One of the greatest high school football upsets of the century happened Friday night when Mator beat high ranking Lazbuddie. Lazbuddie has been running up high scores in every game, and was not only undefeated, but had two men leading the South Plains scoring parade. Mator play about the third game of the season, and the team they put on the field that night would have trouble beating a good seventh grade team. But they beat Lazbuddie.

This leaves Jayton the only Class B undefeated team in West Texas with an 8-0 record, and two weak teams coming up to close out the regular season.

He had gone to the Rotan hospital a few days earlier, complaining of not feeling well, but was thought to be doing better, and then suddenly the end came.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 in the Clairemont Baptist Church where he was a member. Rev. Billy Hudnall of Rotan officiated.

He was elected county commissioner of Precinct

three in 1960 and had served for ten years.

He was born Oct. 25, 1913 in Kent County. Burial was in the Clairemont Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife Sarah; three daughters, Mrs. Linda Dye of Post, Ruth Ann Shaffer of Fluvanna and Marilyn Byrd of the home; one son Woody Byrd of Clairemont; two sisters, Mrs. Edna Ellis of Clyde, and Mrs. Jewell Puryear of Rotan; three brothers; Bill of LaPorte, Bobby of Snyder and Jimmy of Clairemont, and five grandchildren, along with a host of friends.

John Charles Davis scored first on a four yard carry. A second quarter tally saw Kim Nichols hit Steve Owen with the bomb for a 45 yard gain. Then another pass picked up two points. With a 14-0 lead and seconds on the clock before

the half, Forsan picked off a Nichols pass and hit 68 yards for their only tally of the night.

After the half Harold Judy went over from the one, and then again from the 5 in the fourth quarter. Another pass put the final score at 28 for the Birds and 6 for the home standing Buffalos. This set the Birds record at 8-0 the only undefeated Class B team in the general South Plains area.

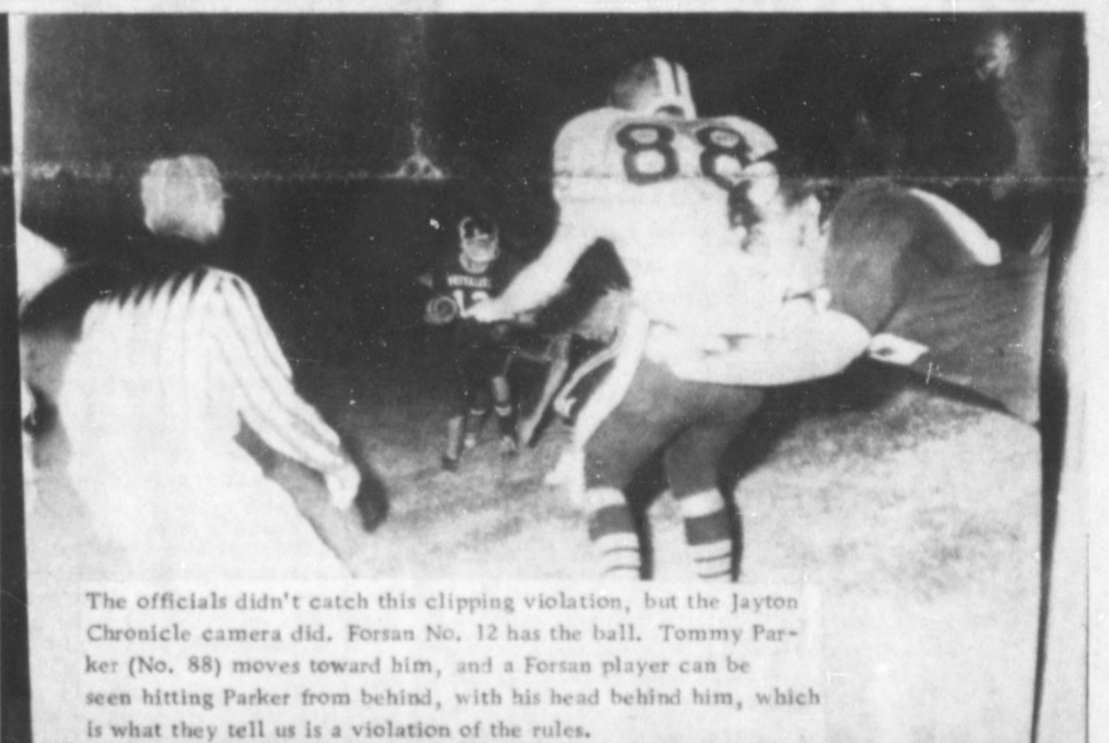

hoped he is now on the road to getting better.

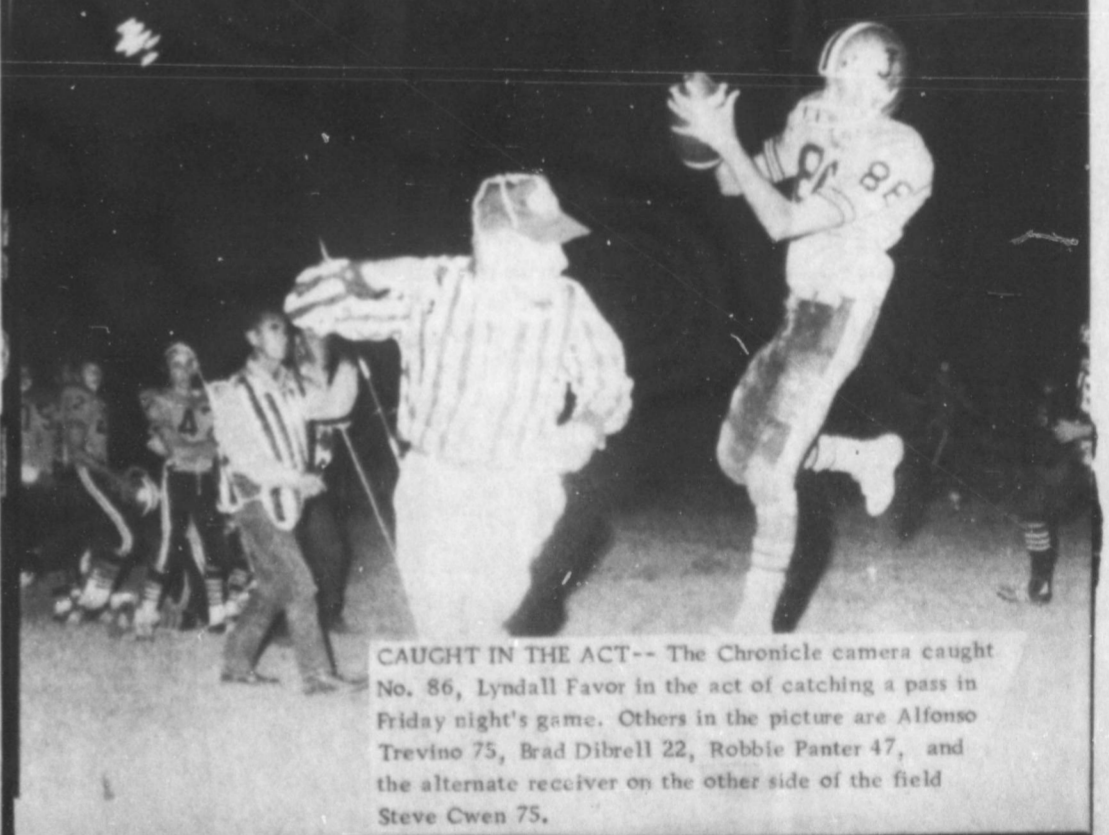

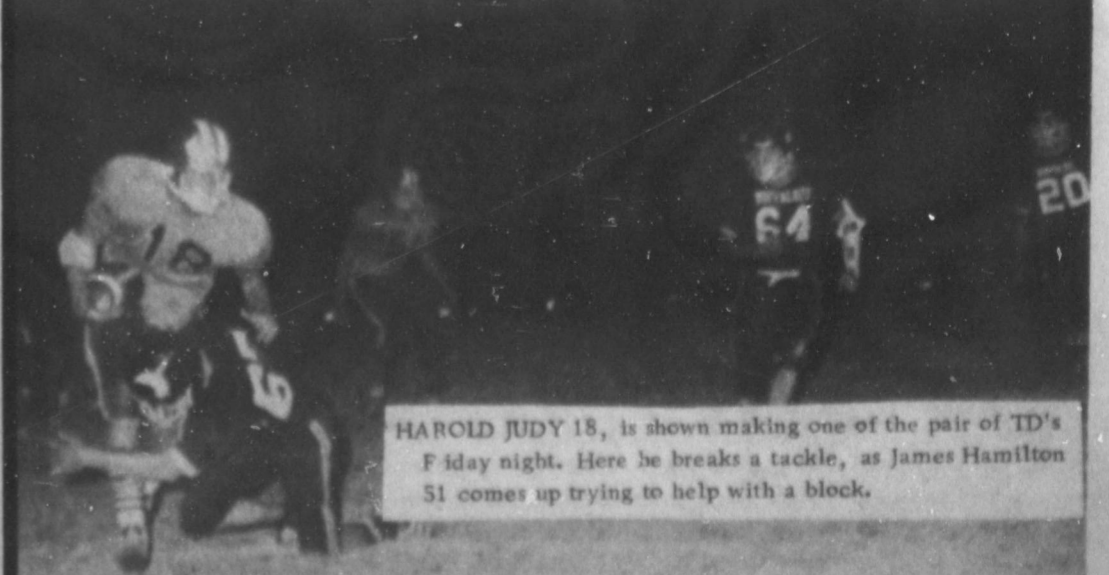

"No Pets Allowed"

When the Scotts rented a new apartment, they took it for granted that their dog Rover would be as welcome as they were. But soon after they moved in, the landlord called their attention to the "No Pets Allowed" clause in their lease.

Unwilling to give up either the dog or the apartment, the Scotts determined to fight. In a court hearing, they offered this argument to the judge:

"Rover happens to be a quiet, well-behaved animal who never bothers a soul and never does any damage. Of course, if he should



cause trouble, we would gladly take full responsibility. But in the meantime, enforcing this no-pets rule against us would be arbitrary and unfair."

Nevertheless, the court held they would have to abide by the rule or move out. The judge said a landlord may reasonably be concerned not only about noise, and not only about damage, but also about the likelihood that other tenants might want to keep pets too.

Generally speaking, the law gives a landlord broad discretion with regard to pets on the premises. In fact, even if no restrictions are spelled out in the lease, he may still be able to take legal action.

Thus, another landlord won an eviction order against an elderly woman who harbored no less than 25 cats in her small apartment. Even though pets were not mentioned in the lease, the court said 25 cats were—simply as a matter of common sense—"23 cats too many."

On the other hand, a landlord may lose his enforcement rights by "going easy" on a tenant for a substantial period. In one case, a landlord tried to evict a tenant after permitting him to keep a parrot for almost four years.

In these circumstances, the landlord was held to have waived the rights he had under the lease. The court said (7), even though the lease plainly said "No Pets Allowed," the landlord's inaction spoke louder than words.

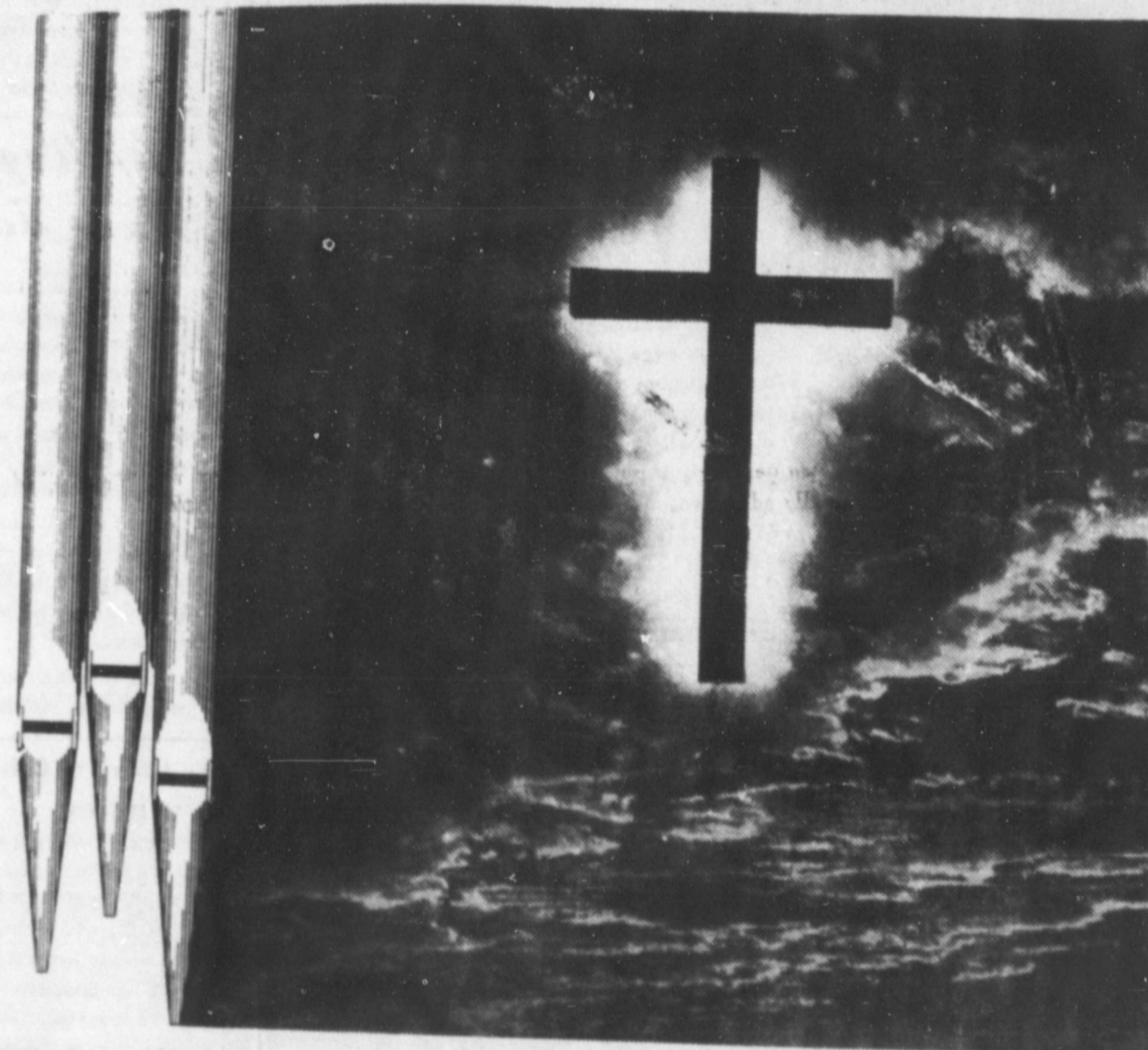

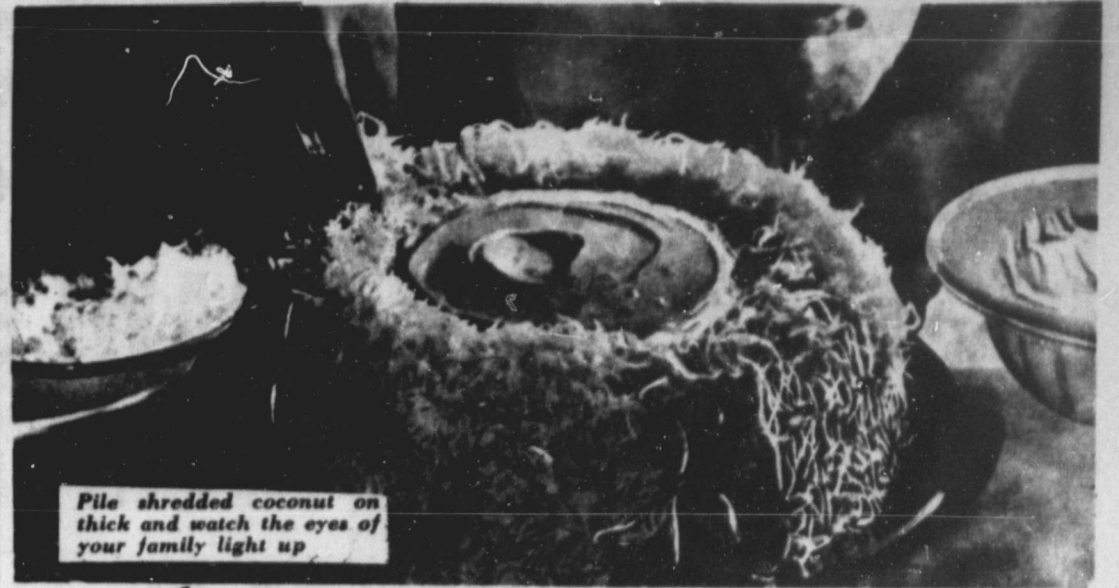

Favorite Recipes By Opal Richards

CHOCOLATE CHIP LAYER CAKE

8 ounces (squares) semi-sweet chocolate
 2 1/2 cups sifted cake flour
 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 cup shortening
 1 cup sugar
 3 egg whites, 3/4 cup milk
 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
 Cut each small square of chocolate into 4 to 6 pieces. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cream shortening with sugar until fluffy. Add unbeaten egg whites, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each is added. Add dry ingredients and milk alternately in small amounts, beating well after each addition. Add vanilla. Line cake pans with paper and grease the paper. Pour about 1/6 of batter into each pan. Sprinkle 1/6 of chopped chocolate over each. Repeat, ending with chocolate. Bake in 350°F oven 30 minutes. Makes 2 (9-inch) cakes.
 CUPCAKES—Add cut chocolate to cake batter with vanilla. Bake in cupcake pans as above.

MARYLAND BLACK WALNUT CAKE

2 cups sifted flour
 2 3/4 teaspoons baking powder
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/2 cup shortening
 1 1/2 cups sugar
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 3 eggs, separated
 1/4 cup milk
 1 1/2 cups ground black walnuts
 Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cream shortening with sugar and vanilla until fluffy. Add beaten egg yolks and beat thoroughly. Add sifted dry ingredients and milk alternately in small amounts, beating well after each addition. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry and fold into batter. Pour into greased pans and bake in moderate oven (375°F.) about 30 minutes. Makes 2 (9-inch) layers.

I-2-3-4 CAKE

3 cups sifted cake flour
 3 teaspoons baking powder
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1 cup shortening
 2 cups sugar
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 4 eggs, separated
 1 cup milk

Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cream shortening with sugar and vanilla until fluffy. Add beaten egg yolks and beat thoroughly. Add sifted dry ingredients and milk alternately in small amounts, beating well after each addition. Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry and fold into batter. Pour into greased pans and bake in moderate oven (375°F.) about 30 minutes. Makes 3 (9-inch) layers.

COCONUT CAKE—Spread Lemon or Orange Filling between layers. Cover top and sides of cake with Seven-minute Icing and sprinkle generously with coconut.

CIRCUS BIRTHDAY CAKE—Spread Orange Marmalade Filling between layers. Cover top and sides of cake with Marshmallow Seven-minute Icing. Arrange a circle of animal crackers upright on top of cake and another circle around bottom of cake. Place tiny candles on top of cake.

Narcotics--

"We may lose a generation of people, if marijuana is legalized," was the jolting statement made by Lt. Detective Bill Rutherford, of the Lubbock Police Department.

Lt. Rutherford, along with Sgt. Doyle Nelson, who delivered a factual and thought provoking talk on the characteristics and effects of harmful drugs. Among the most common hard drugs used among people in this area are marijuana and heroine.

The leafy stem of a growing marijuana plant was displayed, along with many samples of various drugs. The

marijuana plant will grow in almost any location, sometimes to a height of six feet, and producing leaves the entire length of the plant, along with the pods full of seeds. The leaves, pods, and seeds are harvested, round up, processed, and packaged for sale in cigarette and powder form, to be smoked in a pipe.

These cigarettes, or "reefers", or "sticks", sell for about \$1.00 each in this area. A small matchbox will sell for \$5.00, and a kitchen matchbox of these cigarettes will sell for \$20.00.

The effects from marijuana, after about 15 minutes of inhalation, range anywhere

from depression to extreme excitement, depending on the individual, the mental state, and his surrounding environment. A "trip" on marijuana lasts from 2 to 4 hours, causing the user to first lose his coordination, his thinking power, making him highly suggestive, and unable to make rational decisions.

Lt. Detective Rutherford further stated that although there is argument over marijuana being addictive to the user, he personally feels it may not be physically addictive, but definitely is psychologically addictive.

Some day when I'm grown up

"Smack" is produced from an opium producing poppy. Heroin from the Far East is of better quality, and is pure white in color, while that produced in Mexico retains a brownish color.

In this area Pushers sell heroine at about \$5.00 a shot, which is a very small amount. The average heroine addict requires at least \$15.00 to support his habit daily, or about \$5500.00 a year. Once he is addicted he feels heroine is his life and will do anything to obtain it, including murder, stated Lt. Rutherford.

While under the influence of heroine, the addict is calm, and peaceful. However, he cannot seek or hold a job, and must turn to crime to support his habit. Three dollars worth of stolen merchandise is worth \$1.00 cash for his habit.

Over one billion dollars worth of merchandise is stolen by addicts in the U.S. annually. The cost of treating an individual who is addicted runs from \$1300 to \$3000, and since this is the hardest addiction to break, heroine is the biggest killer among drugs today.

Sgt. Nelson, also of the Narcotics Division of the Lubbock Police Dept., described the uses and abuses of "Dangerous Drugs", which include Barbiturates, Amphetamines, and Marijuana. Use of these drugs is similar to alcohol, but heroine addicts usually begin with the use of these less addictive drugs. Average tolerance by individual to Barbiturates requires one more each day.

These drugs are dispensed from Pharmacies and under professional Medical supervision may be prescribed for weight control, and control of fatigue and emotional states.

A user requires very little LSD, from 50-300 micrograms, to go on a "trip" lasting up to 18 hours. This trip distorts and permanently damages the mind, and may come back on the user, without warning, anytime during the next three years.

Methamphetamine, or "Speed", is an increasingly popular drug, which is shot into the veins like heroine. "Speed" users take it for kicks but it will kill. The real danger involving "Speed" relates to infection from maintaining the drugs under unsanitary conditions, and thus leading to Hepatitis. This drug is used mostly by the younger people, with the Junior High School age becoming more prevalent among users.

Another drug described was that of Mescaline, a hallucinatory drug, which is raised around El Paso and in Mexico.

During the discussion period following the talk on drugs, the officers answered questions from both older and younger members of the audience. It was noted that 50% of all crimes committed in the Lubbock area are done under the influence of drugs.


