## Ralph Newton Employed As High School Principal

In a regular Board meeting last Thursday night, Ralph Newton was moved by the board from the position of coach and athletic director, to the position of high school principal. He is an experienced administrator, having served as superintendent at Trent before coming to Jay-

ton. Supt. R. N. Pierce, in discussing the move, the first of the week, was high in his praise of Newton. "He can work anywhere, and do an excellent job," he said. Also the board employed Margie Shackelford of Happy, and West Texas State as bus-

ness teacher. They approved the contract with Pritchard and Abbott for the coming year, to handle oil and gas tax appraisals. The board will not set the tax rate until next month, but Pierce said he is sure there will be no raise in the tax rate.

## Commissioners Court Furthers Plans For Library And Community Center

The Kent County Commissioners Court had one of its busiest days ever Monday, staying in session until after 6 p. m. Several important matters took considerable amount of discussing.

They accepted the bid of West Texas Sound Equipment Company of Lubbock in the amount of \$1,198.27 to furnish material and labor for the installation of sound equipment at the Clairmont gym, the Jayton Roping pens and the Jayton Little League Park. This will be guaranteed for six months after installation.

This order was passed on motion by Carlos Dickerson and seconded by Gordon Hamilton.

They voted to pay \$200 to the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District to prepare and publish a paper on the conservation needs of Kent County.

Jack Amato and Ronny Williams met with the court to discuss changing the company furnishing the county group insurance. The present company has notified them there will be an advance in

the rates. This was discussed at length, but no action taken.

Bill Cox representing an architectural firm met with the court and presented preliminary plans for a proposed County library and community center. This was discussed at length, with many changes suggested. He will draw up plans embracing the suggestions and report back to the court at a later date, probably in a special called meeting.

## About History And Wars And Religion

Two hundred years ago thirteen struggling colonies lay along the Atlantic seaboard consisting of people from almost all parts of Europe. The colonies were governed by England, and as time wore on the demands of the British increased. Taxes became so high that protests were made to no avail. We had no representation in Parliament. British troops were stationed in various parts of the colonies and the colonists were compelled to furnish food and shelter for the soldiers. A squad of soldiers fired on a crowd of citizens killing three persons and wounding several others. Of course, this affair known as the Boston Massacre increased the unrest throughout the country. A ship load of tea arrived at Boston and fifty men disguised as Indians threw it overboard into the sea. Later British General Gage stationed at Boston ordered 800 men to march to Concord and seize food supplies and arrest the colonist leaders. His plan was discovered and all American schoolboys know how Paul Revere made his famous midnight ride arousing the sleeping country side to arms; how the Red Coats fired and fled; how the farmers traded them ball for ball and fired the shots heard around the world. Later on July 4, 1776, the second Continental Congress in session at Philadelphia signed

the world famous Declaration of Independence. Several years of war and privation ensued finally with the help of the French Fleet, General Washington he mmed Lord Cornwallis's army on the Yorktown Peninsula and peace was made and Democracy prevailed.

Democracy as interpreted by our forefathers means equal rights to all and special privileges to none. Democracy may be defended with bloodshed, but it can mean nothing to any country except through worthy practice. Our leaders have made many mistakes at the close of the late war while trying to satisfy the demands of Soviet Russia. Our statesman made concessions at Cairo, Yalta and Potsdam that resulted in the beginning of the Cold War, that later erupted with violent death in the rugged mountains of Korea, where 150,000 of the cream of American manhood were killed, wounded or imprisoned in the slimy dungeons of a relentless foe.

Appeasement has served only to lower the respect of the Communist World for as was shown at the first United Nations conference at San Francisco in 1945, when the American delegate with their usual consideration for the over-sensitive feelings for ungodly Russia omitted the usual procedure and left God out of the conference. They took the view that it was better to please man rather

than God. The next day the Moscow radio beamed out to the world and accused the U. S. delegates of hypocrisy for the omission. "Be not deceived God is not mocked and whatsoever a man soweth that shall he also reap." As we know this nation is the greatest adventure in human freedom that the world has ever known. No foreign country can improve upon our way of life. Here, if a man through hard work and honest enterprise can amass a fortune, he is commended, while government ownership virtually denies him the right to accumulate anything, even his right to worship his God is restricted. As we know, Communism is actuated by a spirit of strategy while Democracy is actuated by principle. The Iron Curtain is nothing new. For years it has hid with its dark mantle the atrocities and horrors of a godless nation, and today the red star of Communism is in opposition to the star of Bethlehem and offers the greatest threat to world freedom that this world has ever known. In the year 1856, one hundred and ten years ago, an eminent Swiss philosopher said what terrible rulers would the Russians be if ever they should spread the might of their rule over our country. They would bring us a Polar despotism silent as darkness, rigid as ice, insensible as bronze, decked with an outward amiability glittering

with the cold brilliancy of snow, a slavery without recompense or relief. What different world would this be if only the nations of the earth were God fearing and Christ exalting.

It was the great Bismarck who said, "The statesman should be ready to grasp the hem when he hears the garment of God rustle through events." But statesmen are spiritually deaf and they do not hear the garment of God through current events, and I am afraid that a broken, blood-soaked earth awaits the coming of him who will rule in peace and righteousness.

In the year of 1949, J. Edgar Hoover who is generally recognized as one of our leading authorities on national and international crime said, "The struggle between communism and Democracy is more than a clash of political ideologies. It is the offensive of atheism against all religions that have their belief in God, and to any honest student of communism it is clear and unequivocal, that communism is Anti-God, Anti-Christ and Anti-Moral. Communism is religion's mortal foe!"

## THE FAMILY LAWYER

You Kiss Driver?

A passenger is injured in an accident, the law naturally asks whether the driver had been guilty of careless driving. But at the same time, it also weighs the fact of the passenger himself. Has he too been guilty of negligence in this case?

A young man was out driving when a girl he had just met when suddenly leaned over and gave him a kiss. Momentarily discomfited, he lost control of the wheel and smashed into a telephone pole.



The girl was injured, and later sued for damages. However, the court decided she also was guilty of negligence—for taking the driver's mind off his driving. In fact, a passenger may be held liable not only for thoughtless acts but even for thoughtless words.

Example: A car was nearing a dangerous curve, a passenger held up a glass of beer and exclaimed: "How do you get this darned open?"

It was, too, was enough to divert the driver and cause a crackup. It was enough, also, in a court of law, to pin a "negligence" label on the thirsty passenger. On the other hand, a rider need not be in stoic silence. He has a right to assume that, despite minor distractions, the driver will show a reasonable amount of good judgment and self control.

In another accident case, the court could see no negligence on the part of a girl passenger who had been talking with her com-

## Aphids Pose Threat To Grain Sorghum In County

LUBBOCK. -- Corn leaf aphids are beginning to build up in grain sorghum over-

pests. On plants up to pre-boot size, damage from the aphids

necessary if this situation occurs, control will usually be rather poor, the maximum being about 60 or 70 percent. This is due to the aphids being found mostly down in the whorl of the plant where they are protected from insecticides.

A number of insecticides are available for treatment where aphid damage is evident. These include carbophenothion (Triphion), demeton (Systox), diazinon, malathion and parathion.

Barnes-Hind points out, too, that since improved contact lenses can now be worn for much longer periods of time, their maintenance is of even greater importance. They explain there is no danger in such lenses, provided they are properly fitted.

Most doctors recommend that contacts be limited to no more than 10 or 12 hours per day.

**BE A SCIENTIFIC NIBBLER**



Leading nutritionists have found that eating a piece of candy an hour or so before mealtime elevates the blood sugar level and, therefore, makes it easier for people with hefty appetites to reduce the size of portions and turn down second helpings.

According to Luden's Inc. of Reading Pa., a leading multi-line candy maker, which makes more than 500 items including the famous 5th Avenue Candy Bar and Nut Log Bar, hunger-pacifying candy snacks don't add many calories. A sour ball, for example, furnishes only 14 calories; a filled raspberry, 14 calories; a chocolate-covered peppermint patty, 30; a caramel, 38; a caramel with nuts, 47; a miniature chocolate, 27; and a regular-sized chocolate, 47 calories.

These figures compare favorably with the calorie count of popular fruits, i.e., an average raw apple provides 58 calories; a banana, 88; and four large prunes, a whopping 268 calories.

- SHRIMP MUFFINS**
- 1 can (4 1/2 ounces) shrimp
  - 1 egg yolk
  - 1/2 cup milk
  - 1 tablespoon grated fresh onion (include juice)

  - 1 package (6 ounces) or 1 1/2 cups biscuit mix

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Drain shrimp; chop coarsely. In a mixing bowl whisk together egg yolk and milk; add onion, parsley, and Worcestershire. Stir in biscuit mix, shrimp, cheese, and butter. Fill well-buttered muffin tins (of 1/2 cup capacity) about half full. Bake 12 minutes. Makes 12.
