The Jayton Band received a first division rating from all six judges for their superior performance. Members were treated to a steak dinner at Frazier's by the school, in honor of receiving Sweepstakes.

A great deal of work and dedication goes into making a successful band. Mr. Smith is pleased with the hard work put forth by the Jayton Band members. The band had an all day band clinic with Mr. Charles Traylor on April 17, in preparation for the contest. Jayton High School also held a band festival for work on the contest music, in March. Three Class A bands and three Class B bands participated in this festival. Of the three Class B bands, Jayton took the trophy for the best concert. Other event competed in by Jayton were the South Plains Fair Parade and UIL Marching Contest. The band received a first division rating in the marching contest.

Two Jayton students are among the record 1,870 candidates for spring graduation at Texas A&M University announced Registrar Robert A. Lacey.

Lacey said 1,381 students have filed for baccalaureate degrees, 371 for master's and 118 for doctorates.

Saving Bond Sales Down In Kent County

In releasing Treasury figures, County Bond Chairman Bob T. Gallagher announced that sales of United States Bonds in Kent County during March totaled \$1,306. During the first quarter of 1972, sales were \$2,447 for 12 percent of goal achieved.

Texas purchased \$18,288,542 in Savings Bonds during the month compared to March 1971 sales of \$17,180,080, an increase of 6 percent. Quarterly sales totaled \$56,927,138 for 28 percent of the state's goal of \$202,3 Million.

National sales of E and H Bonds amounting to \$582 Million were reported for March, 13.3 percent above 1971 sales of \$513 Million. Sales for the three-month period totaled \$1,640 Million—31 percent of the National goal of \$5,3 Billion.

Dee Dickerson Gets Army Citation In Vietnam

BIEN HOA, VIETNAM (AHTNC) Army Specialist Four Henry D. Dickerson, 25, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carlos D. Dickerson, Girard, recently received the Combat Infantryman Badge in Vietnam.

The badge is a unique and cherished award that is highly coveted by its recipients. The award was originated during World War II to recognize the role of the Infantryman. The badge can be awarded only to a member of an Infantry unit of Brigade, regimental or smaller size unit who has satisfactorily performed in active ground combat against a Hostile Force.

In honor of its singular meaning, the badge is worn above all other awards and decorations, over the left breast. It is a blue rectangle with a silver rifle mounted on it, superimposed over a curved wreath. Subsequent awards are represented by stars at the top center of the wreath.

Spec. Dickerson received the award while assigned as a Mortar Crewman in Company E, 1st Battalion, 7th Cavalry, 3rd Brigade of the 1st Cavalry Division (airmobile) near Bien Hoa.

Consumer Textile Complaints

How should a consumer go about making a complaint concerning textile products? "It's the consumer's responsibility to let his dissatisfaction be known," said Roxanne Schnorr, clothing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M University.

The specialist suggested that you ask yourself a few questions before filing a complaint. Was the imperfection the manufacturer's fault? Were all instructions on fabric care followed? Was the product used for its intended purpose? Was common sense used in caring for the item? Were expectations of the product performance reasonable?

"If you can answer yes to these questions you may have a legitimate complaint," said Miss Schnorr. "Make your dissatisfaction known, but keep cool and curb your emotions".

Begin by returning the product to the local retailer. Be certain the article is clean. The retailer should exchange the product repair it or take it back and return the money. If this first encounter gets no results go to a higher level.

Write the product manufacturer. The name and address should be available on the labels and hangtags that came on the article. Explain the complaint. Tell what's already been done in seeking help locally and give the name and address of the local retailer.

"Make a request for help in your final paragraph", the specialist advised. "Address the letter to Customer Service or the Consumer Relations Department for immediate results. Keep a copy of the letter for future reference."

Miss Schnorr explained that if you don't receive a response within a month let the product manufacturer know that you're taking the complaint to another level. Manufacturers don't

want poor customer relations nor do they like bad publicity. The next step may be the action that gets results.

This third step is writing to a consumer protection agency. Include a copy of the letter sent to the manufacturer. This may involve local and national publicity particularly understandable for the manufacturer. The agencies react upon similar complaints received by numerous persons.

For any kind of consumer complaints, write to Mrs. Virginia Knauer, Special Assistant to the President for Consumer Affairs, The White House Washington, D. C.

The Better Business Bureau handles complaints involving advertising poor trade practices and outright fraud. See the listings in the telephone directory for their address.

Trade associations are also becoming involved in reducing consumer complaints. For textile product complaints write to the American Textile Manufacturer Institute, 1501

Chicken-Almond Casserole

1 8-oz package noodles
2 tbsps. minced onion
1 c. thinly sliced celery
2 tbsps. butter
2 tbsps. flour
1/4 tsp. dry mustard
2 1/2 tsp. salt
1/8 tsp. pepper
2 1/2 c. milk
2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1 c. grated American cheese
2 c. diced cooked chicken
1/4 c. chopped pimento
1/4 c. chopped green pepper
1 c. chopped toasted almonds
1/2 c. buttered bread crumbs
Prepare noodles according to package directions; drain in colander. Sauté onion and celery in butter in saucepan,

stirring constantly, until onion is transparent. Blend in flour, mustard, salt and pepper. Add milk and Worcestershire sauce gradually. Simmer, stirring constantly, until sauce is smooth and thickened. Combine cheese, chicken, pimento, green pepper, 1/2 cup almonds and noodles with sauce; blend well. Pour mixture into shallow baking dish; sprinkle with crumbs and remaining almonds. Bake at 400 degrees for 20 minutes or until heated through and lightly browned. Yield: 8-10 servings.

As It Looks From Here

SPRING COMES A BIT LATER in this area than it does there at home. During the whole place has put on new clothes. The leaves are not all out but they show up almost overnight. Flowers and blooming trees are everywhere.

It suggests that our generation has inherited a very beautiful world. We have also inherited oceans and streams filled with fish and tidal waters have teemed with lobsters, crabs, oysters and clams. Unfortunately, some of these things are greatly diminished simply because we have not taken care of them.

Prom near Washington on a clear day the Blue Ridge Mountains loom in the background and the hills seem to command man's tenderest

care. But the uglifiers have their way -- there in a mountain run a rum p-sprung easy chair, its rusty coils appearing almost obscene, and spring asters and jonquills grow up amid a bed of beer cans.

Not long ago a visitor to Athens stood on a street corner uneasily contemplating what to do with his after-breakfast cigarette, which had now burned down to the filter.

The busy sidewalk was immaculate. According to his description, the gutters looked as if they had just been combed and brushed. He said that every place he traveled in Greece he had seen the same tidiness. Finally the tourist pinches out the cigarette on his shoe, dropped the butt in his camera bag and soon returned to America remembering with admiration the cleanliness of Greece.

The Creeks are not alone in keeping things orderly. It appears in Finland, Sweden and Denmark. The small towns of Switzerland and Holland make us ashamed of our own outdoor clutter.

This same American told the story of Vice Premier Pattakos who once had his limousine pause in traffic behind a taxi occupied by a British lady. She tossed an empty cigarette package out the window. The Vice Premier asked the taxi to stop and personally escorted the lady

back to the cigarette package lying in the street. Picking it up he handed it to her. "But I don't want it," she protested. "Neither do we," said Pattakos.

Everyone has seen our highway employees trying to keep the rights-of-way free of rubbish of one sort or another. They do the best they can but have a hard time keeping up. Our affluent society, like some beast, slouches across the land and leaves its ugly spore behind: beer cans, milk cartons, paper cups, brown bags, paper -- plain junk.

Some have speculated on the melancholy tale that one day in some ultimate madness, man will blow this earth to smithereens and leave a dead planet hurtling through space. Thousands of years will pass before new archeologists will appear on the scene from a different galaxy to shift the ashes of the world that was. In it they will find the ruins of great highways, tall buildings and evidence of all the things which now and in the future have existed.

They will be able to determine the cycle of the seasons and to know that a short time

before this season of the year a lot of ugliness was buried beneath the snows. They will also determine the beauties of springtime and the abuses that

man has heaped on. In their search they will read into the legend of these objects --

The showers have started this last week.

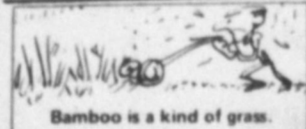
