Kent County Farmers Get \$800,000.00 In Price Support Funds

The Kent County ASCS Office has had increased activity the last two weeks. Farmers completed certification of the 1969 crops on August 15th. This information was then used to compute payments of approximately \$800,000.00 to Kent County farmers by September 2, 1969.

This has brought smiles to the faces of the local merchants, bankers and farmers themselves. With short crops prospects due to the extreme dry and hot summer, these price support checks look bigger each day.

Price support payments are made to farmers who voluntarily participate in either or all the commodity programs--Cotton, Wheat and Feed Grain.

These crops are in excess supply and for them to com-

pete in a world market they must be priced competitively. The difference in the world price and a fair price as determined by the law (Agriculture Act of 1965) is paid in a direct payment to those who are participating in the volunteer program. Also the commodities produced is supported at a level similar to the world price so these can compete more freely in world trade.

These payments act as a cushion when crops fall due to conditions beyond the producers control.

Expenses for a crop are started from 12 to 16 months before a crop is harvested, therefore, price support payments lend stability to such a risky operation. The law authorizes these farm programs expire with the 1970 crop.

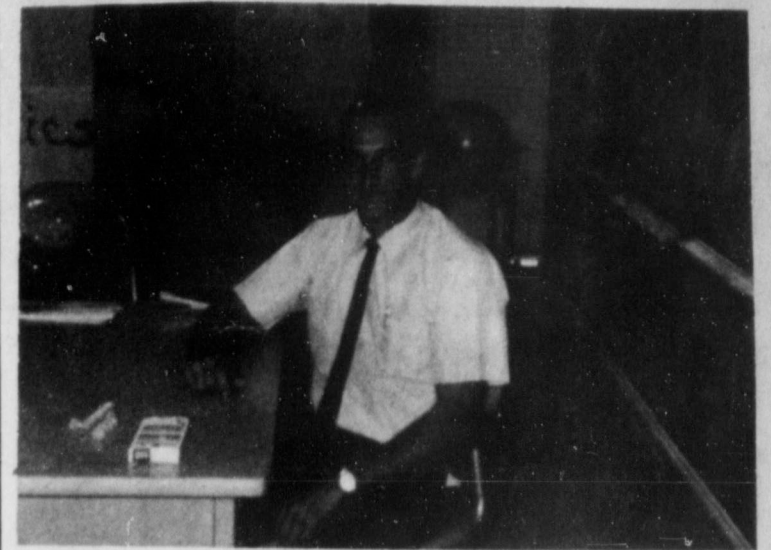
Know The School Faculty

You know, we all want a tax bill that someone else is going to pay. That's why



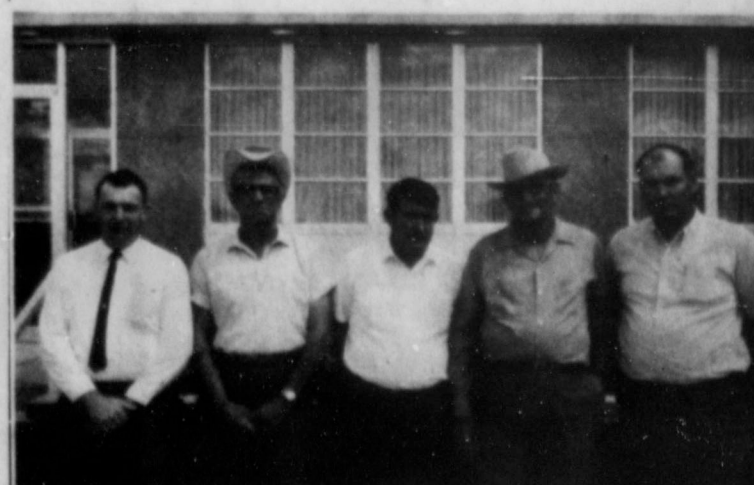

Roscoe Rugged
Roscoe is a team which could be in the thick of the fight after a 7-3 season and a 2-5 district mark, although most observers pick them lower. Five two-way starters, along with three defensive regulars are among the 13 lettermen on hand.

This indicates that the Flowboys should have a rugged defensive unit, but they also have a top-notch backfield and lack only experience in the offensive line. If that line develops, they'll be hard to beat.

Three of the four starters from last season return to the backfield with lanky Ronald Watzl, a 6-2, 185-pound tailback expected to do great things.

Senior quarterback Mike Ratliff and halfback Johnny Sanlings are the other two returning starters in the backfield. Gary Rayburn, a 200-pound junior, is set to launch his size from the fullback spot, with Roger Weeks and Daniel Quintana also bringing letterman experience to the backfield.

Tommy Townsend, who lettered two years at quarterback in Baird and sat out last season under the transfer rule, is also ready to go this season.

Greg Welch, a defensive starter last season, and Bobby Schroedier, a letterman tackle, are a pair of outstanding interior linemen. Tony Deloera, a swift 140-pounder, is set at one end.

David Rannefeldt, 135, is likely to join Welch at the guard position. There are no other lettermen for the offensive tackle or center posts, although Don Freeman, a 200-pound junior up from the "B" team could probably handle one and Cliff Baren, 220, has the size for the other.

Roscoe has a fine group of players up from the "B" team and all they have to do is come through to make the Flowboys a certain threat for the title.

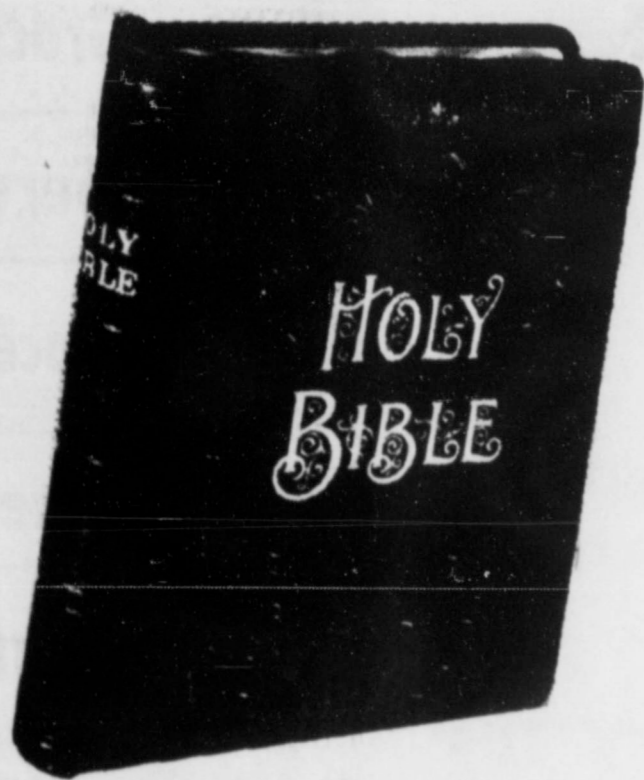

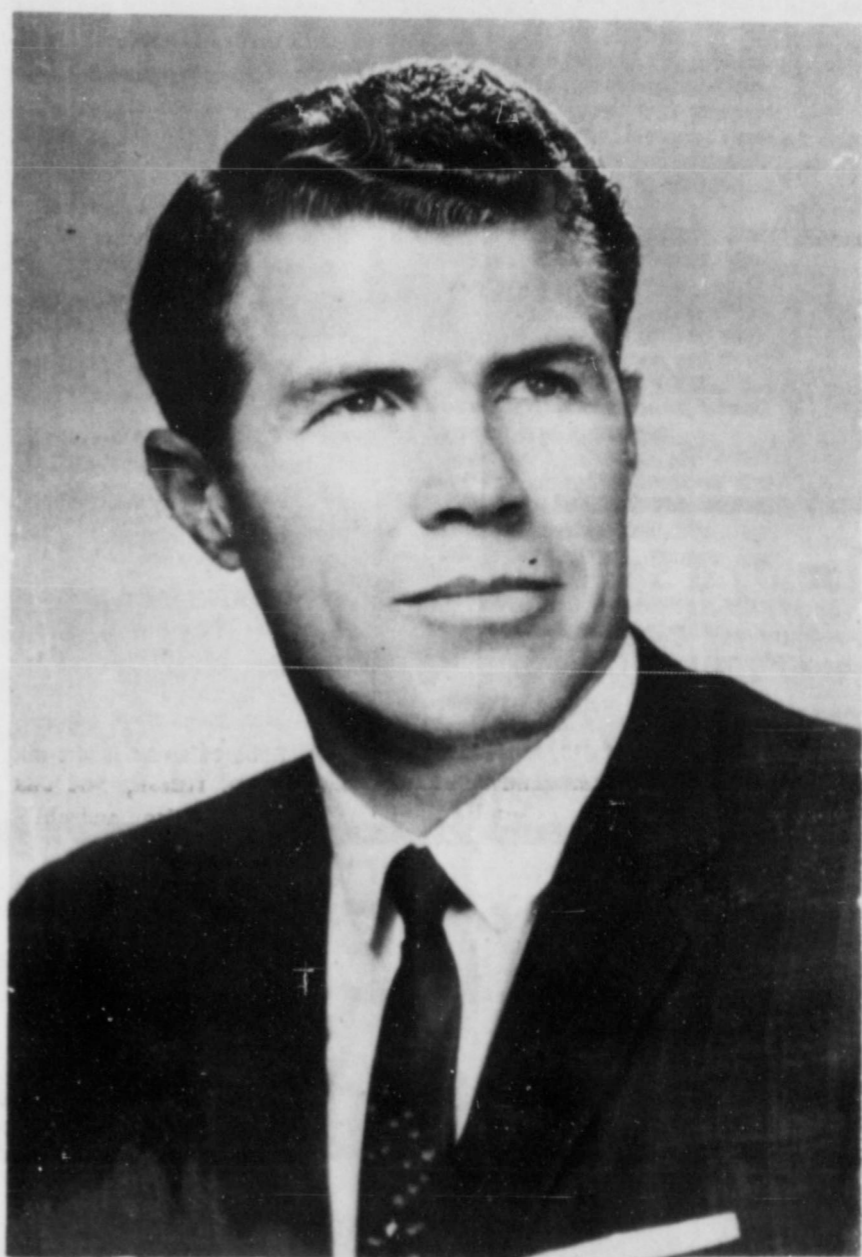
