Hunter Safety Program

The safe hunter knows how to handle firearms. And he probably learned the fundamentals of safe gun handling in a course taught by experts. The foremost hunter safety training program in the United States today was developed by the National Rifle Association of America.

ing the trained junior hunter is 19 times more safe than the untrained youngster. New York realized a 50% decrease in accidents, and New Hampshire had equally good results. Game officials in these states credit the training program as one reason for these encouraging statistics.

There are two types of state hunter safety programs -- voluntary and mandatory. In the mandatory states, all new hunters must complete the course before they can obtain a hunting license. Today, one in every four of the country's 20 million hunters has completed the course. Remington Arms encourages all new hunters to take courses of this kind whether or not state laws require them.

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Japan Rearms

Premier Kakuei Tanaka, newly elected Japanese Premier, has approved major rearmament for Japan. Under the program, yet to be accepted by the Diet, defense spending will be doubled in the next five years.

The Japanese will begin building jet fighters, the Navy will get 54 new ships, including two helicopter carriers, the Army will acquire 450 tanks and armored personnel carriers, plus 154 helicopters, etc.

Though this is the fourth defense plan adopted by Japan since the war, it is the first in which she will acquire so many new modern weapons and begin home construction of sophisticated military hardware. It clearly marks the turning point from a largely disarmed post-war Japan toward a rearmed one.

The Japanese Government today, of course, is no threat to peace in Asia, nor is it likely to be in the immediate future. Rearmament was inevitable for the Japanese, a proud, talented race. Nevertheless, the new turn means that in a few years Japan will be rearmed, with military power comes increased political power.

The economic strength of Japan today is unsurpassed and growing. The nation can well afford a large and modern defense establishment. When that establishment is a reality, the key question for the Japanese will be how much influence traditional military circles exert in the government; the answer to that question may determine the fate of much of Asia in future decades, as it did in 1941.

Kings & Queens

The twentieth century has been a bad one for kings and queens. They have disappeared from their thrones in most of the countries of Europe, though Spain is about to restore the monarchy and monarchies still survive in England, the Scandinavian countries, Holland and Belgium and a few others.

The First World War doomed many monarchies including Germany's and the Second finished off monarchies in Italy and the Balkan countries. The Spanish monarchy died in the early thirties, and a democratic government was established there in 1932. Thus more and more people in the modern age realize that monarchies are an anachronism, no longer practical, democratic or desirable.

Queen Elizabeth in England was recently beset by chanting university students in Scotland shouting obscenities and "Down With The Queen!" and in Denmark and Norway there has been outspoken sentiment to abolish the royal family's special position and privileges.

Most objections are to costs of maintaining royal families, and to the classism concept, which so bulwarks snobbery and social privilege. But sovereigns perform valuable functions also; they act as a unifying influence in many cases, and set a standard of behavior, dress and decorum which many find beneficial.

It has been pointed out, for example, that youngsters in the United States often look to movie stars, extremists, sports stars or even to odd balls, for the lack of a central, unifying symbol, such as a sovereign. That is because Presidents change and are the object of so much political abuse, there is no established standard for young Americans as they shape their behavior, habits and standards.

PRESCRIPTIONS

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TREMENDOUS TRIFLES

THE MISPLACED COMMA THAT COST OUR GOVERNMENT \$1,000,000.

It was the year 1872. The tariff act was being framed. The United States, becoming more and more aware of the importance of tropical and semi-tropical fruits, desired to encourage their propagation in this country.

It was decided to permit the importation of such fruit bearing plants duty free. So the framers of the Tariff Act of June 8, 1872, included in what was then known as the "free list," or the list of items that should be imported free, "fruit plants, tropical and semi-tropical, for the purpose of propagation or cultivation."

The bill was framed. Then it was copied -- or almost copied. For a copying clerk erroneously misplaced a comma and made it read, "fruit, plants tropical and semi-tropical for the purpose of propagation or cultivation."

Importers were delighted. They imported fruits happily, and insisted that they were duty free. The Government contended that a mistake had been made and that duty must be charged on imported fruit; that it was only for PLANTS which were duty free. The Government contended this and the Treasury ruled against the importers of fruit. But it finally reversed its decision and admitted that the law as published DID list fruit on the free list. So importers who had previously paid import duty on the fruit were refunded the amount of such duty, and the Government lost a million dollars in what would otherwise have been an income from imported fruits.

The error was corrected by act of Congress of May 9, 1874 by changing the comma between "fruit" and "plants" to a hyphen, making that commodity listed as duty free to plainly read "fruit-plants," and NOT "fruits" and "plants."

In subsequent Tariff Acts, according to the U.S. Tariff Commission, the hyphen has been omitted and the law now reads as originally drafted, "fruit plants, tropical and semi-tropical for the purpose of propagation or cultivation."

A million dollars is quite a sum but it was the penalty for a misplaced comma.

U.S.-SOVIET TRADE

The United States and the Soviet Union have signed historic agreements settling Russia's debts from World War II while opening a new era of bilateral trade. Preliminary agreement was reached during the Moscow summit in May.

CONGRESS ADJOURNS

The 92nd Congress finished its business and adjourned October 18th after two years of work which was highlighted by enactment of a \$20-billion revenue-sharing bill and giving 18-year-olds the right to vote.

RUSSIA TO PAY DEBT

The Soviet Union has agreed to pay a total of \$722 million, including an unspecified interest charge, over the next 29 years. It is repayment of their wartime Lend Lease debt to the United States.

OVERRODE WATER VETO

The 92nd Congress overrode President Nixon's water cleanup bill veto. President Nixon vetoed the \$24-billion, three-year water pollution control bill calling it a "staggering, budget-wrecking" measure.

ON CRIME

Attorney General Richard Kleindienst reported to Congress recently that there were indications crime was declining. With the new laws passed, he said figures show crime increased at a slower rate.

MAY LIMIT SPENDING

Secretary of the Treasury George P. Shultz, has disclosed that President Nixon plans to withhold funds that Congress has voted to keep Government spending as close as he can to \$250-billion this year.

Q: How hard is it to repair boat damage?

A: Surface scratches and hairline cracking in the gel coat (called "crazing") are cosmetic damages and do not



hurt the strength of the hull or deck. They can be repaired easily.

The repair area should be cleaned with detergent and clear water and completely dried. Use masking tape to mark off the area being worked on. The nicks and scratches can be easily touched up with a resin repair kit from your dealer. And the crazing can be repaired by opening the cracks with an electric hand drill and a V cutting tool so that a gel coat patching resin can be forced into the cracks with a spatula or squeegee.

The V cut should extend slightly below the gel coat

Owens-Corning Fiberglas Corp. and about 1 4 an inch beyond the ends of the cracks. Follow resin time and temperature directions suggested by the manufacturer. Do not work in direct sunlight. In temperatures below 65, you'll need a heat lamp for curing the repair compound. After the resin is cured, wet-sand the area with 600-grit sandpaper and compound, then polish it to a gloss.

Q: When does painting become necessary?

A: Painting for appearance may be desired if polishing no longer restores the gel coat to its like-new luster. Or you may want to change the colors. There are many marine coatings for Fiberglas on the market. No primers are necessary. A thorough cleaning and sanding is the general preparation.

Q: How should you go about repairing structural damage?

A: Structural damage, such as ruptures of the hull caused by impact, involves a more complicated procedure. Structural repair kits and repair instructions are available from the dealer, manufacturer, or a marine hardware store.

One-Sided

U.S. air attacks on military targets in North Vietnam continue to cause a roar of protest throughout the world, though most Americans support President Nixon's policy of reaction to North Vietnam's military aggression.

Even though one appreciates that much of the criticism is caused by political motivation, the desire to defeat Mr. Nixon, nevertheless one is puzzled by the almost total lack of criticism of North Vietnam. North Vietnamese forces fire rockets into cities and towns, killing civilians. They bombard cities and towns with artillery. They often execute officials loyal to Saigon where they seize control. They unquestionably touched off the latest round of military escalation with a major offensive.

Yet for all this the North Vietnamese receive almost no criticism. The United States, for retaliating against military targets, is condemned wholesale. Part of the explanation is that we are a large, powerful nation. Part is because we act in defense of a regime that is not democratic. Part is because many believe we have no business in Vietnam at all, perhaps rightly.

TREMENDOUS TRIFLES

THE WAGER THAT STARTED THE MOVIES

No one could have foreseen the connection between a WAGER and the MOTION PICTURE industry. Seems like a trivial thing? That's just the point SO MANY IMPORTANT THINGS HAVE STARTED IN SUCH INSIGNIFICANT WAYS! But—the story:

The incident happened in Sacramento in the year 1877. Two famous sportsmen of the day fell upon a discussion of a sport they both loved: horse-racing. One of these was Leland Stanford (for whom the famed university is today named) and the other was a noted sportsman of the day. The point of the discussion seemed to be whether all four legs of a horse leave the ground at the same time during a run, a gallop or canter. You must remember that this was before the days of advanced photography and it was difficult to prove what today seems simple, indeed! Feeling became keener as the sportsmen differed, irreconcilably, on this point. It was a wager of some five thousand dollars. And then it was necessary to devise ways and means of complete proof.

It was finally determined to utilize the talents of a noted photographer of the day, the late Muybridge of New York, and the solution of the problem was placed entirely with him.

Muybridge ingeniously devised a battery of sixteen cameras, placed within a foot of each other along the course of the track. To each of these camera's shutters a string was attached that would be tripped by the horse's legs as he ran, galloped, cantered across the prescribed course. In this way, he would be photographed in sixteen different positions.

Now, the story ends in two ways: it definitely established the fact that all four legs of a horse DO leave the ground, thereby earning the wagered sum for his sponsor. But far more important was the incidental and accidental result. . . .

Thomas A. Edison was the most important inventor of the day. His interests had led him into many and varied fields, but it was never in the direction of photography.

One day Edison chanced upon the series of pictures that had been prepared by Muybridge in settlement of the wager. In a flash, he saw in it the central idea of continuous motion. If these intervals between the movements could be made shorter, there would be a more realistic effect of continuous motion.

That was all that was necessary for the fertile and inventive mind of the Wizard of Menlo Park. It was the beginning of a long series of experiments in the field of continuous motion. It was the beginning of Edison's interest in the pioneer motion pictures with which his name is imperishably linked.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Dozing Driver

Too little sleep, like too much liquor, can turn even the mildest motorist into a deadly menace. If a driver dozes off and has an accident, is he legally liable for the consequences?



The law starts with the proposition that no one should be blamed for what he does while unconscious. Blame rests on free will misused—and the sleeping person is not using free will at all.

But one court after another has nonetheless imposed liability on the dozing driver. They find him negligent not for what he does while asleep but for disregarding, while still awake, the telltale signs that sleep was coming.

"It is true," said one court, "that (the driver) can not ordinarily fix the precise moment when he lapses into unconsciousness. But it is not true that ordinarily sleep comes unheralded. It lies within his own control to keep awake or cease driving."

Background factors, contributing to the danger, are also taken into account. One driver had been at the wheel continuously for 18 hours; another was exhausted from overwork; a third had kept going after twice almost "fading out." In each case, when the driver dozed off, he was held liable for the results.

Suppose it is the passenger, not the driver, who falls asleep. Does the law frown on that too?

Occasionally the passenger does have a duty to stay awake—when he has some special reason to think that the driver needs watching. But as a rule he may nap at will, putting his trust in the driver to take care.

In one case a woman in the back seat dozed off and slumped forward and knocking his hands off the steering wheel. In the crash that followed, the driver was injured.

Could he collect damages from the woman on the theory that her falling asleep was an act of negligence? A court said no, because a passenger could scarcely be expected to anticipate such a freakish accident just from falling asleep.

"(She) was required to exercise foresight," said the court, "not clairvoyance."

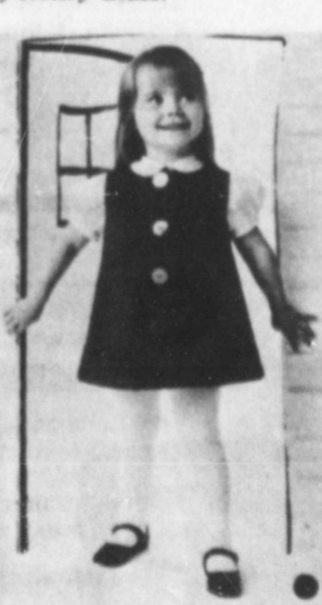

Just where all the tens of billions are that Mueller says only need to be allocated is a mystery. Certainly most Americans think there are many more urgent needs for these billions at home. Maybe that kind of thinking is why Mueller no longer heads NASA.

Spoiled Moderns

Though baseball is over for 1972, a retroactive comment is in order—to help today's young players avoid the mental state and pampered martyrdom of certain moderns in the game today.

Sourest scene of all this season came from Vida Blue, paid \$60,000 this year and given the Cy Young award last year, when his club was celebrating winning the pennant. He sat pouting, bitching about his \$60,000 salary, knocking his manager and the team owner.

No sense of appreciation, no loyalty, no team spirit seemed to affect him. He told a reporter he pitched for himself and that he was going to make the owner come to him in next year's signing. In view of the fact that Oakland won with little help from Blue this year (he was 6-10) one finds it difficult to see any logic in his utterances. Rather, they sound like noises from a pampered, confused child.

Book Reviews

The book reviewing art is fast becoming a game among super-sophisticated writers in which each tries to outdo the other in the use of complex sentences, thoughts, depth studies and modern, claptrap theories about so-called new meanings—which few understand.

It's not unusual for a base, degenerate sex novel to take on all sorts of inner, deep meanings and messages, to reviewers who enjoy reading the stuff. And all those profound analyses of inner and indirect meanings, rejections, projections, psychological connotations, etc., often add up to zero.

The latest theories of a small group of effete, protesting shockers in metropolitan centers, who have a language all their own (which isn't worth learning in most cases) are of little interest to most of America and the world. Yet the importance of these radicals' theories is constantly being exaggerated in much of the metropolitan press. Like children's fads, today's favorite language, phrases and clichés of the radicals will soon die out, with an exception here and there, and the world will go on—having missed nothing.

Crime & Police

Many crusaders would sell the idea that the rising rate of crime in America in recent years stems from the quality of police protection or the failure of the social system in general. But one of the major causes is certainly the courts.

In a recent speech on crime, New York City's new Police Commissioner revealed that last year New York police made 94,000 felony arrests and that of those arrested only 552 went to trial. That was largely because the courts, acting under Supreme Court rulings (during the period when Earl Warren was Chief Justice) interpreted the 4th, 5th and 14th amendments in a way that led them to spend more time trying to determine whether arresting officers made a mistake than whether the arrested are guilty.

Commissioner Murphy said frankly to the Bar Association of New York in a recent speech on the subject: "The court system is in bankruptcy. It simply doesn't work. You all know this. I am not telling you anything new."

A recent case appealed to the Supreme Court from California may reveal whether the new court, with its Nixon appointees, will move in the direction of helping the police—and the courts. It involves a suspected dope peddler; after a time of surveillance, police saw the trash thrown out and stopped the truck which picked it up and discovered all kinds of evidence, upon which the man was arrested. But, utilizing Warren court rulings, the arrested had the case dismissed on the ground that the officers should have had a warrant to search his trash!

This kind of impractical nonsense, the fact that police and offenders know such defenses can be successfully utilized, greatly encourages criminals and discourages law officers, who know that only a fraction of those they arrest will come to trial. That, plus the policy of so many politicians and misguided moralists telling minorities they are so badly treated in America, which has produced many martyrs, is behind much of the nation's crime.

SOUR DOUGH BISCUITS

eighteen 2 1/2-inch biscuits

- 1/2 cup enriched flour*
- 1 cup Starter
- 2/3 cup milk
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 1/2 cups enriched flour*
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup shortening

Measure 1/2 cup flour, Starter, milk and sugar into mixing bowl (not metal); beat until smooth. Cover loosely with waxed paper and let stand in warm place (80 to 85°) at least 18 hours. Stir batter down. Stir together 1 1/2 cups flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Blend in Starter mixture. Add more flour if necessary to make a soft dough. Turn onto lightly floured surface and knead gently 30 seconds. Roll out 1/2-inch thick. Cut out biscuits with floured cutter. Place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in preheated 450° oven 10 to 12 minutes.

SOUR DOUGH STARTER

- 2 cups enriched flour*
- 1 package dry yeast
- 2 cups warm water

Combine ingredients in large mixing bowl (not metal). Mix together until well blended. Let stand uncovered in warm place (80 to 85°) for 48 hours; stir occasionally. Stir well before use. Pour out required amount and replenish remaining starter by mixing in 1 cup each flour and warm water. Let stand uncovered in a warm place a few hours until it bubbles again before covering loosely and refrigerating. Use and replenish every two weeks.

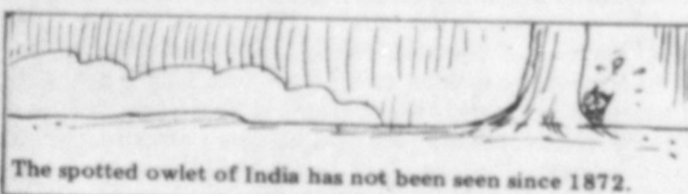


SOUR DOUGH BREAD

- two 1 1/2 pound loaves
- OR 48 bread sticks

- 3 cups enriched flour*
- 1 cup Starter
- 2 cups warm water
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 3 1/2 cups enriched flour* (about)
- Corn meal
- Melted butter

Measure 3 cups flour, Starter, water, sugar, salt and baking soda into large mixing bowl (not metal); beat until smooth. Cover loosely with waxed paper and let stand in warm place (80 to 85°) at least 18 hours. Stir batter down. Mix in more flour to make a moderately stiff dough. Turn onto lightly floured surface and knead until smooth and satiny, about 8 to 10 minutes. Shape dough, place on greased baking sheets that have been sprinkled with corn meal; brush with butter. Cover and let rise in warm place until doubled, about 1 1/2 hours. Bake in preheated 400° oven 40 to 50 minutes, or until done. Brush with butter.

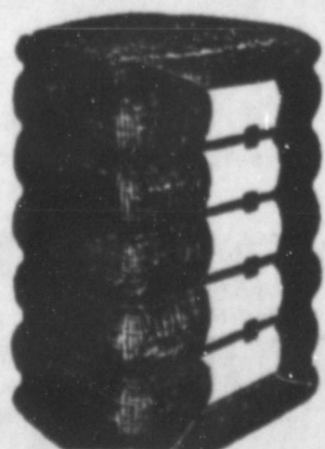

- 2 turnips, diced
- 1/2 c shredded cabbage
- 1 c butter beans
- 2 c okra, sliced
- 2 cans tomatoes
- salt and pepper
- sugar to taste

Add soup bone to 2 quarts of water, add onions, carrots, celery, turnips, cabbage and butter beans. Cook about 2 hours. Add okra and tomatoes. Cook 30 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Season with salt, pepper and sugar. Add more water if needed.
