ALCOHOLISM COUNCIL FUNDS DUE IN MAY

The Texas Commission on Alcoholism expects to have units in this area by May 1, the West Central Texas Council of Governments has been informed. This was the word brought by Ross Newby of Austin at a recent WTCOG meeting in Abilene, according to L. D. Womble, director of the Region 7 Council on Alcoholism, 1001 College Avenue, Abilene, Texas. At that time, Womble said, the Snyder Council will be able to hire its office staff and begin expanding its services for Snyder and its network including Scurry, Kent, Fisher and Mitchell Counties. The council here will carry out all phases of the programs in all communities in the network. "We have a very broad approach to the problems of drugs and alcoholism that will greatly benefit our citizens and communities in many different ways," Womble said.

The Center treats people with birth defects and learning disabilities, as well as stroke, accident, or burns victims. Their patients come from as far away as New Mexico and Oklahoma.

BEAUTY AND TALENT SHOW IS PLANNED

The Universal Pageant System is staging its first Tri-County Pageant April 13-14 at the High School Auditorium in Spur. All girls ages 3-17 who live in Dickens, Kent, and King counties are eligible to enter. The pageant will be divided into 3 age groups: La Petite, ages 3-6; Our Little Miss, ages 7-12; and Ideal Miss ages 13-17. The La Petite contestants will model sportswear and a party dress. Our Little Miss contestants will model sportswear, a party dress, and present a three minute talent act. The Ideal Miss age group will model sportswear (no swimsuits), an evening gown, and present a three minute talent act. All girls also will have a personal interview with the judges. Winners of each age group will advance to the next level of competition. La Petite and Our Little Miss winners will go to the Texas' Our Little Miss Pageant at Waco in June. The Ideal Miss winner will go to the World's Ideal Miss Pageant at Waco in July. Winners at the Texas' Our Little Miss Pageant will go on to the

World's Our Little Miss Pageant in New Orleans. Over \$6,000 in college scholarships are awarded at the World Pageants. Each local winner will receive a crown, banner, trophy, and paid entry fee to the next level of competition. An overall talent winner will also be selected in the Our Little Miss and Ideal Miss age groups. The talent winners will also receive a trophy and are invited to compete at the next level. A total of 11 trophies will be given at the pageant. The Universal Pageant System is the foremost pageant training program in the world for girls between the age of 3 and the Miss America age. It offers training for 3-17 in poise, leadership, sportsmanship, cooperation, and getting along with others. It also offers opportunities for girls to make friends, exhibit talent, beauty, and poise. It gives the shy girl a chance to overcome her shyness and the outgoing girl an outlet for her ambitions. Girls are judged on poise, appearance, appropriateness of costume, personality, attitudes, and talent.

Gray's Independence

Many critics of the late J. Edgar Hoover are now wishing Hoover were still on the job. That's primarily because of growing doubts over Patrick Gray's independence.

Gray, President Nixon's choice to succeed Hoover, has recently been testifying before a Senate committee considering his confirmation.

Many members, Democrats and Republicans, have come to the conclusion the acting FBI chief hasn't properly maintained the prestigious bureau's independence and integrity.

White House lawyers have been allowed to sit in on interrogations of White House personnel in the Watergate case. Gray has turned over records and transcripts of illegally-obtained telephone conversations to the White House.

He has changed his testimony on some occasions. And, generally speaking, many members feel his explanation that he's merely a link in the chain of command, from the White House down, is unsatisfactory.

J. Edgar Hoover always jealously guarded his bureau's independence and integrity, insisting it remain above politics; it is almost inconceivable that he would have followed Gray's recent course of action. The FBI has been, and should remain, above suspicion.

Common Sense & Women

The U.S. Government is now seeking, in court, to force the Pittsburgh Press to stop printing its want ads under "Jobs, Female Interest" and "Jobs, Male Interest."

The absurdity of the current American kick to make everyone the same is thus still at fever pitch. Everyone knows women and men are inclined, for various reasons, to favor certain jobs. For example, most families seeking a nurse for children prefer a female. Most people seeking yard or heavy work help prefer a male.

The Pittsburgh Press, in listing jobs according to the usual preference, isn't discriminating against anyone. Neither the Press nor employers are allowed, by law, to discriminate sexually in hiring. And everyone is free to read the job listings--and to apply.

Yet the Justice Department is now spending time, and the taxpayers' money, seeking to force the Press to ignore these natural preferences, in the name of women's lib.

As with the current constitutional amendment selling the idea women and men are the same, the majority of Americans, men and women, do not believe it, and are not in favor of it. But the agitators and militants, and politicians, are running the show.

Nixon & Housewives

At his latest news conference President Nixon advised American housewives to discriminate in their food purchases, so that demand for the more expensive meats and other foods now selling at greatly inflated prices, will ease.

The President, in rejecting price controls on food, says they won't work and would instead likely produce a black market. He believes housewives, by refusing to buy foods priced excessively high, can do more to ease inflationary pressures than controls.

If enough American housewives heed the President's words, demand for highly expensive foods can indeed be eased, and prices will inevitably recede. Of course, this reaction will last only a limited time--perhaps six months or a year.

The President believes by that time several measures already initiated to increase the food supply will have reduced food prices. The American housewife should cooperate in this effort. If by the end of the year it has not worked, the call for controls will probably be irresistible.

The Canal

General Omar Torrijos, Panama's current chief of state, recently told assembled U.N. diplomats his government is reaching the end of its patience with Washington. (The United States refuses to turn over control of the Panama Canal to Torrijos.)

For the first time, Torrijos aligned Panama solidly with Cuba in his speech to U.N. delegates, who had traveled to Panama to view the canal and hear Torrijos.

Some Latin American nations have proposed to neutralize the canal. Cuba demands all U.S. personnel leave. But most favor a new treaty between the U.S. and Panama, as does Washington.

Air Force Scandals

Following several procurement scandals and fiascos concerning aircraft, a full-blown scandal concerning the firing of an employe who revealed cost overruns of two billions in the C5A transport program is now rocking Washington.

A cover up of what appears to have been unjustified character assassination and a vindictive dismissal of the employe reaches all the way up to the Secretary of the Air Force himself--Robert Seamans.

Clark Mollenhoff, former White House aide, is solidly on the side of the former employe, A. E. Fitzgerald, and has blasted the Air Force for resorting to executive privilege to keep the case secret.

If what is being charged proves true, new leadership in the Air Force appears desirable in the interests of that service, the White House and National security.

FDA Stirs

The Food and Drug Administration, for years quietly insensitive to many of the nation's nutritional needs, continues to show signs of awakening.

Its latest stirring is the long-overdue announcement it will begin to set nutritional standards for prepared foods. The first category of such foods to come under FDA guidelines will be frozen dinners.

The idea is to prevent food producers from marketing prepared foods with no nutritional value or next to none--which the public has no way of knowing.

Millions of Americans are subsisting on a diet lacking in proper nutrition, proper vitamins and minerals. There's no requirement at present that processors and packagers display nutritional information on products. The FDA effort to change that is obviously in the public interest.

Food Prices

The price of too many foods has moved up sharply in the past six months. Some hikes are justified and some--as is always the case in every inflationary period--are hiked because grocers know they can get by with it. A recent survey showed prices varied widely in the same city often for the same brands or products; some difference can be expected but when there's as much as a hundred per cent price differential, for exactly the same product, exploitation of an inflation atmosphere is indicated.

Of course, the American system allows grocers to charge what they wish and no one is forced to buy anything, anywhere--which is as it should be. On the other hand, the public food price hikes cannot be justified on the basis of increased procurement costs.

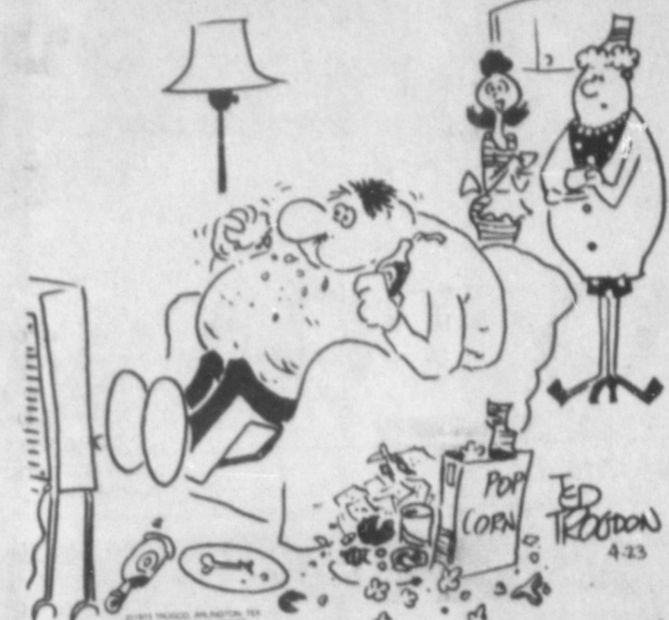

Kaline Taking it One Year At Time; Family No Problem

(Second of a Series) By Edward H. Sims

LAKELAND, FLA. -- At 38, sure-fire Hall of Famer Al Kaline doesn't know how much longer he'll play the game. Last year he led his team to the top in its division in a dramatic September stretch in which he batted .500. He thinks Detroit has an even better team this year.

"We have a much better team than last year. Because of our age, everybody expects us to fall off. I don't. I think we're at the stage where we have to utilize the players carefully. But I don't think we'll prove too old."

"I myself am playing one year at a time. If I do well again, and if the team does well, I'll play again in 1974. Some people think I ought to quit for my family, that my wife wants me to quit, that the family puts pressure on me to quit."

"There's no pressure. This is my life. This is all I've ever done. They like baseball too. If I'm doing well and want to play, they want me to play. There's no problem there."

How does the race in the western division of the American League look?

"It's a real strong division now. Oakland probably

has the best team. But Chicago is improved and California has helped themselves. I don't think Oakland can run away with this year like last year. I think it will be a good race and Oakland can't afford a letdown, which happens to a lot of clubs after winning the World Series."

Speaking of Oakland, the writer recalled the first playoff game last year. It was a tight pitching duel between Mickey Lolich of Detroit and Catfish Hunter of Oakland and it went into the eleventh. In the top of the 11th, Kaline smashed a home run to send the Tigers ahead 2-1. Had they held that lead they almost certainly would have won the playoffs. (They lost 2-3 in five games.)

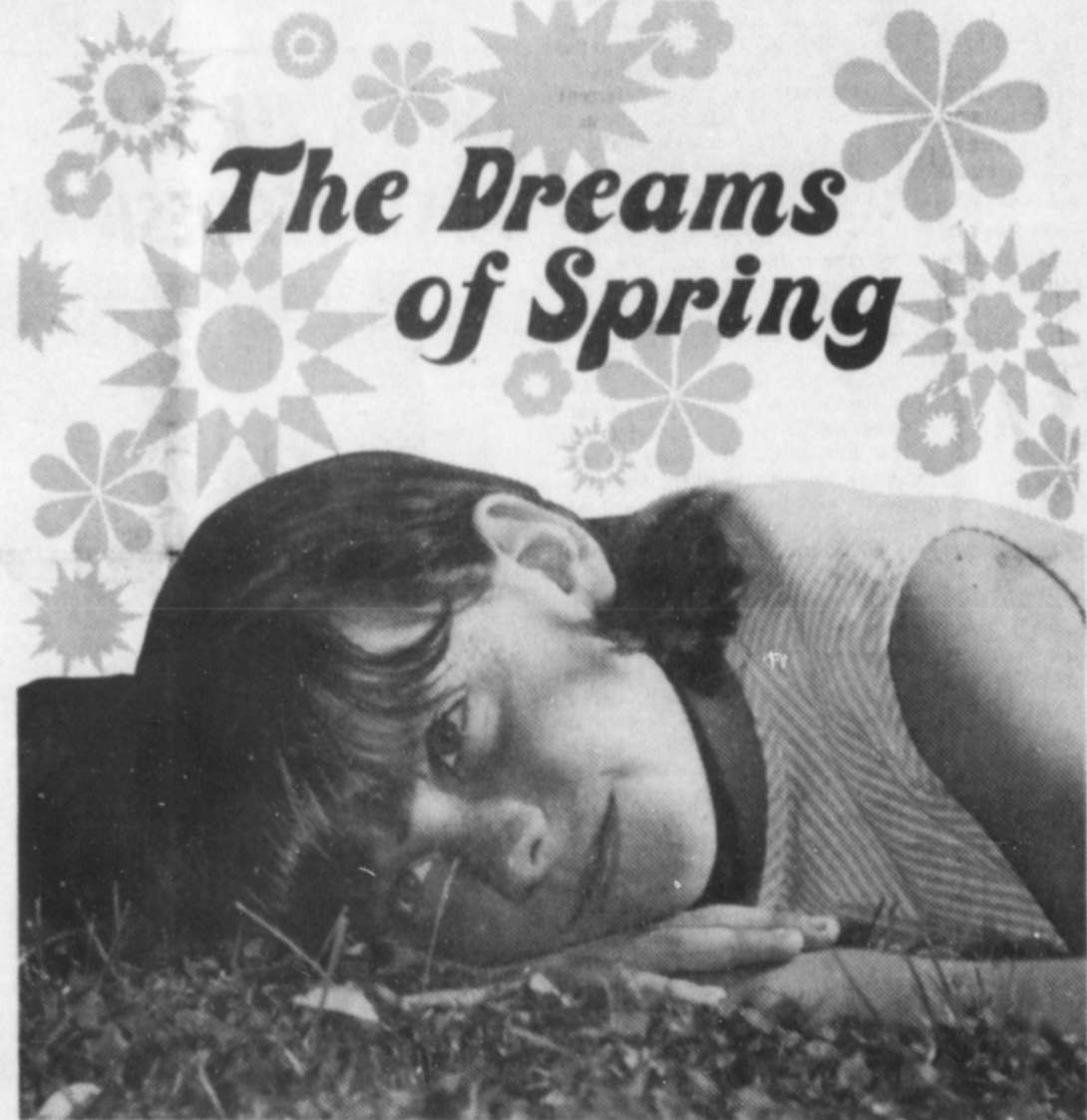
"I hit a sidearm curve ball off reliever Rollie Fingers," Al recalled. "Yeah, it would have been good to have won, but they came back and won it in the last of the 11th."

"Did that bat-throwing incident fire up the Tigers after those first two losses in Oakland?"

"I don't think so, really. We just played good baseball. But Oakland did too and they did a great job in the Series. They've got a fine pitching staff."

Meatless Dishes



Meatless Meat Balls

Contributed by Mrs. Joyce Crowley

1/4 cup toasted bread crumbs
1 medium size onion
1 cup nuts (pecans or almonds)
1 cup raw Irish potatoes
1 teaspoon salt
1 egg
1/4 teaspoon ground sage
1 small can tomato paste
1 cup warm water

Grind crumbs, onions, and potatoes in food chopper. Add salt, eggs and sage. Mix well and press into greased cream dipper to make balls. Place in greased baking dish.

Add tomato paste to warm water and pour over meat balls. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) until done.

This recipe makes one dozen medium balls. It may be doubled and frozen ahead of time then used for a light evening meatless meal. May be served with hot buttered rice.

May be sprinkled with grated cheese before serving. Note: A blender or a potato grater may be used for crumbling the bread and nuts.



Salmon And Carrot Loaf

1 can cooking Salmon--
1/2 cup butter
1/4 cup or 5 carrots grated
1 cup white crackers--
crushed (more if needed)
Put in layers in baking dish. Cover with white sauce made of:

2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons flour
Salt and pepper to taste.
Enough sweet milk to make a thin sauce. Pour over other ingredients. Bake in medium oven until done.

Broccoli Casserole

1 cup rice
3 cups water
Cook rice in water until done. Line casserole with cooked rice.
1 package frozen chopped broccoli cooked according to directions on package
1/2 cup chopped celery
1/2 cup chopped onion
Brown onion and celery in butter or margarine.

1 can mushroom soup
1 can cream chicken soup
Mix onion, celery, soups and broccoli and put in pan lined with rice. Put one small jar cheese whiz on top. Cook 10 to 15 minutes in 350 degree oven.

While the law will tolerate a reasonable amount of "salesmanship" in court, it will not tolerate deception that strikes at the heart of the marriage relation.

However, not every statement connected with religious matters is considered to be that vital.

Take another case in which the bridegroom, having promised to go through a church wedding after the civil ceremony, failed to carry out his promise. For five months he managed to find one excuse after another for staying away from the church.

At last his wife filed suit for an annulment. But this time, the court turned her down. The court reasoned that if she was willing to put up with her husband's excuses for five months, the religious ceremony could not have been so important to her after all.

Of course, the more firmly the marriage is established, the more reluctant the courts are to annul.

A number of cases have been based on the premarital consent by one spouse to have the children raised in the religion of the other spouse. In this situation, even if the consent turns out to be fraudulent, courts have generally refused to find enough grounds for an annulment.

Reason: with the couple having dwelt together for years as husband and wife, and with children already in existence, it is very late indeed to declare that the marriage had been invalid from the start.

Frustrating, isn't it—this trying to catch fish when they simply will not take the lure?

We've just been through that experience—with zero as the score. Now don't misunderstand — we've struck out many, many times before. Lots of 'em! But, never have we tried so hard, so long, and been so completely, helplessly, unsuccessful — yet so very hopeful.

It was an ideal morning, by all the finest rules for good fishing prospects. At least we thought so.

We were already at the lake, so when dawn came we were rearin' to go.

The water looked great, with just enough wind to provide ripples, yet calm enough to permit easy and accurate casting.

Being a cloudy day made it all the better for the fish would not be hiding out in the shade way back under the low, overhanging trees, or deep, deep down. I felt I should be able to find them topside EVERYWHERE—and I did. But, they could see me too.

Without the sun shining in their eyes, or heating the water, the fish were bound to be swimming shallow. Just the time to use those topwater lures. They were—and I did—but it was no go. Worse than that I could see big ones make a lightning-like dash for the bait, then put on the brakes and veer away.

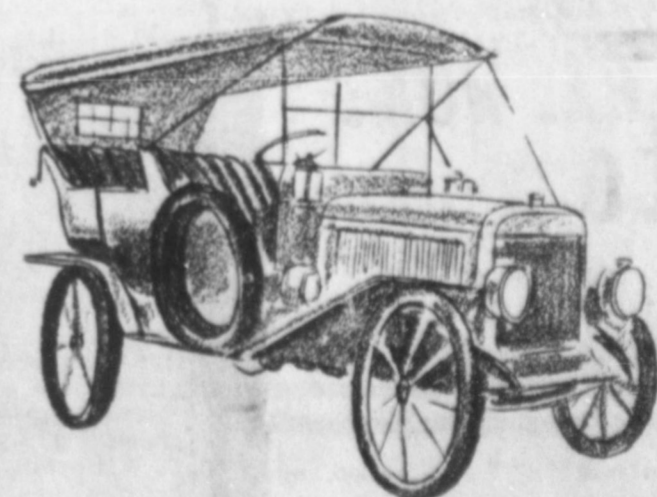

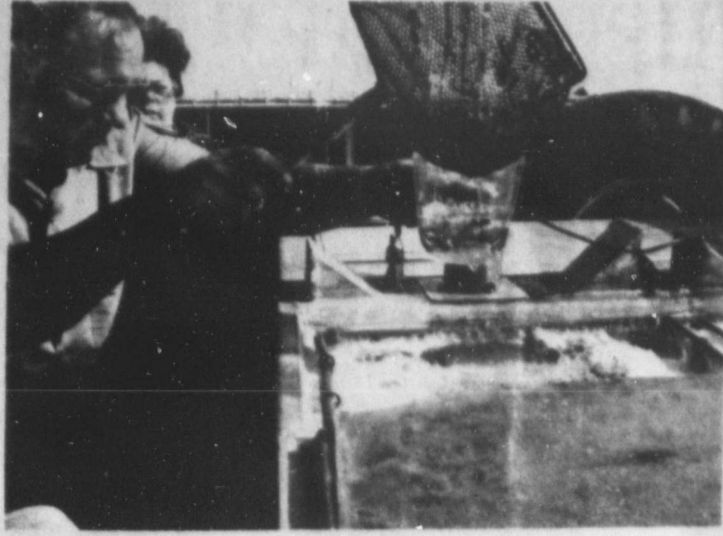

FISHPOND MANAGEMENT

By: Carroll Johnson

Fish ponds must be properly managed to improve or maintain fish production and fishery use by making a favorable water habitat; supplementing natural food supplies; and reducing competition from unwanted plants and animals.

In order to keep your fish pond in good condition it should be fertilized at regular intervals and the time to start fertilizing is in the spring when the water temperature (1 ft. below the surface) reaches 55 degrees or higher. Use 100 lbs. of 8-8-2 fertilizer or the nearest equivalent. Re-

peat the application at 7 to 10 day intervals until the color of the water prevents the sight of a white object (6" disk) held 18 inches beneath the surface. Make further applications when the white disk test shows the need. New ponds should be fertilized before the fish arrive. This will help control the waterweeds as well as improve the habitat for the new fish. On old ponds excessive water weeds should be removed from pond before fertilization program is starting. Fertility should be maintained each year throughout the growing season. This is generally March through October.

Fertilizer can be placed on a platform submerged 6 to 12 inches below the water surface using one platform for each 10 acres of water. Or, it can be broadcast around the edge of the pond in water less than 5 feet deep.

A regular fertilization program will help prevent waterweeds from becoming established but must be carried out throughout the growing season of the aquatic vegetation. Waterweeds can be controlled by the use of chemicals but extreme caution should be used and only those chemicals that have been cleared and approved by the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency should be used.

If your pond has no natural breeding places for fish, breeding can be improved by putting sections of iron pipe, culvert or 55 gal. drums under the surface and anchoring them in place. This gives female fish a place to lay their eggs and raise their young.
