



Ratliff And Hightower In Same District

Under the new Texas Senate Reapportionment plan, Kent County will be in a new district. In this district will be Kent's present Senator, Bill Ratliff, and also Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon.

Sen. Hightower carried Kent County in a special election in 1960 for Congress, but lost the district to Graham B. Howell. Later he served as District Attorney before going to the State Senate. He told the Chronicle he planned to run for reelection next year. It is assumed that Sen. Ratliff will also run for reelection.

This is one of the obvious things about the political maneuvering of the men

Two Deaths In Kent County In October

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated one accident on highways in Kent County during the month of October, according to Sergeant Frank ... Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in persons killed and no persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties in the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for October, 1971, shows a total of 595

accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 294 persons injured. This was 96 more accidents, 14 less fatalities, and 26 more injured than during September.

The 19 traffic deaths for the month of October, 1971 occurred in the following counties: Carson, four, Kent, Lubbock, Wise, Roberts, and Wheeler, two each; Crosby, Hale, Parker, Stonewall, and Hemphill one each.

As It Looks From Here

THE U. S. SENATE'S VOTE for a reduction in U. S. financial support of the United Nations is interpreted by some as retaliation for the ouster of Nationalist China and the admission of Communist China.

Although this action by the U. N. may have triggered and influenced the vote in the Senate, other factors are of obvious influence.

One is the fact that the Senate Finance Committee wants to have a bigger voice in the shaping of U. S. foreign policy. The greatest influence on the vote, however, is that the Senate is simply catching up with reality.

The United States can not afford to slip back into the old isolationism which once gripped the Country but neither can it carry the world on its shoulders forever, which we have tried to do since the end of World War II. With 5.7 percent of the world's people and 6.89 percent of the earth's area, we can not maintain the standard of living to which we have become accustomed unless we maintain world trade. Since we import nine of the basic fifteen minerals in the world, we can not sustain our industrial capacity by closing our borders. Neither can we sell our goods and commodities around the world.

At the same time, we can not continue to be Santa Claus to the world and keep these standards if our imbalance of payments and our public debt

mean anything and a lot of us think it does.

Back to the United Nations--members of that organization can not dodge the glaring inequities any long in the structure of financial support. There is simply no justification for expecting the United States to pay 1/3 of the bills when it was designed as wholly a cooperative effort.

Other nations must assume more of the burden of support and pay their bills when due.

The Soviet Union is today \$100 Million in the arrears and her eastern European satellites add another \$17 million. Some other small nations, whose votes in the General Assembly count as much as our own, have never paid a cent for U. N. support.

The United States saw an obligation 26 years ago to accept a disproportionate share of U. N. financing. At that time the world was struggling to its feet after the shock and destruction of World War II. Meanwhile the world has changed and there is absolutely no reason why the United States should pay about eight times as much towards the U. N. budget as does Japan with its booming economy.

The Assumption of a seat in the U. N. by Communist China gives occasion for the organization to review its entire operation. There is already the authority to take disciplinary action against those nations not paying.

Loraine has a season record of 7 wins and two losses. Their District record reads 3 wins and no losses.

The Jaybirds season record says 6 wins against 3 losses, and the district record 3-0, same as Loraine.

In the season book, Loraine has scored 241 points while the opponents were held to 98. In the district Loraine has put 95 points on the board against 32 for the opponents.

The Jaybirds in nine games

have scored 185 while allowing their opponents 132. For the three conference games the Jaybirds have rolled up 101 to 24 for the opposition.

A fired up group of Hawley Bearcats held a 21-14 lead over the Jaybirds at the end of the quarter here Friday night, and the locals had to turn on the steam and put 15 points on the board in the final period to pull out a shakey 29-21 victory over the visitors.

Harold Judy, operating from the tailback spot, led the Jaybird attack, with two touchdowns and three points kicking. Parker Kidd ran two touchdowns into the end zone, and Steve Kidd took a pass from Brad Dibrell, and ran in two extra points. Dibrell tossed to Judy for one of his tallies.

The Jaybirds had a small edge in the statistics, but it didn't look like it was enough at times. They had 20 first downs against Hawley's 18. The Jaybirds piled up 270 yards rushing, and completed 7 of 11 aerials for 40 yards.

Root Plowing Proves To Be Good Practice

The combination of Brush Control and Range Seeding is a very important conservation practice in Kent County. Cooperators living in Kent County and working with the Duck Creek Soil and Water Conservation District have used this combination of Brush Control and Range Seeding on over 50,000 acres in the past few years.

This 1971 planting season was a dry one, but a number of people planted grass and got good results in most instances. Planting grass this past year were Bill Jones, Z. L. McEnteer, Howard Goswick, Larry Williams, and Leroy Spire.

Brush Control and Range Seeding certainly is not recommended for all rangeland, but should be considered by the

landowner when he is deciding how to manage his rangeland. If he has a good stand of the better range grasses, he probably does not need to seed this land. He would want to select a type of Brush Control that would do a good job in controlling his brush but not disturb his grass. If he has none or a small percentage of the taller growing grasses present, he will want to seed these, so a method of brush control that would prepare a seedbed should be used. By analyzing his range conditions in this manner, the rancher can make the decision that will allow for the most economical and fast recovery of his rangeland.

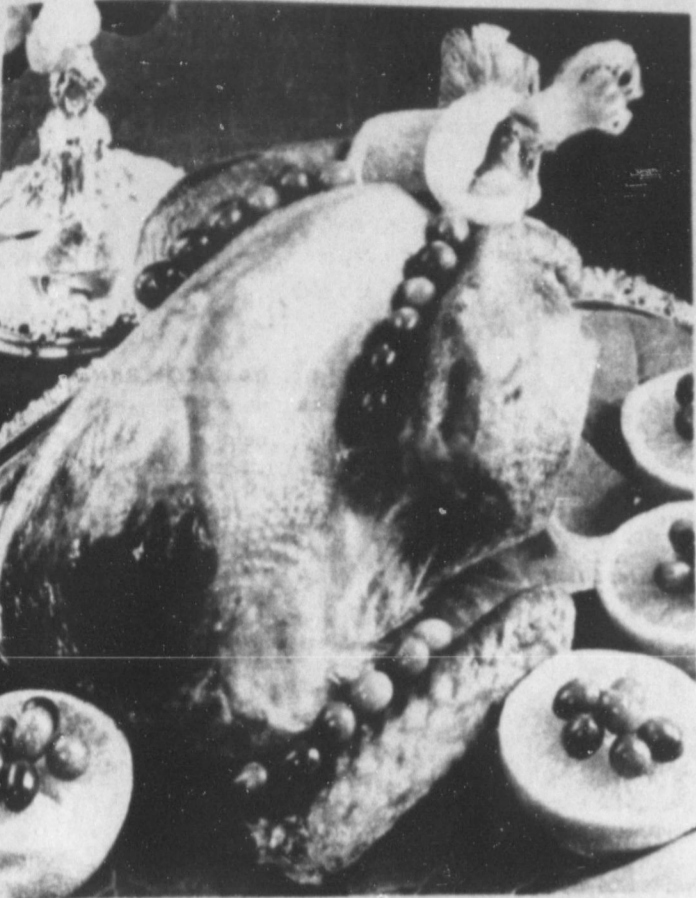

ROAST WHOLE TURKEY

Start with a ready-to-cook turkey. Salt inside of turkey. Fill body and neck cavities loosely with stuffing. Stuffing swells as it cooks, thus needs room to expand. Fold neck skin toward back and fasten with skewers or a few stitches. For stitching use clean white wrapping cord and large needle. Tuck legs under hand of skin at tail or tie down. To do this wrap cord around legs and under tail. This will hold

legs close to the body. Fold the wing tips back on the wings. This will help to hold the neck skin in place. Grease skin of turkey with melted or softened fat. Place breast down on rack in shallow pan. Do not add water, and do not cover. Place in preheated oven set at proper temperature indicated on time table. Baste with fat from bottom of pan during baking, and turn from one side of the breast to the other, then breast up. Or cover the top and sides of bird with a loosely woven cloth which has been moistened in fat. Moisten cloth with fat from bottom of pan if cloth dries during cooking.

Bread Stuffing

- 1 cup fat
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 4 cups chopped celery
- 9 cups cornbread crumbs
- 7 cups bread cubes
- 1 tablespoon salt
- ½ teaspoon pepper
- 2 teaspoons poultry seasoning
- 1½ to 2 cups broth, milk or water
- 4 eggs, raw or hard cooked

Use 2 to 4-day old light bread for bread cubes, or dry out bread in the oven. Cut into cubes. Cook onion and celery in fat over low heat until onion is soft but not browned, stirring occasionally. Meanwhile, blend seasonings with bread cubes. Add the onion, celery and fat. Pour liquid and beaten eggs (if used raw) gradually over the surface, stirring lightly. Add more seasonings as desired. Stuffing for a 14-18 pound turkey.

Variations:

1. The proportion of cornbread and light bread may be varied to suit taste. Light bread and biscuit or cornbread and biscuit may be combined.
2. Giblet stuffing: Simmer giblets until tender. Chop and brown in the fat before adding onion and celery.
3. Parsley stuffing: Add ½ cup finely chopped parsley to bread with seasonings.
4. Oyster stuffing: Cook 1 to 2 pints of oysters in the oyster liquid until edges curl. Add to bread with seasonings. Include oyster liquid as part of liquid in stuffing. Chop oysters if they are large.
5. Pecan stuffing: Add 2 cups pecans to bread and seasonings.

GIBLET GRAVY

- 3 tablespoons pan drippings
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 2 cups water, broth or milk
- Salt and pepper
- Chopped giblets
- Sliced hard cooked eggs, if desired

Cover giblets with water and simmer in a covered saucepan until tender. Drain the giblets and chop. Pour the pan drippings into a bowl leaving the brown residue in the roasting pan. Let the fat rise to the top and skim off. The meat juice under the fat should be used as part of the liquid. Place 3 tablespoons of the fat back in the roasting pan. Add flour and blend well. If desired, brown the fat and flour slightly to give additional color and flavor. Add liquid all at once. Cook, stirring constantly until uniformly thickened. Season to taste. Add chopped giblets and sliced hard cooked eggs.

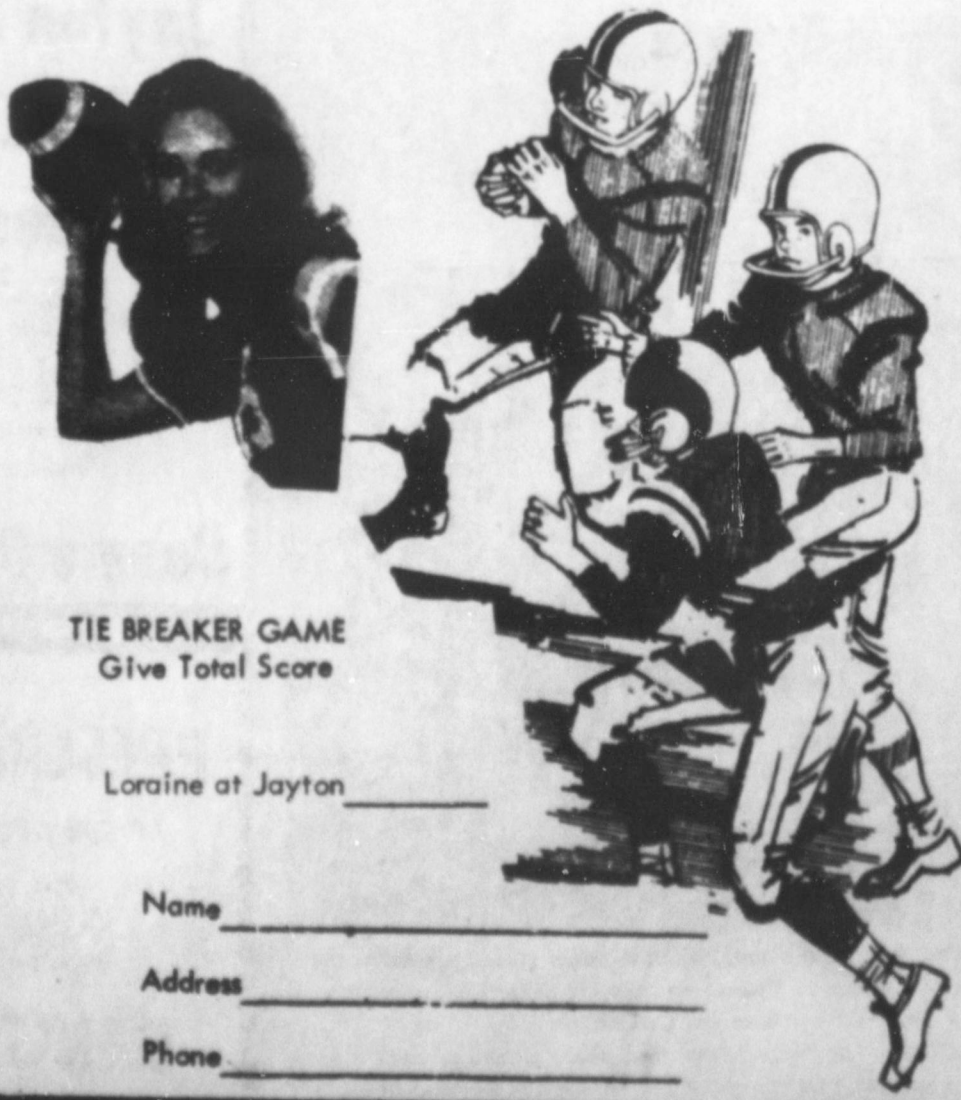
