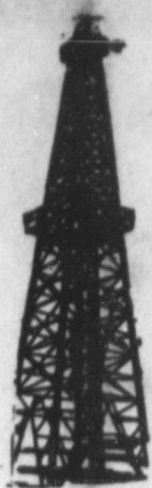

## Annual 4-H Club Stock Show in Clairemont Feb. 26-27

The twenty ninth annual Kent County Stock Show will be held on Friday and Saturday February 26-27, at the Show barn in Clairemont. One hundred and twenty animals are expected.

Livestock judging will begin on Friday afternoon at 6:00 P. M. with swine judging. One class of purebred gilts and three classes of market hogs will be judged by Jesse Holloway of Lubbock Christian College. Following the selection of the champion market hog, Judge Holloway will place the lamb classes: fine-wool, crossbred, medium

wool, and Southdown. The grand champion lamb will be selected from the four class winners.

Beef judging will begin on Saturday morning, 9:00 A. M. with the placing of a class of 3 Hereford heifers. Twenty eight steers will be divided and judged in three classes: light, medium, and heavy.

The champion steer will come from the class winners. A class of two year old fillies will be placed by E. W. Cade Jr., D. L. Wilson of Seminole will judge showmanship in all classes. Bruce Griffith of Crosbyton will classify

lamb. A barbeque lunch will be served at noon on Saturday on the show grounds.

Presentation of awards will be made after lunch, with the auction sale beginning about 1:00. The top 50% of each market animal class will sell at auction, with the rest of the animals being sold at floor price. The floor price will be set about 11:00 A. M.

Prizes and premium money will be paid to the exhibitors from contributions made to the Stock Show fund.

Principal Ralph Newton told the Chronicle, "We are planning to host all parents during the week. We wish to

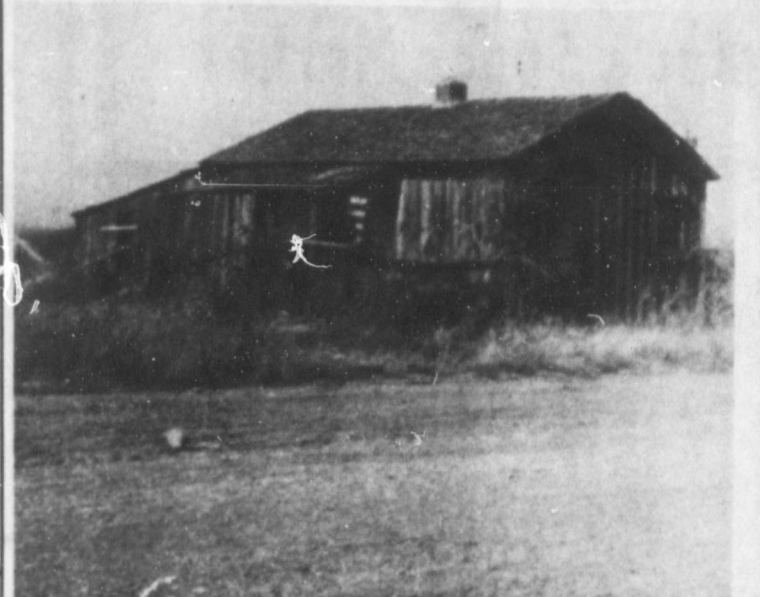
invite all parents to visit school during school hours. We would like for every parent to attend classes with his or her children."

## State Convention Scheduled In Dallas

Three area educators will be official, voting delegates at the 92nd annual state convention of the Texas State Teachers Association March 11-13 in Dallas.

The area delegates are R. N. Pierce and Ralph Newton, Jayton; and Mildred Blackshear, Spur.

They are among the 1,300 certified members of the 1971 House of Delegates which will meet on the last day of the convention to discuss and act

on proposed amendments to the TSTA constitution, new policies, recommendations of standing committees, and other business.

The official delegates are elected from the 433 TSTA local associations throughout the state and certified by districts on the basis of one delegate per 100 members or a fraction of 100. Every local association in the state is entitled to at least one official delegate.

With total membership in TSTA expected to hit a record 138,000 this year, attendance at the convention may exceed 10,000. Featured speakers include A. D. (Andy) Holt, president emeritus of the University of Tennessee, and Art Linkletter, the well-known radio and television entertainer.

In other words, that millionaire owner could either give me back my prorated rent or I would keep my keys to the box.

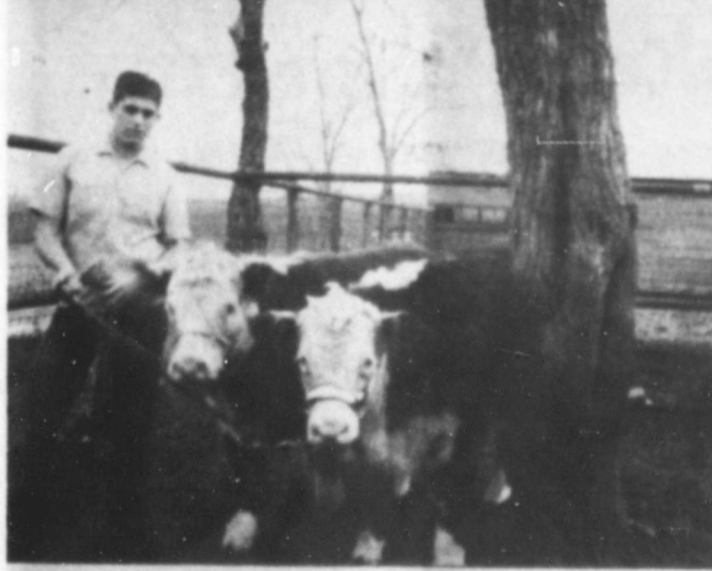
The lines of the FDIC payout were unbelievable. People were queued up in the mall of the Sharpstown Center for blocks. Many were bitter. So many retired had invested their money in the Savings Department when they moved to Texas to be near their Texas-based children.

The FDIC completely took over the bank. I might say if 1/2 of caution was used in operation that was used bankruptcy--it would eliminate bank's closing. An official of FDIC was at each window,

numbered 1 to 10 and with a last name Wilson I was given #10. My account number had been verified prior to my admission to the 4 guards at the bank door. I explained to the man there was no way of my telling if the amount of the check was correct as I had not bothered to stub my checks... He told me to accept the money which was in the form of a FDIC Case No. 6 Claim No. and if later there was problems to come back. I understand there was a total of 17 million in deposits that was not covered by the FDIC... The people will have to wait for pro-rata share.

The Future Farmers Association had to be in on the act with animals for display in pens in the mall. The sheep and their babaing reminded me of the people lined up like sheep. And the goat bleating made me think that the public had been made a goat of. But they say that it will be straightened out. In short, it was an experience I do not care to repeat soon.

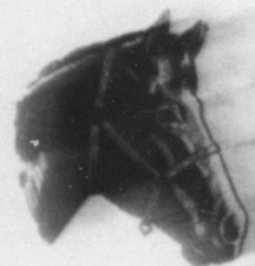



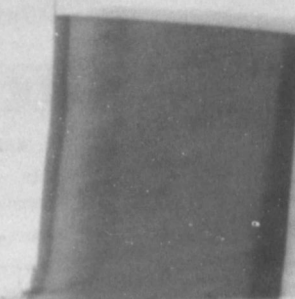

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## PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal programs as it deems appropriate.

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services on behalf of:

- (1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall be residing within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;
- (2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;
- (3) Needy blind persons;
- (4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR 21) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the journals, may propose amendments to this Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed amendments shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State, of the number of legal votes cast at said election for and against said amendments; and if more than one be proposed, then the number of votes cast for and against each of them; and if it shall appear from said return, that a majority of the votes cast, have been cast in favor of any amendment, the said amendment so receiving a majority of the votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy disabled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children."

## PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR 17) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) The Texas Water Development Board shall upon direction of the Texas Water Quality Board, or any successor agency designated by the Legislature, issue additional Texas Water Development Bonds up to an additional aggregate principal amount of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) to provide grants, loans, or any combination of grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature. The Texas Water Quality Board or any successor agency designated by the Legislature may make such grants and loans to political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas, including municipal corporations, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59, or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitution, State agencies, and interstate agencies and compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party, and upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may authorize by general law. The bonds shall be issued for such terms, in such denominations, form and installments, and upon such conditions as the Legislature may authorize.

"(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund to be invested and administered as prescribed by law.

"(c) The bonds authorized in this Section 49-d-1 and all bonds authorized by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear interest at not more than 6% per annum and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe, subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.

"(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by, and subject to the limitations in Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1; provided, however, that the financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 subject only to the availability

of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

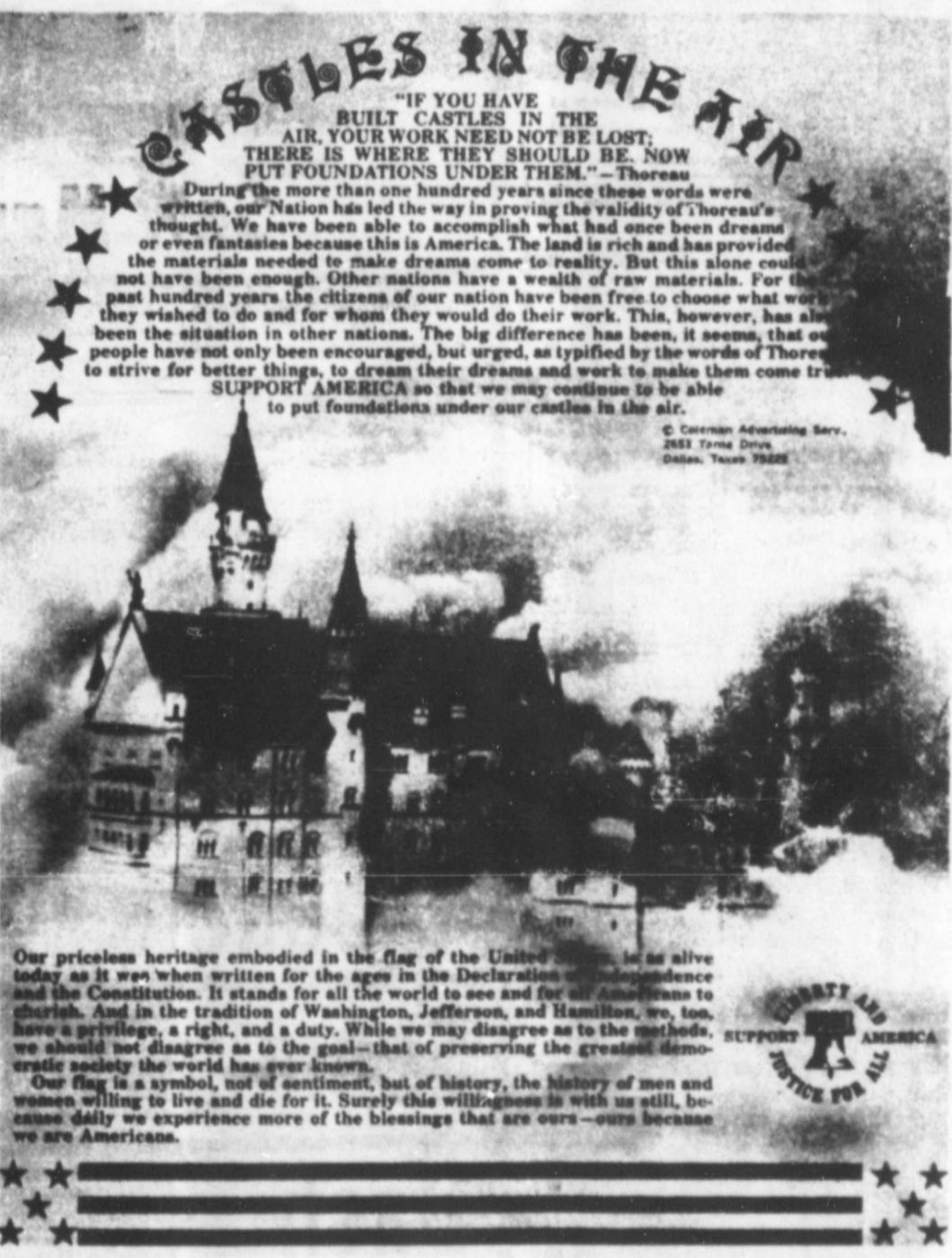
"(e) Texas Water Development Bonds are secured by the general credit of the State and shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"(f) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on Tuesday, May 18, 1971, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum."

## PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 15) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. (1) The State Ethics Commission is created an agency of the State. The commission consists of nine members. Three members shall be appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas with the advice and consent of the Associate Justices serving on the Court, two members shall be appointed by the Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas with the advice and consent of the other Justices serving on the Court, and three members shall be appointed by the Chairman of a State Judicial Qualifications Commission with the advice and consent of the other members of the commission, one of each group of three shall be attorneys engaged in the active practice of law, in addition thereto there shall be two ex officio members, one from the House of Representatives and one from the Senate to be elected on the day of each Regular Session of the Legislature by a joint vote of the membership of the House for a term of two years and the Senate for a term of two years. (2) With the exception of the initial appointees, each member shall hold office for a term of six (6) years and his successor is appointed if he has qualified. In making initial appointments, each appointing officer shall designate one (1) appointee to serve a term of two (2) years, one (1) appointee to serve a term of four (4) years, and one (1) appointee to serve a term of six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, and only for the unexpired term of the term in question. The membership shall designate one of its members to serve as chairman for a term of two (2) years. (3) The members of the commission shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. (4) The commission shall recommend the compensation, salary, and mileage allowances of members of the Legislature, and may recommend the salary of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Lieutenant Governor

proved before that day by resolution of either House of the Legislature.

(b) All rates of compensation, mileage allowances or per diem rates and all changes and recommendations made by the commission thereof shall not take effect until approved section by section by resolution of both Houses of the Legislature.

"All votes on these resolutions or parts thereof shall show the individual votes in the respective journals of both Houses.

(8) The commission shall investigate any alleged violation of any rule of ethics promulgated by it and report its findings to the appropriate State agency, official, legislative body, grand jury or district attorney.

(9) Until otherwise provided by the commission, each member of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury an annual salary of Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and per diem not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first 120 days only of each Regular Session and for 30 days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than 140 days. In addition to the per diem, the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after adjournment of the Regular or Called session.

(10) The commission is further authorized to recommend to each Legislature changes which will update, improve, and effect economy in the legislative process."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 18th day of May, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to create a State Ethics Commission empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the Legislature, State officers and legislative officers, to investigate violations thereof, and to recommend compensation for members of the Legislature and the Lieutenant Governor and recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process."

(a) Each rule of ethics or change thereof made by the commission shall take effect on the 15th day of the legislative session following the proclamation unless disap-

Some of these boys, who were given such flowery speeches, will wonder about it all, as they get red-shirted their second year, or as they begin the third year sitting on the bench, about number three behind some big star.

But that is the name of the game.

There are a few things about political labels I don't quite understand.

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## 908 Men Called In March Draft

The March draft call for Texas was announced today by Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas. Glantz said Texas will induct 908 men from the Extended Priority Selection Group and from the First Priority Selection Group for 1971.

Glantz emphasized that men in the first priority group would be called only if the March call can not be filled with men in the extended group.

The Extended Priority Selection Group is made up of men whose lottery number was reached by their local board in 1970, and who would have been inducted earlier had there not been delays in the

issuance of their induction orders due to procedural or other delays.

"The March pre-induction physical examination call is for 2,400 men", Glantz added.

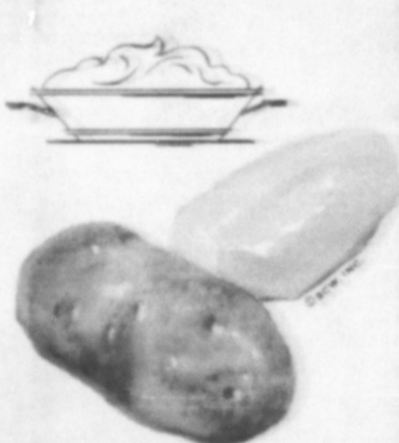
