ABOUT HOME YOUR Use an attractive fence

Pences are a good defense against winds and prying eyes. For the most efficient cooling, keep louvers vertical and not more than eight inches wide. Slant them with your prevailing winds. To act as a wind break, the fence must be solid and tall

enough to offer protection. Decorative holes in the fence do not let in as much air as louvers but they actually boost its force. This may be important if your summer breeze is sluggish.

Horizontal louvers aren't recommended. They either shoot the wind up and over your garden or they force it against the ground and cause a pile-up of air that whips around and does very little

to hide the sights and sounds of your service area. The design of any fence must blend with the house architecturally Often a fence can be constructed to give much needed shade to yard or terrace

area. Build your fence so that both sides are attractive looking You can buy many welldesigned ready-made fences. The fences come in sections and are attached to your posts. This type of fence is
