The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six month of 1972 shows a total of three accidents resulting in no persons killed, and no persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Department of Public Safety Region 5 for June, 1972 shows a total of 527 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 347 persons injured as compared to June, 1971 with 524 accidents resulting in 10 persons killed and 308 persons injured.



They are told that it comes from the burning of old worn out, bills, Actually, old currency is burned at each of the 12 Federal Reserve Banks and not returned to its source of printing for destruction as it usually is supposed.

SINCE THE COUNTRY HAS become so environmentally conscious, other methods of doing away with unusable paper money are being investigated.

FEDERAL RESERVE BANKS are now beginning to grind up cash since the cities where they are located have antiburning laws and, where en-

Distribution of Grazing

stockman in the Duck Creek Soiland Water Conservation District that cattle, graze the most convenient areas, or the type areas they prefer in a pasture. These areas are usually close to water, feed grounds, salt areas, loafing areas or areas of easy access. Livestock could be called "lazy" in that they go no further from these areas then they need to in order to graze.

These grazing habits present a grazing management problem to the rancher. Livestock will overgraze these selected areas and possibly never graze other

of this one single fact, the rancher with this problem does not get full production from his rangeland.

There are a number of ways that this problem can be solved, depending on what has caused the problem in the individual pasture.

One major cause is the location of watering facilities. Some ranchers depend upon creeks, rivers, or a few ponds in large pastures for their supply of livestock water. This causes a concontration of grazing on probably the most productive land he has, and possibly no use at all a distance away from the supply.

lure his livestock to the ungrazed areas by placing his salt and minerals, and supplemental feed in the ungrazed areas. This has been used to great advantage on a number of ranchers in the area with good results.

In our area, we have some rough land mixed in with good deep soll in a large percentage of our pastures. Even though the pastures have water distributed well, and we spread our salt and supplemental feed out correctly, we still have a grazing distribution problem on some areas.

Over the past few years, a system of grazing has been a great success where ranchers developed that will eliminate this problem. The high intensity - low frequency

rotation deferred grazing system has been a great success where ranchers have adopted its use. In this system the cattle normally grazing six or more pastures **************

are put into one pusture and rotat d to the next pasture approximately every 30 days. This concentration of cattle normally grazing six or more pastures are put 1 ito on. reduces spot grazing to a minimum and the 10 months of rest each year in each year in each pasture has shown rapid improvement ir range condition and total

grass production. In these systems we stock

at a heavier stocking rate for a shor period of time when they are grazed. This causes the livestock to go places to grazes they normally wouldn't because of the competition for grazing among themselves. They also will eat grasses not usually grazed, giving the



That ended their friendship In short order, Eddie sued the grocer for damages on grounds of assault and battery. But a court turned him down, saying his claim was barred by the doctrine of "assumption or risk."

This doctrine has wide application in all kinds of playful and recreational activities.

"One who takes part in a sport," said one court, "accepts the dangers that are obvious and necessary, just as a fencer accepts the risk of a thrust by his



Most often, the doctrine has been applied in golf. Thus: A golfer shanked an iron shot, and his ball struck another player standing far to the right. Ad-

mittedly, he had not yelled 'Fore!" before taking his swing. Nevertheless, he could not fairly have foreseen danger to anyon so far out of range.

Result: a court ruled that the victim should not collect damages. The court said this was the kind of risk he had assumed by going onto a golf course in the

But the doctrine does not apply to risks that are not "natural" to the sport-that are due instead of somebody's miscon-

In another case two fishermen were sitting in a rowboat when one, trying to make a backward cast, hooked his companion in the cheek. Sued later for dam ages, he sought refuge in the doctrine of assumption of risk. "Accidents," he said, "will

But the court said accidents like this will not happen if fishermen are reasonably careful with their hooks. The victim had court, that was preventable by plain common sense.
