# Jaybirds Win Over Matador This Week's Honor Players Here Friday Night 19-6

The Jaybirds and the Matadors slugged it out to a scoreless tie in the first half here last Friday night, but the Birds were not to be contained thusly, and came back for a 19 point second half to win an easy 19-6 victory.

Jayton moved the ball well in mid field, but stalled inside the ten twice in the first half.

The Birds made their first tall midway of the third quarter when Martin Garcia scampered around end. Later, Tom Gibson got off a nice run to put the ball on the two, and then Garcia carried it on in.

Midway of the fourth quarter Harold Judy took a long pass and ran it in, for a total play of more than 60 yards for the final tally, and Kim Nichols kicked the one

Matador did not get on the scoreboard until late in the final period when Coach Newton had his bench

Jayton dominated the statistics, leading in first downs ll to 6, and moving the ball 178, to 162 yards. The Matadors did not connect with a single pass, but had one picked off, and they picked off one of the Jays passes. Matador punted 4 times for 35 yards average and Jayton made three for 31 average. Each team took 2 penalties for 20 yards. The visitors lost the ball 3 times by fumbling, and Jayton only once.

The Jaybirds, who now hold a 2-1 record for the season, having lost to Class A Roscoe, and winning from Rochester and Matador, have their work cut out for them this Friday night as they move into the Bobcat's lair in Rule for the annual conflict.

The term "Armed Forces Overseas" includes personnel of the Armed Forces, members of their families, and U. S. civilians employed overseas who receive their mail through an APO or FPO, New York, San Francisco, or

Texas Senators Ralph Yar- | borough and John Tower have been asked by Texas Farm Bureau President Sidney Dean to help change certain "Tax reform" proposals that would hurt agriculture.

In a letter to the two Texas Senators, Dean said the House passed Tax Reform Bill, H. R. 13270, contains several provisions which, if enacted, would "work to the detriment of thousands of full-time far-

Dean said provisions of the proposed law which "we are vitally concerned about" in-

(1) Deletion of the current per cent investment credit for farm machinery and equip-

(2) Extension of the holding period required for livestock to be eligible for capital gains treatment. (3) Repeal of the livestock

exemption from the depreciation recapture provisions of current law.

(4) Ameniment of the present "hobby farming" or "taxloss farm-reporting in favor of the accrual method.

Dean elaborated on the provisions as follows:

"Simple economics dictates the necessity for continuing the 7 percent investment credit as an inducement for farmers and ranchers to buy and use the most efficient machinery and equipment available to assure continued adequate supplies of food and fib-

er for the consumers of this nation. Considering the evertightening cost-price : queeze on farmers and ranchers, the 7 percent investment credit is just what it says it is -- a good investment in the future.

# ew Voter Registration System

Anew voter registration has been initiated for year by the Kent County office. According to the et legislation concerning er resigtration, a signed apcation must be presented to tax office, from which the rent receipt is issued. Inded in this law, and shown the application, is the stateat above the applicants sigare that the giving of false The new voter registra -

mation to procure the reration of a voter is a felony. a system is computerized all the information shown the application card. A e is available for address ges and corrections. If the ication card is correct, all applicant need do is sign and bring or mail it to the office. The card is printed mailing as a postal card, since it is a standard card return address lists only the unty Tax Assessor-Collector, inty Courthouse. Should the be mailed, simply write on, Texas beneath the adstamp, and deposit in the mail box. The voter registration receipt will be returned by mail also.

Should the application card become lost, a duplicate is on file at the tax office. For those persons not having lived previously in Kent County, a blank application is available at the tax office. Also to be noted in the fact that those persons who reside in Kent County that for some reason did not register last year, no application will be mailed as the information for the new system was taken from the last poll list. An effort will be made to get those names and send an application to these people.

The voter registration law presently requires that each voter regardless of age register annually. Since no money is charged for this service, many people become negligent, or forgetful, and fail to register, or register twice. It is hoped that the new computerized system will be helpful to the people and enable the tax collector to perform a more effecient

## **Baby Sitting** Course Set

Jan Luna, Patti Ewing, Kin Davis, Minette Geeslin and Nylene Sherer have completed a five lesson Babysitting Course sponsored by the Home Demonstration Agent, Pat Nilson.

What are the rights of a babysitter? Of the parents? What is expected of a babysitter? What mades a good sitter? These are questions answered the first day as the girls learned the primary concern of a babysitter is, at all times, the safety of the children. The girls learned the importance of knowing how to reach the parents in case of an emergency, as well as the doctor, police, fire department or neighbor.

Judge Bob Gallagher stressed safety while baby sitting and what to do in case or prowlers, burglars, fire or an emergency. He said preparation is the key to all safety habits.

Mrs. Carroll Johnson disucssed the differences in children at various ages and simple but effective guidance techniques.

Mrs. Hal Dean Cave, Jayton School Nurse, had the girls feed, diaper and bathe a doll to practice caring for babies. She also showed

The girls ended the course by showing their "Etcetera Boxes" and enjoying refreshments.




