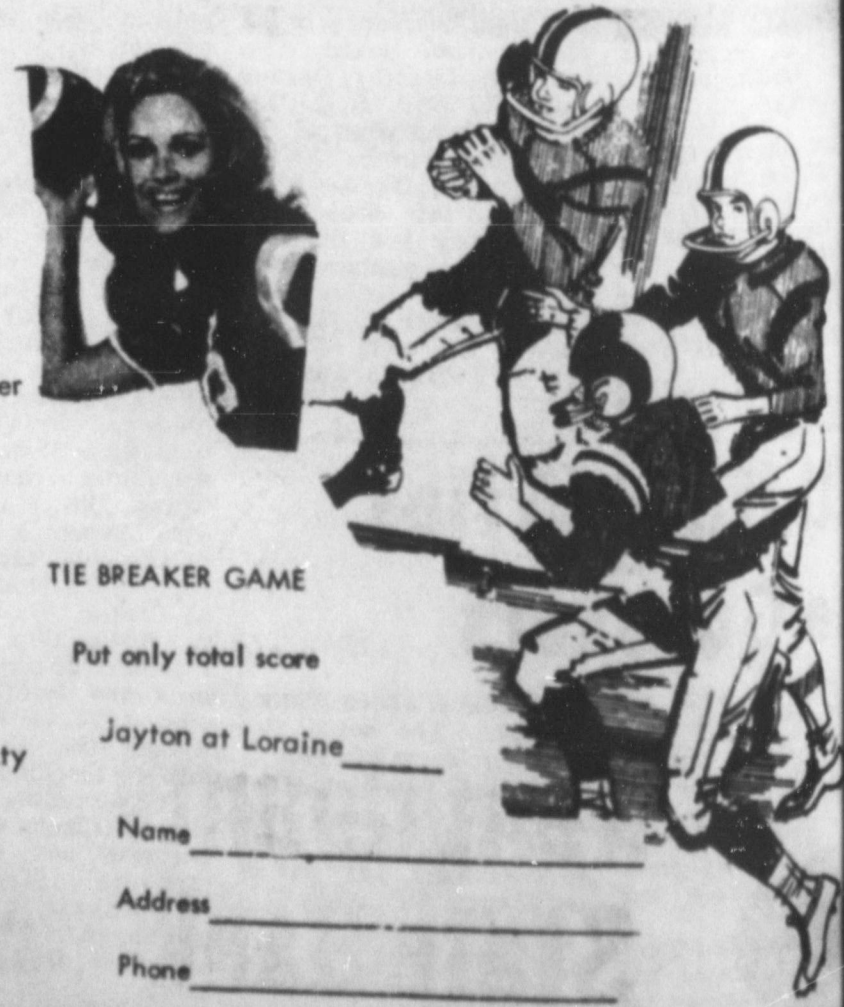

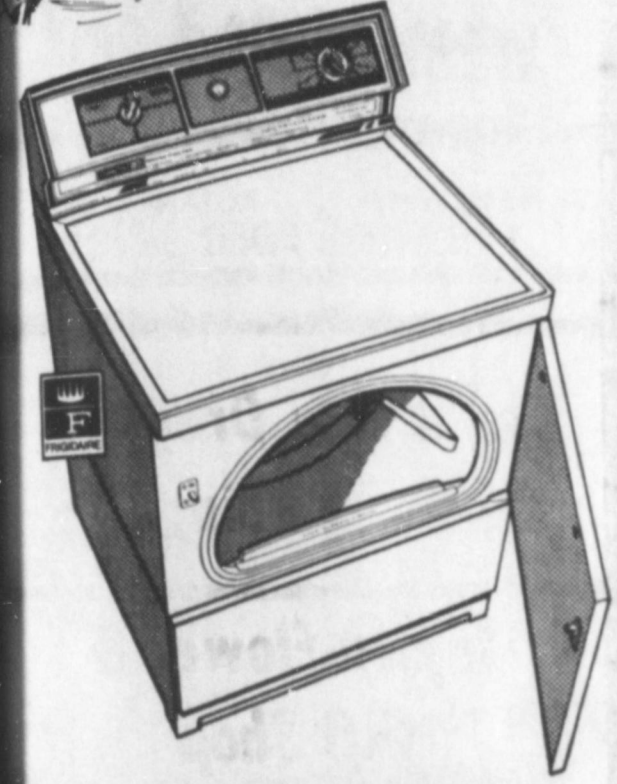

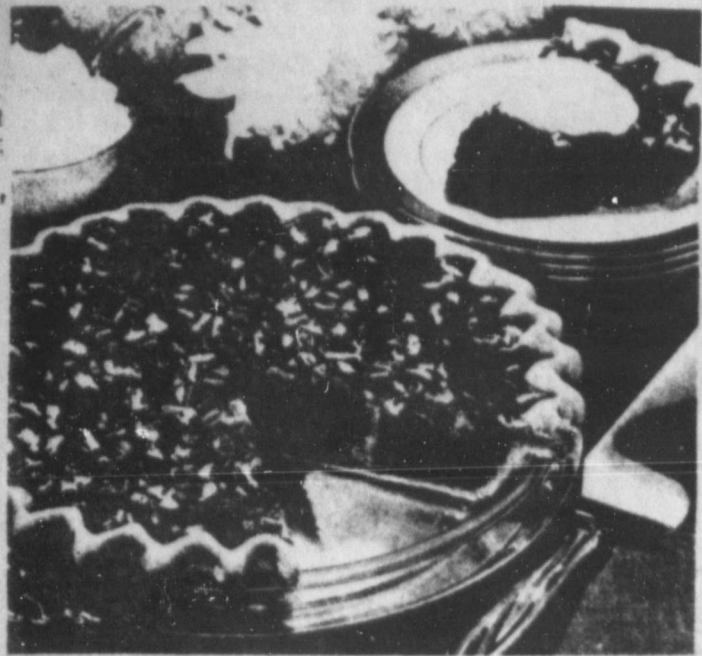

Pumpkin Pecan Pie

3 slightly beaten eggs
1 c. canned or mashed cooked pumpkin
1 c. sugar
1/2 c. dark corn syrup
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 tsp. salt
1 unbaked 9-inch pastry shell
1 c. chopped pecans
In small mixing bowl, combine eggs, pumpkin,

sugar, corn syrup, vanilla, cinnamon, and salt; mix well. Pour into unbaked pastry shell. Top with chopped pecans. Bake in moderate oven (350) about 40 minutes or till knife inserted half-way between center and edge comes out clean. Cool; serve topped with whipped cream. Makes 1 9-inch pie.

My Favorite Pumpkin Pie

1 egg
3/4 c. sugar
1 Tbsp. flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 tsp. nutmeg
1/2 tsp. ginger
2 c. steamed pumpkin
2 Tbsp. molasses
5/8 c. Pet Milk diluted with
5/8 c. water
Beat egg thoroughly; add sugar mixed with flour, salt and spices. Then add pumpkin, molasses and diluted milk. Stir until well blended. Line a deep pie pan with pastry. Pour mixture and bake in a hot oven (450 F.) 10 minutes, reduce to 325 F. and bake 30 minutes longer or until firm. Makes 9-inch pie.

Holiday Raisin Pie

2 T cornstarch
1 c sugar
1/2 t cinnamon
1/2 t nutmeg
1/2 t cloves
2 eggs, separated
1 c sour cream
1 c raisins
1/2 t lemon juice
1/2 c chopped nuts
1/4 c cream of tartar

Minimum Tillage Farming Is Gaining In Popularity

Many farmers are farming less and enjoying it more. Minimum tillage farming has rapidly gained in popularity among farmers during the past four years. In 1969, the Soil Conservation Service reported 1,508 acres of Minimum Tillage farming in the state. In 1970, 8,897 acres; in 1971, 59,037 acres; and in 1972, 196,315 acres. The acreage in 1972 is 130 times the acreage reported in 1969.

Why are farmers going for this new method of

started by planting a late feed crop in the two skipped rows of broadcasting small grain into the cotton on the last cultivation. After cotton harvest, if feed was used, the residue is left on the ground to prevent wind and water erosion, hold the moisture, and allow the soil to become friable by the bacterial action on the residue. In the event of the use of the small grain, it is allowed to grow until a sufficient residue is produced and then killed with sweeps, or herbicides. This leaves sufficient re-

side on the soil and we have saved many cultural trip over the land.

Now comes the time of the year that some farmers bed their land. In minimum tillage, this is not necessary. The residue on the soil surface takes the place of bedding. It holds the water on the land to allow moisture intake, it shades the ground to cut down evaporation from warming of the soil and wind and will reduce soil blowing to a minimum. This residue over a period of time will make tight land friable, and give the sandy soils new life. The farmer should use only those tillage operations necessary to control weeds, and choose those methods that will leave the residue on or near the soil surface.

After the cotton is planted, cultivation should be held to a minimum. This can be accomplished by using herbicides if needed. A herbicide should be used that can be placed on top of the ground, or incorporated with a rotary hoe type implement. This should leave sufficient residue on the soil surface.

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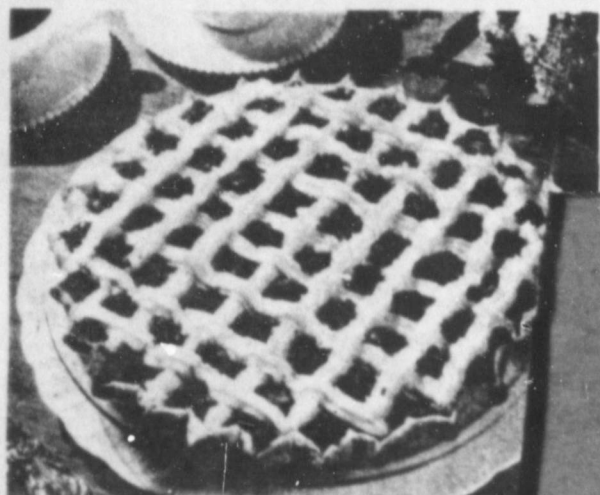

Cranberry Mince Pie

3/4 c. canned jellied cranberry sauce
1 1/2 c. diced pared tart apples
1/4 tsp. grated lemon peel
1 Tbsp. lemon juice
1 recipe plain pastry

(based on 2 c. mince-meat)

Serve warm.

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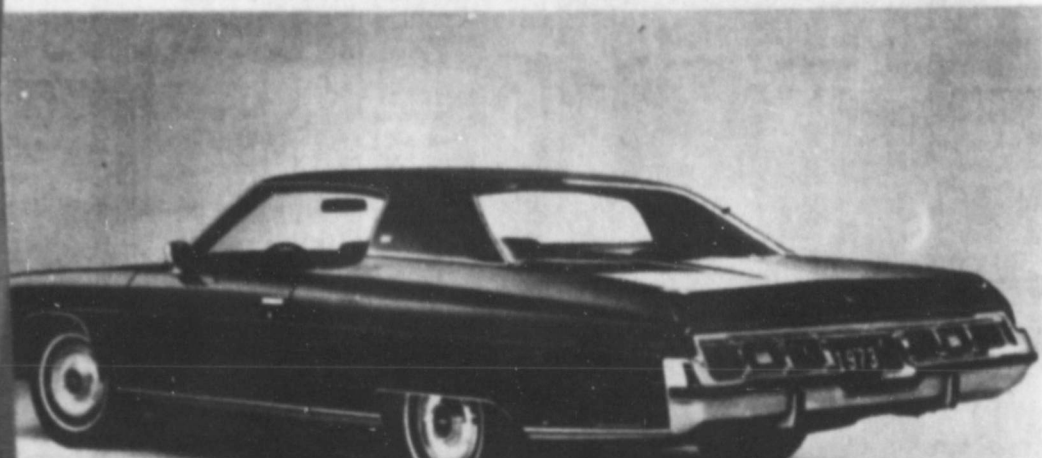
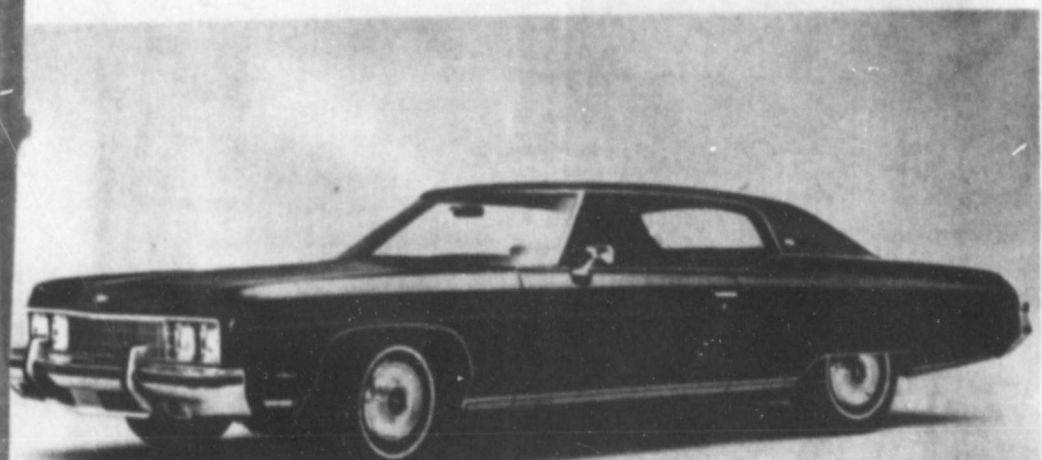
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
