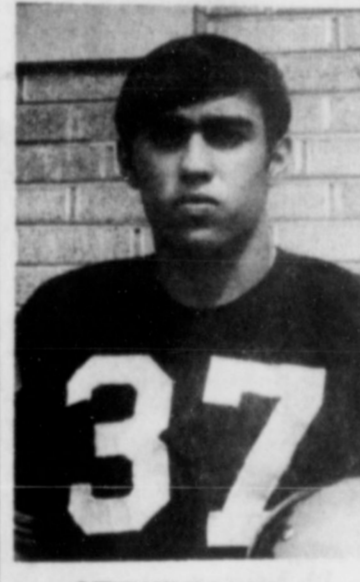

pecially in these times when the U. S. Savings Bonds Program takes on increasing importance in helping to keep our Nation economically strong and secure".

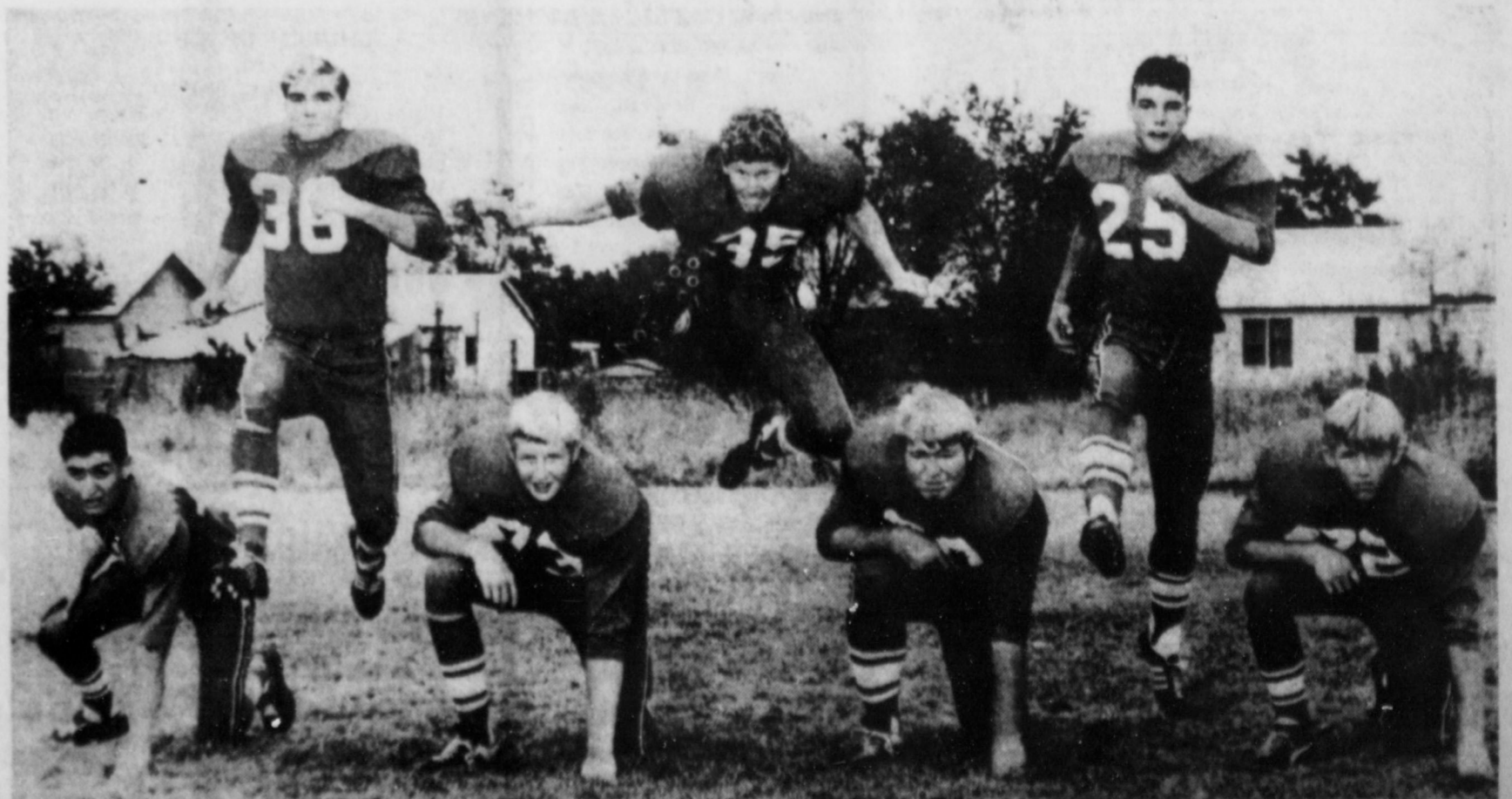
Gallagher is well-known in civic affairs, being active in volunteer work in many areas. He is active in the Lions Club of Jayton and serves as ex officio county school superintendent.

The Hope of The World

In St. Paul's first letter to the Church at Corinth in chapter 14 and verses 34 and 35 he said, "For God is not the author of confusion, but of peace as in all churches of the saints. Let your women keep silent in the church. For it is not permitted unto them to speak; but they are to be under obedience as also saith the law; and if they will learn anything let them ask their husbands at home, for it is a shame for women to speak in the church."

If this scripture should be enforced in the church today, no woman would have any privilege whatsoever. She could not sing, teach a class or ask a single question.

No matter how important, she could not speak to a friend. She would have to go home and ask her husband anything that she wanted to know and probably he would not know the answer.

As we read Paul's first Corinthians, we can appreciate his trouble. Planted in a small congregation in a great heathen city, the people were steeped in the traditions of Paganism, even some of his members still adhered to their heathen beliefs.

The women were trouble makers and kept the church in a state of confusion. Paul, although living and writing under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit could become vexed at times, and the church at Corinth was his greatest worry.

Paul's first letter to the Corinthians was written from Ephesus during A. D. 57, and the second is supposed to have been written from Macedonia some months later. The first letter of course, was worthy of admonition, the second epistle is supplementary to the first. It encourages the mem-

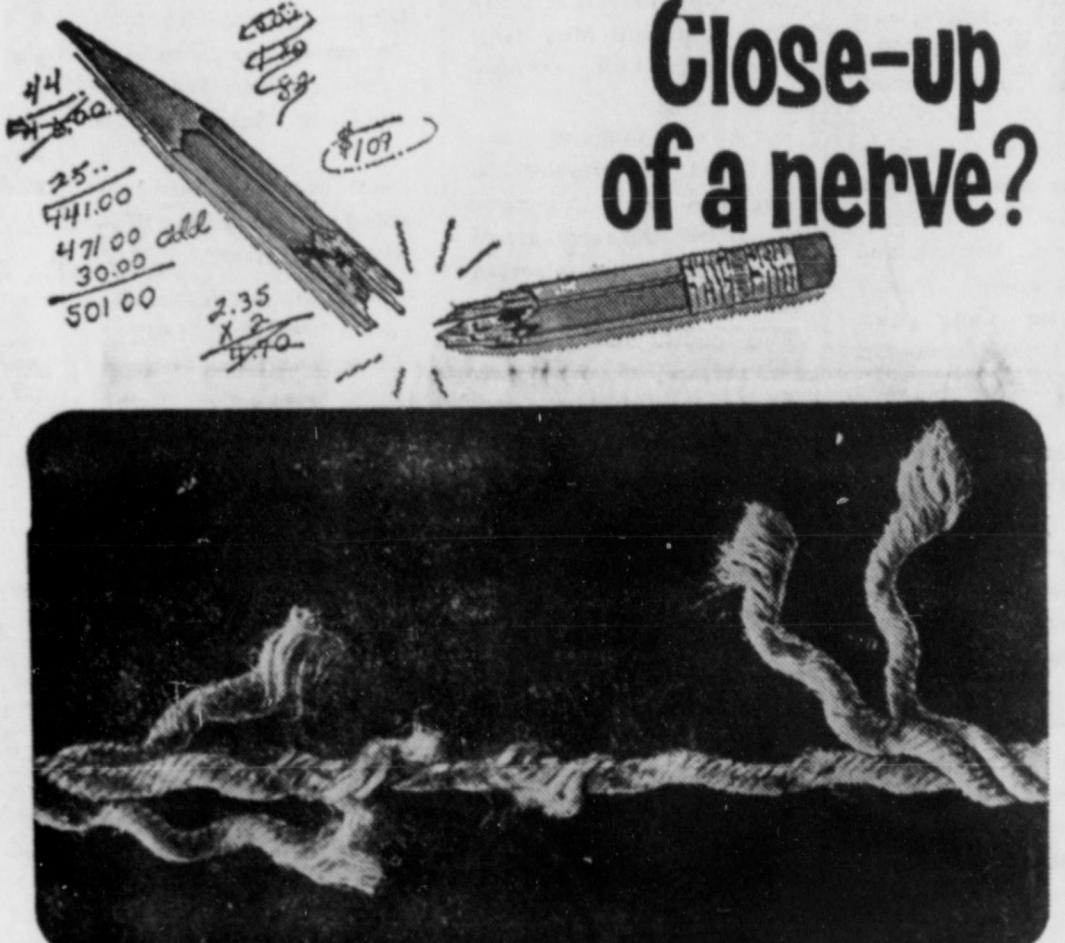

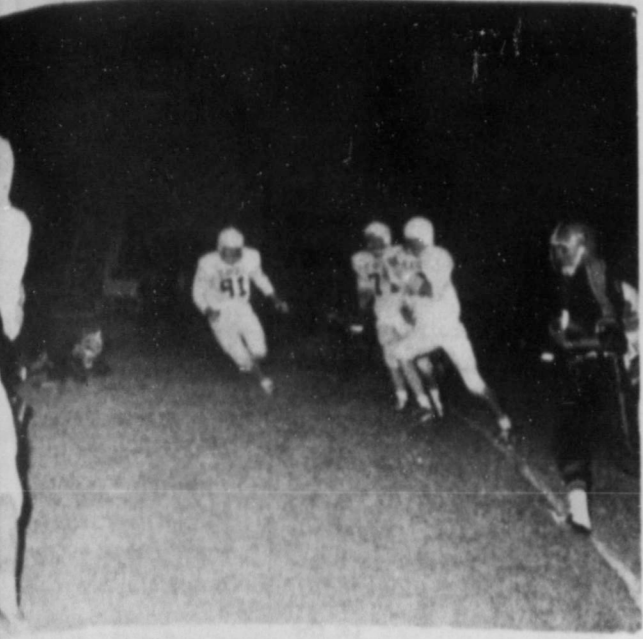
After much prayer and meditation he read and almost memorized First John chapter 4, and he realized that he lacked that love.

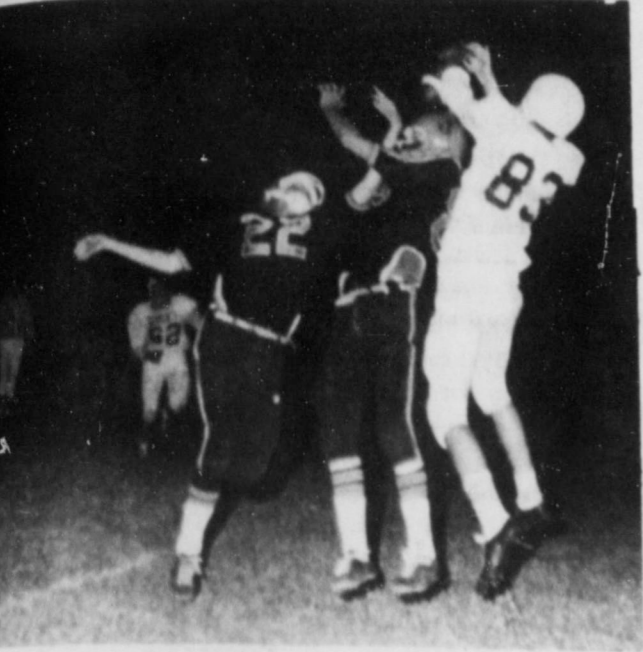

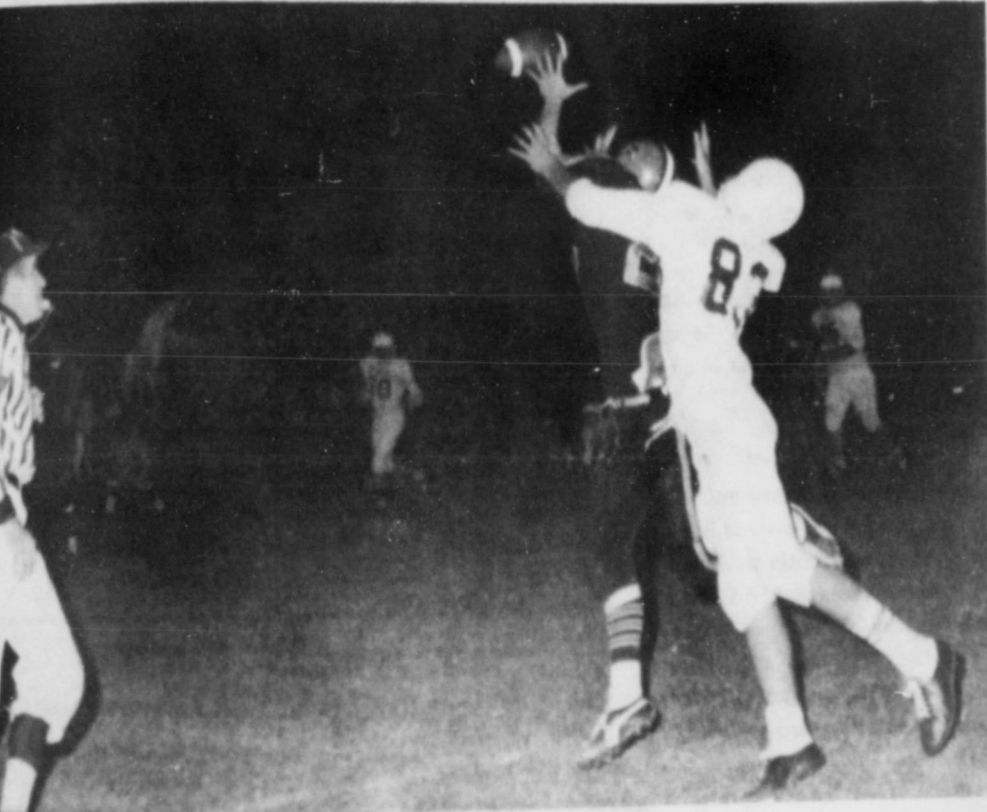

They've also dealt out coordinated beach ensembles wildly adorned with bold playing card motifs. In sturdy cotton hopsacking, the outfits include zip-front jackets, trunks, and long trousers.

And, to make sure this summer's male doesn't feel fashion-neglected, designers have even come up with a beach coverup for men. In unbleached cotton muslin, it's styled like a Tunisian tunic with embroidered neck and sleeves.

Fire Insurance: A "Good Bet"?

Suppose you notice that a neighbor's children have a habit of playing with matches. Could you, if

you were so inclined, take out a fire insurance policy on your neighbor's house? It would be a "good bet," because of the relatively strong chance of a fire.

But the law would not recognize such insurance, because you do not have an "insurable interest" in your neighbor's house. That is, destruction of the house would not hurt you at all. The insurance thus

would be gambling, pure and simple. And, as one court said, it is "a fundamental postulate of all insurance that it must not be a mere bet."

It isn't only that the law frowns on gambling. There is another reason for requiring an insurable interest: to keep you from temptation. If you have fire insurance on a house in which you have no real stake, you might be tempted to burn it down.

Of course, you have an insurable interest in your own home. But as a rule, that interest ends when you sell the property. Take this case:

A woman sold her house, but continued to "hold over" her fire insurance. Sure enough, the house did burn down a few months later. But a court ruled that the woman could not collect on the policy.

"She suffered no loss," said the court, "because the property destroyed was not hers."

On the other hand, you may have an insurable interest in a piece of property even though you don't own it—and never did. For example:

A man took out fire insurance on a house he was occupying as a tenant under a four-year lease. When this house burned down, he demanded payment on his insurance policy—and a court upheld his claim. The judge said a leasehold, too, is a valuable property interest, an interest that fire insurance could protect.

But the tenant could collect only to the extent of his leasehold interest, not for the full value of the house. In short, fire insurance is supposed to let you come out even. It is not supposed to let you make a profit.

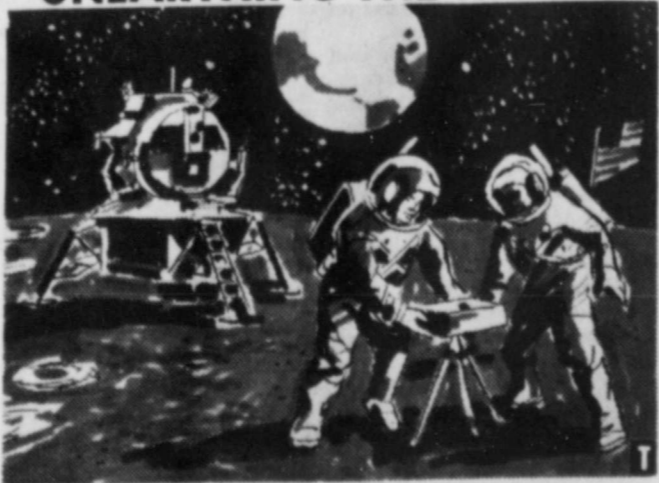

UNEARTHING THE MOON



John Glenn, first American to orbit the earth, recently remarked that we don't yet know what the real value of going to the moon and beyond will be and that we are not yet close to finding out. The knowledge we are obtaining, however, is the last thing we are looking for, he said. "He who has command of information, and can use it well, is on top — more so today than ever before."

What is the initial information garnered by the first men on the moon? Much of it will relate to "paydirt" struck by these valiant "prospectors," who found a great variety of different rocks, which could tell much about the moon's age and origin.

They dug a five-inch sample of lunar soil that "looks moist," a suggestion that there might be water and so perhaps microscopic life beneath the moon's surface.

They found the crust of the moon much harder than numerous geologists and astronomers expected they would. It took

work to dig out two core samples and to plant the American flag.

They set up a seismometer which soon was recording moon tremors. Medically, the excursion showed the moon to be not so fearful a place as cautious planners painted it.

That moon research will yield many practical benefits is not doubted, although it will take time. One medical example of progress through space research was the testing of a motion sickness formula to protect the astronauts from suffering the ill effects of spinning. The formula found most effective is contained in Triptone, which is available at drug counters. 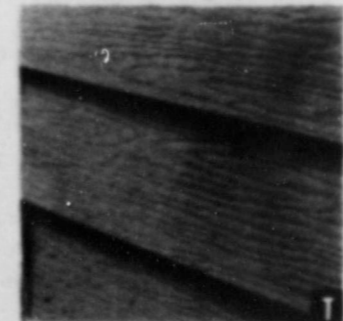

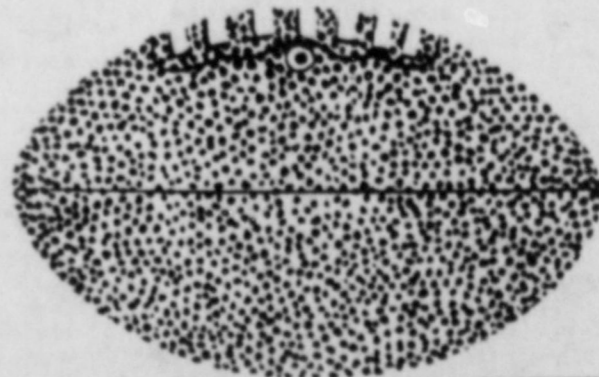
