Mrs. Les Matthews of Jayton will teach crocheting every Tuesday and Thursday night, beginning March 10th, at 7:30 in the Extension Office.

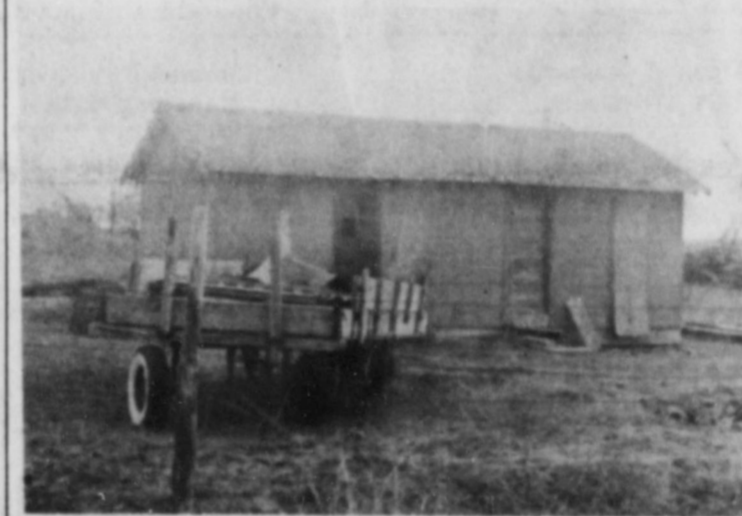

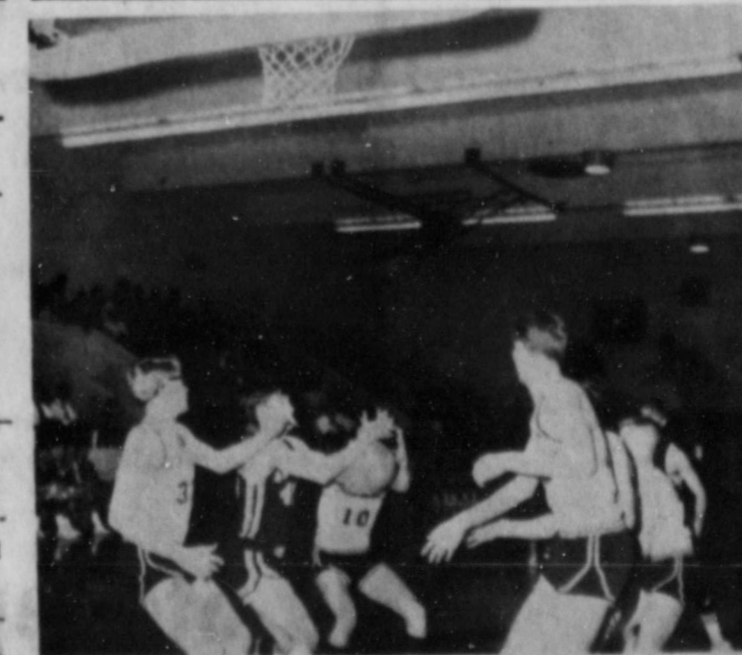

Cuisenaire Rods are a new teaching method which uses rods of various sizes and colors to teach basic mathematical principles to students from pre-school through junior high.

The workshop, held at the Holiday Inn Parkway in Lubbock, was for area teachers who were provided with Cuisenaire Rods Kits by the ESC at the first workshop in October.

Sister Alice Hunter, school consultant for the Diocese of Dallas-Ft. Worth and counselor for the Cuisenaire Co., conducted the workshop and gave teachers knowledge for the effective use of the Cuisenaire Rods.

The conference also provided a review of basic procedures in the use of the rods and assistance was given to teachers with specific problems.

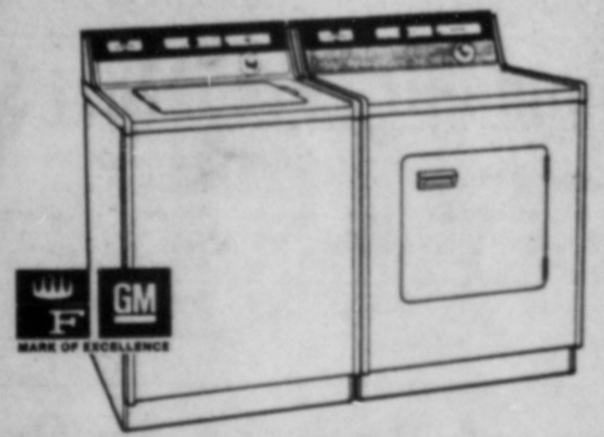

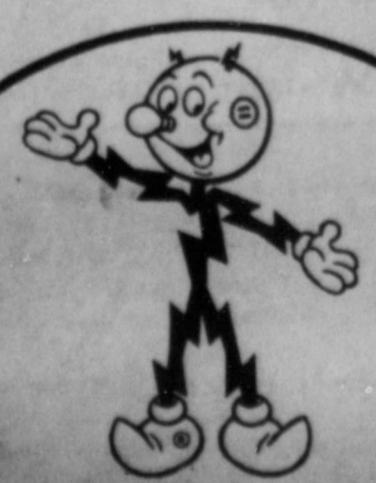



pantry patter

Eggs are a good source of Vitamin A along with protein, B vitamins and iron. Vitamin A is found in the yolk of an egg. Two eggs equal 22 percent of daily recommended needs of Vitamin A for an adult. Extra egg yolks can be frozen, with the addition of a stabilizer.

To prevent egg yolks from becoming gummy and lumpy after thawing; add a small amount of salt, sugar, or other edible ingredient before freezing. Add salt to yolks if you'll use them later for mayonnaise or noodles. Add sugar if eggs are used later in baked goods. Each cup of egg yolks should be blended with one tablespoon of sugar or corn syrup or one-half teaspoon salt.

Leftover egg yolks may be stored a day or two in refrigerator. They should be covered with cold water in a tight-

ly closed container.

Leftover egg yolks can be used in a butterscotch parfait, cream soups, custards, French vanilla ice cream, sauces, scrambled eggs, mayonnaise, or come cakes.

To enrich pudding and pie filling mixes, add slightly beaten egg yolks to amount of milk specified on package. Then make as label directs.

Beat one or two yolks in mashed potatoes.

Add to white sauce to make it richer or to condensed cream soups.

Substitute two egg yolks for one whole egg when making baked or boiled custards.

Other good sources of Vitamin A include butter and margarine, cod liver and other fish oils, whole milk and cream, liver. Vegetables and fruits of high vitamin A value are dark green, leafy vegetables such as turnip greens,

mustard greens, and spinach; deep yellow vegetables as carrots, pumpkin, sweet potatoes, and winter squash; and yellow fruits as peaches, apricots, and cantalope.

STUFFED EGGS

WITH MUSTARD
9 hard boiled eggs
1/2 cup crumbled blue cheese
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/4 cup prepared mustard
1/2 tsp. black pepper
Peel eggs and cut in half lengthwise. Remove egg yolks and mash with fork. Add cheese mayonnaise, mustard and pepper. Beat until smooth. Put into egg white halves.

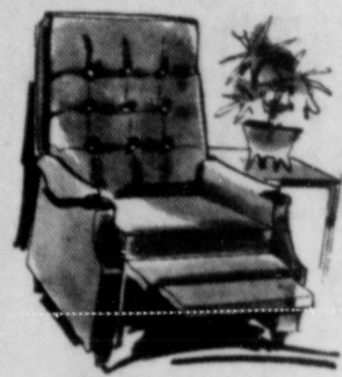
