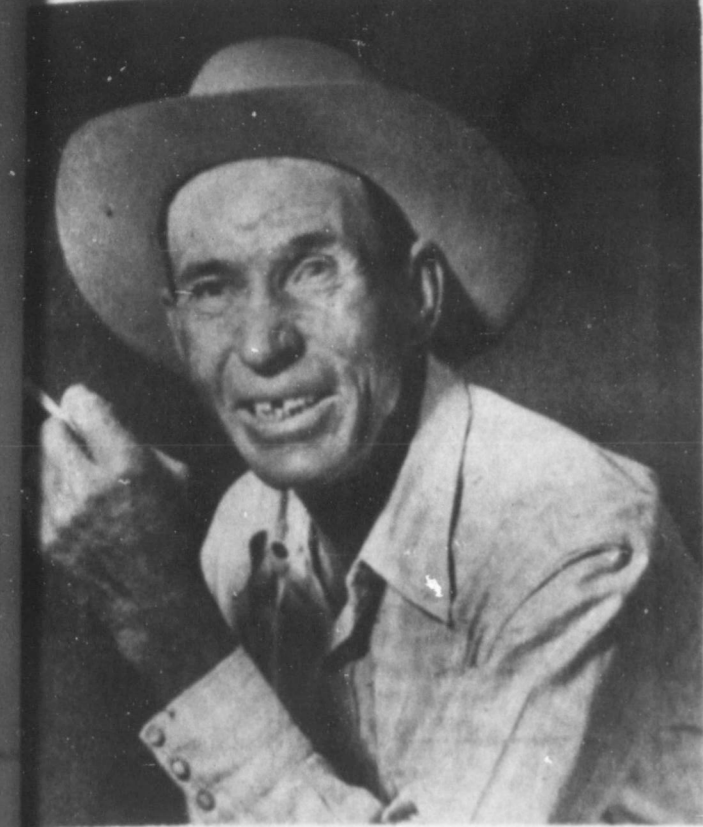

Scandalous John Selmon To Be Honored At The Stamford Cowboy Reunion

Eugene Swenson, president of the Texas Cowboy Reunion, has announced that this year's show will be dedicated to the late "Scandalous" John Selmon.

Attribute to "Scandalous" Selmon, the 1971 Texas Cowboy Reunion will award the first annual John Selmon Memorial Trophy. This prize will be given to the winner of the old-time cowboy calf roping contest. Entrants must be at least 55 years of age.

"Scandalous" John was born July 2, 1884 and married Emma Zinn in Spur. He was foreman of the SMS Flatop Ranch from 1919 until he retired in 1968. For over 35 years he served as arena director and led the Grand Entry each year for the Texas Cowboy Reunion.

The Kent County Commissioners Court, in a special session Thursday, June 3, passed three important orders.

They voted to approve a right of way easement to Lyn-tegar Electric for poles and lines on Labor 5, League 265 in Dawson County. This is Kent County School land.

They voted to organize a board of equalization and directed the county clerk to advertise the meeting of the board.

They voted to meet again in a county board of equalization on June 17th at 1 o'clock. The regular monthly meeting will be Monday.

Board To Hear Report On School Finances

The school board is scheduled to have met Thursday night at 8 o'clock.

On the agenda to have discussed were the following: A financial report on the sale of property. Mrs. McGaha purchased the Girard tea chorage for \$2,200.00. The tool house was purchased by C. C. Scott for \$70.00.

Superintendent Pierce told the board they had \$10,000.00 insurance on the HomeEc building, and \$20,000.00 on the gym, but were looking for someone to furnish insurance

on the other buildings.

The board was to be asked to set a policy on how much of the \$100.00 per student cost the board would pay on the speech clinic at Tech, which speech students were being encouraged to attend.

Superintendent Pierce was expected to recommend to the board a tax rate of \$1.52, which is under the \$1.55 which had previously been mentioned.

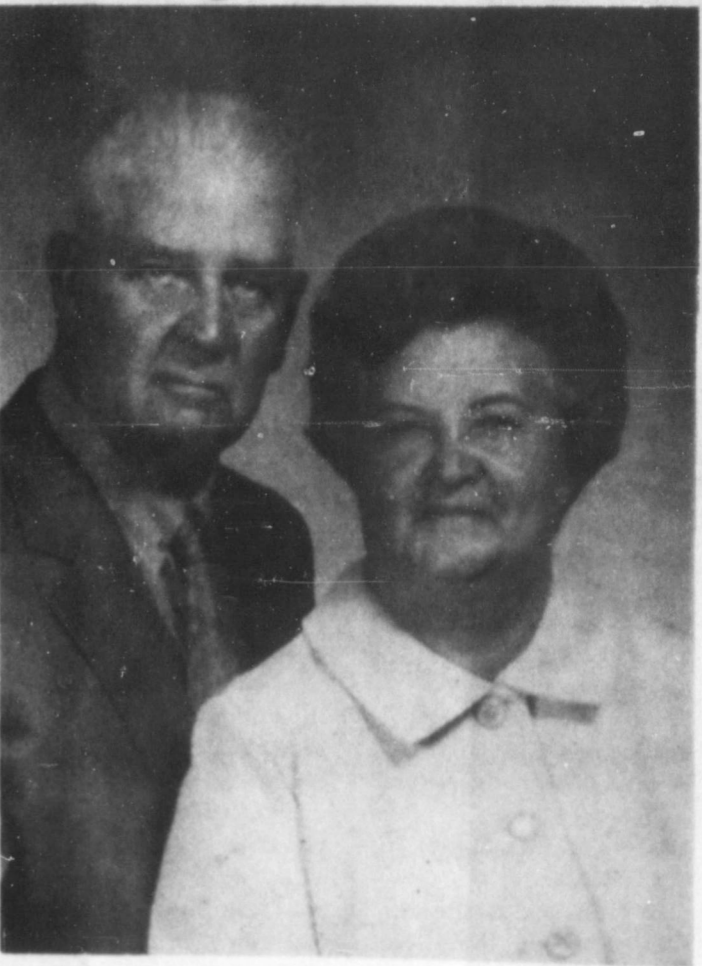

Cotton Insect Survey Team Work In Kent

Cotton insects survey teams for the Agricultural Experiment Station began working in the Kent County area on June 1. Thirteen boll weevils were found on Monday June 7 along the Duck Creek area southwest of Girard. One weevil was found about 5 miles northwest of Jayton.

Survey teams are regularly checking 35 fields in the cotton producing area of north-

east Kent County. Research is being made on the cotton farms to determine the movement of boll weevils, places of overwintering, and migration habits.

Farmers are urged to make regular checks on their cotton for insects.

Recommendations are available from the Insect Guide, obtained from the County Agent Office.

Rep. Omar Burleson Happy To Represent Kent Co. In Congress

Congressman Omar Burleson today commented on the Congressional Redistricting just completed by the Texas Legislature. "By legal necessity," he said, "the State Legislature has just gone through the most difficult job of re-appointing Congressional Districts on the basis of population. The outcome of these adjustments on the basis of population is never calculated to please everyone and,

as a matter of fact, they seldom please anyone completely. The Legislature does the best job it can, and it is no easy one."

In Burleson's statement, he continued, "It is my feeling that a community of interest should be maintained in establishing Congressional Districts. It is fundamental that this be preserved for best representation of the people. In this instance County relates closely to the area which it has been my privilege to represent in the Congress for a great many years. I am delighted with the prospect of representing Kent County in the United States Congress. I have numerous personal friends there and will look forward to making new ones at the opportunity afforded itself."

Spread mixture on top of congealed salad; chill. Cut into squares; spread with mayonnaise. Top with cheese. Yield: 2-15 servings.

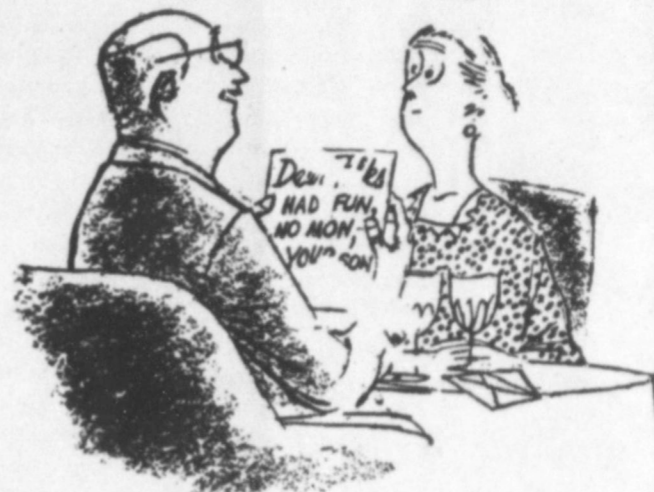

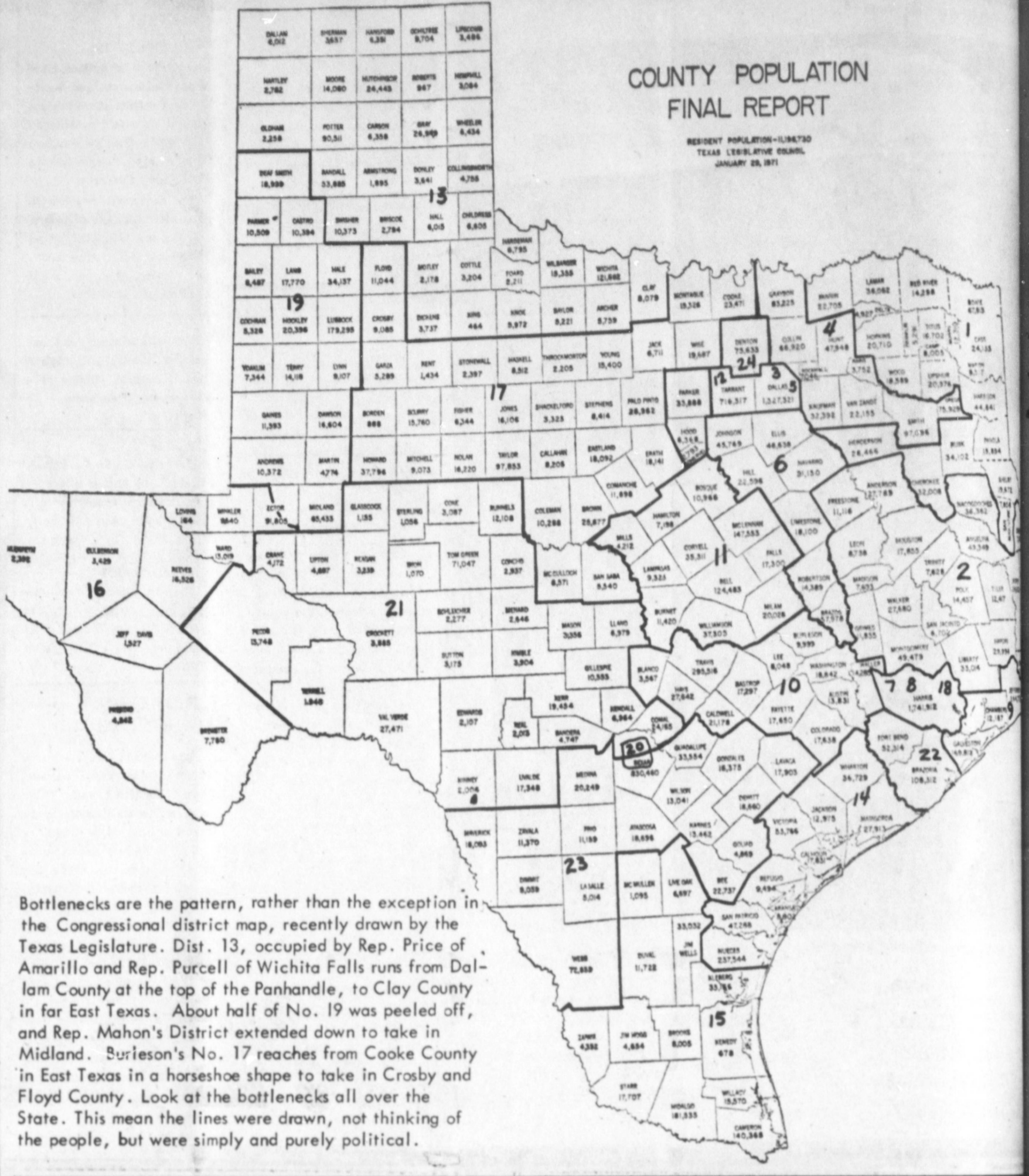
