Jones Awarded Scholarship

Deaths Of The Highways Still A Major Problem

Deaths continue to mount on our streets and highways. Crime is still on the rise. With these facts in mind, the Texas Department of Public Safety announces the start of a 150-man training school.

The school will begin on the 22nd of September and will be held at the Texas Department of Public Safety Law Enforcement Academy in Austin. Trainees will receive a salary of \$545 per month during the four-month training period. Upon graduation the salary will be increased to \$651 per month.

To qualify for one of these positions, an applicant must be between the ages of 20 and 35, a height of not less than 68 inches, a weight of not less than two pounds per inch of height, nor more than three and one-half pounds per inch of height, and be of good sound physical condition. He must have completed high school, or the equivalent. He must be a citizen of the United States and be of good moral character.

The intensive training program, which will consist of some 800 hours of classroom

work, is designed to prepare the cadet to handle the various situations which he will be confronted with as a patrolman.

Upon graduation from the Academy, the cadet will be assigned to one of the four uniformed services--Highway Patrol, License and Weight, Motor Vehicle Inspection, or Driver's License.

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
“(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors.”

“Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.”
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 3, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition:
“Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas.”

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR15)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-b, Subsection (a), Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
“(a) The State Building Commission is created and succeeds to the powers and duties heretofore vested in the agency of the same name by this Constitution and to the powers and duties the Legislature has vested or may vest in the Commission. Its membership shall consist of three Texas citizens appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The term of each member shall be six years except in the first appointments to the Commission the Governor shall appoint one member for two

years, one for four years, one for six years, and thereafter one member biennially. The Governor shall biennially designate one member as Chairman. Vacancies in the Commission shall be filled by appointment by the Governor for the unexpired term. The provisions of this paragraph shall be self-enacting.”
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: “The constitutional amendment reconstituting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission.”

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 51, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:
“Section 51. The homestead, not in a town or city, shall consist of not more than two hundred acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, with the improvements thereon; the homestead in a city, town or village, shall consist of lot, or lots, not to exceed in value Ten Thousand Dollars, at the time of their designation as the homestead, without reference to the value of any improvements thereon; provided, that the same shall be used for the purposes of a

home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of the head of a family; provided also, that any temporary renting of the homestead shall not change the character of the same, when no other homestead has been acquired.”
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: “The constitutional amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale.”

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR30)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Subsections (5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), and (13), Section 1-a, Article V, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
“(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceedings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement, censure, or removal of any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.”
“(6) A. Any Justice or Judge of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts, any County Judge, and any Judge of a County Court at Law, a Court of Domestic Relations, a Juvenile Court, a Probate Court, or a Corporation or Municipal Court, and any Justice of the Peace, and any Judge or presiding officer of any special court created by the Legislature as provided in Section 1, Article V, of this Constitution, may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any person holding such office may be censured, in lieu of removal from office, under procedures provided for by the Legislature.”
“B. Any person holding an office named in Paragraph A of this subsection who is eligible for retirement benefits under the laws of this state providing for judicial retirement may be involuntarily retired, and any person holding an office named in that paragraph who is not eligible for retirement benefits under such laws may be removed from office, for disability seriously interfering with the perform-

ance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature.”
“(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to the misconduct or disability of particular persons holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance and testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.”
“(8) After such investigation as it deems necessary, the Commission may in its discretion issue a private reprimand, or if the Commission determines that the situation merits such action, it may order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal, or retirement of a person holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefor, it shall issue an order of public censure or it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal, or retirement, as the case may be, of the person in question holding an office named in Paragraph A of Subsection (6) of this Section and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission.”
“(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order public censure, retirement or removal, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Tax Free Dollars

Your neighbor carelessly backs his car into your fence, causing \$200 worth of damage. Acknowledging his fault, he hands you a check for \$200. Do you have to pay income tax on this amount?
No, because it is not really “income” at all. The money merely makes you “come out even.”
Now, suppose he refuses to pay and you have to sue him for the money. Then, too, if you win the \$200, it is tax free. Again, it simply makes you come out even.
This principle has wide application, notably in personal injury cases. Accident victims sometimes win verdicts involving large sums of money. To the extent that the money is compensation for their injuries, it is not subject to income tax.
In fact, the injury need not even be physical at all. In one case, a man won \$100,000 for defamation of character. The government tried to collect income tax on this sum, but a court ruled that it was not taxable. The court said the purpose of the money was just to “make the plaintiff whole.”
And in another case, the money that a girl won in a breach of promise suit was likewise held not taxable, since it was compensating her only for the harm she had suffered.
However a verdict may also include “punitive” damages, im-

posed not to compensate for the plaintiff's injury but to punish the defendant for his wrongful conduct. On this portion of the verdict, a tax may indeed be collected.
For example:
In another defamation case,

the plaintiff won \$1,000—\$650 for the damage done to his reputation, and \$350 to teach the defendant a lesson. The \$650 was held tax free, but the plaintiff did have to pay income tax on the \$350. This was considered income because, in spite of the

harm he had suffered, he came out \$350 richer than he had been before.

“Section 1-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon.”
Sec. 2. The foregoing con-

stitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition:

Mr. and Mrs. Tom Wilson one on vacation in Houston and other points of interest for past ten days, they are expected home this week.

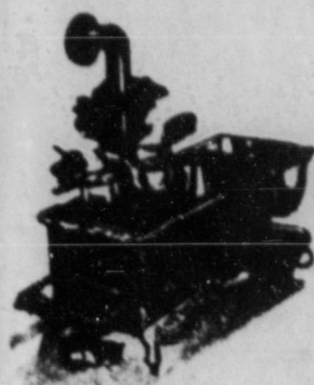

APPLE AND NUT SALAD

4 apples, diced
2 tablespoons lemon juice
3/4 cup Pineapple Cream Dressing
Lettuce, 3/4 cup salted almonds
Combine apples, lemon juice and dressing. Arrange in salad bowl on lettuce. Garnish with almonds. Serves 6.

AUTUMN FRUIT SALAD BOWL

1 head romaine
1/2 pineapple, pared and sliced
1 grapefruit, peeled and sectioned
1/2 red apple, sliced
1/4 pound red grapes, seeded
1 orange, peeled and sectioned
Whipped Cream Mayonnaise

ANGEL PEACH DESSERT
1 package angel cake mix
1 3-oz. package orange flavored gelatin
2 c. sliced peaches
1 c. whipped cream
1 4-oz. package shredded coconut, toasted

Bake angel cake according to directions on package. Cook. Remove from pan. Cut center from cake to make hole 4 inches across. Place cake on a flat plate. Prepare gelatin as directed on package. Chill until partially set and fold in peaches. Fill center of cake with this mixture. Chill until set. Frost top and sides with whipped cream and sprinkle with toasted coconut.

LIMEADE PARFAIT
1 c. frozen concentrate for limeade
1 qt. vanilla ice cream
1/2 c. whipped cream

In a parfait glass put a spoonful of concentrate limeade just as it comes from the can. Next, a scoop of vanilla ice cream. Repeat layers and top with a bit of whipped cream. Serve immediately, or keep in freezer until ready to serve.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 22) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county."
