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Are You A Wise Shopper For Food?

When unloading the grocery bag, do you make a mental note of how long the hamburger will safely keep or how many days before the bread will become stale?

Rutgers University has examined all major retail food categories and has made recommendations on the length of time products retain their quality and the types of date labeling that assure the consumer of good quality food.

From one shopping trip to the next, groceries are exposed to varying sanitary conditions and temperatures before being purchased. Even the techniques used in processing and packing food items can affect their preservation.

Potato chips become stale and rancid within a week in one type of wrapper yet will still be fresh four weeks later in another type, the agent noted.

The Rutgers study recommends that ground beef packages show the date and time of wrapping. The meat should be sold within 24 hours of wrapping and should bear a label that advise consumers to either cook or freeze the within 24 hours of purchase.

## As It Looks From Here

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO, WHEN THEN Chairman of the House Administration Committee of the Congress, I inaugurated a study of how paper work in government could be reduced.

THEN, AND NOW, PAPER WORK, much of it absolutely essential, threatens to bury us, choke business and slow the processes of getting a job done.

EVERY GOVERNMENTAL AGENCY issues forms to carry out regulations it has established. It was found during the investigation that more than 30,000 forms throughout the Federal Government were issued each day. Heads of departments and agencies were brought before the Subcommittee on House Administration and queried about the necessity of issuing so many forms to be filled out by individuals and businesses. In most instances an attempt was made to justify all their paper work but much of it was unconvincing.

REGULATIONS, WHICH DEMAND SO MUCH paper work and so many copies, are reducing the freedom of the individual citizen. The tremendous cost of filling out forms and reports by business is costly and in the end must be paid for by the taxpayer.

PRESENTLY A SUBCOMMITTEE OF THE U. S. Senate is studying the same thing and has come up with an estimate that all the paper work of Federal, State and local Governments is costing the taxpayers, individuals and businessmen, \$36 billion a year. WITH THE RISE OF THE MANY new programs inaugurated by the Congress in recent years, such as the various

consumer programs, environmental protection, health and welfare, occupational safety, not to mention income tax forms, paper work has increased many times over. Each agency issues its regulations with all sorts of forms and reports for compliance. Some businesses have to employ people to do nothing but fill out papers. For example, just a few years ago, plans for airport construction were presented to the government with four or five copies. Today a minimum of 45 copies of plans are required. Overlapping agencies must all be provided with a certain number of copies to determine if their regulations are met. Washington is bulging at the seams with stored paper.

THE STUDY OF GOVERNMENT PAPER WORK reveals that this flood of required reports and applicants figures out to ten forms for every man, woman and child in the Nation. In some instances, people have simply gone out of business by not being able to comply. One report shows that a small businessman intended to hire a college student to help him with his paper work. In fact, he hired 3 part-time students but when he found out it took a bundle of paper work to just hire the students, he decided to do the work himself rather than to employ the students.

THE OWNERS OF A SMALL HOSPITAL, who serve their community well, found they had to report to 23 separate agencies of government. They say they are simply unable to meet such a task and are threatening to close down. CERTAINLY PROPER AND NECESSARY information must be had to protect the govern-

ment's interest, which means the taxpayer's interest, but a vast amount of it is nonproductive, contributed to the cost, and slows performance. Indications are, however, that this flood of paper work will continue to increase.

IT ALL ADDS UP TO THE CONCLUSION that there is simply too much government. Unfortunately, much of it is demanded by all of us and we are getting it. It visibly demonstrates the increased regimentation of our people and proliferation of government bureaus and agencies.

THE STUDY FIFTEEN YEARS AGO, referred to in the beginning, identified the problem and may have had some temporary effect but it really found no way to place restraint on unnecessary paper work on the myriad of agencies and bureaus cranking out all their forms. A report on the study is somewhere in the storage bins here in Washington. It is hoped the Senate study now going on may have better results.

# A Study Of Obesity

The inability to achieve satisfaction from eating may be one of the major factors differentiating the obese from the normal weight individual.

According to a study that measured the attitudes to food of obese and thin persons, it was found that obese individuals see food pictures as more appealing than thin people, and that the obese will consume more food before refusing to eat.

Researchers commented that the obese individual has possibly developed a way for dealing with his excessive food intake. He may attempt to eat only at certain times or select very appealing foods. During the experiment,

both obese and normal weight individuals were asked to drink the same amount of beverage and then view slides of food.

They were asked to rate the pictures as either pleasant or unpleasant and appealing or disgusting. After viewing four slides, they were again asked to drink the beverage and view more slides.

This information was provided by Foods and Nutrition Specialist Karen Kreipke.

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From The Recipe File of Opal Richards



BRIDE'S CAKE

2/3 cup shortening  
2 cups sugar  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
3 cups cake flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
4 teaspoons baking powder  
1 cup milk

6 stiff-beaten egg whites  
1/2 cup chopped blanched almonds  
1/4 cup chopped citron  
1/4 cup chopped candied cherries

Thoroughly cream shortening and sugar; add vanilla. Add flour sifted with salt and baking powder alternately with milk. Fold in egg whites, then nuts and fruits. Bake in 2 waxed-paper-lined 10-inch layer cake pans in moderate oven (350°) 30 minutes. Frost with Double-Cooked Frosting (page 20). For very large 3-tiered cake increase recipe one-half.

GROOM'S CAKE

1 cup shortening  
1 cup sugar  
5 eggs  
2 cups flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/4 cup unsweetened pineapple juice  
1/4 pound citron, finely cut  
1/4 pound each orange peel and lemon peel, finely cut

1/2 cup chopped candied cherries  
1 1/4 cups chopped pineapple  
1/2 cup chopped dates  
1/2 cup chopped dried apricots  
1/2 cup chopped figs  
1/2 pound white raisins  
2 1/4-pound cans moist, shredded coconut  
2 cups sliced, blanched almonds

Thoroughly cream shortening and sugar; add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Reserve 1/2 cup flour for fruits; add remaining flour sifted with salt and baking powder alternately with pineapple juice. Add floured fruits, coconut, and nuts; stir only until well blended. Pour into waxed-paper-lined 3 1/2 x 7 1/2-inch loaf pans. Bake in slow oven (275°) 1 1/2 hours. Decorate with candied pineapple, almonds, cherries, or citron. Continue baking 1 hour. This may be made in graduated sizes of layer pans for a Groom's Cake. Makes about 8 pounds of cake.

### Rural Housing Expanded

Many additional families in Texas are now eligible for rural housing loans from the Farmers Home Administration, FHA State Director J. Lynn Futch announced this week.

"In families where both husband and wife are employed," Futch explained, "the new policy permits half of the wife's gross income to be excluded in determining whether the total family income is within the maximum limit for loan eligibility."

For example, the husband is the principal source of income with \$6,000. His wife earns \$4,000. His entire income, plus half of his wife's or \$2,000, total \$8,000. This is within Texas' moderate income level of \$8,000 so the family may be eligible for a Farmers Home Administration loan.

James V. Smith, National Administrator of Farmers Home Administration emphasized that newly-eligible families must demonstrate that they otherwise merit FHA financing, and that credit is not available from regular commercial sources.

"The new policy will assist families in which the wife's income is needed to improve the standard of living. Note that if the wife is the principal breadwinner, the rule does not apply. This change will in no way affect our expanding service to low-income families," Mr. Smith said.

Loans may be made to families that will buy or build home in open country or towns up to the 10,000 population, and who are not able to secure credit from regular commercial sources. Complete information is available from the agency's 143 county offices located in county seat towns throughout Texas.
