The Texas Highway Department is planning the construction of Farm to Market Road 1083 in Kent County from the end of present F.M. 1083 to U.S. 380 and S.H. 70.

The proposed highway project will provide for a two lane highway consisting of a 20 ft. asphalt surface on 100 ft. of right of way. The proposed highway is located about 4 miles southwest of Jayton.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's Office. Mr. Ben R. Wilkinson, on North State Highway 208, Colorado City.

Also, the drawings showing the proposed geometric design have been placed on file with the County Judge of Kent County.

Information about the State's Relocation Assistance Program, the benefits and services for displaced and relocation assistance of office as well as information about the tentative schedule for acquisition of right of way and construction can be obtained at the Resident Engineer's Office.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic and environmental effects of the proposed location and design for this highway project by delivering a written request to the Resident Engineer's Office on or before September 11, 1970.

In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.

PUBLIC NOTICE

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 22)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county."

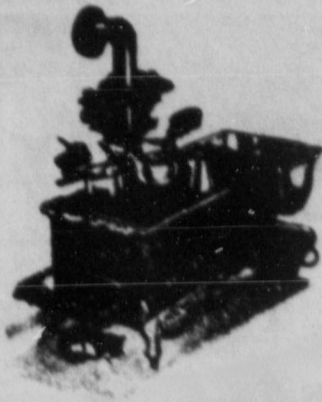

1/2 cup bread crumbs
1 1/2 teaspoons salt

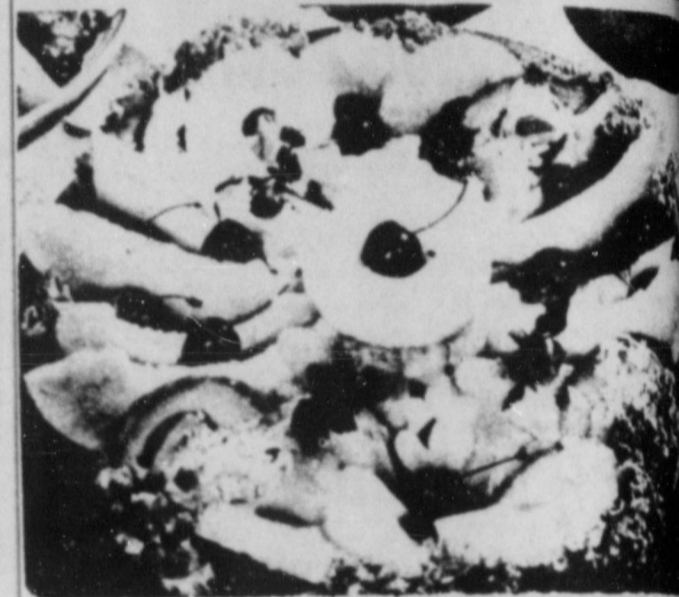

Life Jackets Could Have Saved Lives

For the third time this summer, lack of a life jacket or ski belt has contributed to death by drowning in White River Lake. While heavy plant growth in the lake entangled the first two victims, this time it was only a hindrance in recovery of the body. In each of the three drownings, the victim might have survived had he worn a life jacket or ski belt. These deaths have made lake officials aware of the fact that compressed air and scuba diving equipment should be owned by the Water District for such emergencies. This is being investigated right now. But have these needless deaths made people aware of the need to wear life jackets at all times when in or on the water? When lake patrolmen warn people to wear them, they usually get an irritable answer. The irony of Sunday's tragedy was that, while an exhausted crew drug the lake, seeking the boy's body, children without life jackets were swimming all around the rest of the lake. Perhaps swimming at the lake will have to be banned completely. (THE CROSSBYTON REVIEW)



Assuming reasonably favorable weather the 25 High Plains counties represented by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. have current prospects for harvesting 1,840,000 bales of cotton this year, about 450,000 more than were produced in 1969. Including price support payments, lint and seed, such a crop would be worth in the neighborhood of \$338 million to area farmers. Potential production was estimated in a joint effort by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange and PCG. Each year the two organizations collaborate in compiling crop estimates on the first of each month, August 1 through December 1. The estimates, of necessity, are based on crop conditions for the remainder of the season will be "reasonably favorable." PCG's breakdown of figures on the crop's value show that the lint from a 1.84 million bale crop, at about \$90 per bale average, would come to \$165,600,000. A total of 759,000 tons of seed, at a "guessed" minimum \$50 per ton price to the farmer, would net another \$37,950,000. Price support payments, most of which have already been made, are based on projected yields and this year add up to about \$34 million. The LCE-PCG estimate sets planted acreage for the 25 counties at 2,218,000, of which it is calculated that 2,104,500 were "standing acres" on August 1. This leaves about 113,500 acres, a little over 5 percent, that has been abandoned because of hail, drought, windstorms or other weather phenomena. Acreage planted but never harvested in 1969 figured about 28 percent. About 30 percent of the cotton on the High Plains is not irrigated, and reaching the 1.8 million bale estimate will depend much on rainfall. Most areas of dryland cotton are now reported to be holding up well but badly in need of rain within the next 10 days or two weeks. Irrigated cotton, through late in some areas, looks extremely good almost everywhere, observers report.

NEWS for OUTDOORSMEN

Despite some thoughts to the contrary, the hunter is directly responsible for today's extensive wildlife conservation program. Without him many species now plentiful would be extinct.

Hunters rate the mourning dove as the number one game in the United States. Regardless of whether it is hunted or not, the annual mortality of the mourning dove is between 70 and 80 percent.

This you may not believe, but there are more rifle and pistol ranges in the United States than there are golf courses. Furthermore, shooters outnumber golfers three to one.

Hunters have spent more than \$100 million for duck stamps since the passage of the migratory bird-hunting stamp act of 1934. This revenue is used to preserve wetlands for waterfowl habitat.

America's wildlife program has been financed at the rate of \$22 per minute for more than 30 years through the Pittman-Robertson Act—a sportsman-supported excise tax.

Hunters spend nearly \$300 million a year on automobile travel for gas, oil, tires and maintenance.

A porcupine can destroy two trees in a single night and is known to cause damages ranging from \$10 to \$100 per acre. He's a busy little fellow!

Sportsmen are said to be the cleanest when it comes to littering, with the least number of offenders. They are responsible for only 5 percent of the litter. Picnickers are blamed for 25 percent and passing motorists for 70 percent.

The National Park idea began with Yellowstone in 1872, but the National Park Service was not created until 1916.

Camping is here to stay. In the national park system alone there are approximately 30,000 camps. During the summer months most of them are filled every night.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection 1, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 3, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR15)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-b, Subsection (a), Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "The State Building Commission is created and shall have the powers and duties heretofore vested in the State Building Commission and the duties of the Legislature shall be vested in the State Building Commission. Its membership shall consist of three members appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The term of each member shall be four years except in the first election to the Commission the Governor shall appoint one member for two years, one for four years, one for six years, and thereafter one member biennially. The Governor shall biennially designate one member as Chairman. Vacancies in the Commission shall be filled by appointment by the Governor for the unexpired term. The provisions of this paragraph shall be self-enacting."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment reconstituting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR15)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-d, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR28)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 52, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 52. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company."
(b) Under Legislative provision, any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include, towns, villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts, may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory, except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this Constitution, and levy and collect taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof, as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes to wit: (1) The improvement of rivers, creeks, and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation thereof, or in aid of such purposes. (2) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation, or in aid thereof. (3) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof. (c) Notwithstanding the provisions of Subsection (b) of this Section, bonds may be issued by any county in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county, for the construction, maintenance, and operation of macadamized, graveled, or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of the county, and without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation. The county may levy and collect taxes to pay the interest on the bonds as it becomes due and to provide a sinking fund for redemption of the bonds."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing any county, on the vote of a majority of its qualified property taxing electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 51. The homestead, in a town or city, shall consist of not more than two acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, with the improvements thereon; the homestead in a town or village, shall consist of lot, or lots, not to exceed in value Ten Thousand dollars at the time of designation as the homestead, without reference to the value any improvements thereon; provided, that the same shall be used for the purposes of a home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of the head of a family; provided also, that any temporary renting of the homestead shall not change the character of the same, when no other homestead has been acquired."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale."

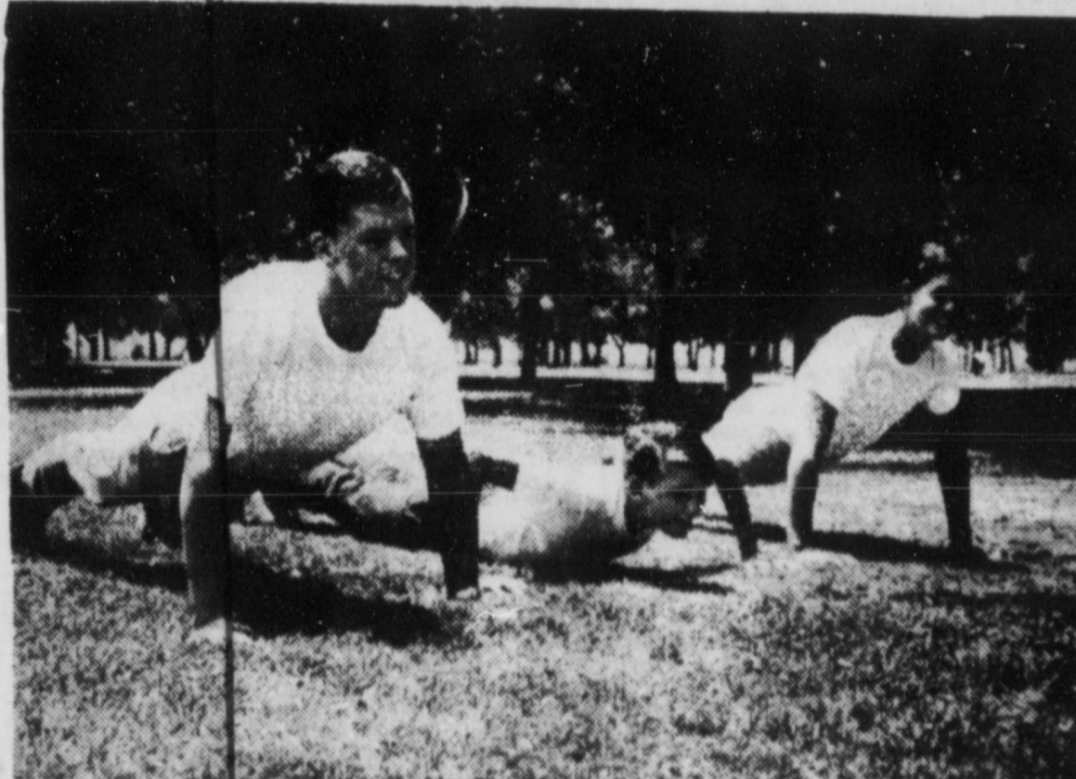

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR30)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement, censure, or removal of any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall be by affirmative vote of at least five members."
(6) A. Any Justice or Judge of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts, any County Judge, and any Judge of a County Court at Law, a Court of Domestic Relations, a Juvenile Court, a Probate Court, or a Corporation or Municipal Court, and any Justice of the Peace, and any Judge or presiding officer of any special court created by the Legislature as provided in Section 1, Article V, of this Constitution, may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any person holding such office may be censured, in lieu of removal from office, under procedures provided for by the Legislature."
B. Any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of this subsection who is eligible for retirement benefits under the laws of this state providing for judicial retirement may be involuntarily retired, and any person holding an office named in this paragraph who is not eligible for retirement benefits under such laws may be removed from office, for disability seriously interfering with the perform-

recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary."
(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement or removal, due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privileged one. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed."
(12) No person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal."
(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to and cumulative of the methods of removal of persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section provided elsewhere in this Constitution."
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment relating to the removal, retirement, or censure of Justices, Judges, and Justices of Peace under prescribed circumstances."

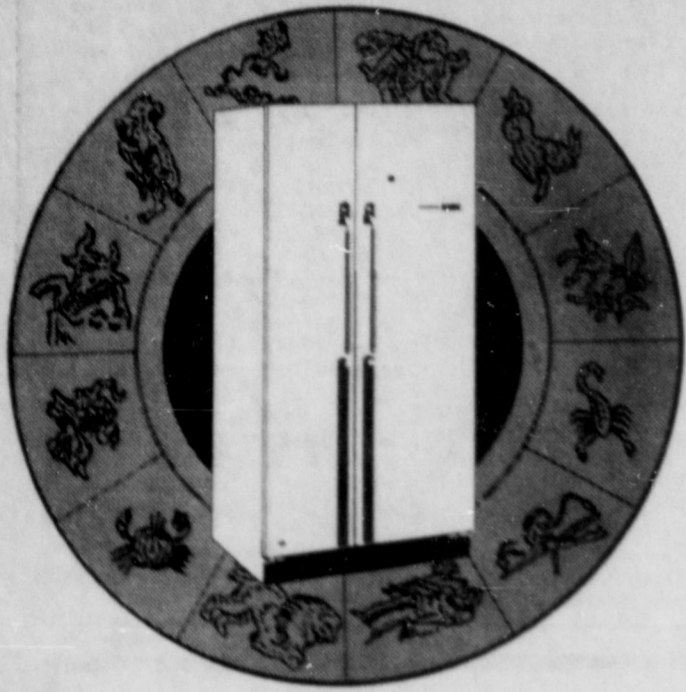

Lipstick: A Job Hazard

Near the end of her lunch hour, a stenographer sat down in the company lounge to put on lipstick. But she lost her balance and fell, suffering a back injury. Could she collect workmen's compensation?

The company insisted that the girl was not entitled to compensation because she was not "on the job" when hurt. Nevertheless, a court upheld her claim.

"Applying cosmetics was not an abandonment of her employment," said the judge. "It added to her comfort and self-esteem, and thereby permitted her to



more efficiently concentrate upon her duties."

Generally speaking, workmen's compensation covers injuries that occur not only during the work itself but also during other activities closely related to the job. For example, it applies while an employee is getting a drink of water or going to the lavatory.

In fact, workmen's compensation may apply even before the day's work has begun. Take the case:

A hotel waitress, arriving early headed first for the powder room to change into working shoes. On the way, she slipped and broke her arm. Even though she had not yet been on the job, she was held entitled to workmen's compensation—because changing her shoes was so closely related to her work.

However, the law usually does not approve a compensation claim if the victim's activity is in violation of company rules and regulations.

In another case, a ball worker was injured while trying to force open a tight winch. He claimed later that the winch had been stuffy, and that he needed some fresh air to breathe better.

However, there happens to be a company rule against opening windows without permission of the foreman. Accordingly, a court ruled the claimant was not entitled to compensation. The court said he could not logically be considered "on the job" while doing something that his employer had specifically forbidden.
