APPROVES OIL IMPORTS
President Nixon has approved a 15 per cent increase in oil imports for the remainder of 1972 to offset insufficient U.S. production.

WAGES UP
The Labor Department has reported that wages across the country, both union and nonunion, have risen 3 per cent in the four months since the wage-price freeze ended.

Draft Notice

The July Draft Call has been announced by Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas. Men in the 1972 First Priority Selection Group with lottery number 50 or lower will be issued induction orders with reporting dates in July. This Priority Selection Group is made up of men born in calendar year 1952 and of men who lose a deferment during calendar year 1972.

During April and May, induction orders went up to lottery number 015; during June to 035; and now for July to 050.

Men with lottery numbers of 90 or lower will be ordered for pre-induction physical examinations during July if they have not yet been examined. Their physical examinations are administered to men in the 1972 First Priority Selection Group, also.

Thirty days notice will be given on all induction orders. There is no quota for Texas; however, Colonel Glantz said he expects 400 men to be inducted in Texas. Mrs. Lucille Wade, Chairman of Local Board No. 80 said there are no induction orders issued by her local board. There will be 10 men issued orders for pre-induction physical examination.

with about 55% of the votes. But Briscoe received 93% in his home town.

Everyone has his own trade, or line of endeavor, and some people are experts in their field, when they would not stand so tall any place else.

We visited in the home of a long-time friend, who is one of these kind of people. A small man, with a strong voice, probably good enough to be a TV announcer, Kelly Prichard readily admitted that he was probably the best in his line of business. He works for a firm that sells supplies of steamships, and other who ply the high seas, particularly the Texas Gulf. I enjoyed listening to him talk "shop."

"A steamship is like a City" he said, "Everything the people of a city need, they will need aboard a ship, groceries, hardware, novelties, entertainment and what have you."

"The purchaser for the ship and I take his list, and we turn the town upside down to get all the items he needs. Neither he or I are concerned with the price. Our superior have already worked this out."

"You may think this is a snap," he continued. "But not always so."

"We supply ships from all over the world. And some-

times this within itself is a problem," he said with a grin.

"For instance," he continued, "Not long ago a ship from the middle east came in, and they ordered a large quantity of Mohammed killed goat meat. You know these people have religious scruples against eating beef, or in other words the sacred cow. So they order goat meat or chickens, and on top of this it must be killed a certain way to meet the religious superstitions of these people. I know how it is done, and can take care of this chore for them. Sometimes the priest goes with me, and I must follow his directions." Refreshment table was in white linen cloth, with floral

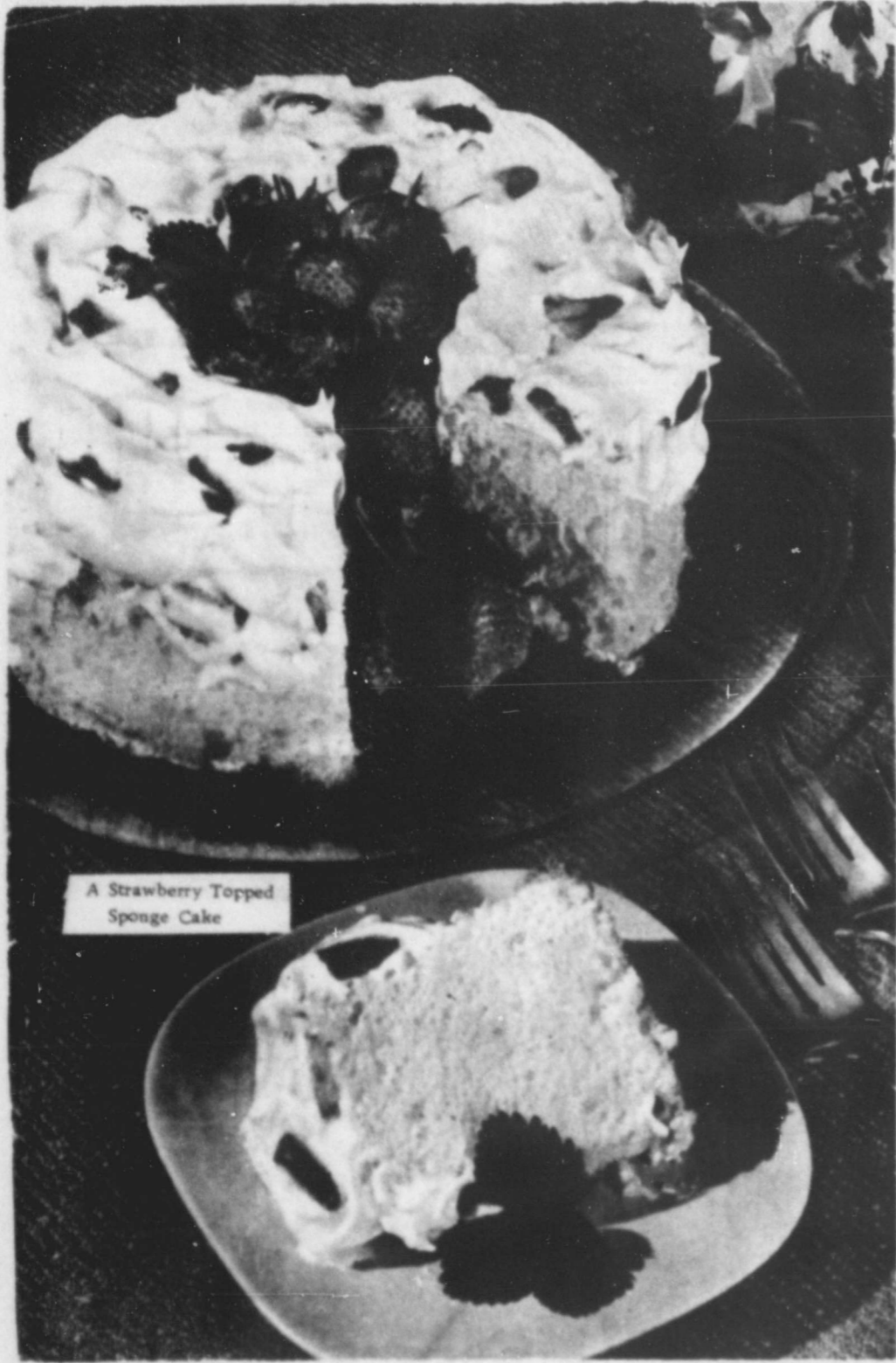
arrangement of pink roses and honey suckle. Punch was served from crystal bowl and white cake squares were served to guests.

A Strawberry Topped Sponge Cake

6 egg yolks
 1/2 cup cold water
 1 1/2 cups sugar
 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 1/2 teaspoon orange or lemon extract

Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon-colored; add water and continue beating until very thick. Gradually beat in sugar, then extracts. Fold in flour sifted with salt, a little at a time. Beat egg whites until foamy; add cream of tartar and beat until they form moist, glossy peaks. Fold into egg-yolk mixture. Bake in 10-inch ungreased angel-cake pan in slow oven (325°) 1 hour. Invert pan to cool. Ice with whipped topping and fill center with strawberries.

1 1/2 cups cake flour
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 6 egg whites
 3/4 teaspoon cream of tartar

FEATHER SPONGE CAKE

1 cup cake flour
 3/4 cup sugar
 1 3/4 cups egg whites
 3/4 teaspoon salt
 1 1/2 teaspoons cream of tartar
 3/4 cup sugar
 1 teaspoon vanilla

Sift flour with 3/4 cup sugar four times. Beat egg whites with salt until frothy; add cream of tartar and beat until stiff but not dry. Add remaining 3/4 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, folding in thoroughly. Add vanilla with last addition of sugar. Sift flour mixture over top, a little at a time, and fold in lightly with a down-up-over motion. Bake in 10-inch ungreased angel-cake pan in moderate oven (325°) 75 minutes. Invert pan to cool.

Variations of Angel Cake

Angel Custard Dessert: Make custard of 6 egg yolks, 3/4 cup sugar, 3/4 cup lemon juice, and 1 1/2 teaspoons grated lemon peel. Remove from heat; add 1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin softened in 1/4 cup cold water. Fold in 6 stiff-beaten egg whites beaten with 3/4 cup sugar. Tear angel cake in small pieces. Place in oiled angel-cake pan. Pour over custard; chill until firm. Unmold; fill center with whipped cream. Serves 8.

Chocolate Angel Cake: Substitute 3/4 cup cake flour and 5 tablespoons cocoa for 1 cup cake flour. Sift cocoa with flour and sugar four times.

Holiday Angel Cake: Fold in 1/2 cup finely chopped, drained, maraschino cherries just before baking. Frost with Seven-Minute Frosting (page 20).

Layered Angel Cake: Cut angel cake crosswise in two layers. Fold toasted almonds into flavored whipped cream for filling. Frost with whipped cream and sprinkle generously with toasted, shredded almonds. Serve at once.

Sunshine Angel Dessert: Top pieces of angel cake with Pineapple-Marshmallow Filling.
