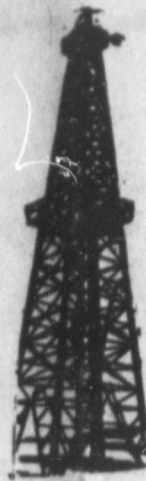

Work To Begin Next Week On Library And Community Center

The Kent County Commissioners Court, Monday voted to employ Bill Fleeman and Co. of Lubbock to build the library and community center on their bid of \$91,883.00. Also, to accept the alternates of tile for \$500 extra, and to Carrier air condition, which figures \$1100.00 less than the one called for in the bid.

Other firms offering bids were Home Lumber Co. of Rotan, \$93,000.00, Oasis Builders of Kermit, \$98,450.00 and Rush Builders of Lub-

bock, \$99,318.00.

The bid called for work to begin within ten days, and for the job to be completed in 150 days.

Hamilton made the motion on this order, with Sarah Byrd making the second. The vote was unanimous.

On a motion by Hamilton, seconded by Carrier, voted to construct rest rooms at the Little League Park, and at the Kent County Roping Club premises. Carrier, Hamilton and Byrd voted for this order,

with Dickerson voting no. (Dickerson gave as reason for voting against the order, that the Co. does not own the roping club premises, and he did not think it proper to erect buildings under such conditions.)

In a meeting on May 10th the court voted to let the Lions Club hold its meeting in the court house basement.

This Week In Jayton



I have one comment to make about the new advances in the price of postage, THANKS FOR NOTHING.

Several years ago the Postal service came up with the nominal zip code system. This was supposed to cure all the postal department evils; and speed up the handling of the mails.

Soon after then the prices of postage took another big hike.

This past year the postal service was allegedly taken out of politics, and supposedly put on a regular business basis. This, too, was to greatly add to the efficiency of the service. Almost immediately, we get the advance in rates, but this time, not even the promise of better service.

Just for fun, would you like to look at a few examples of how the new mail handling system has helped the service? This is the case all along the border line, between two sectional centers.

If you live in Abernathy and you send a letter to nearby Hale Center, it would go to Lubbock, back through Abernathy and Hale Center to Amarillo, and then back to Hale Center.

A letter mailed from Cone Floydada, would go to Lubbock, back through Cone and Floydada, to Childress, and back to Floydada.

A letter mailed in Post to Snyder, would go to Lubbock, through Post and Snyder to Abene and back to Snyder. You could go all along the line between two sectional centers, and get a thousand examples just like this. But, they say, this does not slow down the service, because it

Emergency Loans Are Available To Kent County Farmers

Farmers Home Administration State Director J. Lynn Hutch announced that Kent County has been designated by the Secretary of Agriculture for the making of emergency loans to farmers and ranchers who have sustained substantial losses on account of the drought.

This designation continues in effect through June 30, 1972, and will authorize emergency loans to be made to those persons who suffered substantial losses from any adverse weather conditions, such as high winds, hail, or floods, that have occurred or might

occur during the period of this designation.

Funds are available and applications for such loans may be made at the FHA County Office located in the Best Building, 3423 Ave. T. Snyder.

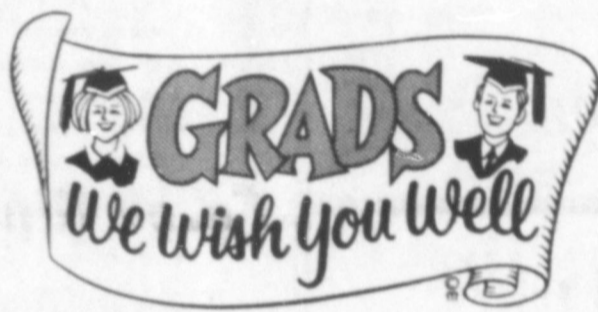

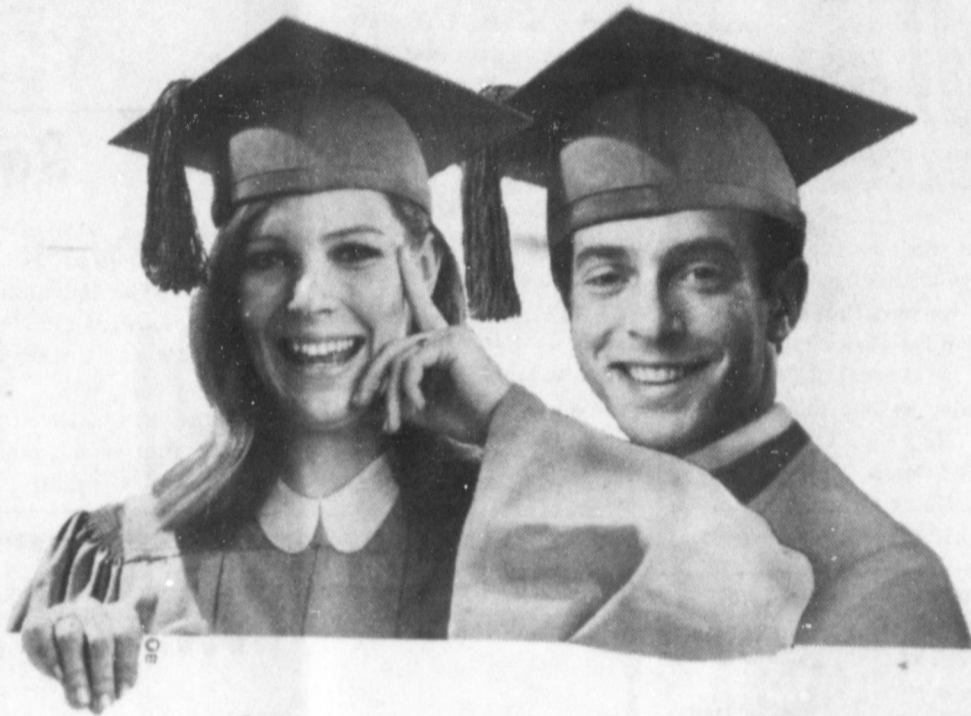

The only way a working man can expect to spend any of the money he's made is to live so long he draws it back in social security and paid up holidays.

Final, Mister Editor, Buz Hookum griped about the three day week being talked about now. He said that's jumping out of the pan in the fire, cause just as shore as a feller's work week is cut back, his old lady will find more things fer him to do around the house.

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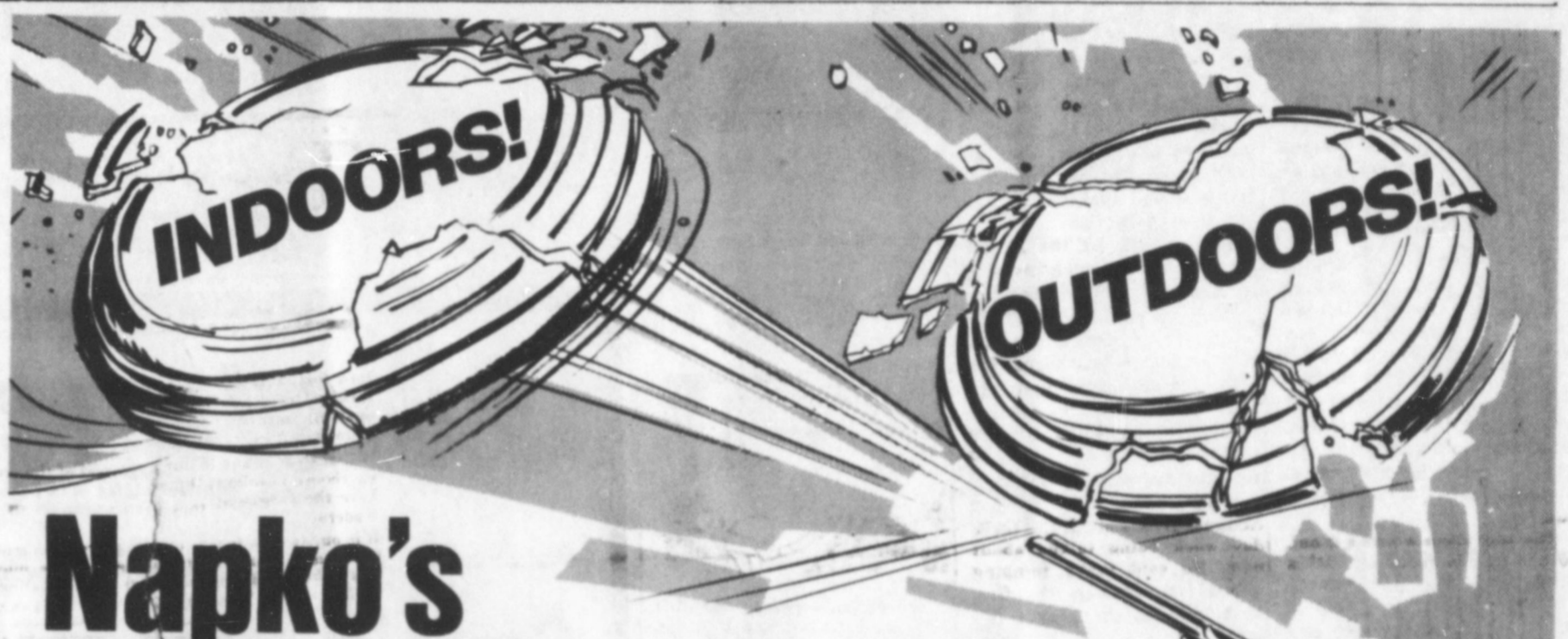

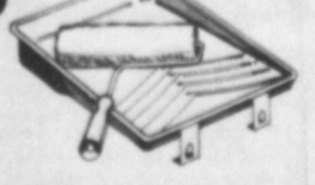

Silver Anniversary

Prepare 4 9" cake layers (your own or from mix); cool. With silver paint, paint 2 1 1/2" curtain rings silver.
Frosting and decorating: Prepare 1 1/2 times recipe for Snow-Peak Frosting.
 Stack the 4 cake layers, using Snow-Peak as the filling; set in center of foil-covered 12" cardboard circle. Frost cake, smoothing off frosting on sides and top. Heap rest of frosting around base of cake, pulling it up with spatula to make peaks. Now fill a paper cone with frosting; then cut off 1/2" from tip. On the side of the cake at the center front, press out frosting to make the figures "2" and "5". Then outline each of the figures with silver dragées. Set the cake in place on the table; then tuck pleated silver-fabric edging in place around the base. At one side on top of the cake, arrange gardenias, which are protected underneath with a circle of foil; alongside the gardenias, stand the 2 rings, tied with a bit of white satin ribbon.

Golden Anniversary: Make the 4-layer cake above, tinting the frosting golden yellow; use the figures "5" and "0," 2 gold (brass) rings, pleated yellow fabric edging, yellow flowers, such as roses, daisies, chrysanthemums, etc., and yellow satin ribbon.

Snow-Peak Frosting

1 1/4 cups white corn syrup
 2 egg whites
 Pinch salt
 1 teasp. vanilla extract

Heat syrup to boiling in small saucepan. With electric mixer at high speed (or with egg beater), beat egg whites until they form soft peaks when beater is raised; add salt. Slowly pour in syrup continuing to beat until frosting is fluffy and hangs in peaks from beater; fold in vanilla. (For spoon designs, beat until very stiff.) Stays soft at least 2 days. *Fills and frosts top and sides of 2 8" or 9" layers*

Maple Snow-Peak Frosting: Substitute dark corn syrup for white; use 1/2 teasp. each maple flavoring and vanilla.

KITCHEN SCIENCE

A recent university study of 100 housing developments turned up the interesting fact that the three most widespread kitchen planning flaws were (1) not enough cabinet storage space, (2) not enough counter top space, and (3) no counter space at all next to the range.

What is the best material for counter top surfaces? Tastes differ, but for beauty and easy care it would be hard to beat DuPont's "Corian" methacrylate material, a durable new product that is easily installed with household tools. The best way to keep your kitchen smelling and looking fresh is with a good exhaust hood located directly over the range and exhausting outdoors. For greatest efficiency, the hood should overlap the front burners as well as the back ones, and should be located no more than 26 inches above the range top. The larger and thicker the grease filter inside the hood, the better. A wall exhaust fan should be located no more than a foot or two directly behind the range or in the ceiling directly above it. While not as efficient as a range hood, it will definitely help.

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
