## Patrol Checks One Rural Accident In Sept.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated one accident on rural highway in Kent County during the month of September, according to Sergeant Frank Jirick, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in an estimated property damage of \$450.00.

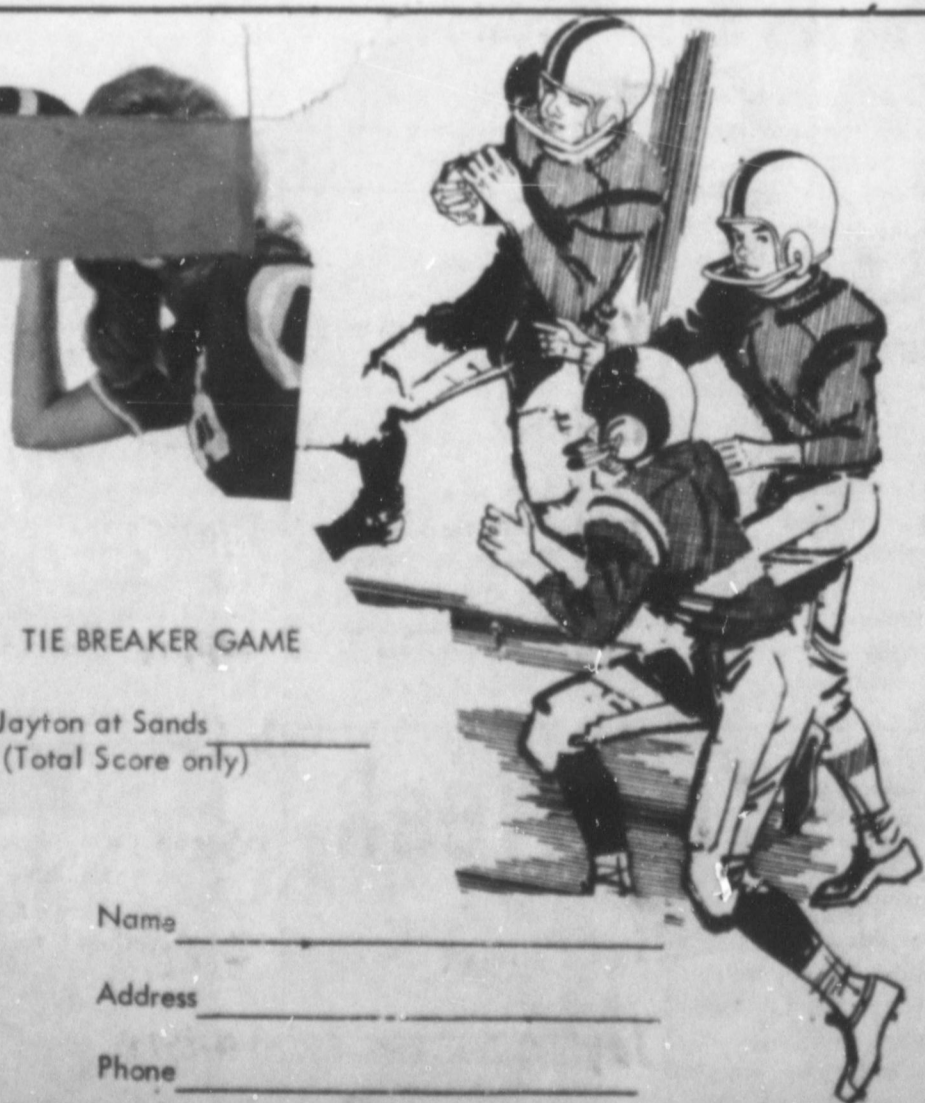

## THE FAMILY LAWYER

### Heir Conditioning

Freddie was delighted to hear, at the reading of Uncle Dan's will, that he was supposed to inherit a large sum of money. But there was a catch. The money would be his only on condition that he give up cigarettes.

In short order, Freddie challenged the validity of this anti-cigarette clause.

"Uncle Dan had no right to try to control my private life in this way," he complained in a court hearing. "My personal habits including smoking, are no one's business but my own."

However, the court ruled that



Freddie would have to either give up his cigarette habit or lose the money. The judge said that since the money belonged to Uncle Dan, he had a right to put strings on his gift if he so desired.

Of course it is natural, for a person making his will, to want to shape the character or conduct of his heirs. Nevertheless, the law does impose limits as to how far he can go. Consider this case:

A man left money to his daughter, on condition that she not only give up cigarettes herself but also make her husband give them up.

This time, a court decided the man had gone too far and held the anti-smoking clause null and void. The court said he had asked his daughter to do something that was not fairly within her power.

Furthermore, in close cases, the courts are inclined to let the heir keep the bequest, even if he has not lived up fully to the expectations expressed in the will. Thus:

Another man was worried about his son's dissolute friends. He provided in his will that the son should have certain valuable real estate, so long as he did not become a "drunkard and a vagabond."

Representative George Mahon reports that prior to the congressional recess last week, the regular appropriation for the session had passed the House of Representatives. Mahon stated that in the bills, including a vetoed which must be revised and passed, the House was below budget by about two and a half billion dollars. Five are in process through both houses and will be required before

all the bills will be presented to the President for his approval. When the final chapter on appropriations for this session of Congress is written, Mahon predicts the Congress will have reduced the budget requests by about one billion dollars. ### TRAVELING WITH YOUR BABY



Babies are excellent travelers because, unlike the rest of us, a traveling baby never really leaves home. As long as you are there attending to his needs one place is as good as another. And because your baby's needs are basically simple, he can usually have the comforts of home anywhere you travel. Careful planning, however, is the only way to assure a successful and pleasant trip for your baby as well as yourself. Here are some tips on how to streamline those plans.

**DON'T PACK THE KITCHEN SINK:** It's a temptation when traveling by car to take "everything" along—playpens, feeding tables, strollers, all sorts of collapsible and folding gear. Usually a few pieces of multifunctional equipment are enough. For example, a car bed can be used in the back seat while traveling as well as a crib after you reach your destination.

**FORMULA PREPARATION**  
Generally, modern prepared infant formulas provide excellent nutrition—closely paralleling human milk in content and digestibility. Some formulas, like Mead Johnson's Enfamil are available in convenient ready-to-use forms, in either bottles or cans. These formulas are ready to give your baby with little preparation on your part. The bottles of formula preparation, refrigeration and de-voicing car space for supplies is limited. Although it is possible to prepare and sterilize formula by conventional means while traveling, it's difficult and time consuming.

**DIAPERS ARE IMPORTANT**  
At least half an infant's wardrobe—and the most crucial half—are diapers and waterproof coverings. When traveling, you might decide to take along at least a dozen cloth diapers (in case there's a washing delay). These are the most economical if you already have them and are best for long auto-rides if you don't mind washing enroute. If you use them, remember to bring a plastic bag or tight-top bucket to keep the soiled ones in. For a vacation from diaper washing though, it might be worth the extra expense to take along disposable diapers instead of, or as a supplement to, those that need to be cleaned.

**BASIC FIRST AID**  
Since infants under a year live fairly protected lives, first aid equipment will be simple. Your doctor may recommend an infant thermometer (rectal), some baby aspirin (know the proper dosage) and, for 9 to 12-month-olds, an anti-nauseant for travel sickness, which, at your doctor's orders, can also be used as a mild sedative. For older infants, those already creeping, take along adhesive bandage, an antiseptic, petroleum jelly and other tumble or splinter soothers. And don't forget the vitamin drops.

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## From The Recipe File Of Opal Richards

### MAGGIE'S CAKE

1 stick butter  
1 box vanilla wafers  
1 pkg. Chocolate chips  
1 can Angel Coconut  
1 cup pecans  
1 can Sweetened Condensed Milk.

Melt butter in pan, sprinkle crushed vanilla wafers in pan; Add chocolate chips, coconut and pecans. Then, pour milk over all ingredients and bake at low temperature until done.

### CHERRY PECAN UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE

1 cup butter  
2 cups sugar  
1 cup pecan meats, chopped  
2 cups pitted tart cherries, well drained  
2 1/2 cups sifted cake flour  
3 teaspoons baking powder  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
2 eggs, well beaten  
1/2 cup milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Whipped cream  
Fresh cherries

Melt 1/2 cup butter in heavy skillet, add 1/2 cup sugar and stir until dissolved. Add nuts and cherries. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cream remaining butter with remaining sugar until fluffy. Add eggs and beat thoroughly. Add sifted dry ingredients and milk alternately in small amounts, beating well after each addition. Add vanilla and pour batter over mixture in skillet. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 1 hour. Remove from oven and turn onto large platter. When cool, cover with whipped cream and garnish with fresh cherries. Serves 12.

### CHOCOLATE UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE

2 ounces (squares) chocolate  
2 1/2 cups (1 can) sweetened condensed milk  
2 1/2 cups sifted cake flour  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
6 tablespoons shortening  
1 cup sugar  
2 eggs, well beaten  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1/2 cup milk

Melt chocolate, add condensed milk and mix well. Line greased pans with paper and grease paper. Pour chocolate mixture into pans and cool. Sift flour, salt and baking powder together. Cream shortening with sugar until fluffy. Add eggs and vanilla and beat thoroughly. Add sifted dry ingredients and milk alternately in small amounts, beating thoroughly after each addition. Pour carefully over chocolate mixture and bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 35 minutes. Makes 2 (8-inch) layers.  
Add 1/2 cup chopped nut meats to chocolate mixture. Or sprinkle 1/2 cup shredded coconut on top of chocolate mixture.

When you are making individual baked custard, put a marshmallow in each custard cup before adding the custard mixture. Bake as usual. Youngsters like this!

### CRANBERRY UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE

3 tablespoons butter  
1 1/2 cups sugar  
2 cups cranberries  
1 1/2 cups sifted cake flour  
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup shortening  
1 egg, beaten  
1/2 cup milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla

Melt butter and 1 cup sugar in baking pan; add cranberries. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cream shortening with remaining sugar until fluffy; add egg and beat thoroughly. Add sifted dry ingredients and milk alternately in small amounts, beating well after each addition. Add vanilla. Pour batter over cranberries and bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 40 to 50 minutes. Turn upside down. If desired serve with whipped cream. Makes 1 (8x8 inch) cake.

### RHUBARB UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE

4 cups cut rhubarb  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup quartered marshmallows  
1 1/2 cups sifted flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup shortening  
1 cup sugar  
2 eggs, separated  
1/2 teaspoon almond extract  
1/2 teaspoon vanilla  
1/2 cup milk

Cook rhubarb over low heat until juice begins to run, add sugar and marshmallow and mix well. Simmer about 10 minutes and pour into greased cake pan. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cream shortening with sugar until fluffy. Add egg yolks and flavorings and beat thoroughly. Add sifted dry ingredients and milk alternately in small amounts beating well after each addition. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry and fold into batter. Pour over rhubarb mixture and bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 40 to 50 minutes. Loosen cake from sides and bottom with a spatula and turn out onto cake plate. If marshmallows are very fresh, do not add to rhubarb until just before cake batter is poured on. Serves 8.

**HUCKLEBERRY**—Heat 2 cups cooked huckleberries with 1 tablespoon butter and 1/2 cup brown sugar 10 minutes. Sift 1 cup flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt and 1 teaspoon baking powder together. Cream 1/4 cup shortening with 1/2 cup sugar. Add 1 beaten egg and mix thoroughly. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with 1/4 cup milk with 2 drops almond extract. Turn huckleberries into greased pan (8x8 inch) and cover with batter. Bake at 350°F., 45 minutes.

**EXTRA FLAVOR**

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### FUTURE MISS VENUS TO LIGHT UP SILVER SCREEN



Beautiful misses like these from all over the world will be shooting for the title of "Miss Venus of 1971", which will carry a film career with it.

The glorious beauty who becomes the first Miss Venus next spring is going to need more than looks, grace, and a smattering of talent. She's going to have to have the kind of "magic" that lights up a movie screen—and she'll be given every chance to prove she has it by making an actual professional screen test.

Miss Venus' winnings will come to at least \$150,000, and will include a \$25,000 contract to act for producer Dino De Laurentiis ("War and Peace," "Barbarella") for one year, with options for six more. Her total winnings may reach \$510,000.

In a recent New York City press conference, at which Miss Joan Crawford and other film notables were present, the Miss Venus contest's unique concept and approach were explained by its director, Robert Oliver.

"This is the first international competition which is thoroughly film-oriented. It is dedicated not merely to the search for a beautiful future film star. Most beauty contest winners have their moment of celebrity, and then are never heard from again. But our winning Miss Venus—and very likely some of the other contestants as well—will be given every

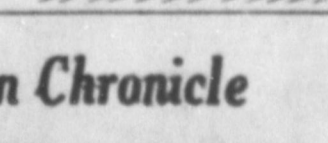
opportunity to become a motion picture luminary. They will be judged finally for star quality, as revealed by the movie camera."

Producer De Laurentiis, who is hoping to use the contest to discover a future Diahann Carroll, Sophia Loren, or Raquel Welch, lauded this concept as "one which can revitalize films by supplying exciting new stars, like those who have brought audiences to theaters in the past and always will. The young woman who becomes Miss Venus will not be the only one to profit by this contest. All of us in the film industry can be winners, too."

The over-all plan for the contest calls for holding the finals in a different city each year—in Olympic Games style. The city which will play host to the first Miss Venus finals, next spring, has not yet been chosen, but Rome, New York, Tokyo, Montreal, Los Angeles, and San Diego are being considered. About one hundred contestants will reach the finals, about half from the U.S.

The stars, producers, and directors who have already agreed to act as Judges include Carol Channing, Diahann Carroll, Omar Sharif, Eli Wallach, David Merrick, Vittorio de Sica, Abe Burrows, Sol Hurok, and other notables.

year old really is not an adult, and one of the advantages of living at home is the parental guidance there available, and if you turn off all guidance you turn off one advantage of living at home!

If you provide a girl with all the money she could possibly need to live in the city (let's "heaven only know" what she'll do to get money!) you turn off another advantage of staying home: freedom from having to do it.

But if strictness doesn't always work, and if total freedom doesn't always work, then what can you actually do? There are experts who'll disagree with one or more suggestions on almost any list, but a better than fair number of experts would agree with the following.

1. Give reasons, not just rules. If you don't have reasons, why have the rule? And if you feel that you have reasons "but can't quite put them into words," consider the possibility that they are not valid reasons—and that you "can't" express them because you really don't want to.
2. If you want a daughter home by an early hour during the week so she can be fresh in school the next day and improve her chances of getting into college, you have a valid reason. But if you want her home early Saturday night because you don't want the neighbors to see her coming home late, you don't have a reason valid to her unless she cares about the neighbors as much as you do.
3. Be willing to negotiate. You have the power and the money, so your child's only

mentously important peer approval is to a child. Uncertainty of their physical attractiveness, and of their uncertain future in this uncertain world—and sometimes uncertain of their parents' love, or of ever having anyone else's love—children crave peer approval as the clear sign that everything will turn out okay.

The approval can be telephoned; let your child have a private phone if you can afford it. It can come in response to generosity; let your child be a generous host or hostess, even if it means not having the car party at your house that night. It can come from excelling at healthy sport; can you teach your child to excel at bowling or diving?

Who am I? What am I? What will people think of me? If a child peers into the mirror and sees buck teeth or protruding ears, or pimples or an "uncool" wardrobe, he may come up with a sad answer to these questions. But if the parent steps in—in time—with orthodontia, or a little plastic surgery, or a tube of some skin remedy, or a little more questions of choice of clothing, the child's gratitude may be profound.

Peer approval is one thing; child needs and a parent can give. A parent can help a child to get it, and he can cause a child to lose it. And it is so important, that if a child can't get it while living at home, he gives serious thought to getting it away from home.

They flock to the city in droves, when the weather is warm, yearning to break loose, to try things, to find the answer to what life is all about.

But though they go to find people with answers, they find only people with the same questions. They seek the security of belonging to a group, but find the insecurity of discovering that they are alone. They find it gets awfully wet outside when it rains, and that it's awfully dangerous inside when it rains or not. Their fearsers wilt, and also their anger. And when the weather gets cold, or they see too much brutality, or hear of yet another OD (drug overdose) death, the kids realize that peace and love and happiness do not abound in the hippie section, and they go home.

In many cases—indeed in most—the parents are wise enough, or at least mature enough, to see that the all doesn't happen in the "hippie place."
