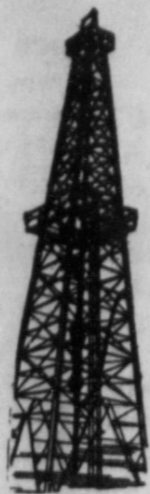

The voters of Kent County settled one race, and postponed two others in Saturday's Primary.

County Treasurer F. O. Harrison staved off his opponent, Cornelia Cheyne, 401 to 302, to win a new three year term.

Precinct 2 Commissioner, Carlos Dickerson led the field of five with a vote of 72. All of his four opponents were huddled together behind him only four votes separating his runoff opponent C. C. Scott, and the other three.

Precinct 4 Commissioner W. C. Dibrell, and his runoff opponent Donnie Carriker each polled 94 votes with Hamlin Stanaland coming in third with 77.

Kent County also gave a nice margin of 375 to Bentsen over Yarborough with 293.

Notes by the HD Agent

Ten years of research have produced a new dry whole milk powder which may successfully meet the ultimate trial; it taste like milk.

The product, Dairy Fresh, was developed by US Dept. of Agriculture research engineers. In marketing tests it proved itself successful as a beverage.

Just about everyone who bought and used the new powder couldn't tell the difference between it and fresh fluid milk, reported Frances Reasonover, Extension foods and nutrition specialist.

Nonfat dry milk powders are not new; they have been sold in supermarkets for years, she explains. But powdered whole milk, prior to Dairy Fresh was not generally sold in retail outlets. It went mainly to the institutional trade usually for cooking and baking.

Dairy Fresh is made by a continuous vacuum foam process which pasteurizes, homogenizes and concentrates whole milk and reduces it to powder. A can of the Dairy Fresh powder can be reconstituted to the equivalent of one quart of whole milk, with a butterfat content of 3.25 percent.

This powder can be stored under normal home refrigeration for six months. To reconstitute, homemakers add cold water to the powder in an electric mixer or shaker.

Virtually all Dairy Fresh users in the market test gave it high scores when asked its taste, wholesomeness, cost, and richness. And when asked to compare Dairy Fresh with fresh fluid milk, the great majority considered it as good or better than fresh milk on all of these counts except richness.

Three in 10 Dairy Fresh users considered the powdered milk less rich than fresh fluid milk, but the acceptance rate on the "ease of storage" point was overwhelming.

was evidenced in yet another way. More than 75 percent of the consumers who bought and used it said they planned on buying more. A follow-up interview showed that a third of the initial customers had actually made a second purchase. The new powdered milk did not cut into another product's market, Miss Reasonover added. At the price it was sold—4 cents per quart below fluid whole milk in 2 quart cartons—Dairy Fresh will open new outlets for milk in camping, resort homes and for special uses. Fluid milk sales during the test period were not affected by Dairy Fresh.

Milk, in all forms, is probably the most important source of riboflavin, Vitamin B2. Riboflavin is necessary for normal growth, healthy eyes, and healthy skin. A deficiency may result in cracking of skin at the corners of the mouth, an abnormally smooth tongue that has a purplish-red color, eye disturbances, improper growth in children and tendency to age early. Eye disturbances include sensitiveness to light; watering, itching and burning of eyes; swelling, soreness, and roughness in the eyelids, dimness or blurring of vision and eyes that are easily fatigued. Eye symptoms are usually the first to appear. In experiments performed on female rats kept on B2 deficiency diets, the young showed birth deformities including shortened leg bones; fusion of the ribs; fingers and toes; and cleft palate. Those given high levels of riboflavin grew

faster, matured earlier, showed more vigor and lived longer with a relatively shorter period of senility than those on normal diets. Sources of riboflavin are milk, cheddar cheese, dried yeast, liver, kidney, and dark green leafy vegetables including spinach, kale, collards, broccoli and Brussels sprouts. Enriched cereals are a good source of riboflavin. All forms of milk contain important amounts of riboflavin. Non-fat dry milk costs one-third to one-half as much as same amount of whole milk. Fresh milk in 1 to 1 gallon containers usually cost less per quart than single quarts. Milk should be heated or cooked at a low temperature. Do not let it boil. High temperatures cause the protein to coagulate into a film on top and a coating on sides of the pan. Prolonged high temperatures cause off-flavors and sometimes scorching. Use

low temperature for baking casseroles containing lots of milk. Buttermilk and home-soured milk can be used interchangeably for baking. For each cup sour milk needed, 1 tablespoon vinegar or lemon juice with enough sweet milk to make one cup of liquid. Let this stand 5 minutes before you use it. Sour half and half may be used in place of sour cream in many recipes, including cakes and cookies that contain fat in addition to sour cream.  In heavy iron skillet, saute onions, garlic and chilies over medium heat; add grated cheese, cook over low heat, stirring constantly until cheese is completely melted. May be served warm or cold. Yield: 12 servings. Serve with corn chips.

A drillstem test in an unidentified formation between 3,911-3,960 feet recovered 1,035 feet of oil and 1,825 feet of slightly mud-cut and heavily gas-cut oil, no water.

Site is 2,173 feet from north and east lines of Section 331-Block 2, H&TC Survey, 10 miles north of Rotan.

The opener of the Rough Draw, Northeast Field, the firm's No. 1-A Jackson, was completed Jan. 15 to flow 219 barrels of 42-gravity oil, plus four barrels of water daily, through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations at 3,976-4,010 feet.
