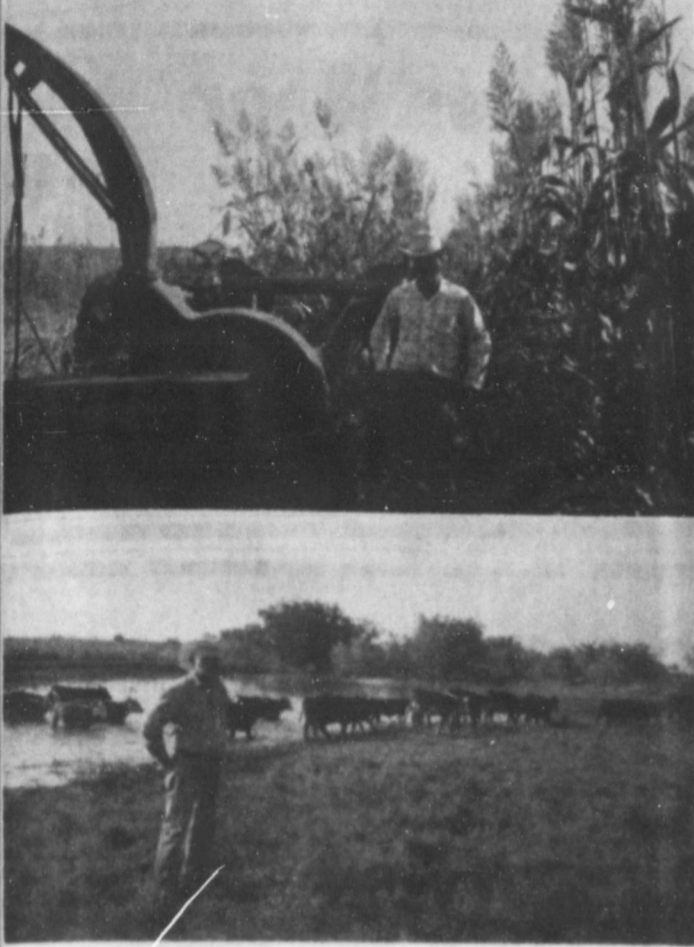

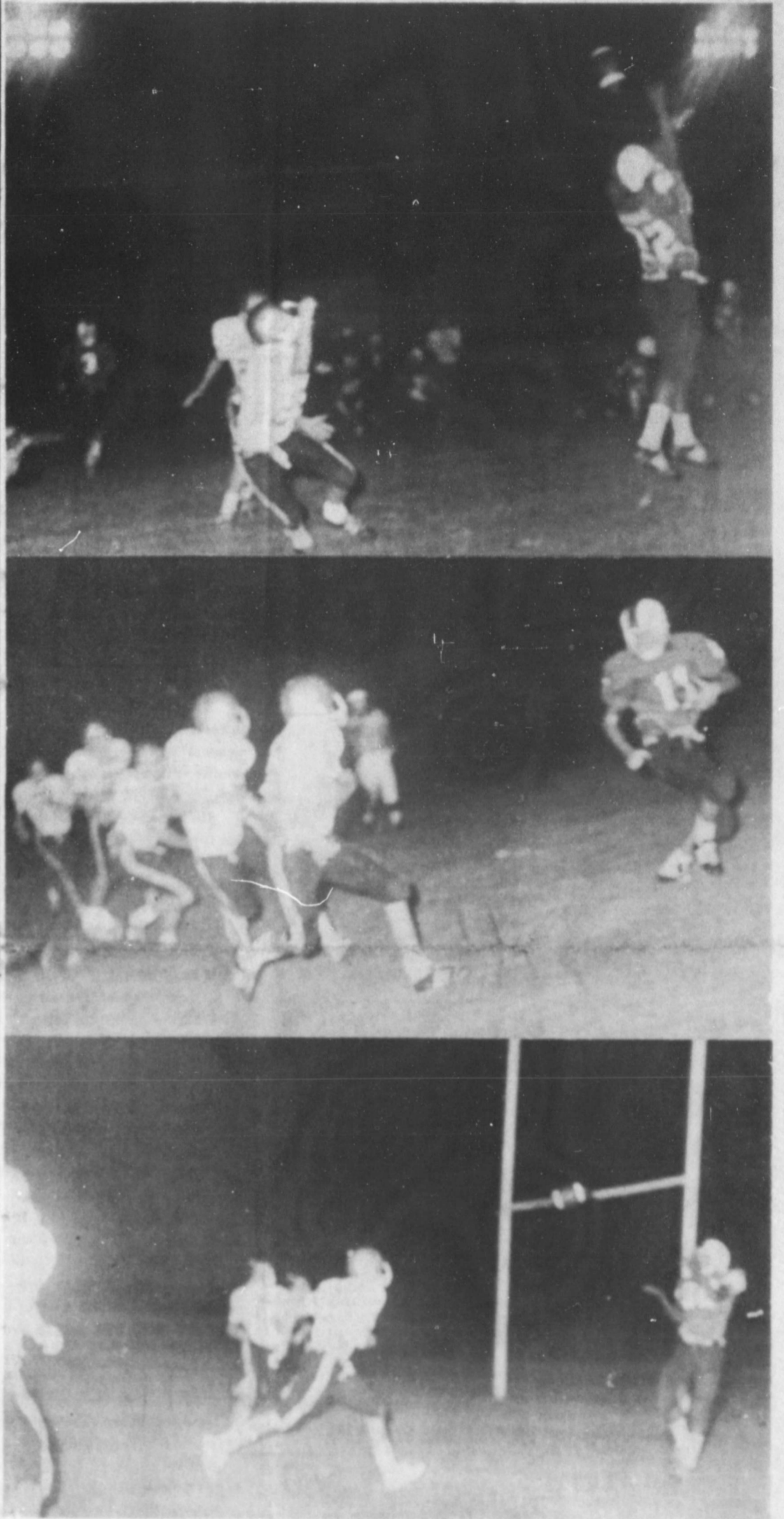

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## Big Country Development Project Meeting Held

The Big Country Resource Conservation and Development Project sponsors held a meeting in Aspermont September 22nd. Approximately 150 people attended this meeting representing Kent County.

A resource Conservation and Development Project is a way and means for local people to study their problems, evaluate their resources, and band together with neighbors with assistance available from all government agencies in solving of their local problems.

Mr. James Abbott, Assistant State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, were touring the Big Country RCGD Project area to determine the feasibility of the project. This meeting was held to enable the local people to present the problems of the RCGD area to enable Mr. Abbott and

Rechenin to get the entire picture of the problems and the local interest in solving them.

Kent County Judge, Bobbie T. Gallagher, spoke before the group of approximately 150 people from a 12 county area, presenting the problems of resource conservation and development in Kent County and the surrounding area.

This is one of the highlight speeches of the day.

Mr. Abbott and Rechenin spoke to the group and pointed out some facts of the RCGD program to the people. One of the major points was that the RCGD programs is a locally initiated program, locally directed. They further pointed out that RCGD provides a base for people of an area to come together to plan and carry out actions that will make their area a better place

to live, work, and play. The basic formula, to enable local people to do this is to take better care of their resources and at the same time use all of these resources to improve their community's economy.

Each RCGD Project has its own locally developed goals, but in general RCGD projects aim to accomplish the following:

1. Develop land and water resources for agricultural, municipal, or industrial use.
2. Provide soil and water information to other planning agencies on such resource uses as farming, ranching, recreation, wildlife habitat, housing, industry, and transportation.
3. Carry out conservation measures for watershed protection and flood prevention.
4. Accelerate soil surveys and interpretations where they are needed to complement project plans.
5. Reduce pollution of air and water.
6. Speed up conservation work on individual farms, ranches, and other private holdings and on public land.
7. Make needed adjustments in land use by converting poorly suited cropland to more beneficial uses-- grass, trees, wildlife habitat, and recreation.
8. Improve and expand recreation facilities; promote historical and scenic attractions.
9. Encourage existing industries to expand and new ones to locate in the area and thus create jobs; encourage industries to process and use

products of the area.

10. Improve markets for farm crops, forest products, and livestock.
11. Improve, build, or bring to the area needed community facilities such as hospitals, schools, sewage treatment plants, and roads.
12. Encourage training and retraining programs to improve job skills.

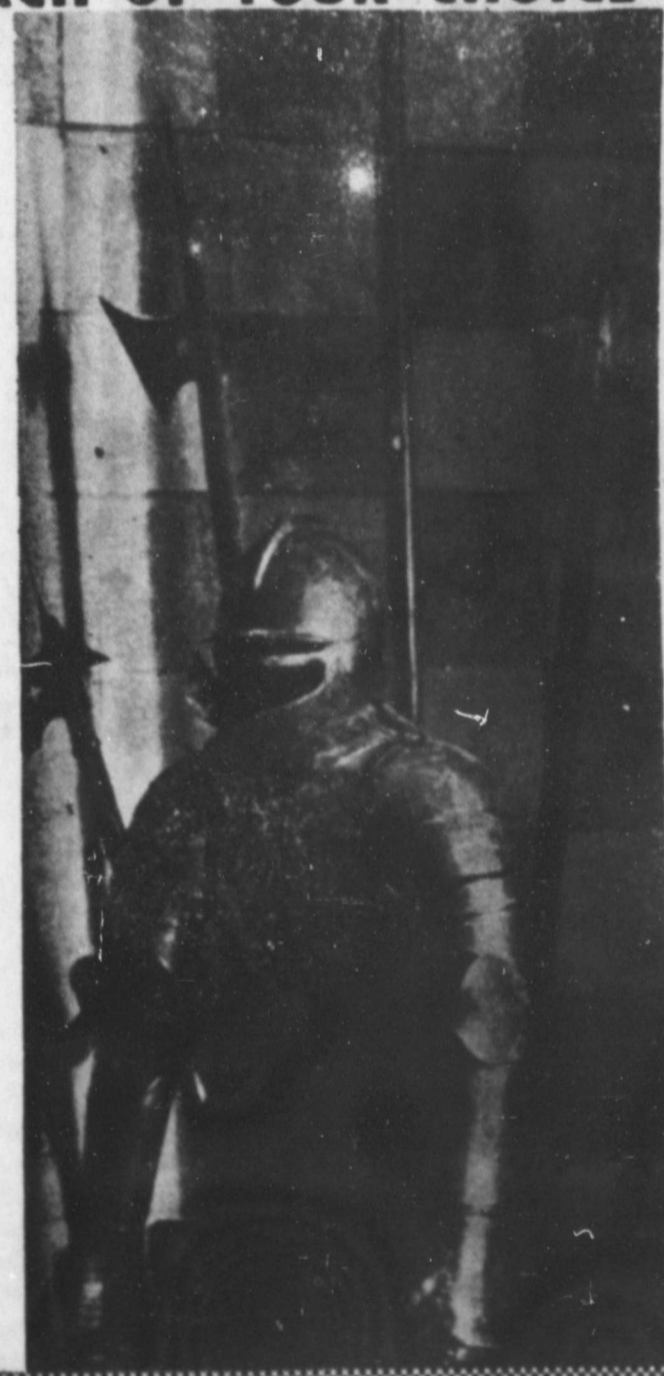

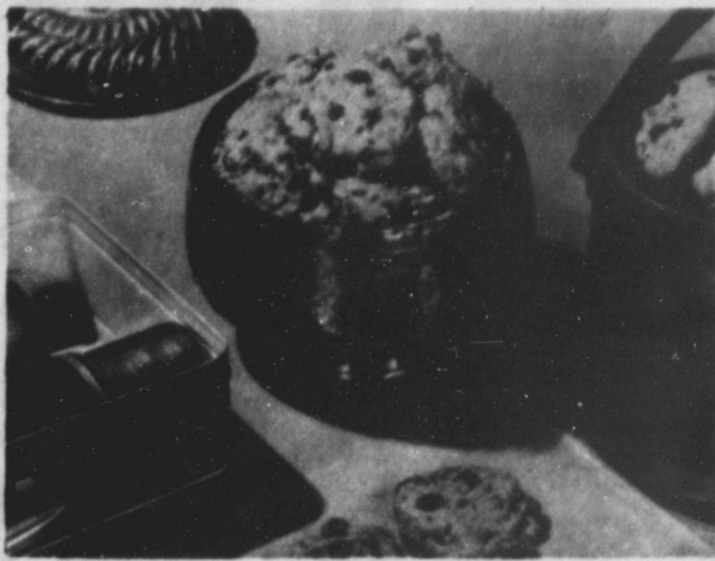

## From The Recipe Files Of Opal Richards



### Peanut Butter Cookies

3/4 cup unsifted flour, stir to aerate before measuring  
 1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
 1/2 cup or 1/4 lb. stick butter or margarine  
 1/2 cup creamy or chunky peanut butter  
 1/2 cup firmly packed light brown sugar  
 1/2 cup granulated sugar  
 1 large egg  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 1/2 cup salted Spanish peanuts, red skins on  
 1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate pieces

On wax paper thoroughly stir together the flour and baking soda.  
 In a medium mixing bowl cream butter and peanut butter; beat in (one ingredient at a time) the brown sugar, granulated sugar, egg and vanilla. Add flour mixture; with a spoon mix well. Stir in peanuts and chocolate pieces.

Drop by heaping teaspoonfuls, about 2 inches apart, on to an ungreased cookie sheet. Press down with floured fork, (markings will not show after baking.)

Bake in a preheated 350° oven until lightly browned--10 minutes. Let cookies stand on pan about one minute.

Then with a wide metal spatula remove to wire racks to cool. Store in a tightly covered tin box.  
 Makes 4 dozen cookies.

**GINGER SNAPS**  
 2 cups sifted flour  
 1 teaspoon baking soda  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1 teaspoon ginger  
 1/2 cup light molasses  
 1/2 cup firmly packed dark brown sugar  
 1 large egg

On wax paper sift together flour, soda, salt and ginger. In a medium saucepan heat the molasses and sugar, stirring until sugar dissolves (do not boil) cool; add egg and beat well. Gradually stir in sifted dry ingredients until blended. Chill dough for 3 hours. Work with 1/2 of the dough at a time, keeping refrigerated. On a floured pastry cloth, with a floured stockinet covered floured rolling pin, roll out dough to 1/4 inch thickness.

Cut out with a round 3-inch cookie cutter. Place 3 inches apart on greased cookie sheets.

Bake in a preheated 350° oven 12 to 15 minutes. With a wide metal spatula remove to wire racks to cool. Store in a tightly covered tin box. Makes about 13 cookies.

**SUGAR COOKIES (Basic)**  
 Sift together and set aside  
 2 cups sifted flour  
 1 teaspoon baking powder  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 Cream until shortening is softened  
 2/3 cup butter or margarine  
 1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
 Add gradually, creaming until fluffy after each addition

**VARIATIONS:**  
**BUTTERSCOTCH COOKIES**  
 Follow basic recipe. Reduce sugar to 1/4 cup. Add 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar. Increase shortening 2 tablespoons.

**LEMON OR ORANGE SUGAR COOKIES**

Follow basic recipe. Substitute 1 1/2 teaspoons lemon or orange juice for vanilla extract. Add 1 tablespoon grated lemon peel or 2 tablespoons grated orange peel.

**SPICED SUGAR COOKIES**  
 Follow basic recipe. Add 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg with flour.



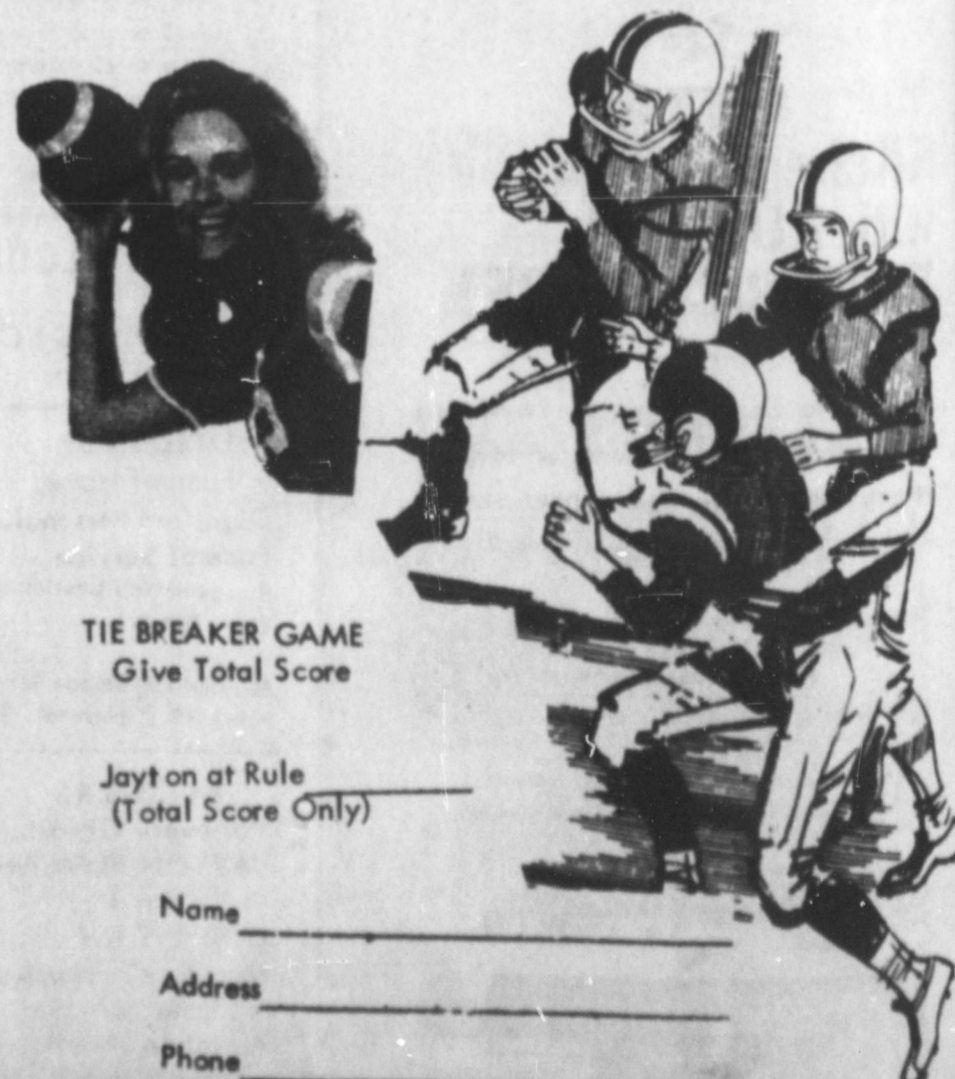

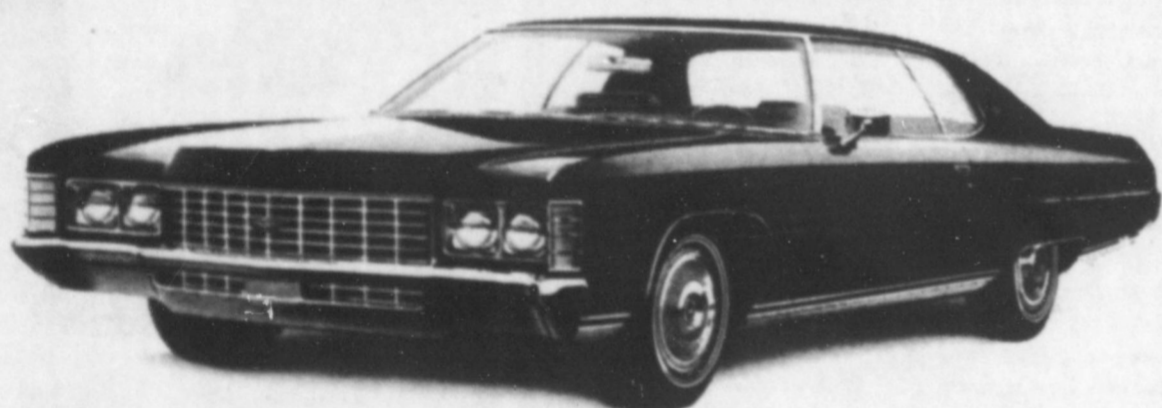
