Six Kent County 4-Hers entered record books for District Judging.

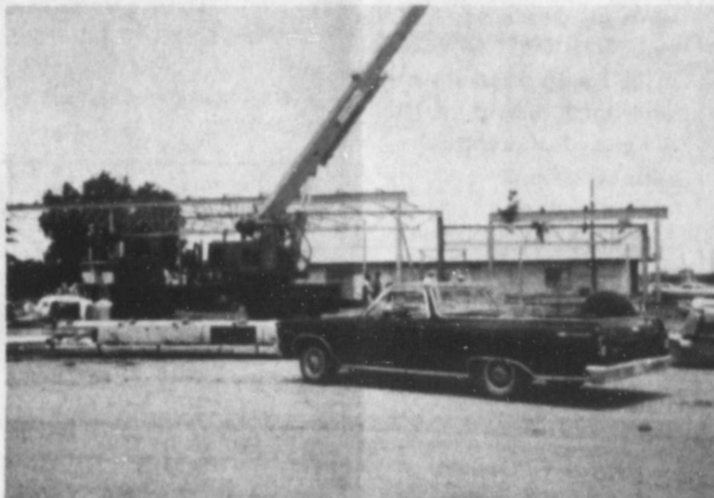

Congratulations to these hard-working girls.

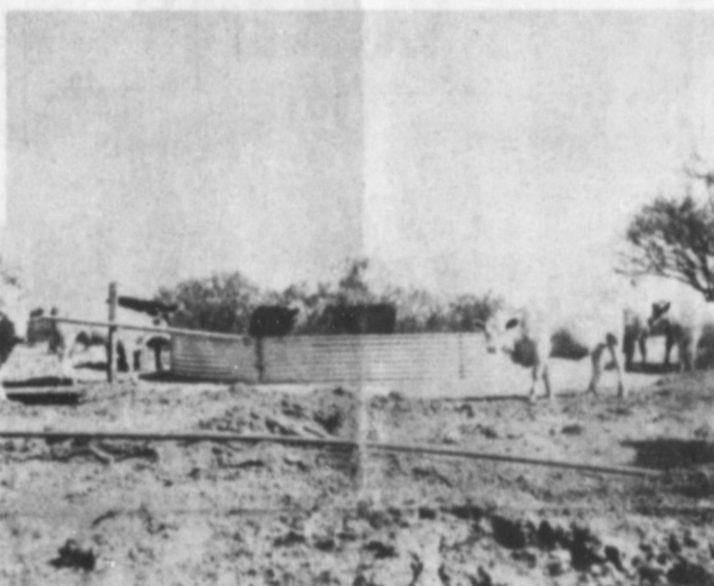

Adequate Water Supply Essential For Ranchers

No matter how good your pasture of rangeland may be or how well it may be managed, you must have an adequate supply of livestock water, properly distributed according to the topography of the land. Proper distribution of livestock water utilizes all of your grassland, prevents overgrazing of certain areas, keeps your livestock in the best possible condition and makes management much easier. Livestock should not have to travel over 1/4 mile in rough country, 1 mile in rolling country or 2 miles in level country.

Since ponds cannot always be located exactly where they are needed and in dry years are not too dependable, water storage facilities and drinking troughs many times can be used to bring about the desired results. Pipelines can be used to transport the water to the desired location from a convenient well or other dependable water source. This method is usually more dependable in a semi-arid region such as Kent County.

Water Storage Facilities should be constructed of durable materials such as steel plate, galvanized metal or concrete and should have a steel re-inforced concrete bottom. Size of storage should be of sufficient size to provide for a weeks supply of water for the expected number of livestock to be serviced. This can be determined by allowing 15 gallons per day for

beef cattle and horses, 30 gallons per day for dairy cattle and 2 gallons per day for hogs.

Facilities may be constructed as a storage facility with a drinking trough separate or may be constructed as a combination storage-drinking trough. An overflow and drain should be provided to allow excess water to be drained away from the trough to prevent a mudhole around the trough. Also, a drain will allow the trough to be drained and cleaned periodically. A 2 to 3 foot apron poured around the outside of the trough or facility will prevent "trenching" and will allow small calves to reach the water supply. Guards can be constructed over the float valves in such a manner as to prevent breakage by livestock and yet be easily accessible for servicing.

This Week In Jayton



District Judge Jones of Austin has officially ruled that the Texas Legislature did not do a good job of setting the bounds of the districts of representatives to the Legislature, and declared redistricting unconstitutional. This was resulting from a suit filed by Republicans against Midland County as their guide line case.

Midland County lacks just a few voters having a district the right size for one representative. But when the redistricting plan was presented, Midland County was divided down the middle, with part of it in a district reaching all the way to El Paso, and the other part in a district reaching all the way to Abilene. Judge Jones said in effect the political implications were a bit too obvious here. Any clear-thinking citizen would agree with him.

Delwin Jones of Lubbock who headed the redistricting committee, told newsmen Monday, they had several alternatives. One would be to appeal the case to the Texas Supreme Court. The second would be to let a committee composed of the Lt. Governor, the Speaker, the Attorney General and the Comptroller do the job. This would be the logical routine thing to do.

The next would be for the Attorney General to not recognize the 1970 census, and leave the districts on the present setup.

We shall see how it comes out.

Draft Impasse Causes Young Men Confusion

Selective Service System Executive Secretary Mary L. Johnson, who manages Stone-wall Dickens and Kent County's Local Board, says the current Congressional impasse over extending the induction authority has created great uncertainty among area draft-age men.

Mrs. Johnson continued, "Selected Service Director Curtis Tarr has recently stressed the importance of explaining to our draft-age men the high probability that draft calls will resume in the near future and that the current impasse in Congress is not likely to affect any registrant's chance of being drafted." "Our local board has been specifically instructed to continue to register and classify men, and to order for preinduction physical examinations those young classify men who may be needed to fill draft calls in the coming months," Mrs. Johnson said.

Men with lottery numbers through 125 were eligible for induction in June in order to fill draft calls. Since then, the Defense Department has asked Selective Service to draft 16,000 men in July-August. This request is being held by Selective Service headquarters pending final Congressional action on the draft bill, which is expected within several weeks.

"Those young men with relatively low lottery numbers

who are eligible for induction this year, particularly those with numbers below 175--the current processing ceiling have a very good chance of being processed for induction after draft calls are restored," Mrs. Johnson said.

"Many young men," said Mrs. Johnson, "seem to think that the Selective Service Act has permanently expired and that they probably will never be drafted. Some of them also think that the entire system has stopped. They are wrong since it is only the induction authority that has expired. They, therefore, may be unintentionally breaking the law by failing to register at age 18, by not keeping their local boards informed of their current address, or by failing to report, if ordered, for their preinduction physical examinations."

Mrs. Johnson also stressed that local boards are continuing to CO, hardship, and student deferments and to take other classifications actions. "Young men who had planned to submit requests for deferments or exemptions are encouraged to do so," Mary L. Johnson said. "The expiration of the induction authority does not affect our responsibility to classify young men," Mrs. Johnson added.

SHISH KABOBS

SHISH KABOB

Classic "barbecue on a skewer" - better than ever with cubes of tender Beef

2 lbs. boneless Beef

leg or shoulder, cut in 1 1/2 inch cubes.
1/2 cup wine vinegar
1/2 cup oil
1 clove garlic, crushed
1 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. pepper
1/2 tsp. oregano
1/2 tsp. paprika
3 onions, quartered
12 tomato wedges or cherry tomatoes
1 green pepper, cut into 6 strips

Place Beef cubes in bowl. Blend vinegar and oil with seasonings, pour over Beef. Cover bowl and let stand 2 hours or overnight in refrigerator. Thread Beef on skewers alternately with vegetables. Broil close to heat until meat is browned, about 12-15 minutes, turning often and basting with marinade for moistness. Makes 6 servings.

EASY BONELESS BARBECUE

1 Beef boned rolled shoulder, about 3 lbs. or boned, rolled leg, about 4 lbs.
1/2 cup oil
1/2 cup red wine (or vinegar)
1 small onion, finely chopped
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. sugar
1/2 tsp. rosemary
1/2 tsp. pepper
Remove strings from Beef. Strip off fell (outer skin), and open out. Secure any loose pieces of meat with skewers. Combine remaining ingredients and pour over Beef. Marinate 1 hour or longer. Broil on rack 4 inches from heat 45-60 minutes, turning every 15 minutes, basting with marinade. Makes 6-8 servings.

BARBECUED BEEF RACK ORIENTALE

Add sweet and pungent oriental flavor to broiled Beef rack - deliciously different.

1 rack of Beef
1 1/2 - 2 lbs.
1 tbs. soy sauce
1 tbs. apricot preserves
1/2 cup water
1 tbs. lemon juice or vinegar

1 clove garlic, crushed
Brush Beef with mixture of remaining ingredients. Broil 6 inches from heat 55-60 minutes. Turn after 1/2 hour and baste with soy sauce mixture. Or broil on spit of electric or charcoal rotisserie. Makes 1-2 servings. Bring baste to boil, serve as sauce.

ITALIAN CHOP KABOBS

Two exciting variations on the kabob theme - skewered whole Beef chops Italian style or with a Hawaiian touch.

12 beef chops, 3/4 inch thick
1 lb. mushrooms
2 sweet red peppers, each cut into 6 pieces
1 cup bottled Italian salad dressing

Thaw chops so that they can be pierced with skewers. Cut unpeeled mushrooms into 1 inch slices. Thread chops flat on 6 skewers, alternating with mushrooms (pierced through the skin) and pepper pieces. Brush with salad dressing. Broil about 10 minutes each side. Makes 6 servings. VARIATION: For Hawaiian Chop Kabobs, alternate chops with drained canned pineapple chunks and pieces of green pepper. Brush kabobs with Oriental style barbecue sauce and broil as above.

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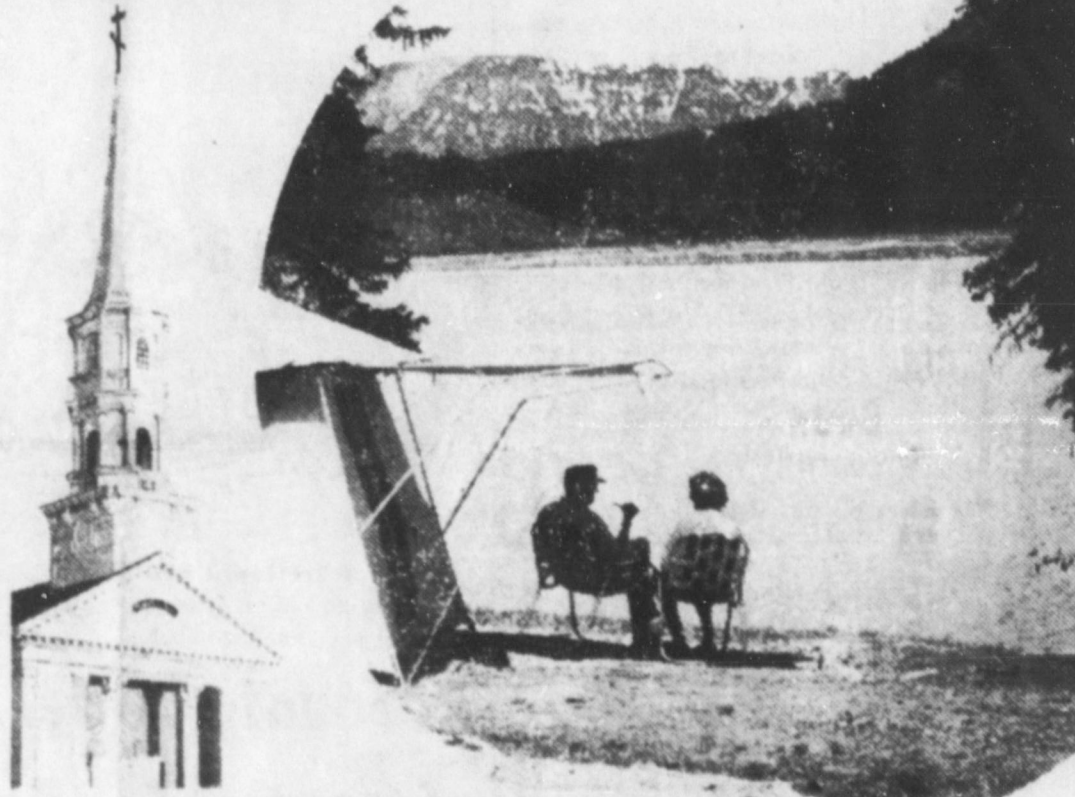

that part of the world. Some writers and commentators are already comparing the President's trip to that of Prime Minister Chamberlain's visit to Hitler in Munich prior to World War II. Some have characterized the trip as simply the President sitting down with Chairman Chou En-lai to eat Peking duck. Maybe even this is worth something.

It is hard to imagine that peace in that part of the world can be eased as long as the communists continue their aggressive aims against the smaller and weaker nations in Southeast Asia. It could--and this is the big hope--possibly lead to some better understanding between communist China and our own Government regarding the intents of both in Asia.

The war in Vietnam has been sustained the prolonged primarily by the aid and assistance given by Moscow and Peking. If--just if--something may be said or done to help wind down the whole thing then, the trip would be a victory.


From all indications the President is well aware that the chances of solid accomplishment are slim, but even operating on the theory of "What can you lose," it may be worthwhile.

The "What can you lose" is, in fact, the key to the whole thing. The matter of our relationship with the Nationalist Chinese on Formosa, South

Korea, Japan and others, certainly must not be impeded and this seems to be the assurance of the President.

On the other hand, the announcement, Premier Chou En-lai has continued to condemn and berate the United States as an aggressor.

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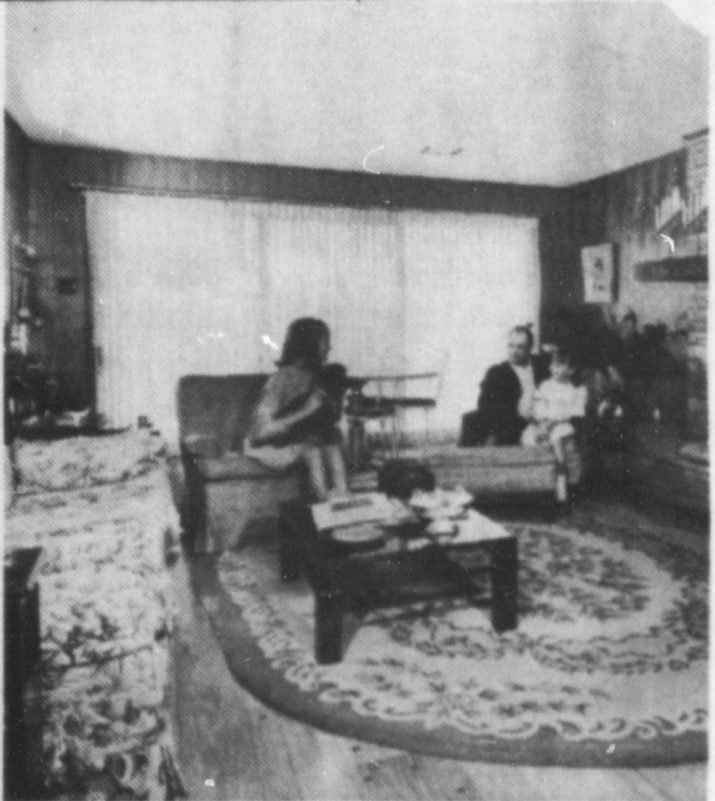


