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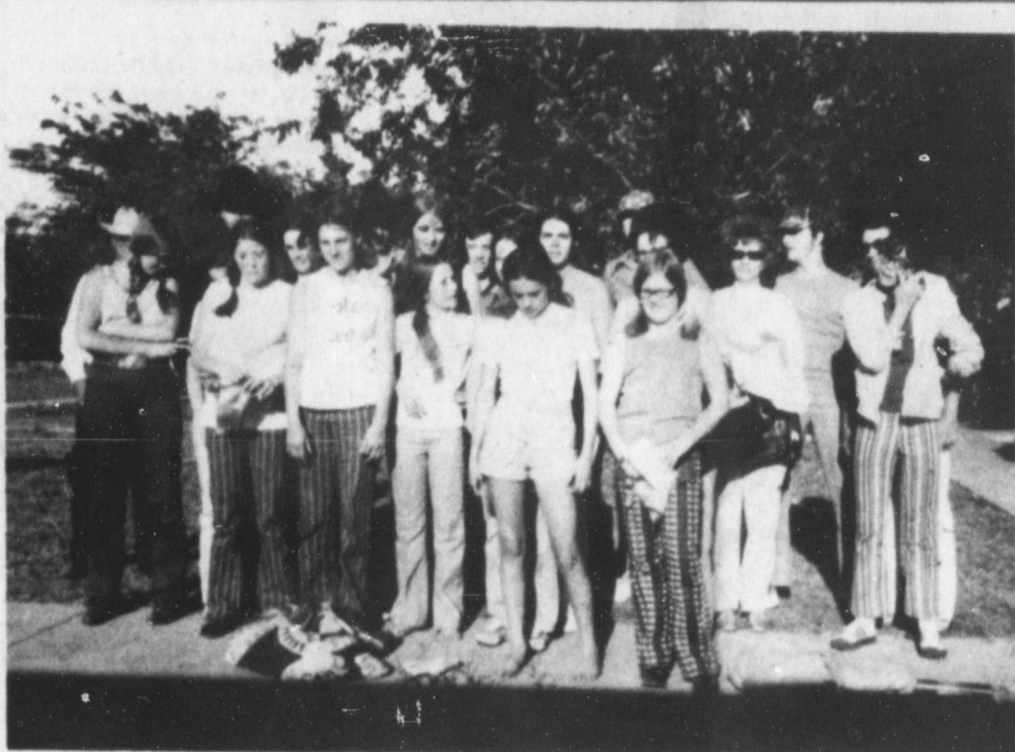

4-H Club Members Attend District Contest Contests In Wichita Falls

Five Kent County 4-H Club members qualified for the State 4-H Club Contests at the District Contests in Wichita Falls, The District Contest at Wichita Falls on Saturday, April 22, included 4-H Club members from 22 counties.

The Field Crops Demonstration Team members were Minette Geeslin and Paula Mayer. Their demonstration described the boll weevil control program in the Kent County area, placed first in the district competition. The Entomology Team members were Chuck Kimmel, David Senn, and Mike Wilson. Their contest consists of two parts: insect identification and a written examination. The team placed second in district.

Seventeen Kent County 4-H members participated in the annual contests. The senior

division includes 4-H members who are 14 and over. The junior division includes members 13 and under. Donna Wright and Rena Bural entered a demonstration in Farm and Ranch Management. Their illustrated discussion on management of 4-H Horse project won a blue ribbon in the district contest, junior division.

Statement Of Bill Parks

TO THE VOTERS OF PRECINCT ONE

Perhaps to begin this formal statement of my candidacy for commissioner of precinct one, Kent County, I should speak of my background before moving to this county ten years ago.

I was raised in Breckenridge, Texas and am forty-four years of age. I attended public school there, and upon graduation I entered the U. S. Navy, serving in the Pacific theater toward the end of World War II. After being discharged from the service, I attended Texas University and Texas Christian University. In 1948 I married my wife, Charlie Nell. We ranched and farmed in Wheeler county, Texas, and Beckham county, Oklahoma until moving to Kent County in October, 1962. Since then, in partnership with my aunt, Mrs. E. E. York, I have operated and managed the ranch where we presently live. We have a daughter, Jamie, who is married to Granville Smith of Jayton. We have a son, Bill, who is a junior in Jayton High School. I have served on the Jayton school board since February, 1964. I am a member of the First United Methodist Church of Jayton.

As to my political philosophy, it is basically very simple. I believe in an honest and unbiased approach in the administration of local government. We, in Kent County, have been blessed with an abundance of money and low taxes due to the production of oil, but if court rulings such as we have had fostered on our schools should be turned on a county basis, we may find ourselves in a very undesirable situation. Also, we are now confronted with a shortage of petroleum products in the United States. This has forced the oil allowable up to 100% and from all we can hear and read it will remain at this constant level. This is going to throw a tremendous strain on the oil reserves of Kent County and naturally cause a much more rapid depletion. What will be the future for Kent County when this oil is gone? That is why I believe we should take a realistic and sound approach in handling the taxpayer's money.

It has been a great experience and enjoyment to me to visit with the people of precinct one during this campaign. I entered this race with a sincere desire to do what little I can to help the people of precinct one and the entire county. Unless we continue to progress and work together, our county can do nothing but go downhill. My family and I consider Kent County our home, and if I can help make it a better place to live, I will feel that I have accomplished what purpose I had for filling for this political office.

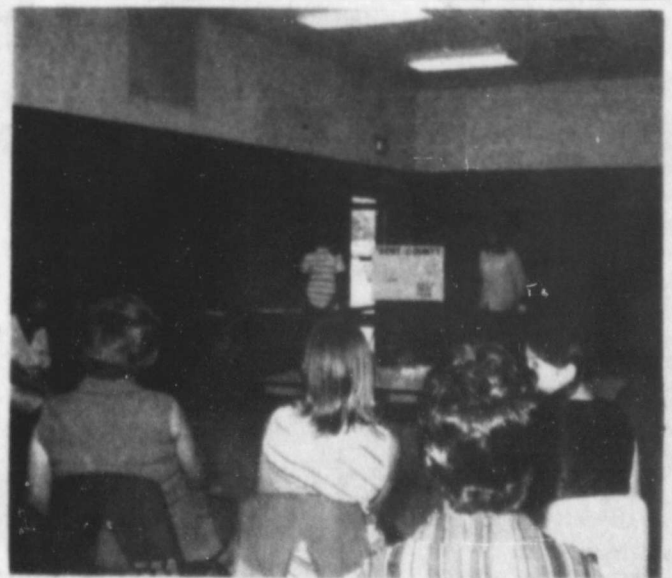

Howard Freemyer has just returned from a 10 day trip to Chicago where he attended a National District Attorney Seminar on Drugs, and related matters.

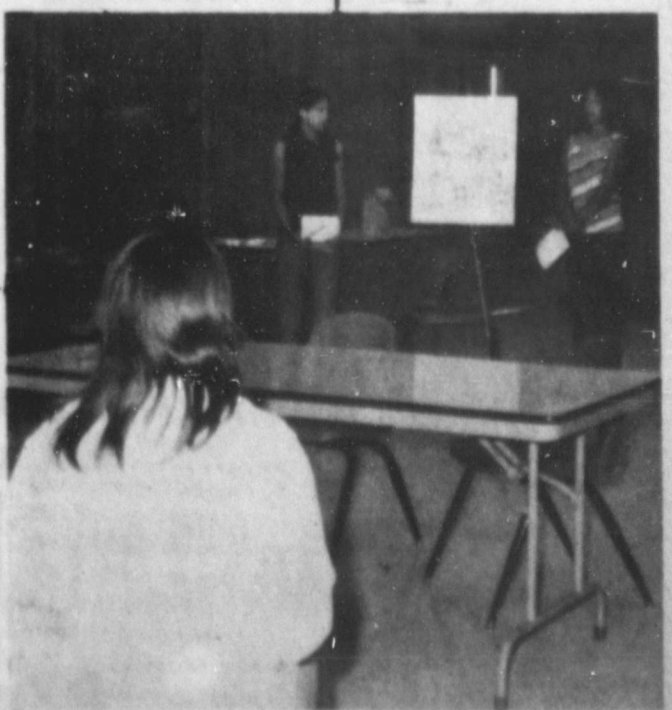
This was a general discussion about drug use, abuse, control, and etc.

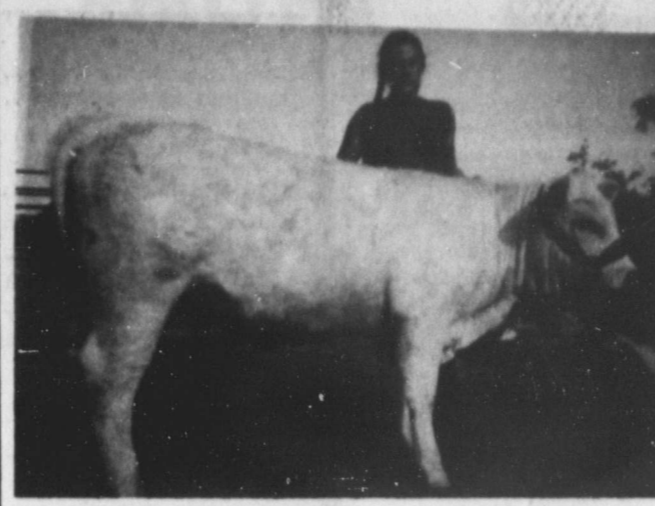

THE FAMILY LAWYER

"Nobody's Child"

Right now, roughly one American baby in 10 is being born out of wedlock. Together, these children form yet another "minority" group in our society--the illegitimates. Do they too have constitutional rights? Does the Constitution guarantee them equal treatment, just as it does to racial and religious minorities? The common law had a scornful name for anyone born to an unwed woman: *filius nullius*--"nobody's child." For centuries, such children labored under severe legal handicaps.



However, a recent decision by the United States Supreme Court has taken a giant step toward equalizing their status.

The case arose when five illegitimate children sought damages for the wrongful death of their mother in a hospital. Under state law, illegitimate children had no right to make this kind of a claim.

But the Court disregarded the state law and ruled that the children's claim must be allowed. The Court said it was unfair to penalize them for a characteristic over which they had no control. In its decision, the Court recalled the anguished protest of an illegitimate son in *King Lear*:

"Why bastard, wherefore base?" Does this ruling mean that from now on, illegitimate children will have exactly the same rights as legitimate children?

Not necessarily. In one case, the question was whether an illegitimate son had the right to be supported by his father. The court said yes, because to rule otherwise would be to "cast the burden upon the innocent child."

But in another case, the question was whether an illegitimate child was automatically entitled to the same inheritance rights as a legitimate child.

This time, the answer was no. The court said that, just as inheritance laws could favor sons over grandsons or first cousins over second cousins, so they could favor legitimate children over illegitimate children.

Discrimination is lawful if it has some reasonable purpose, said the court, and discouraging illegitimacy is a reasonable purpose.

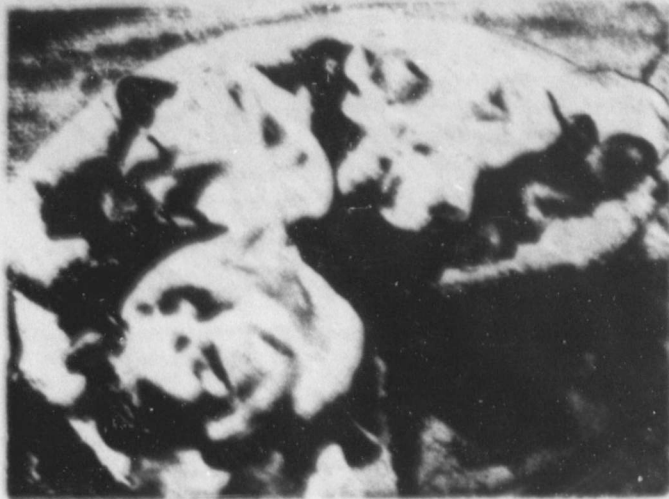

STRAWBERRY CHIFFON PIE

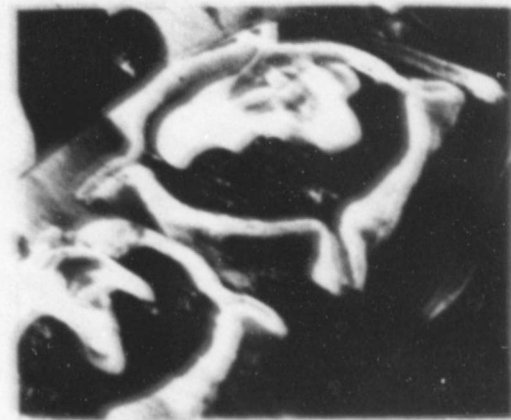
- 1 pint strawberries
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin
- 1/2 cup cold water
- 1/2 cup boiling water
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped
- 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten
- 1 Graham Cracker Pie Shell
- 1/2 recipe Whipped Cream Topping

Wash berries. Save 1/2 cup whole berries for garnishing and crush the remainder, add sugar and let stand 1/2 hour. Soften gelatin in cold water 5 minutes, then dissolve in boiling water. Combine with crushed berries, lemon juice and salt. Cool and when it begins to thicken fold in whipped cream and egg whites. Pour filling into pie shell and chill until firm. Garnish with whipped cream, whole berries. Makes 1 (9-inch) pie.

RED RASPBERRY—Use red raspberries instead of strawberries.

- 2 slightly-beaten egg yolks
 - 2 cups milk
 - 1 3-ounce package vanilla pudding mix (dry)
 - 2 3-ounce packages cream cheese
 - 2 egg whites
 - 1/4 cup sugar
 - 8 baked tart shells, 3 1/2 inches in diameter
- Fresh or canned fruits
- Combine beaten egg yolks and milk. Cook pudding mix according to package directions using the egg yolk mixture as the liquid. Remove from heat. Cut cream cheese into pieces and add to hot pudding; beat till cheese is melted. Let mixture cool about 10 minutes.
- Beat egg whites to soft peaks; gradually add sugar beating to stiff peaks. Fold egg whites into pudding. Spoon into tart shells; chill. Just before serving, spoon sugared fresh strawberries, fresh blueberries, or canned peach halves over tarts. Makes 8 servings.

Wildlife Habitats Can Be Greatly Improved

When H. Johnson, District Conservationist, Cooperation of the Duck Creek Soil and Water Conservation District can improve their land as a wildlife habitat and reap many benefits from it. Most all people just live to see wildlife. Sportsmen like to hunt wildlife. Most people enjoy getting out in the open air on a crisp morning, see the flash of a conveyer of bob white or see the tall-tail flash of a white collared dove as they hurry by cover. The excitement is there.

What does this excitement mean to the local land owner? Whether he is a wildlife watcher or sportsman they are interested in their wildlife population for self enjoyment. If they are interested in making extra income off their land they should be interested in the wildlife on their land.

More people are looking for land now than ever before for the purpose of hunting. How many of these people you can handle on your land depends directly on how much wildlife you have on your land by how you manage your wildlife habitat.

A number of wildlife habitat influencing practices are:

1. Field border planting: these are planting of perennial plants such as hard neck producing prairie, hickory shrubs that are planted in rows, windbreaks, waterways, farm

ABOUT YOUR HOME

Fences are a good defense against winds and prying eyes. For the most efficient cooling, keep louvers vertical and not more than eight inches wide. Slant them with your prevailing winds. To act as a wind break, the fence must be solid and tall enough to offer protection.

Decorative holes in the fence do not let in as much air as louvers but they actually boost its force. This may be important if your summer breeze is sluggish.

Horizontal louvers aren't recommended. They either shoot the wind up and over your garden or they force it against the ground and cause a pile-up of air that whips around and does very little cooling.

Use an attractive fence to hide the sights and sounds of your service area. The design of any fence must blend with the house architecturally.

Often a fence can be constructed to give much needed shade to yard or terrace area. Build your fence so that both sides are attractive looking.

You can buy many well-designed ready-made fences. The fences come in sections and are attached to your posts. This type of fence is made of wood which reflects less heat than masonry.

Walls and fences make a perfect background for planting. Choose shrubs that are evergreen or have an interesting pattern when bare.

Fad Diets Dangerous

The Zen Macrobiotic fad diet that's now popular endangers the health of its followers, according to a Texas foods and nutrition specialist.

Sally Springer of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service said that the concepts of the Macrobiotic diet which originated in Japan constitute a major public health problem and are dangerous.

"Individuals who persist in following the most rigid diets of Zen Macrobiotics stand in great danger of incurring serious nutritional deficiencies and malnutrition," Miss Springer emphasized. "Some incidences of death have resulted from strict adherence to this diet."

The unusual diet proposes 10 ways of eating and drinking through which a person may establish a healthy and happy life. According to its followers, this may only be obtained through a proper balance of Yin and Yang. Certain foods are categorized as Yin,

whereas other foods are known as Yang.

The diet advocates natural foods and is predominately vegetarian. It placed great emphasis on the inclusion of whole grain cereals. In addition, fluids are to be avoided as much as possible.

Especially popular among adolescents, the diet is considered to be a means of creating a spiritual awakening or rebirth. Some persons have undertaken this diet as a form of protest against the establishment which, in their minds is represented by the food industry. The diet is even adhered to as a means of protest against war on man's inhumanity to man.

The proposed dietary plan comprises 10 diets ranging from the lowest level, which includes only 10 per cent cereal, to the highest level, made up of 100 per cent cereals.
