### The Jayton School Board Plans Meeting Thursday

#### This Week In Jayton



The regular monthly meeting of the Jayton school board is scheduled to be held, tonight, Thursday.

Probably number one item on the agenda will be the setting up of the plans for the trustee elections coming up in April. The terms of Garth Gregory and Long will expire. Bill Sartain is serving by appointment, and he will be required to run for the remainder of the unexpired term vacated by Jim Montgomery last year.

Filing date for anyone wishing to be a candidate for any of these three places on the board, is 30 full days before the date of the election, which is March 1.

In a statement mailed to board members in advance of the meeting, Supt. R. N. Pierce, made these comments about school affairs:

The Music Department will host a music festival March 28 at the high school. The following schools will participate, Knox City, Albany, Paducah, Lorraine, Jayton and Roby.

The Jayton High School Stage Band performed on the Abilene Telethon last Saturday night. They did an excellent job and received most favorable publicity.

The carpeting is almost complete. Looks very good. We have cut down on our extra help because of the time saved in maintaining carpet instead of tile floors. Next year we should further reduce this.

### Easter Seal Program Plans Its Fund Drive

Mr. Robert Hall will head the 1972 Easter Seal Appeal in Kent County, it was announced by Rodney D. Hargrave, Dallas, President of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas.

Residents of Kent County will receive the annual Easter Seal Appeal letters in the mail beginning February 28. The Easter Seal Appeal, conducted yearly to provide disabled persons and their families treatment and services, will continue through Easter Sunday, April 2.

Mr. Hall is one of 223 men and women throughout Texas who are serving in this capacity. The cost of the statewide Easter Seal program is over one million dollars, financed mainly by the Easter Seal Society.

Special emphasis is being given in the 1972 Easter Seal Appeal to the disabled citizen or his family in Kent County who may need assistance and not know where to obtain it. Any disabled person can contact Mr. Hall at the Kent County State Bank, Jayton, who will refer the request for services to the Easter Seal Society. A determination of the extent and type of assistance will be made. Arrangements for needed treatment or service will be made by the Easter Seal Society.

### Jayton School Lunchroom Serve 5268 In January

The Jayton school lunchroom had total receipts of \$2,340.06 for the month of January, and expenses, or paid out of \$3,179.95, according to a report made to the board of trustees by Supt. R. N. Pierce today.

Listed as receipts were sale of lunches to adults \$222.00, sale of lunches to children \$1,244.60, and state reimbursement \$873.26.

Listed as expenses were food purchases \$1,380.57, labor \$1,320.27, supplies \$196.80, special milk program \$235.44 and other expenses \$46.87.

An average of 225 students ate in the lunchroom each day, for a total of 4730 meals. An average of 26 adults were served meals daily, with a total of 538 meals served the report stated.

### Sen. Jack Hightower Seeks A New Term

Vernon, Texas, February 8. Now in the mail are formal requests for a place on the ballot for the Democratic primary by Jack Hightower as a candidate for re-election to the State Senate from the 30th Senatorial District.

Sen. Hightower has been an announced candidate for some time, but formal filing with the County Democratic Committee was delayed due to the litigation involving Senatorial district boundaries and the question of filing fees. Some of the legal questions having been resolved it is now known which counties are included in the new 30th Senatorial District.

Sen. Hightower is in his eighth year of service in the Senate. He also served one term in the Texas House of Representatives and was District Attorney of the 46th judicial District seven years prior to his election to the Senate.

A legislative leader, Senator Hightower is Chairman of the Senate Administration Committee and has played a vital role in the improvement of the legislative process in Texas. In addition to his membership on the major Senate committees in the last regular session of the legislature he served as President Pro Tempore of the Senate. On April 3, 1971, while serving as Acting Governor, the people of the 30th Senatorial District honored Senator Hightower and his family at "Governor-for-a-day" events in Austin.

Senator Hightower, 45, is a native of Memphis, Hall County, Texas. He and his wife, the former Colleen Ward of Tulsa, Texas, have three daughters, Ann, 19, a student at Baylor University; Amy, 15, and Alison, 12.

#### WAR THE DEVIL'S FAVORITE PASTIME

In the Revolutionary War 4,044 American men were killed. In the War of 1812, we lost 1877 men. In the Mexican War our loss was 1,721. In the Civil War the North lost 365,000 men and the Southern losses probably exceeded Northern losses. Spanish American War 700 men were killed. In Truman's alleged police activity 60,000 men were killed in Korea or desperately wounded. In John Kennedy's vain attempt to stabilize Indio China we have lost around 50,000 men killed and many thousands wounded. **Notes On Care Of Food In Freezer**

Your food freezer is not a bank, so don't put foods in and expect them to draw interest. Advises Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist at Texas A&M University.  
Foods get no better with age; in fact, they are bound to be some loss in quality. But a food freezer is something like a bank in at least one respect. In both cases, you need records. Listing what is in a package, along with the date you placed it in the freezer is fine but that is not enough.

You also need a written record that shows your deposits and withdrawals says Mrs. Clyatt, speaking in banker's terms. A written record shows what is in the making of the shopping list.  
Use the freezer as often as possible. It is all too easy to "lose" packages of frozen food in the back or bottom of the freezer. Food thrown away because it was stored too long soon makes the food freezer an expensive kitchen item.

# As It Looks From Here

WHAT HAS BEEN LABELED BY SOME as the "monster of the 20th Century," the computer, and its possible effects on the privacy of our citizens has been and still is a concern of many here in the Congress.

This so-called "monster of the 20th Century" has touched most of us directly or indirectly in recent years. It is being used in medical research to an extent which astounds most of us. Research on one of our most dreaded diseases, cancer is being conducted by the computer in both private and Government-funded institutions throughout the United States, including the National Institutes of Health. The results of this type of computer activity could make it possible to identify the causes of cancer and hopefully its eventual cure. The computer has also made it possible for hospitals throughout the Country to better serve the needs of heart attack victims by making it possible to monitor heart rhythms.

The Banking industry, large commercial establishments, the credit card industry and the like have made it possible for many to come "eye to eye" with the computer in our daily lives. Many of these confrontations are frustrating; the most common complaint being that it is just impossible to communicate with a computer when attempting to rectify a computer mistake. Yes, even computers make mistakes, even though it has been fairly well established that its mistakes are, in most cases, caused by humans--the programmers.

Let us look at some of the more sinister activities a computer is also capable of performing, both in public and private applications. It is now being used to predict behavior of our citizens--how they will think, act and even vote. The privacy invading capacity of the computer has long been a concern of Senator Sam Ervin of North Carolina, one of our foremost authorities on Constitutional principles. He is particularly concerned with what happens to all the computerized information gathered and being gathered by Government agencies and for what purposes it is being used.

The computer and its applications are predicted to be America's largest industry by 1980 and even the computer industry itself is beginning to look to the Government to provide an intelligent framework for its anticipated growth. It is felt guidelines must be established to cope with such things as a "Universal Birth Identification Card," similar to the credit card, which would feed into a National Data Bank every human transaction from birth to death. Everything from taking a bus ride or buying a newspaper, under some

plans for a cashless-checkless society, would be a part of the utilization of such a card. The card would be a necessary consideration of every act and would provide for the recording of every human act.

There are thousands of similar techniques now being encouraged and while we must recognize and support the immense benefits to be gained from the wonders of modern science and advance behavior research made possible by the computer, there is also an obligation to see that we do not restrict the freedom of Americans

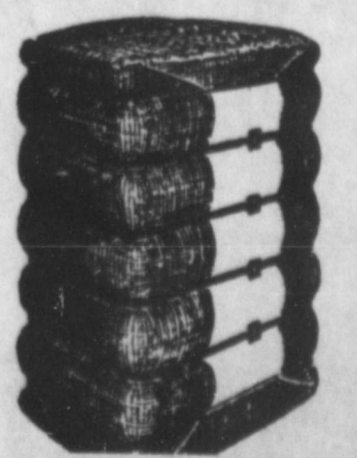

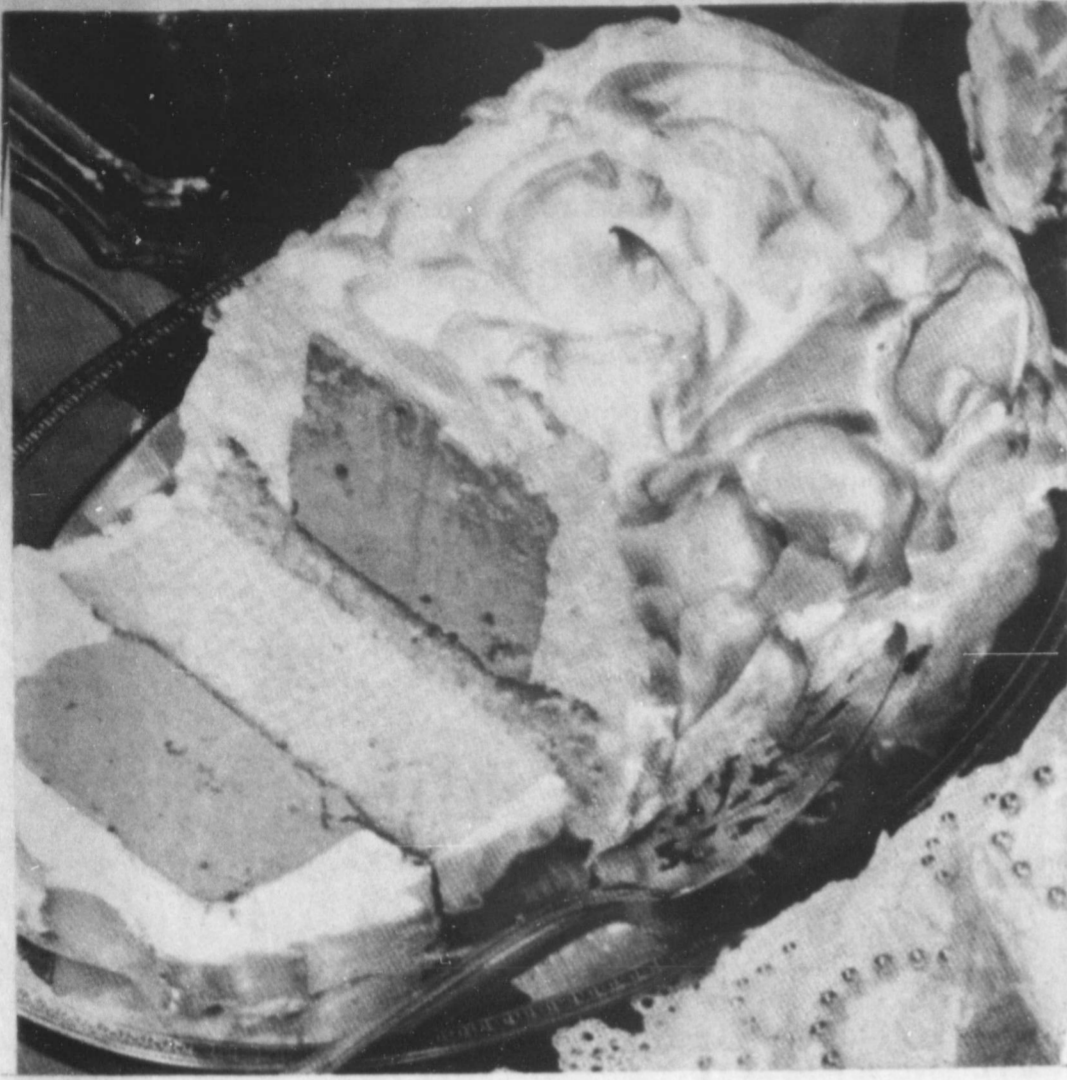

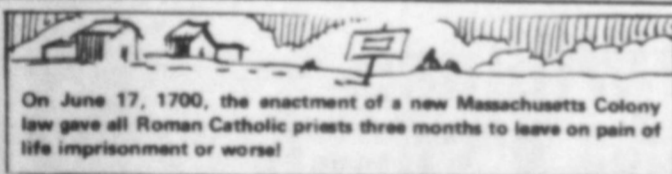

Doting Parents

Ethel, hesitant about marrying Fred, decided to put a blunt question to his mother and father. "I love your son," she said, "but I have doubts about his health. Tell me frankly, is he well?"

They assured her that he was in perfect health. But, as they well knew, Fred was suffering from both tuberculosis and drug addiction. Ethel found out the truth shortly after the marriage, and promptly got an annulment.



But she did not stop there. She followed up with a damage suit against Fred's parents. Grounds: fraud.

At the trial, the parents claimed they could not be expected to make unpleasant disclosures about their own child. Nevertheless, the court held them liable. The judge said their deceit was too deliberate and too important to be excused.

This is an unusual case. But it illustrates that doting parents do not have an unlimited right to favor their child at someone else's expense.

A comparable situation arises when parents are accused not of unfairly pushing a marriage but of unfairly breaking one up. For example:

A mother was sued by her daughter-in-law for alienation of her son's affections. It seems that the mother had waged a relentless campaign against the marriage, not so much because she loved her son as because she hated his wife. The court decided this too was outside the parental privilege and ordered the mother to pay damages.

Of course, the law does give parents a considerable amount of freedom to speak their mind. In another case, a youthful husband who was having marital difficulties went to his father for a man-to-man talk. The father urged him to get a divorce, and he did.

Could the father be held liable by the divorced wife for alienation of affections? A court said he could not, because his interference was within the reasonable limits of a parent's role. As one judge put it:

"Times of stress naturally bring parent and child together for counsel and advice. This, the law does not condemn."

SCABIES REPORTED

Through December 13, 17 cattle scabies outbreaks have been reported, involving Oklahoma, Nebraska, New Mexico and Kansas in addition to Texas. Federal quarantines are not now being issued in the other states because their outbreaks to date have proved to be isolated or traceable to shipments from the quarantined areas.

Actual scabies outbreaks have been discovered in only 7 of the quarantined counties, but State and Federal officials agree on the need to quarantine all counties in the area. The counties under quarantine are: Armstrong, Bailey, Brisco, Carson, Castro, Chandler, Collinsworth, Cottle, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Floyd, Foard, Gray, Hale, Hall, Hemphill, Hansford, Hardeman, Hartley, Hutchinson, Lamb, Lipscomb, Moore, Motley, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher and Wheeler.

Dipping will be conducted under APHS or State Animal Health Agency supervision. APHS or State Inspectors also will certify quarantined area cattle for interstate shipment.

Environmental Quality Control officials will observe dipping operations to guard against pollution of streams or ponds.

APHIS officials urge cattlemen to inspect their cattle for scabies and report any suspicious cases to State or Federal Animal Health Officials or their Extension Agent.
