"Try to Remember, These Dates in December," That's the theme of this year's Christmas Mail Early campaign. The dates, of course, are the four most critical mailing dates for parcels to distant places and local and nearby areas, and for distant and local greeting cards.

Our theme line, "Try to Remember, These Dates in December," is a play on the title of the hit tune from a musical production. Versions of that beautiful score form the background for our TV and radio spot announcements.

Mail for Armed Forces Overseas should be mailed not later than the schedule shown below:

Surface Mail: Parcels Nov. 7; Greeting Cards, Nov. 12.

SAM (Space Available Mail, not over 5 lbs.), Nov. 21.

PAL (Parcel Airlift, not over 30 lb.), Nov. 28.

Airmail, Parcels, Dec. 12; Greeting Cards, Dec. 11.

For all packaging, invest in good quality, sturdy wrapping materials. This small investment can help insure undamaged delivery of valuable gifts and prevent delays which might result if rewrapping were required in transit.

The Christmas season provides an excellent opportunity to secure ZIP Code numbers for out correspondents especially the once-a-year ones. And since all greeting cards must have 6¢ or first class postage the use of return address including our ZIP Code number, RA 79527, will have undeliverable cards returned, some of the ways our patrons can aid in speeding up the Christmas mail volume are: (1) Separation of "Local", "Out-of-Town", and "Airmail" and depositing them on the service counter rather than mail drops or collection boxes; (2) Mail early in the day; (3) Use ZIP Codes; (4) Pick-up Mail daily from post office boxes.

Coach English was high in his praise after the game of the team. Each member of the squad gave fine performance, getting execution on his assignments.

He went into a buck and wing dance. Was bleeding a little and slapping at his neck with both hands when another youngster, seeing there was no real damage done said, "What's the matter, kid?" "Your cooties a ter you again?"

You'll remember, if you are old enough, that service men in World War I cracked a million jokes to express their uncomplimentary opinions of their staple-rations, tinned beef and "gold-fish."

Ours was a machine gun outfit and for each gun we had a mule. The Germans were pecking away at us with their artillery one evening and one of their shells scored a direct hit. There was meat anywhere you wanted to look and all of it mule. "Oh, Boy!", one of the kids yelled, "Fresh meat at last, but we'll have to eat 'er raw!"

If you read the papers, listen to the radio, watch the television and take note of it all the bickering and brawling that is going on in our country today you might get the impression that anybody who can be amused now is a lunatic and would laugh in the graveyard or on a cross. But if boys who have no guarantee they will be alive in the next second can face this problem without becoming maniac depressives we should at least try to stay out of the psychiatric wards and the "dumps."

I have a friend here who is the editor and owner of one of those little throw-away advertising papers. He is as close to the racial problems we face as anybody I know and is working as hard to solve them. But he took his nose away from that grindstone last week long enough to cook off their brand new and cogent suggestion.

He says that it will solve part of the racial problem to have the seating arrangement on all the means of public transportation built on a revolving system like Ferris Wheels and Merry-Go-Rounds. No-body would have to ride

in the back-seats because there wouldn't be any.

When a pessimist goes home to his sweet wife and children and she finds a long blonde hair on his coat he knows he's hubbed it and can't move a muscle to save himself, so he humps up in a corner and waits for the storm to blow over.

The optimist on the other hand studies his problems and finds solutions. In this case he tells her something like, "Well, honey" when I came home this evening the bus was crowded and I had to share a seat with a Hippie. Every wife knows Hippies have long hair, no sweat, and constructive thinking wins again.

Another of the Nations Problems that has been making lots of trouble and conflict has been to find ways and means to give the youths of the Nation something to do besides raising hell and bushels of hair.

The President of a Rotary Club seems to have found a solution to this problem that could sweep the nation and maybe the world. He has started what he calls a "Rent A Youth Program." It's like an employment office. All the eligible youths are registered at a central point and they are sent out on call where ever anybody has a job of work to do like mowing the lawn, walking the dog, weeding the petunias, scratching Grand-pa's back or baby-sitting.

While we were standing in front of the show windows and gazing at the sloppy, sleazy sacks, the coarse and heavy high-top boots and all the hideous plunder the diseased minds that rule the clothing marts of the world can design my unhappy and disapproving mug got me into a jam with the police. A cop put the "pinch" on me for what I was thinking.

One of the great mysteries of living in our National Capitol is how much there is to see and can happen in one place and so little of it get into the great newspapers. I think it's the reporters. They've lived in their brick and concrete canyons too long so they are victims of ingrowing myopia and tunnel vision. Three Valley Counties Facing Investigation

Federal authorities said Tuesday that ballots in three South Texas counties will be impounded because of alleged voting irregularities.

U.S. Atty. Anthony Farris charged in Houston that the violations occurred in Starr (Rio Grande City), Jim Wells (Alice) and Duval (San Diego) counties.

Voter Intimidation

Farris said a hospitality tent was established in Starr county. "People who don't go through the tent are assumed to have voted for the other party," he said. This, he added, was "a form of voter intimidation."

At Rio Grande City two tents—a large Army-style tent and a smaller lean-to affair—were set up at the back of the Starr County Courthouse.

The front door of the courthouse was locked and guarded by an armed deputy. There was no way for voters to enter except through the back. It was virtually impossible for them to enter without being seen from both the nearby tents.

The Democratic tent was decorated outside with political signs, including a large poster picture of Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and smaller Lloyd Bentsen signs. Inside a number of women were checking names in voter registration lists. Cars were sent for people who had not yet voted. Soft drinks, coffee, cookies and sandwiches were being served.

At the Republican tent were pictures of senatorial candidate George Bush. Coffee and soft drinks were available.

STATEMENT OF NONDISCRIMINATION

The Dickens County Electric Cooperative, Inc. has filed with the Federal Government a Compliance Assurance in which it assures the Rural Electrification Administration that it will comply fully with all requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Agriculture issued thereunder, to the end that no person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the conduct of its program and the operation of its facilities.

"Any person who believes himself, or any specific class of individuals, to be subjected by this organization to discrimination prohibited by Title VI of the Act and the Rules and Regulations issued thereunder may, by himself or a representative, file with the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250, or the Rural Electrification Administration, Washington, D. C. 20250, or this organization, or all, a written complaint. Such complaint must be filed not later than 90 days after the alleged discrimination, or by such later date to which the Secretary of Agriculture or the Rural Electrification Administration extends the time for filing. Identity of complainants will be kept confidential except to the extent necessary to carry out the purpose of the Rules and Regulations."

Never in the history of mankind has youth been so vocal. We must try to understand the youth of today but they need desperately to try to understand the generations before them. Eric A. Walker, president of Pennsylvania University recently gave a remarkable address to the graduating class of that institution. It was so timely and pertinent and presented such refreshing view that I think it deserves repeating.

Eric A. Walker, Colonel, Military Police, TSG

"Ladies and gentlemen of the graduating class, no one has more pride in your accomplishment than the elder generation. But I am not going to tell that older generation how bright you are. Nor am I going to say we have made a mess of things and that you are the hope of mankind."

"I would like to reverse the process. For if you will look over into the bleachers, I will re-introduce you to some of the most remarkable people ever to walk the earth; people you might want to thank on this graduation day--your parents and grandparents."

"Let me tell you about them. These--your parents and grandparents--are the people who within just five decades have by their work increased your life expectancy by approximately 50 per cent and who, while cutting the working day by a third, have more than doubled per capita output."

"These are the people who have given you a healthier world than they found. And because of this you no longer have to fear epidemics of flu, typhus, diphtheria, smallpox, scarlet fever, measles or mumps that they knew in their youth. And the dreaded polio is no longer a medical fad. While tuberculosis is almost unheard of."

"Let me remind you that these remarkable people lived through history's greatest depression. Many of these people know what it is to be really poor, what it is to be hungry and cold. And because of this, they were determined it would not happen to you, that you would have a better life, you would have food to eat, milk to drink, vitamins to nourish you, a warm home, better schools and greater opportunities to succeed than they had."

"Because they gave you the best, you are the tallest, healthiest, brightest, and probably the best looking generation to inhabit the land."

"And because of them, you will work fewer hours, learn more, have more leisure time, travel to more distant places, and have more of a chance to follow your life's ambition."

"These also are the people who fought man's grisliest war. They are the people who defeated the tyranny of Hitler, and who when

it was all over had the compassion to spend billions of dollars to help their former enemies rebuild their homelands. And these are the people who had the sense to begin the United Nations."

"It was representatives of these two generations, who through the highest court of the land, fought racial discrimination at ever turn to begin a new era in civil rights."

"They built thousands of high schools, trained and hired tens of thousands of better teachers, and at the same time made higher education a very real possibility for millions of youngsters--where once it was only the dream of a wealthy few."

"And they made a start--although a late one--in healing the scars of the earth and in fighting pollution and the destruction of our natural environment. They set in motion new laws giving conservation new meaning, and setting aside land for you and your children to enjoy for generations to come."

"While they have done all of these things, they have had some failures. They have not yet found an alternative for war, nor for racial hate."

"Perhaps you, the members of this graduating class, will perfect the social mechanism by which all men may follow their ambitions without the threat of force--so that the earth will no longer need police to enforce the laws, nor armies to prevent some men from trespassing against others."

"But they--these older generations--made more progress by the sweat of their brows than in any previous era, and don't you forget it. If your generation can make as much progress in as many areas as these two generations have, you should be able to solve a good many of the world's remaining ills."

"It is my hope, and I know the hope of these two generations, that you find the answer to many of these problems that plague mankind."

"But it won't be easy. And you won't do it by negative thoughts, nor by tearing down or belittling."

"You may and can do it by hard work, humility, hope and faith in mankind. Try it."

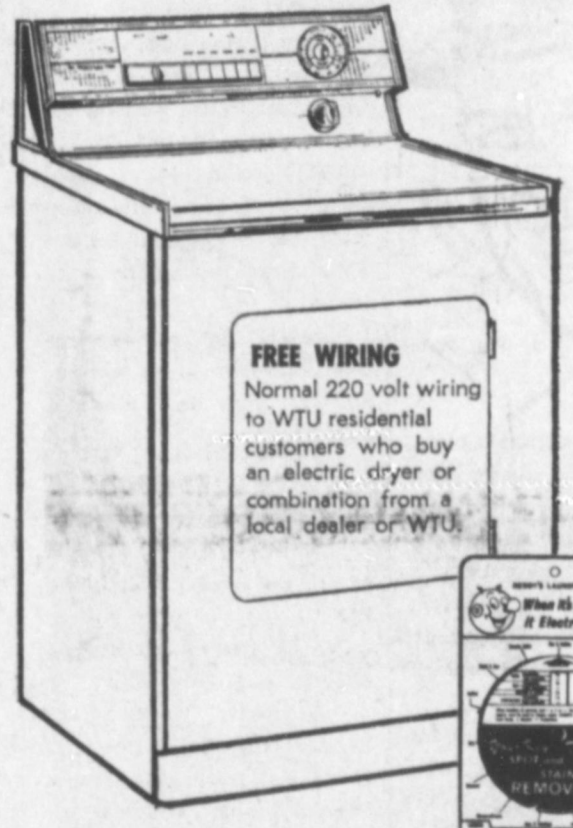

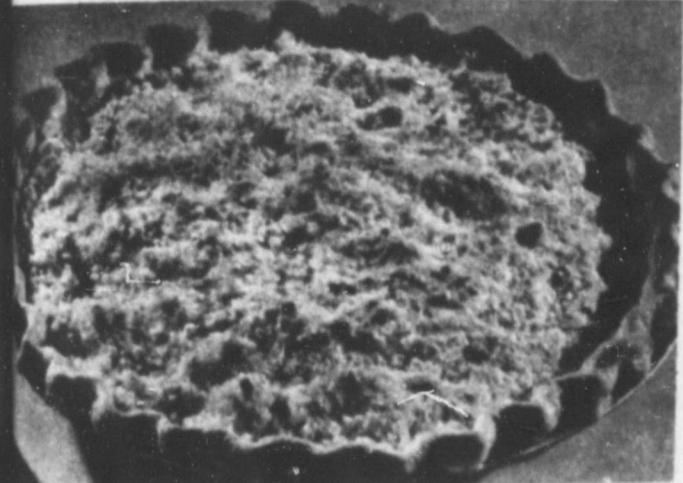


CHILI RELLENOS
 1 cup uncooked rice
 1/2 cup oil
 1 large onion, chopped
 1 can whole green chili peppers
 1/2 lb. or more cheddar cheese
 1 cup beef stock*
 1/2 tsp. Pepper to taste
 1/2 cup bouillon cubes and 1 cup water stock.
 Sauté rice in oil until golden brown; drain. Cut chili peppers in half and stuff

with grated cheese; packing hard. Using a large casserole start with a layer of rice, then a layer of onions and a layer of peppers. Repeat, ending with a layer of rice on top. Dot with butter and pour boiling stock over Casserole.
 Bake 45 mins. at 375 degrees in covered dish. Serves 8.

POW Commemorative Postage Stamp Is Issued

Postmaster General Winston M. Blount announced today that commemorative postage stamps honoring the 50th anniversary of the Disabled American Veterans organization and pointing attention to the plight of servicemen who are prisoners of war or reported missing in action in Southeast Asia, will be issued with dual first day ceremonies November 24 at Montgomery, Alabama, and Cincinnati, Ohio.
 The 6-cent stamps will be printed on the same sheet. These stamps which are designed by Stevan Dobanos, Chairman of the Citizen's Stamp Advisory Committee, are horizontal panels of blue, white and red, from top to bottom, respectively.
 At the top of the DAV stamp, in white, is "50 Years of Service." In the center is the DAV emblem. Beneath, in white, is "United States 6¢."
 At the top of the POW stamp, in white, is "Honoring U. S. Servicemen." Center, in blue, is "Prisoners of War/Missing and Killed in Action." Bottom, in white is "United States 6¢."

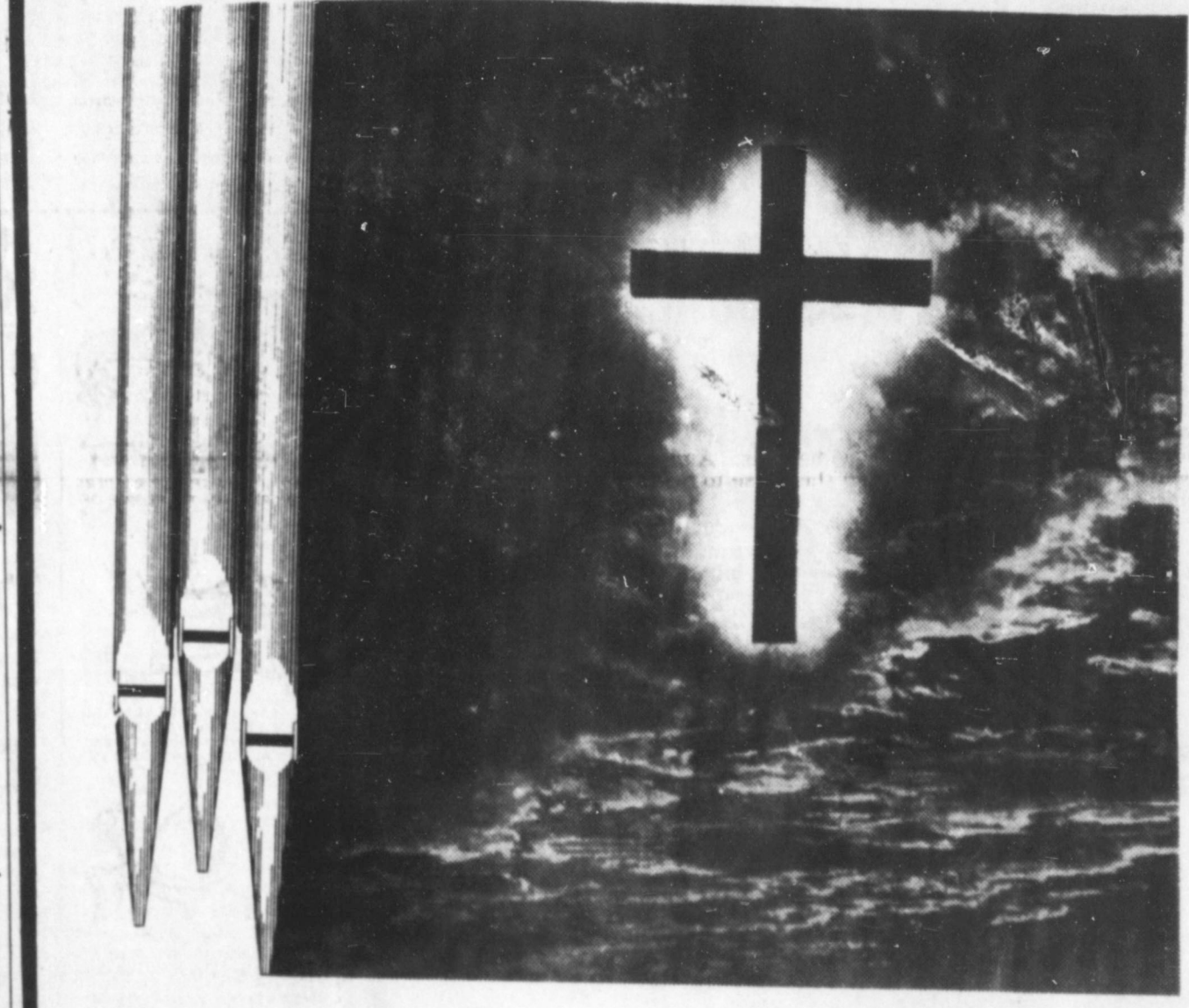

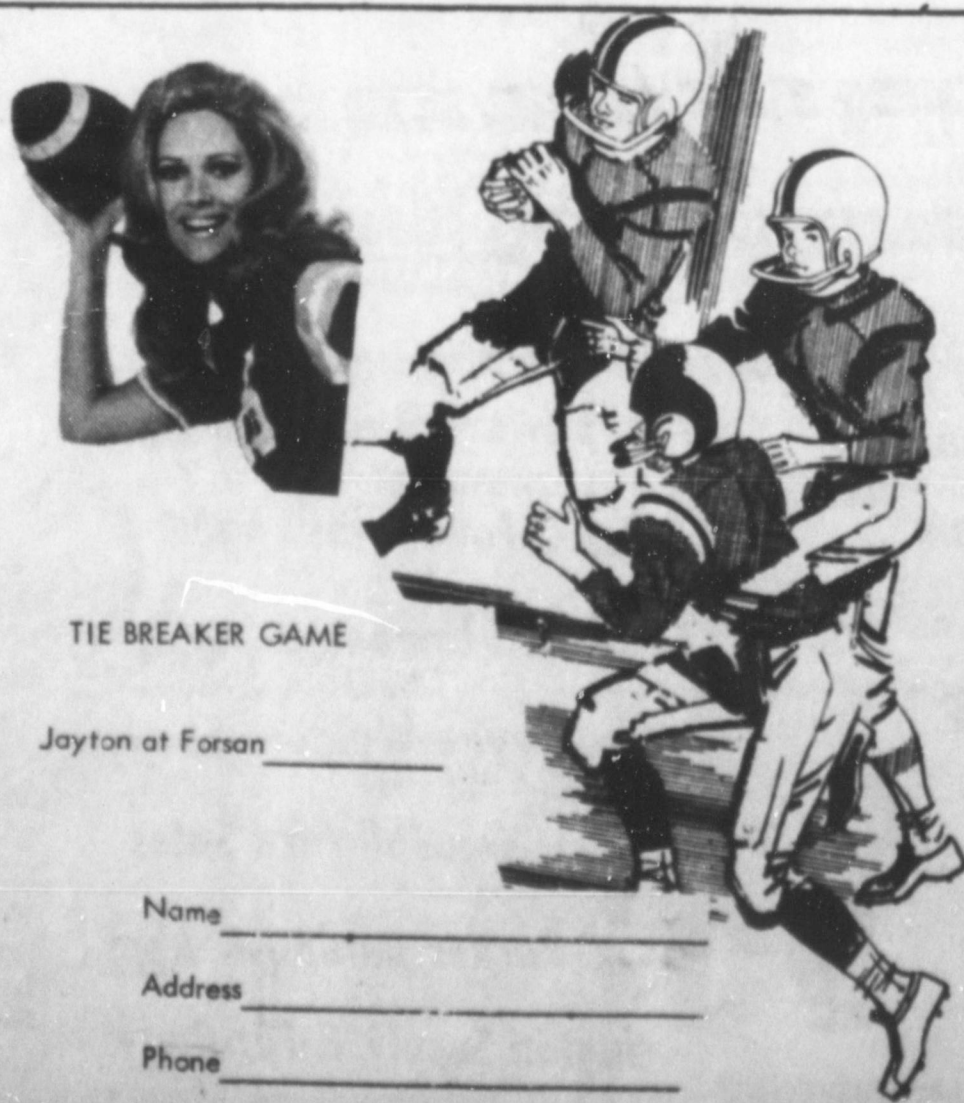

And I predict that the more peace protests, campus rebellions, bombings and hippie tricks the looney left pulls, the higher the percentage of clear-thinking people will hasten to the side of the right. Right?

Controversial quips:
 Why is it that the students who claim "They won't listen!" are the same fanatics who outshout speakers invited to their own forums?

Labor bosses goaded the newspaper employees on to increasingly outrageous salary demands, with the result that there are now fewer newspapers in existence, and inevitably, there are fewer jobs.

The same senators who are outspoken in their objections to U. S. assistance in Vietnam are strangely silent when the North Vietnamese bomb, murder and mutilate the South Vietnamese.

The bureaucrats who administer the labor laws of our country permit the union chieftains to say anything they like to the workers, yet they put severe restraints on what the company owner or manager may communicate to their own employees!

A retired gentleman whom I know lives alone on the ninth floor of a New York City apartment house. Unfortunately, he has a heart condition. The Soviets' professed objective at the international arms conferences—SALT—was the limitation of missiles, nuclear weapons and other heavy war materials. But their actual record of late—according to Secretary of Defense Laird—even after the SALT talks, proves that they have been amassing ICBMs, warheads and big missiles at a fantastically increasing rate. Never underestimate the double talk of the Reds!



Did anyone ever stop to question what the Red Chinese are doing in Tanzania? That's a long way from home—7,000 miles, by my count. For one thing, they're building a naval base in Dar es Salaam. They have promised the Tanzanians more patrol boats. Word leaks out that there are Communist Chinese military advisers by the hundreds in Tanzania. Is it possible that the Chinese are going to build an air base there too?
