Government Employs 17 Percent Of Kent **County Workers**

Average family income was\$5,658 in Kent County, Texas in 1969, compared with \$8,490 for the State, according to a report on the 1970 census by the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce. Per capita income for the county amounted to \$2076, the report shows.

The 1970 census counted 1,611 residents in the county, 1.6 percent were foreign born with 2, 4 percent native born with one or both parents of foreign birth.

Among the county's 1,528 nhabitants age 5 and over in 1970, 267 were living in a different county within the State in 1965, and 7 in a different State.

In the population age 16 and over, 80.0 percent of the men and 26.3 percent of the women were in the labor

force. Among the employed, 23.0 percent were holding white collar jobs, and 17.0 percent were government workers.

About 29,4 percent of the married women with husband present were in the labor force.

There were 394 persons 3 to 34 years old enrolled in school. In the 25-and-older population, 40.1 percent of the men and 40,6 percent of the women were high school

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 10 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 68)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 1. The Legislature." 'Section 1. The Legislature, at any regular session, or at any special session when the matter is included within the purposes for which the session is convened, may propose amendments revising the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for statewide offices and propositions, as defined in the Constitution and fined in the Constitution and statutes of this State. The date of the elections shall be specified by the Legislature. The proposal for submission must be approved by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, entered by yeas and nays on the journals.

"A brief explanatory state-ment of the nature of a prowith the date of the election and the wording of the pro-position as it is to appear on the ballot, shall be published twice in each newspaper in the State which meets requirements set by the Legislature for the publication of official notices of officers and departments of the state government. ments of the state government. The explanatory statement shall be prepared by the Secretary of State and shall be approved by the Attorney General. The Secretary of State shall send a full and complete

courthouse at least 30 days prior to the election on said amendment. The first notice shall be published not more than 60 days nor less than 50 days before the date of the election, and the second notice shall be published on the same day in the succeeding week. The Legislature shall fix the standards for the rate of charge for the publication, which may not be higher than the news-paper's published national rate for advertising per column

advertising per column "The election shall be held in accordance with procedures prescribed by the Legislature, and the returning officer in each county shall make returns to the Secretary of State of the number of legal votes cast at the election for and against each amendment. If it appears from the returns that a majority of the votes cast have been cast in favor of an amendment, it shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation thereof shall be made by the






