Commissioners Move To Implement Bond Issue, And Purchase Land For Airport

The Kent County Commissioners Court Monday, by motion of Hamilton and second by Dibrell, and a unanimous vote, authorized Judge Gallagher to purchase approximately 29 acres of land from Robert Lewis, 31 acres from Ralph Branner at the price of \$200 per acre, to be used for the Kent County Airport.

Also they appointed a committee of Raymond Hughes, Bob Hamilton, Bill Vencil, Ladell McAteer, Jos

Leagus, Kim Nichols, Harold Judy and Euel Harrison to make recommendations on the golf course.

They asked the Lions Club to appoint four, and the MOD Moms to appoint three persons from their number to make recommendations on the County Park.

They voted to authorize the Lubbock National Bank to sell the bonds recently voted. Low bid was an average of 4.873 percent average.

School Board Gives OK To Building Program

The Jayton school board in its regular monthly meeting Thursday night of last week, approved nine items of a twelve item building program, totaling about \$70,000, worth. Some of these things have already been done. The projects, and amount of money involved are:

Metal shop 30' X 38', \$21,000, and equipment \$5,000.

Auto Mechanic Shop, \$33,000, and equipment, \$6,500.

Paving, \$3,000, library furniture \$1,850, football lights \$3,700.

Home Ec. Furniture, \$1,650, projector \$1,000.

Blue print machine \$650, electronic music tuner \$750.

Projects proposed, but still in the checking stage were a weight machine, \$2,500., Cyclotron \$950., and cafeteria kitchen \$11,000.

They discussed teacher replacements, and the sick leave policy.

They appointed Superintendent Pierce to contact Judge Chapman regarding the disposing of the Girard school property.

In a previous meeting, the board had a split vote on an order to use the school cafeteria for the homecoming dance, Parks, McAteer, and Gallagher voted yes; Gregory and Murrell voted no, and James Long abstained.

He is survived by his wife, two sons, C. L. of Lubbock and Bid of the home, and a number of other relatives and friends.

Spotlight, Black America

John Howard Griffin's "Black Like Me" is the true account of one white man's personal experience as a Negro. Turning his skin black, Mr. Griffin spends several months in the deep South as a colored man subject to all the squalor, the violence, the antagonisms, the hopelessness that tread on many of our black citizens today.

"Lost Boundaries" by W. L. White is another true account, but this book is the reverse of "Black Like Me". The Johnson family are white Negroes who are shunned by other Negroes but are accepted as white. This is the story of the lives of this family, including

the children who grew up believing they are white, with all the white man's prejudices, only to discover that they are not white after all.

"Soul Sister" by Grace Halsell is also a personal experience; this time of a white woman who turns herself black to invade the black world. Her nightmarish ordeal as a black American began in July 1968.

Whitney M. Young's "Beyond Racism" is a hard-hitting book that strips away the myths and misunderstandings that cloud our view of America's racial problems.

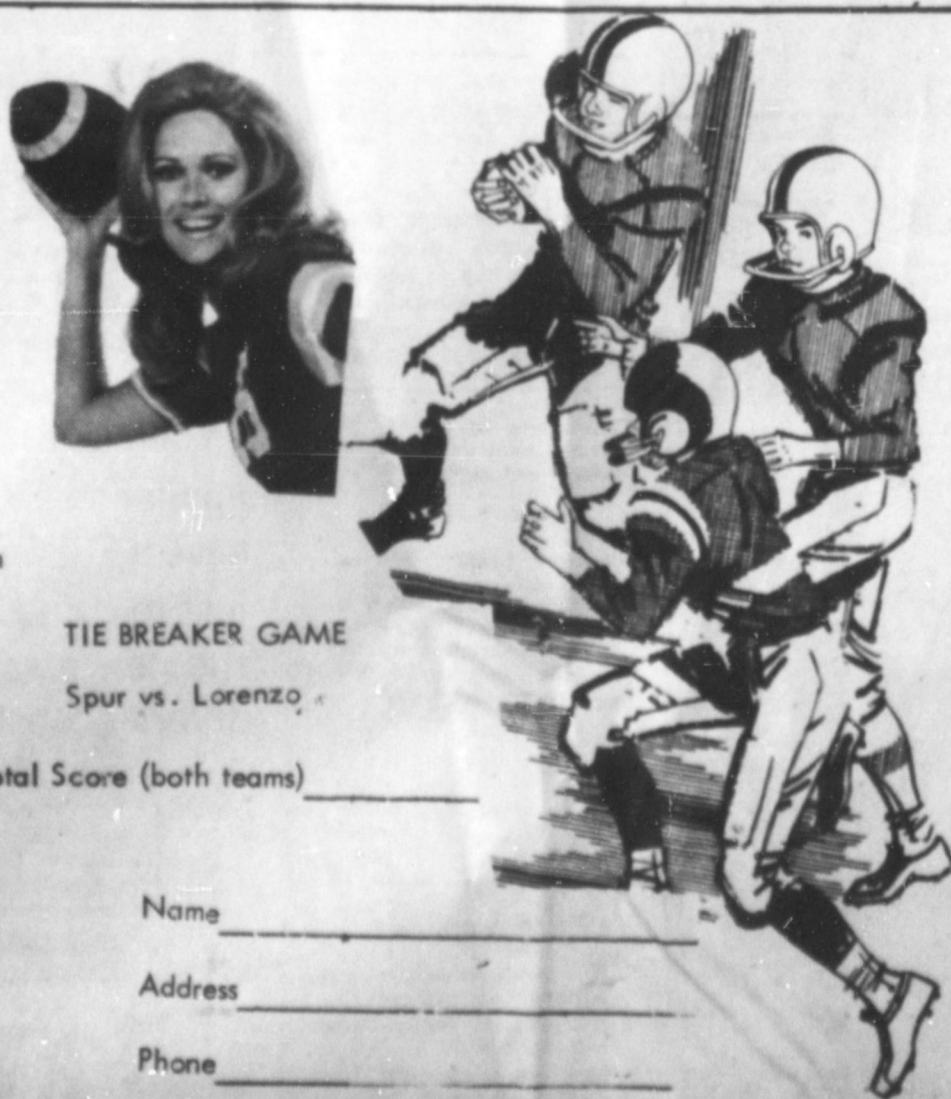

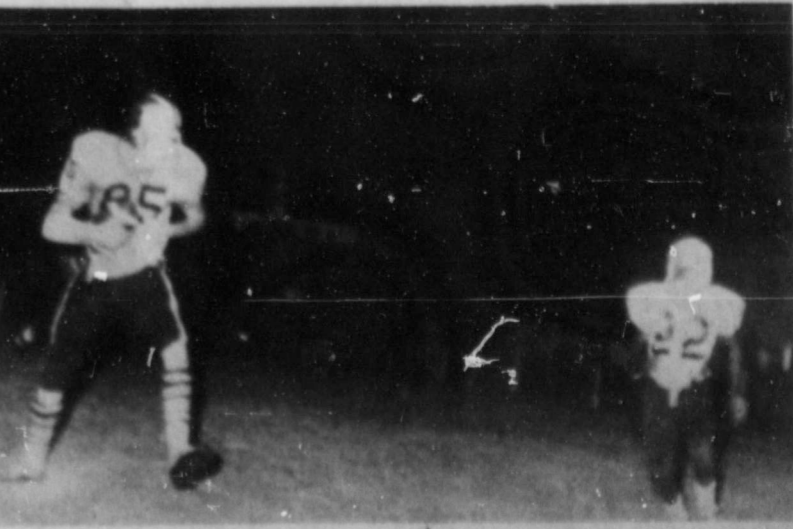

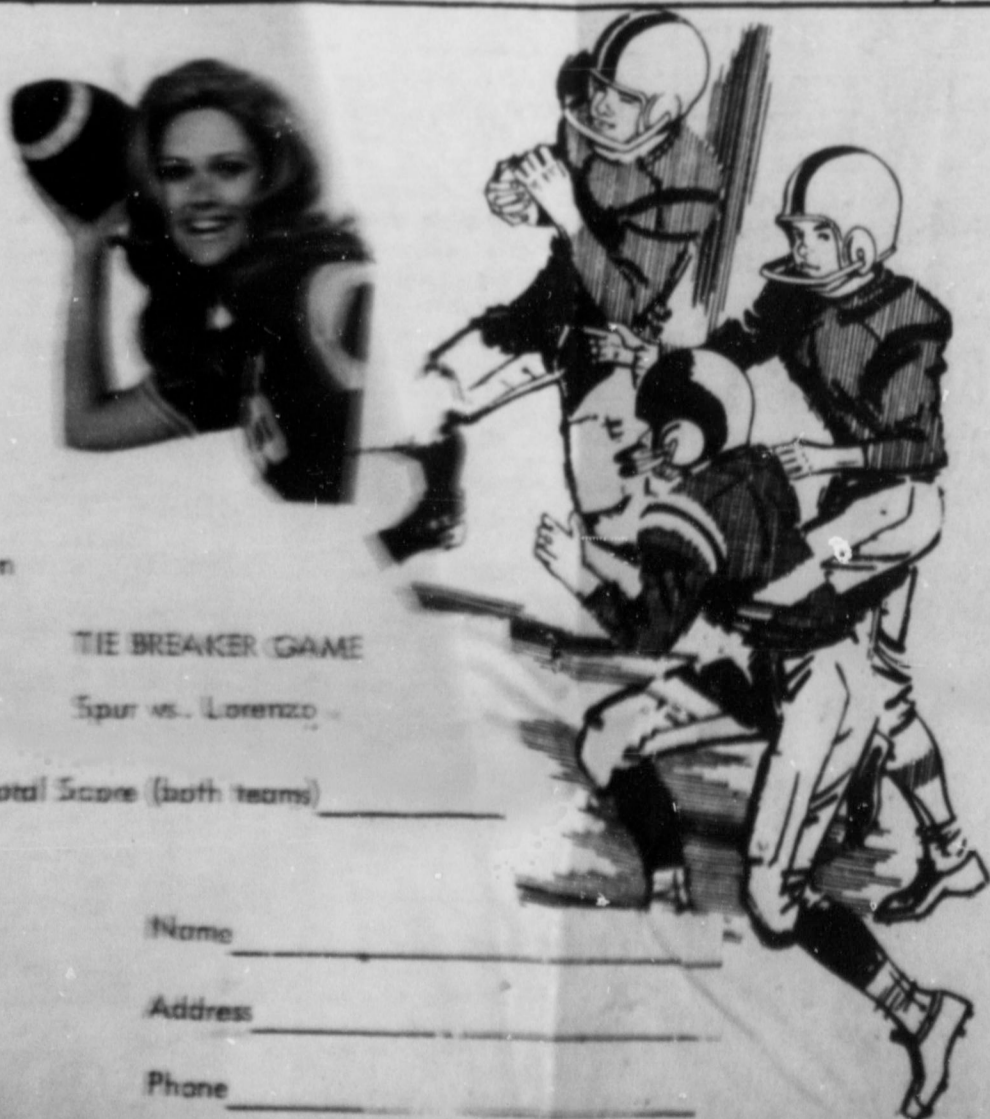
