City Approves Jayton City Sewer System Plan

Week in Jayton



At their February 23 Noon Luncheon in Abilene. The Executive Committee of the West Central Texas Council of Governments approved a preliminary application for construction of wastewater collection and treatment facilities by the City of Jayton.

The system as proposed will consist of collection lines, pump stations, force main and treatment plant. Total cost of the project is estimated at \$254,000. The City intends to sell bonds to be paid from revenue funds in the amount of \$122,000, and request a grant-in-aid in the amount of \$132,000. A grant from the Farmers' Home Administration in the amount of \$77,000 is being requested to assist in the construction of the collection system. Funds in the amount of \$55,000 are being requested from the Texas Water Quality Board, the State agency that administers Public Law 660 funds, for the construction of the treatment plant, lift stations and force main.

The Council of Governments, acting as a regional clearinghouse for a nineteen (19) county State planning region, is required by the Federal Office of Management and Budget, under Circular A-95 guidelines to review and comment on many federally aided projects including water and sewer developmental programs.

The Council and a special regional project review committee which met earlier on February 16, found this project to be consistent with water and sewer development plans for Kent County and afforded it unanimous endorsement.

The thirtieth annual Kent County Livestock Show was held at the 4-H Club barn in Claremont on Friday and Saturday, February 25 and 26. A total of 121 animals was shown by the Kent County 4-H Club members.

Lisa Cravey exhibited both the grand and reserve champion steers, with her heavy weight steers bred by J. H. Daugherty Sr. Other blue ribbon winners were Lisa Cravey in the medium weight class, and Teresa Stewart in the light weight class. Teresa's steer was bred by the Stewart Estate Ranch in the Red Mud Community.

Champion lamb was a Hampshire shown by Mark Edwards. Pattie Edwards showed the reserve. Both lambs came from the Edwards flock. Other blue ribbon winners were Mark Edwards in the Southdown cross class, Patricia Edwards in the fine wool-cross class, and Minette Geeslin in the fine wool class with a wether bred by Edwin Parks of Snyder.

Mark Edwards exhibited the champion market hog, with reserve honors going to Sharon Edwards. Both were Durocs bred by a Slaton hog farm. Sharon also won the medium weight hog class. In the breeding gilt class, Bruce Scott placed first with a gilt bred by the Scott Brothers, Doug, Billy, and Bruce. Their sows were exhibited in last year's 4-H show as gilts.

Horse classes winner was Sharon Edwards. Her 2 year old was named champion, and her yearling was reserve. Showmanship winners were Doug Scott in the swine division, Mark Edwards in the beef division, and Sharon Edwards in the lamb and horse divisions.

Jesse Holloway of Lubbock Christian College was the show judge. He commented on the high quality of all the animals.

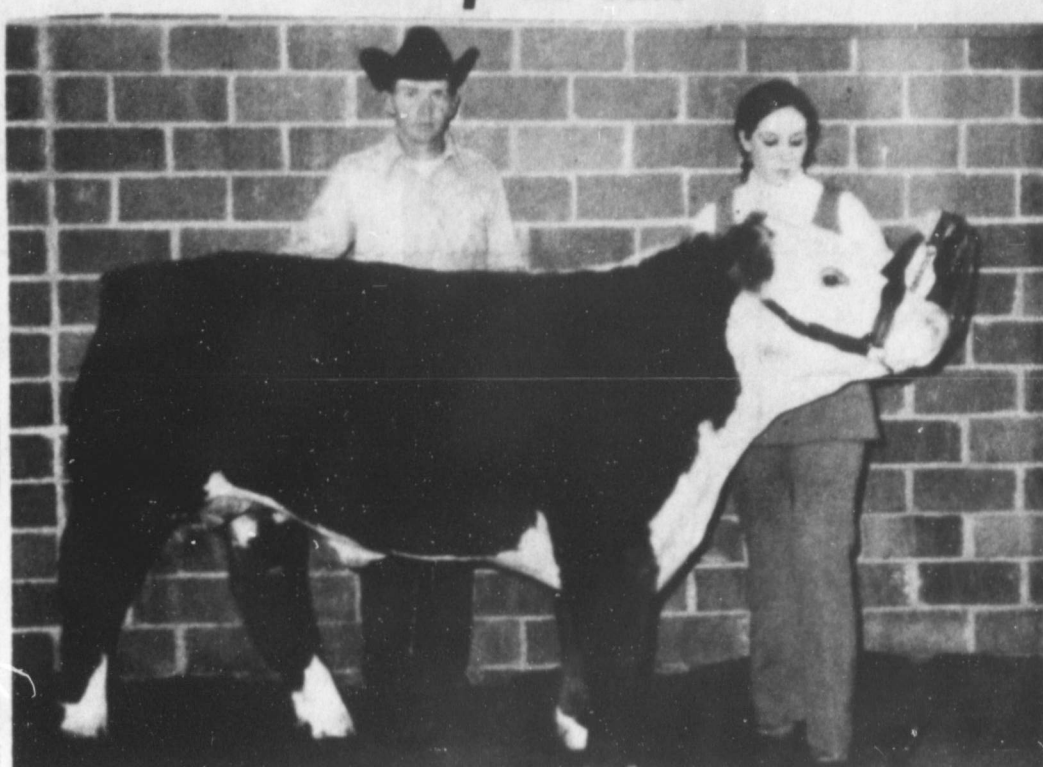

Court Divides On The Purchase of A Loader

A split vote occurred in Kent County Commissioners activities Monday as they opened and examined bids for a loader. West Texas Equipment Co. had submitted a bid of \$14,750, for a Caterpillar. Patton Equipment bid \$13,524, for a Trojan loader and Plains Machinery Co. had low bid of \$12,000, for a Hough brand loader.

Carlos Dickerson offered a motion to buy the Caterpillar and Sarah Byrd seconded his motion. But when the vote was called Hamilton, Carriker and Gallagher opposed the motion and it failed to pass.

Whereupon Carriker moved to buy the Hough loader on low bid and Hamilton seconded. On this motion Carriker and Hamilton favored it, Dickerson and Byrd opposed it with Gallagher breaking the tie with a favorable vote and this order passed.

In other action the court approved the treasurers report ordered current bills paid and considered the library budget. The budget approved by the court called for the spending of \$100 for supplies-\$910 for adult books a total of 130 at \$7.00 each-and 100 children books at \$6.00 each-for a total budget of \$1,610.00.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Doting Parents

Ethel, hesitant about marrying Fred, decided to put a blunt question to his mother and father. "I love you son," she said, "but I have doubts about his health. Tell me frankly, is he well?" They assured her that he was in perfect health. But, as they well knew, Fred was suffering from both tuberculosis and drug addiction. Ethel found out the truth shortly after the marriage, and promptly got an annulment.



But she did not stop there. She followed up with a damage suit against Fred's parents. Grounds: fraud. At the trial, the parents claimed they could not be expected to make unpleasant disclosures about their own child. Nevertheless, the court held them liable. The judge said their deceit was too deliberate and too important to be excused.

This is an unusual case. But it illustrates that doting parents do not have an unlimited right to favor their child at someone else's expense.

A comparable situation arises when parents are accused of not unfairly pushing a marriage but of unfairly breaking one up. For example:

A mother was sued by her daughter-in-law for alienation of her son's affections. It seems that the mother had waged a relentless campaign against the marriage, not so much because she loved her son as because she hated his wife. The court decided this too was outside the parental privilege and ordered the mother to pay damages.

Of course, the law does give parents a considerable amount of freedom to speak their mind. In another case, a youthful husband who was having marital difficulties went to his father for a man-to-man talk. The father urged him to get a divorce, and he did.

Could the father be held liable by the divorced wife for alienation of affections? A court said he could not, because his interference was within the reasonable limits of a parent's role. As one judge put it: "Times of stress naturally bring parent and child together for counsel and advice. This, the law does not condemn."

Root Plowing & Seeding

Kent County Ranchers are in full swing rootplowing and seeding brush infested rangeland.

Kent County ranchers completing their rootplowing and seeding are Weldon Jones, Dr. G. M. Wallace and Manuel Davis. Other area ranchers, who will be rootplowing and seeding are Norman Hahn, Ray Alderman and Charlie Cave, Bill Jones, Bill Paris, and C. C. York.

These ranchers are improving their ranches by ridding themselves of thick brush and replacing it with good grasses such as sideouts

grams, plains bristle grass, and green sprangletop.

Mesquite use approximately 1700 pounds of water to produce one pound of brush. Most grasses use approximately 400 pounds of water to produce one pound of grass. You can see from this comparison that grasses are a much more efficient use of water than brush.

This is magnified even more when you consider the ability of grasses to hold water on the ground where it falls instead of letting it run rapidly into the streams carrying



with its soil.

This water that is held on the land allows the grass to make even more production, than if it flows off our land.

These ranchers who are carrying out these conservation practices will reap many benefits from their work. They are also conserving the nations most vital resources for future generations.

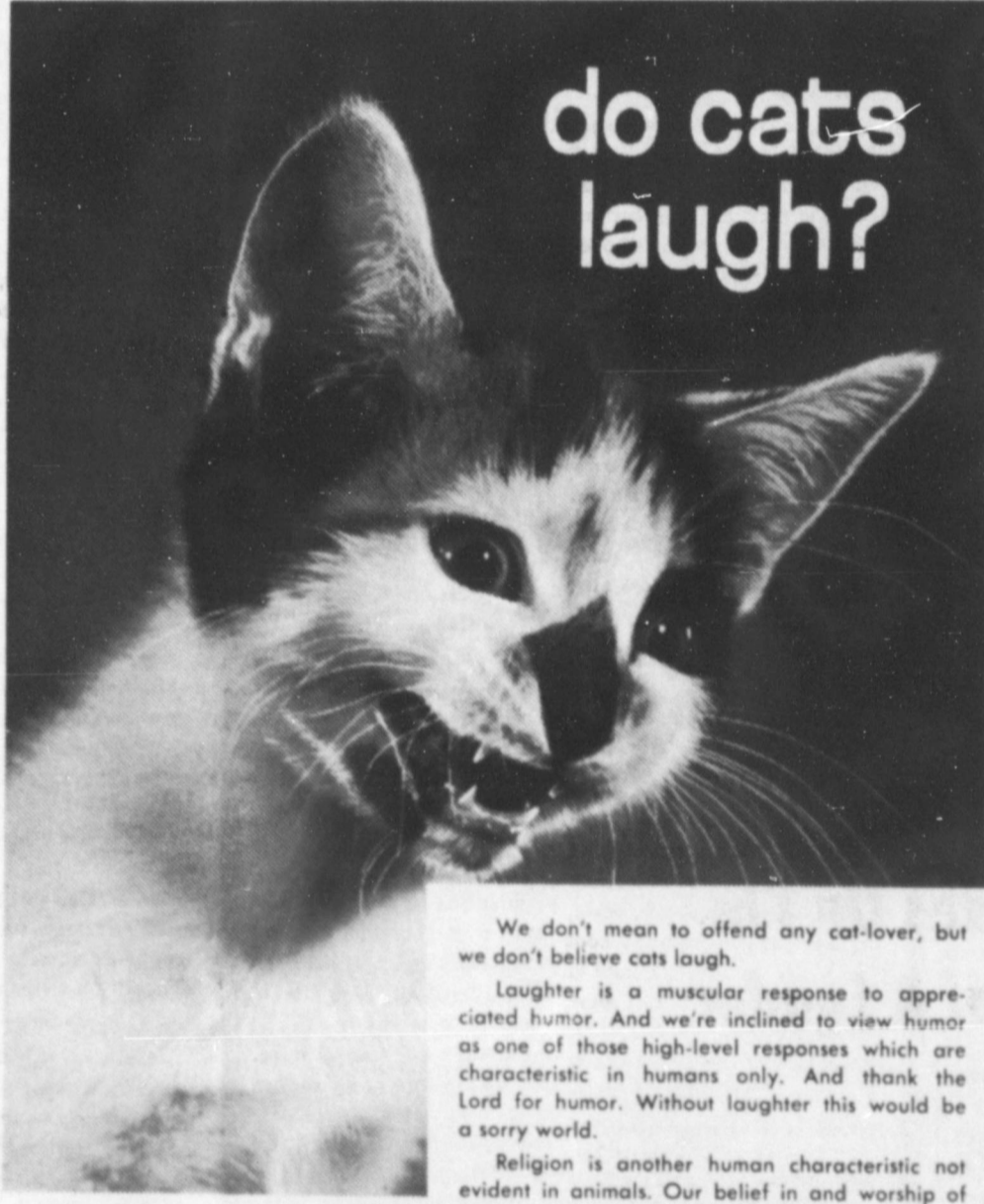

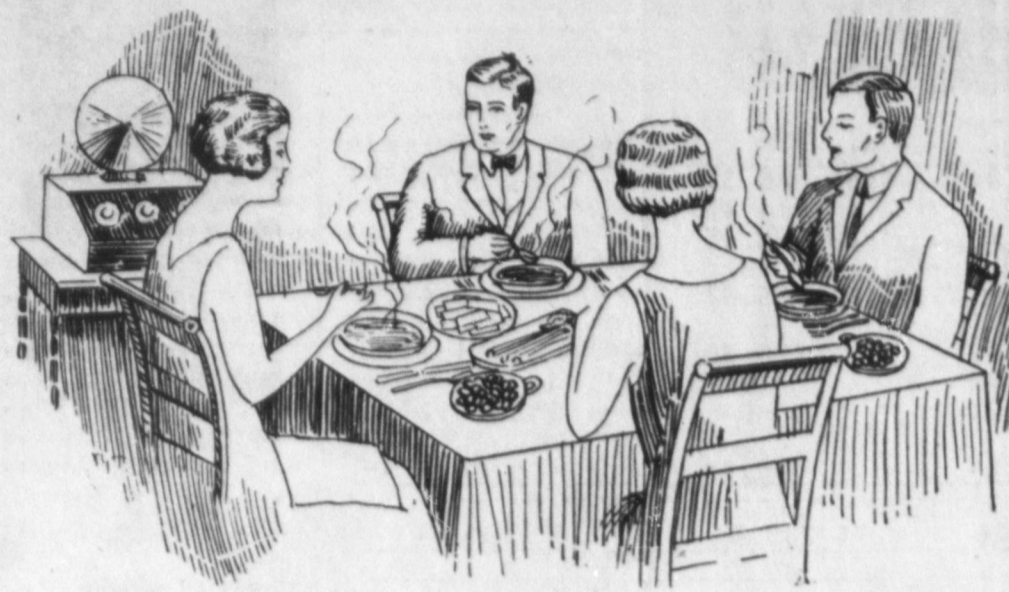

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From The Recipe File Of Opal Richards



Food Like Grandmother Cooked

Many a young wife has been embarrassed or humiliated by having her husband say he wished she could cook like his mother or like Grandmother used to cook. This week's recipes are taken from grandmother's day. You modern housewives see if you want to feed your families dishes from these recipes.

ROAST 'POSSUM WITH SWEET 'TATERS
To roast a 'possum, first catch the 'possum. Dress it and soak in salt water for 12 hours, then wash and parboil it in salt water until tender. Have ready some sliced sweet potatoes which have been boiled, until done, in clear water. Lay 'possum out flat in roasting pan; put slices of sweet potatoes all around it; add pepper and sufficient stock. Bake in a quick oven until a nice brown. Serve on a platter, using potatoes and parsley for garnishing.

NOTE: To dress opossum to 1 gallon of boiling water add 1/2 cup of lime and scald opossum quickly. Pull off half at once, scrape well; cut off feet, tail and remove entrails. Head is left on, remove eyes and ears. Cleanse thoroughly with hot water. Cover opossum with cold water, add 1/2 cup salt or less. Let stand 12 hours. Remove from salted water and pour over hot water almost to cover. Boil until skin is tender. Let stand in broth until time to bake. Bake as above.

TURNIP GREENS WITH HOG JOWL
1 lb. mustard greens
1/2 lb. salt pork or fresh hog jowl or ham hock (less if desired)
water to cover
1 lb. or more young tender turnip tops
Spring onions

Wash and drain mustard greens; pour in pot with meat with barely enough water to cover. Cook until meat is tender. Wash and drain turnip tops; boil in separate pot until tender. Add to meat pot and simmer a few minutes. Drain. Arrange meat over greens. Cut over all, several young spring onions. Serve the pot lidder in cups, if you like. Serve with corn pone. Serves 4 to 6.

BAKED GRITS SHERRY
1 cup uncooked grits
1/2 lb. sharp cheese, grated; or garlic cheese
3 eggs, beaten
3/4 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
Dash Tabasco sauce
2 tablespoons sherry
Cook the grits according to package directions. Keep heated; stir in the cheese; blend thoroughly until cheese melts. Remove from heat and add the egg-milk mixture. Add the sauce and wine. Pour into a greased 1-qt. casserole. Bake at 350 degrees for around 25 minutes, or until mixture is set and browned slightly on top. Serve hot.

MAYFLOWER APPLE PIE WITH CHEESE
This recipe is said to have "come over on the celebrated ship in the year 1620". Rich pie crust for deep dish, tart crust
1 cup sugar
Tart apples to fill dish, about 3 cups
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
Dash cinnamon
1 tablespoon lemon juice

Handful of chopped citron 1/4 lb. butter
Collect and measure ingredients; peel and slice apples very thin, removing cores and seeds—about 3 cups of tart apples. (Eating apples do not make a good pie.) Roll out bottom crust and line in earthen dish neatly. Spread 1/2 cup of the sugar evenly over the bottom. Arrange sliced apples in the dish, piling them as high possible to make a pie rich in filling. Sprinkle remaining 1/2 cup of sugar over the apples, adding the nutmeg dash of cinnamon, lemon juice, and finely chopped citron and butter cut into bits. Roll out top crust, making a slit in opening to allow steam to escape. Wet edges of under crust together. Pie is ruined if juices escape. Place in a hot oven (400 degrees) to brown quickly; cover to turn pan over it; reduce the heat to 300 degrees and cook slowly for an hour. When the pie is baked, its apples will be tender, translucent, and juicy will be like jelly. A shallow glass dish or earthen casserole with a cover can be used if you haven't an earthen dish. Add slice of cheese and allow to melt slightly.

LONGHORN-STYLE CORN PONE
1 cup water-ground meal
1 tablespoon lard
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup milk
Enough water to make soft batter
Mix the ingredients well; bake or fry in pones (small cakes) until light brown. (Bake at 400 degrees for 15 minutes.)

MILLION-DOLLAR SALAD
3 lbs. white grapes, or white canned cherries
2 cans pineapple
1 lb. marshmallows
1/2 lb. blanched almonds
Juice of 2 lemons
4 eggs
1 cup milk
2 cups heavy cream, whipped
Cut and stone grapes or cherries. Cut pineapple, marshmallows and almonds into cubes. Put these ingredients into large porcelain bowl, and pour lemon juice over.
Make a custard of eggs and milk. When cold, add cream, beaten stiff. Add to the fruit, etc. Let mixture stand 24 hours. Serve cold. Serves 14 to 16.
