## Land Bank Lowers The Interest Rates

E. H. Flournoy, Jr. Assistant Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Spurr, announced today that The Federal Land Bank of Houston will reduce the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 7%.

"This reduction will be effective January 1, 1972 on all variable rate loans and effects more than 177 million dollars in loan volume to more than 5,000 Texas farmers and ranchers", Flournoy stated.

The variable rate loan plan which was introduced by the Houston Bank in July, 1969 lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. This is the third time in the past year that the billing rate has been reduced.

"Continued improvement in the money market has made

this reduction possible and is in line with the Bank's policy of providing farmers and ranchers of Texas credit at the lowest possible cost consistent with sound business practices", Flournoy stated.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long term real estate loans throughout Texas. The Bank has over 573 million dollars in volume of loans outstanding. The local association makes and services loans in five counties. Officers and directors of the association are E. H. Farris, Jr. of Crosbyton; M. L. Dilberry of Aspermont; M. V. Jay of Jayton; Donald Wooten of Crosbyton; Nathan C. Morris of Afton; and Joe V. Jennings of Lorenzo.

## Time Approaching To Register Cars

If you own one or more of the more than seven-and-a-half million motor vehicles in Texas, some important mail is coming your way.

The first of 7.5 million renewal applications from the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department were dispatched from the Post Office's facilities in Dallas on Friday, December 31.

Owners of motor vehicles should be receiving the renewal applications—for obtaining 1972 Texas license plates—early in January.

The actual motor vehicle registration "season" at county tax offices does not begin until February 1.

However, vehicle owners can go ahead and order their license plates by mail immediately.

What is required is to complete the renewal application, pay the registration fee and have each vehicle to be registered to the local county

ment. License plates can be obtained in person at county tax offices and designated substations beginning on February 1.

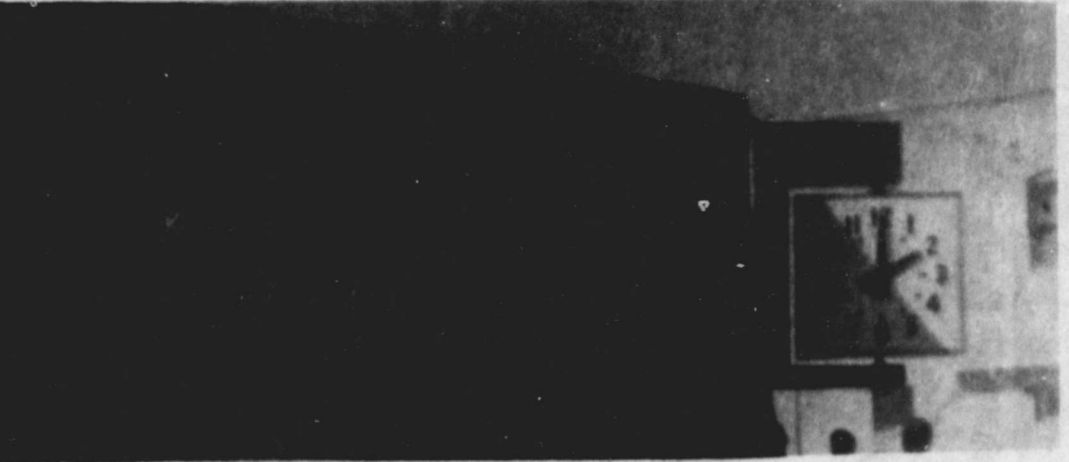
In any case, registration will go faster if the owner leaves the three-part form intact and does not separate any of the three parts.

Complete, easy-to-follow instructions are contained on the form and on the envelope.

Deadline for displaying 1972 license plates is midnight, April 1.

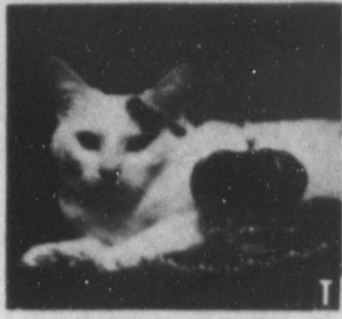

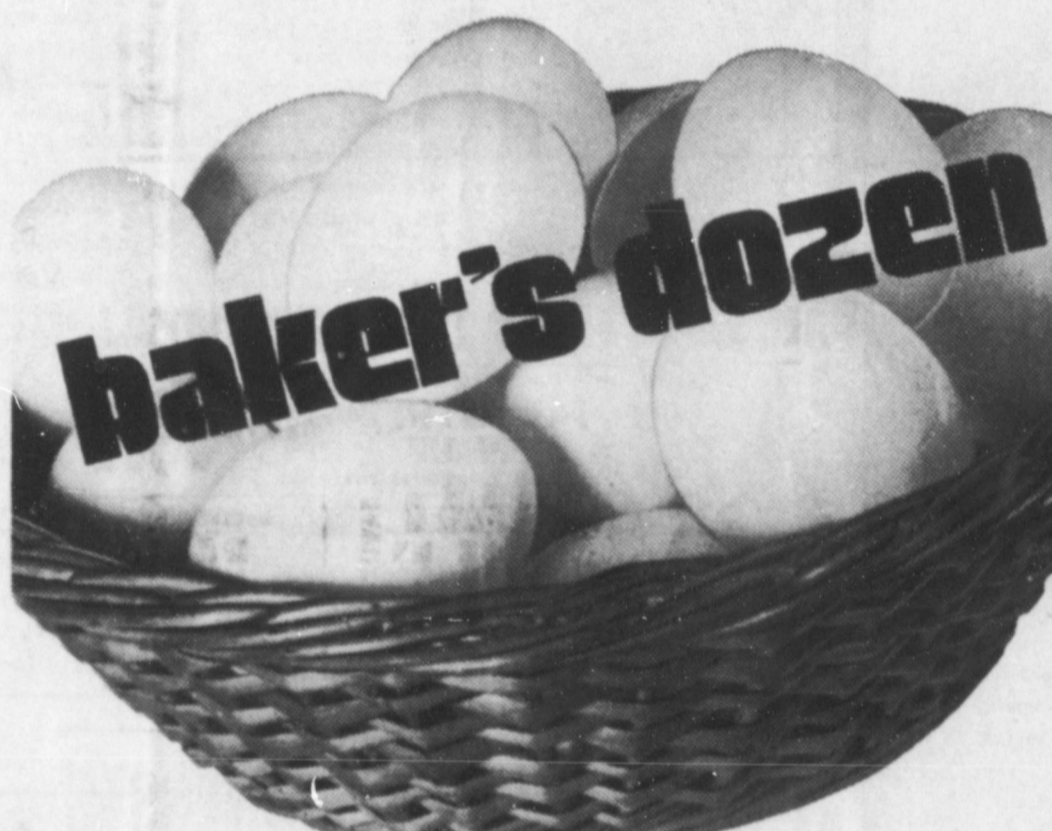

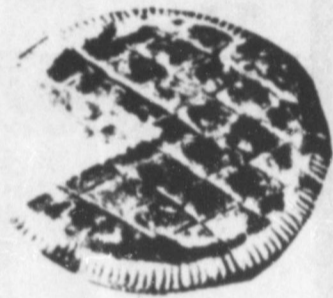
Soups For Cold Weather

**HARTY BEEF SOUP**  
 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter  
 1 cup water  
 2 cups shredded potatoes  
 2 tablespoons chopped onion  
 1 tablespoon flour  
 4 cups milk  
 1 package (3 oz.) smoked sliced beef  
 1 cup (8 3/4 oz. can) whole kernel corn  
 1/4 teaspoon celery seed (optional)  
 1 cup dairy sour cream  
 Salt and pepper  
 Dairy sour cream (optional)  
 Chopped parsley (optional)

Simmer and cook until potatoes are done, about 20 minutes. Stir in flour and cook 1 minute. Gradually add milk, stirring constantly. Stir in beef which has been cut into small pieces, undrained corn and celery seed. Gently blend in cream. Heat to serving temperature. Add salt and pepper to taste. Serve garnished with a dollop of sour cream and parsley, if desired.

**SPARAGUS CREAM SOUP**  
 2 packages (10 oz. each) frozen cut-up asparagus  
 1 3/4 cups water  
 1 cup dairy sour cream  
 2 tablespoons butter  
 2 tablespoons regular all-purpose flour  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 1 teaspoon chicken stock base \*  
 Dash of pepper  
 3 cups milk  
 2 quart saucepan place asparagus and water; cover and bring to a steam. Reduce heat; simmer until tender. Drain asparagus with cooking liquid; blend in sour cream; set aside. In 3-quart saucepan melt butter; blend in flour, salt, chicken stock base and pepper. Remove from heat; gradually add milk. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until thickened. Cook 2 additional minutes. Stir in asparagus mixture. Heat to serving temperature. Note: One chicken bouillon cube dissolved in 1/4 cup boiling water may be substituted for chicken stock base.

**CORN BREAD STICKS**  
 2 cups corn meal  
 1/2 lb. flour  
 1/2 cup baking powder  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 1/2 cup salt  
 1/2 cup oil  
 1/2 cup buttermilk  
 Preheat the oven very hot, about 450 degrees and grease buttered iron stick pans to heat. Combine the dry ingredients in a bowl and add eggs and buttermilk. Do not overbeat. Spoon the batter into the hot stick pans and bake until brown on top, about 10 minutes.



Apple - Cheese Pie

Pastry for 9 inch two-crust pie  
 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese (4 ounces)  
 2 cans (21 ounces each) apple pie filling  
 Heat oven to 425°. Prepare pastry except--add cheese before mixing. Fill pastry-lined pie pan with apple pie filling.  
 Cover with top crust which has slits cut in it; seal and flute. Cover edge with 2 to 3 inch strip of aluminum foil to prevent excessive browning; remove foil for the last 15 minutes of baking. Bake 35 to 40 minutes.

## THE FAMILY LAWYER

### Duty of a Wife

"Whither thou goest, I will go; and where thou lodgest, I will lodge."

Does the modern wife owe this kind of biblical loyalty to her husband? Under today's law, is she still obliged to let him choose the family home?

Almost everywhere, that continues to be the basic rule. By and large, it is the husband who has the last word as to where they will live. If the wife refuses to follow his lead, she is guilty of desertion—grounds for divorce.

Thus: To cut expenses, a man prepared to move to a smaller apartment. But his wife decided it was "not stylish enough" for her, and went home to her parents. After a long impasse, the man finally sued for divorce and won a decree. The judge said the wife's refusal to live with him, for no good and sufficient reason, made her a deserter in the eyes of the law.



Nevertheless, the husband's authority is far from absolute. He cannot insist on a housing arrangement which is simply not fair to his spouse.

For example, one man decided to move in with his mother, even though he could well afford separate lodgings—and even though his mother and his wife did not get along with each other.

A court held, in these circumstances, that the wife had a legitimate excuse for not joining the household.

Furthermore, when a man invites his wife to join him at a new location, he must really mean it—not just be going through the motions. One cantankerous husband, having journeyed alone to the West Coast, sent back the following "invitation" to his wife:

"I have completely gotten over my regard for you, if I ever had any. However, I am doing what I must do, even though you have ruined my life. I ask you to come and make your home with me, as the law requires."

When she held back, he tried to divorce her on the grounds of desertion. But the court ruled against him. The judge said this was the kind of an invitation that no self-respecting wife could possibly accept.

### What's the Weather, Buoy?

A new buoy system for recording and surveying oceanographic and meteorological data is currently being tested in the North Sea and the Baltic. Recorded data is transmitted to land. To supply the power for the electronic measuring and transmission set, three nickel-cadmium batteries, recharged by solar cells, are incorporated into the buoys.

To handle the highly corrosive salt water, about 115,000 feet of copper-nickel tubing are used in the desalination plant.
