## Dale Condron Dies In An Abilene Hospital

Clifford Dale Condron, 43, of Jayton, Kent County Attorney since Jan. 1, 1963, died Thursday afternoon at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene after and illness of several weeks. He underwent surgery about three weeks ago and had been in intensive care ever since.

Services were held at the First United Methodist Church of Throckmorton. Wayland Dowden, Methodist minister from Clyde, Will Scott, Church of Christ minister from Throckmorton, and Jack Wright, minister from Abilene officiated. Burial was in Throckmorton Cemetery with Merriman Funeral Home in charge. Graveside rites were conducted by Masons.

Condron was a brilliant student, graduating from Throckmorton at the age of 14 in 1942 and entered Texas Tech at the age of 14. He volunteered for the Navy in 1944 and completed officer's candidate school with high honors, but was too young by regulations to be an officer. He appealed to Pres. Franklin Roosevelt by mail, and was granted special permission to be commissioned. He served as a Naval lieutenant in the American and Asiatic theaters, and received many medals and honors. He was discharged Aug. 13, 1946, and entered the University of Texas Law School. He was graduated with honors in 1949, and later completed his law degree.

He was a member of many honorary and professional societies and fraternities including the Order of the Coif, Chancellors, and The Law Review. These are honors highly coveted by attorneys all over the nation.

He had practiced law in Haskell, Beaumont, and Throckmorton, and was practicing attorney before the US Supreme Court. He was a member of the Jayton Methodist Church, American Legion of Throckmorton, the Haskell Masonic Lodge 682, and was a member of the El Paso Consistory.

Condron was first appointed by the Kent County Commissioner's Court to fill the one year unexpired term of Dawson Bryant, who had resigned, and later was twice elected to the office. He had

resided in Jayton eight years. Survivors are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Condron of Throckmorton; three brothers, James of Throckmorton, R. H. Jr. of Gainesville and Wilburn of Knox City; a son, Chris, and a daughter, Gayle Ann, both of Throckmorton.

Pallbearers were Euel Harrison, Hubert Roach, District Judge B. C. Chapman, Jon Jameson, Joe Williams, and District Attorney Royce Atkins.

The holiday season is here, and I'd like to wish everyone a very Merry Christmas and Happy New Year. Eat plenty of black-eyed peas on January 1, 1970 for good luck during the year.

For holiday meals, here are some food thoughts:

For a light appetizer pour gingerale over diced apples and bananas in your prettiest sherbet glasses.

Corn relish brings back thoughts of long ago Christmas and adds interesting texture to your relish tray.

Slices of mild avocado and plump sections of grapefruit are a cooling relished salad in your warm, hearty

meal.

Slivered almonds tossed with buttered French-cut green beans make everyday vegetables fit for a king.

For a flavor surprise, stir chunks of pineapple into mashed sweet potatoes before the dish is dotted with marshmallows and baked.

Plump some raisins with boiling water and add them to fresh cranberry-orange relish.

Washed, polished fruit and assorted nuts make a perfect center piece and double as dessert.

refrigerator for long periods of time. Remove all dressing from turkey and store in covered container. Store gravy in separate covered container. Use dressing and gravy within 1 or 2 days. If only one side of turkey has been carved, wrap whole bird; otherwise, remove meat from bones, wrap well, and store in refrigerator. Use within 2 or 3 days.

When serving leftovers, remove from the refrigerator only enough for one meal, so any remaining are kept under constant refrigeration.

Leftover turkey and gravy may be frozen. Wrap turkey in moisture - vapor-proof paper, excluding as much air as possible, or pack in freezer containers. Pour gravy into freezer cartons or jars. Turkey and gravy may be packed in same container. Plain turkey may be stored in freezer for 1 month. Turkey covered with gravy may be stored for 6 months. Freezing of dressing not recommended for it becomes soggy and may develop an off-flavor.

If you are traveling out of town for the holidays, have a safe trip, and I'll see you in 1970.

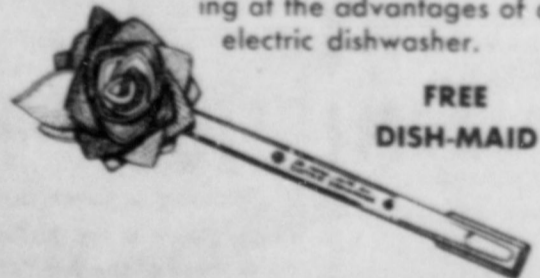

### Treat Lousy Cattle Now

Lice that are on your cattle now are the ones that start the winter infestation. Since lice don't fly and they don't spend any time on the ground or in the brush, treatment of lousy cattle now will kill all of the lice that are on your cattle and the cattle will stay free of lice this winter unless they come in contact with a lousy animal.

Don't wait until your cattle are rubbing the fences down before you treat for lice. Treat cattle by a thorough spraying or a good dipping now before the weather gets bad and their hair gets long. If treatment for lice is put off until cattle are noticeably infested, the cattle have been weakened and the lice are more difficult to control.

Insecticides and application rates recommended for lice control on cattle are listed in the "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry," which is available in your local county agricultural agent's office.

Before buying insecticides for spraying or dipping cattle, read the label on the insecticide container completely. Pay particular attention to warnings and restrictions listed on the label, check on waiting periods—especially if some treated cattle may be going to slaughter.

### Christmas Lighting Conveys Special Holiday Message

Special lighting has become an important way of conveying Christmas messages in many homes.

With a bit of imagination, simple materials and a few basic rules, a home can give a warm holiday wish for all. Mrs. Jane Berry, Extension housing and home furnishings specialist, says the best effects begin with a plan.

It's not a bad idea to put the plan on paper, she says, sketching the effect wanted and lighting the equipment and supplies needed.

Strive for unity and beauty of design to prevent gaudy overdecorating. Choose the most attractive part of the home or yard and place the focal point of the design there, advises the specialist.

Indoors and outdoors, concentrate lighting on one single feature -- the focal point. Build around the focal point with secondary lighting and design features. Relate the whole design to the house, yard, or whatever will form the background.

General lighting can unify all the elements of the design as it reduces glare and unwanted shadows. Strings of light that form paths or lines between the various parts of the design also make for unity.

Outdoor lighting should coordinate with indoor design, the Texas A&M University specialist adds. One will accent the other and fewer decorative materials will do the job. The total effect will be far more impressive.

### Special Breeding Practices Showing Good Results

College Station--Texas stockmen may profit from suggestions by a Texas A&M University animal reproduction specialist.

John Beverly, Extension specialist, said if certain criteria are met, heifers can be bred to calve at 2 years of age without running the risk of their failing to calve as 3-year-olds.

The criteria listed by Beverly includes: (1) growing the heifers so they will gain about one and a quarter lbs. per day; (2) avoid pushing heifers to a point of becoming fat; (3) heifers must weigh 600 pounds when they are bred, and (4) the heifers need to be bred to calve 30-60 days before the regular cow herd completes calving.

"The heifers must get their growth before they are bred in order for them to breed right back for their second calf," Beverly said. "Otherwise, there is a big risk of their missing the second calf in order to satisfy the body requirements for growth."

The reason for breeding heifers to calve 30-60 days ahead of the regular cow herd goes back to the growth factor.

"A heifer with a first calf has four requirements for the feed consumed--body maintenance, milk production, growth, and reproduction. If any of these have to be sacrificed, reproduction is the first to go. The mature cow does not have the growth requirement, so the extra 30-60 days allow some time for growing without sacrificing reproduction. This insures the second calf heifers to calve on time with the remainder of the herd," Beverly said.

**Silencing the Liar**

Mother-in-law trouble sent Fred's young wife into court.

"That horrid woman has been telling my Fred some terrible tales about me," she complained. "I want a stop order against these lies. I want an injunction to keep her quiet from now on."

But the court refused to issue such an order. The judge said the wife would have to let the mother-in-law do her talking—and then sue her for defamation of character.

To the young woman, the judge's advice was scant comfort. And to anyone facing vilification by another person, an ounce of prevention is surely better than a pound of cure.

Yet, as a rule, courts will not forbid a falsehood in advance—mainly for fear of stifling the free speech guaranteed by the Constitution. The law's usual remedy, instead, is to let the lie come out in the open, and then make the liar suffer the consequences.

This applies not only to private disputes, as in the case of Fred's wife, but to public disputes as well. For example:

A man fired from a charitable organization began publicly accusing its officials of misconduct. The organization went to court for a stop order, on the ground that the accusations were false—and were injuring its good name.

But again the court refused to interfere, saying the organization would have to follow the slower path of a damage suit for defamation.

Nevertheless, a stop order may be issued when, in addition to the lie itself, there is some extra element of financial injury—something more than mere personal discomfort. Thus:

A motorist, dissatisfied with his car, demanded a new one from a dealer near his home—even though he had bought the car somewhere else. When the dealer said no, the motorist painted a large white elephant on each side of his car and began cruising around near the dealer's showroom.

This time, when the auto dealer went to court, the judge did issue a stop order against the motorist. Not only was his "white elephant" message deceiving, said the court, but it also was an effort to force a new car out of the dealer by a sort of blackmail.

## News From The State Capitol In Austin

AUSTIN, Tex. -- A "State of emergency" exists for reducing Texas' traffic toll, Gov. Preston Smith warned in addressing some 700 safety-minded persons who answered his call to attend a public support conference to discuss the problem and how to solve it.

Result is a new statewide safety campaign. It got underway immediately and is focusing efforts on the holiday periods—Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Years. These are the times when accident frequency is unusually high. Smith reminded the conference of community

leaders that 10 Texans a day die in automobile accidents. Figures provided by the Texas Safety Association reveal that last month alone the loss—dollarwise—amounted to \$77 million. Crashes in Texas' urban areas account for \$50 million of this figure.

Causes? Higher speed limits, abolishing the old merit-rating insurance plan which called for higher premiums on bad drivers and a 1965 law which allows judges to probate misdemeanor sentences including traffic offenses were blamed for the climbing death rate.

Whatever the cause 3,481 died last year, 217,000 were hurt and \$875 million in economic losses chalked up. Department of Public Safety statistics indicate 3,700 will die this year unless holiday safety campaigns are a remarkable success.

"The grim reality," said Smith, "is that one out of every seven motor vehicles registered in Texas was involved in an accident in 1968. The certainty of 10 Texans losing their lives on the highways of our state each and every day is more than tragic. It constitutes a crisis—a crisis that, in my mind, is a state of emergency."

OIL ALLOWABLE ROCKETED—State oil production allowable zooms to a near record 62.7 percent of potential for December under a Railroad Commission order.

December figure is highest set under present formulas except for last June's 63.5 percent. It will authorize a maximum 3,770,319 barrel daily production. This is 472,051 more than November which was limited to 52.7 percent allowable. Estimated daily production during December is expected to average out at 3,194,476.

Five of 14 major crude oil purchasers asked for an allowable increase. Eight asked retention of the November level, and only one sought a reduction.

### EDUCATION'S

INVESTMENTS Moving more heavily into equities instead of debt investments, the Texas State Board of Education has decided to put 60 per cent of its income into corporation stocks. It may increase that to 70 per cent if it finds bargains in the stock market in November and December.

Board took this action after two vice presidents of the Chase Manhattan Bank, the board's fiscal advisors, suggested heavier investments in common stocks. Voters to Texas have removed the constitutional limit that the fund's money must go 50 per cent into municipal and government bonds.

Board of Education buys from \$4 million to \$5 million worth of securities a month. It put the \$4.1 million it got from cash bonuses on oil and gas leases on Nov. 4 mainly into U. S. treasury bills. This was timed so as to fill in the gaps in the year ahead and hold average buying to about \$4 million.

COURTS SPEAK--State Supreme Court in a major will contest held that 22-year-old Army Sgt. Albert Buckman Wharton III is sole heir to the \$45 million oil-ranching estate of Electra Waggoner (for whom the town of Electra was named.)

High Court set arguments for December 17 in a case which will determine if private clubs in dry areas can hire agents to buy liquor for "locker system" pools. Four months ago the Third Court of Civil Appeals holding against the State Liquor Control Board, said such a procedure is legal.

Sixteen-year-sentence of a 17-year-old Dallas youth for possession of marijuana was reversed by the Court of Criminal Appeals on grounds that there was no evidence the boy was ever in the room where burned marijuana was found.

San Antonio discount stores have filed a motion for reconsideration of a split Supreme Court decision on upholding Saturday-Sunday closing law's constitutionality.

ATTORNEY GENERAL SPEAKS--A Court order stating that a person with a suspended driver's license can drive under certain conditions with an "occupational license" must set out the actual hours of the day that driving is permitted, says Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

Martin altered an earlier opinion to reflect that those seeking "occupational licenses" need only a court order and proof of insurance (or its equivalent) under the Texas' Safety Responsibility Law.

The Attorney General is warning Texans to be on the lookout for lottery punchboards currently being mailed into the state. Letters accompanying the boards attempt to induce people to sell chances on the punchboards to win merchandise. Martin pointed out that selling chances on the punchboards is a violation of the state lottery law.

AUTO INSPECTIONS DOWN Auto inspections are 30 per cent behind the number last year, according to Col. Wilson E. Speil, director of Texas Department of Public Safety.

Unless things pick up, forecasts Speil, car owners are going to be waiting in some mighty long lines at garages and service stations around the April 15 deadline.

During the state fiscal year which ended August 31, 6.3 million vehicles were inspected. Since September 1, only 538,000 have gone through the required check. All inspection stickers issued after September 1 will expire 12 months from date of issue. All new stickers must be displayed before April 15, however. Stickers this year

will go on driver's side of windshield.

VALLEY VISTAS YANKED--James W. Griffith, new Southwest Regional Office of Economic Opportunity boss, announced withdrawal and reassignment of 15 VISTA anti-poverty workers in Cameron and Willacy counties.

Griffith charged that Volunteers in Service to America were made "scapegoats of local political disputes" and subjected to "harassment, uncertainty and threats." He said the VISTA group in the two counties were responsible people and there was no evidence of improper action on their part. Griffith lashed Cameron County commissioners for again requesting the governor to remove them after a 90-day truce period had been agreed on for reassessing VISTA work. There is, Griffith concluded, a shortage of such workers, and they will be sent where they are needed and wanted.

APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED--Gov. Preston Smith named the members of the new Texas State Board of Examiners of Psychologists, then changed his mind about qualifications of three of the six, pending a more specific definition of "accredited" Colleges--a requirement of appointees.

He left standing the appointments of Dr. Murray Kovar of Lubbock, Dr. George Kramer Jr. of Corpus Christi and Dr. Wayne Gill of San Antonio.

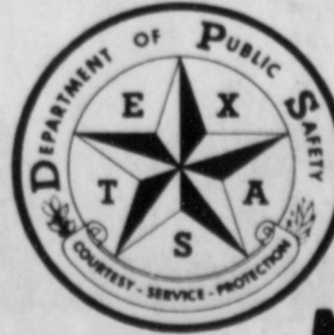

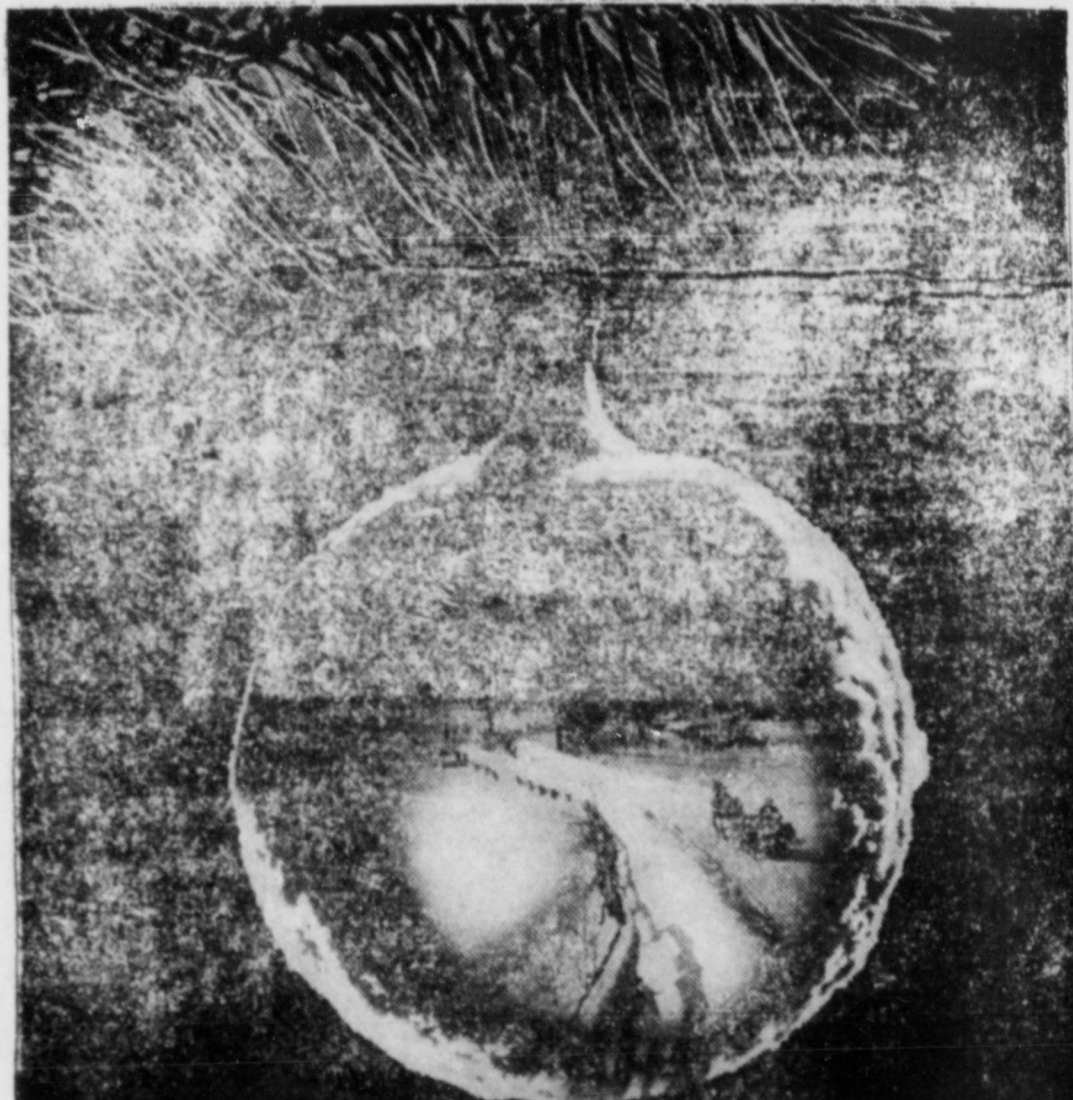

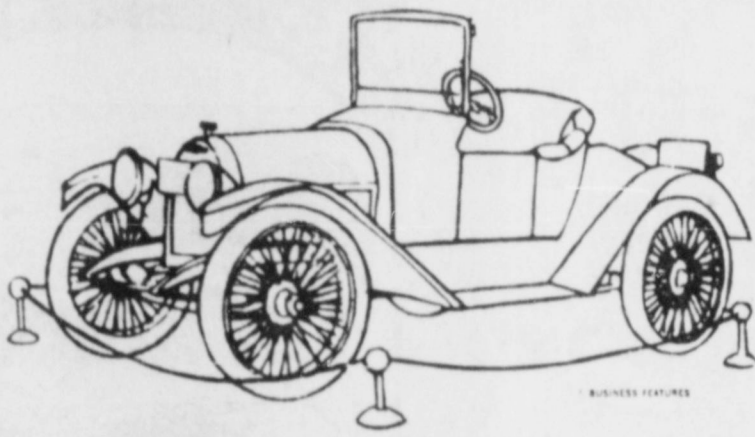

In Bethlehem, it's the rainy season.

In Hawaii, Santa Claus might arrive by boat, and Christmas could be celebrated on a sunny beach. In Australia, Christmas is a time for picnicking — it's summer "down under."

Even in Northern lands, December 25th does not always provide the pleasures of a "white Christmas."

In spite of the varying climates where Christmas is observed, and in spite of the frequent shortage of ice and snow at the appropriate time, the traditional image of Christmas is, and probably always will be, a wintry, snowy landscape — celebrated in song and story, pictured in countless paintings.

The countryside under a blanket of snow, the hillside drifted deep in white, the trees bent down with snow or crystal-bright with ice, the lakes, rivers and streams gleaming in ice-covered magnificence — these are favorite themes in holiday lore, and favorite dreams for all those who spend Christmas cozily among the conveniences of modern centrally-heated buildings and modern transportation.

The "winter wonderland" of ice and snow has been a frequent source of inspiration for artists. There's a wealth of winter landscape paintings that, although not directly associated with Christmas, seem to set the mood and reflect the spirit of the season.

In 16th and 17th century Holland, for instance, a whole tradition of landscape painting was devoted solely to depicting winter scenes — somewhat unusual since the winter weather of Holland is not especially cold.

Perhaps because he devoted his artistic talents exclusively to the winter landscape, Avercamp's paintings capture to perfection both the beauties

For admirers of art and white Christmases alike, one of the definitive painters of winter scenes is Hendrik Avercamp.

and pleasures of winter. Bare branches of trees etch their patterns against expanses of ice, in contrast with the cozy cottages and, on the ice, the merry skaters, for an ideal blending of the cold weather and warm spirit of a winter holiday.

Of Avercamp's personal history, little is known. Records show that he was baptized in Amsterdam in January 1585, and buried at Kampen in 1634. His painting was influenced by the Flemish landscape tradition and particularly by Pieter Bruegel the Elder — a painter whose fascination with the winter scene did much to shape his landscape style. The snow-covered hillsides

seen in the work of the elder Pieter Bruegel contrast strangely with the flat, icy terrain of his native Holland. The explanation is to be found in travels which took him to mountainous lands. Bruegel became a master in the Antwerp painters' guild in 1551, and shortly afterward journeyed to France and Italy, says the Grolier Book of Art. In 1554 he returned from

Rome to the Netherlands, re-crossing the Alps on his way. The mountains and scenery of Italy made an immense impression on him, as reflected in the drawings he made at the time. More than the "contemporary" Italian art, those mountainous vistas influenced his landscape style — and ultimately inspired Avercamp and other Flemish painters of the ever-wonderful winter scene.
