



#### New Butane Law In **Effect For Farmers**

The recent 62nd, Regular Session of the Texas Legislature amended the Liquefied Gas Tax Law whereby a farm or ranch user can elect to secure a Special Farm User Permit and Pay taxes in advance on 1, 200 gallons of fuel per year per vehicle, or a monthly fraction thereof, on vehicles secured after January, and to purchase tax free LP Gas wihtout filing monthly reports and tax payments or keeping records, other than annual speedometer readings. The law requires that the speedometer be kept in good operating condition at all times. The new law becomes effective September 1, 1971.

Under the new law a supplier cannot sell or deliver LPG tax free to any user who owns and/or operates a motor ve.hicle with LPG unless said wner holds a valid permit s a Bonded-User or as a Special Farm User.

The new law states that a person who owns and/or operates a motor vehicle powered with LPG cannot legally issue,

nor can a supplier accept in lieu of tax payments, a signed statement that none of the LPG purchased or acquired in Texas by him will be delivered or permitted by him to be de livered into the fuel supply tanks of motor vehicles.

The Special Farm User Permit will be issued to farmers or ranchers by the Comptroller of Public Accounts, and will cost \$60.00 a year or \$5.00 a month for each remaining month after January. The Special Farm User permit will authorize the holder to purchase LPG tax free in a LPG operated vehicle. A representative of Robert S. Calvert, State Comptroller, will be at Jayton Courthouse on August 31st from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm for the purpose of issuing these per-

#### One Kent Accident

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated one accident on rural highways in Kent County during the month of July, according to Sergeant Frank Jircik, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for July, 1971, shows a total of 564 accidents resulting in 38 persons killed and 324 persons injured. This was 40 more accidents, 28 more fatalities, and 38 more injured than during June.

The 38 traffic deaths for the

month of July, 1971, occurred in the following counties: Wise, 8; Donley, 5; Wheeler, 4; Lamb and Witchita, 3 each; Oldham, Clay, and Lubbock, 2 each; Deaf Smith, Hall, Parmer, Potter, Archer, Dickens, King, Palo Pinto, and Young, I each.

The traffic fatalities in July have been the most that have been recorded during any month of 1971.

mistake can "take the sting out" of what he said by instructing the ury to ignore it.

Nor is a judge expected to be uperhuman. In the heat of a trial, he may understandably show flashes of nonjudicial emotion. In one case, while the judge was talking with a lawyer, the defendant kept interrupting. Finally the judge burst out:

"Please keep quiet. I don't like it. You are here to answer questions. If there is any more of that kind of talk, you will be in jail for contempt of court."

But this time, an appellate court ound no grounds for a new trial. The court said that, even though the judge should not have lost his temper, he could be excused for a natural reaction to a stressful

The United States Supreme Court once summarized the matter as follows:

KENT COUNTY HISTORY

Donnie Carriker went to Crosbyton on Saturday August 14th where he received a certificate to honor Kent County from the West Texas Pioneers -- Old Settlers Re-

Certificates of Honor were given to Hall -- Kent, Dickens and Motley counties by Robert Work, Crosby County Judge.

Kent County was created in 1876 from Bexar and Young territories. The County was named after Andrew Kent, one of the heroes of the Al-

The county government was organized in 1892.

The first county seat was at Clairemont and was moved to the present county seat of Jayton in 1956.

The first county Judge, A.W. Landers, was killed in

1893 while traveling between Clairemont and Synder.

The early funds and records were kept at Synder until the

county was organized. It is generally beleived that the motive for the killing of Judge Landers was robbery due to the fact he often transported county funds to or from

The first court house built in 1 894 of native sand stone for \$18,000.00. The first floor of this building is still standing and is used for a community center. The first jail was built of the same material for \$1,000.00. A controversy arose regarding the building of the jail but it was resolved by a 3 to 1 vote of the commissioners court

and the jail was built. The building stands today and is tourist attraction.

The first mineral produced in Kent County was early day salt production from the natur ral salt flats along some of the rivers and creeks. Today Ken Coutny has oil and gas production which is estimated to be worth \$250 million dollar.



> Families failing within these scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the crincipal's office in each school. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to ictermine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eliqubility.

> Under the provisions of the policy the Business Manager will review applications and deturmine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local official ne may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. R. N. Fierce, whose address is Jayton, Texas has been designated as the Hearing Official.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the office of the Business Manager where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.


