A Lot Of Chicken For Schools

By the end of the school year, Texas will have received more than 5.8 million pounds of chicken for schools in the National School Lunch Program.
This is Texas' share of frozen cut-up chicken bought by the U. S. Department of Agriculture to help schools meet protein requirements of lunches served under the program. This amounts to around 9.9 average servings for each Texas child who eats lunch at a participating school.

Deliveries of the chicken began on September 1 of last year and will continue through May.

The National School Lunch Program is administered in Texas by the Texas Education Agency in cooperation with USDA's Food and Nutrition Service. Chicken and other foods donated by the federal government are distributed to school through the State Department of Public Welfare.

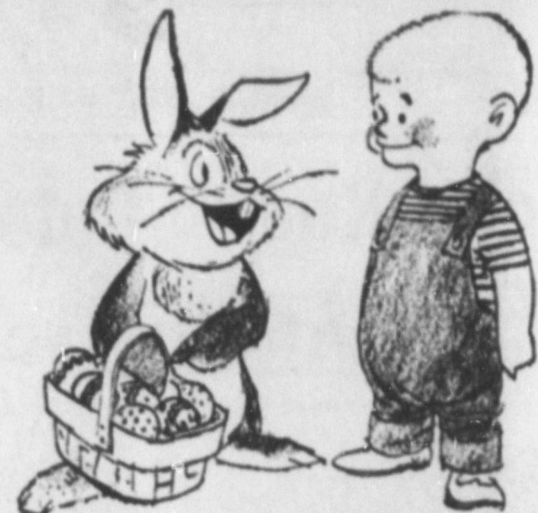



Now that spring has been here about a month, what are its weather characteristics and what causes them? Spring naturally brings warming weather, for in springtime each day is longer than the night. But it also brings more rainfall in most areas of the country. Usually builds up until early summer and then tapers off--into the dry fall months.

Spring also brings gusty winds and short, hard rainfalls. It brings sticky, murky weather in the more southerly climates and the first "spring fever" attacks of the year. The reason for the rain lies in the gradual lessening of cold, dry air masses--in frequency of appearance.

The warmer weather and more sunshine produce more thunderheads and moisture and rainfall from them. Because the change of season to warmer air isn't always quietly effected, tornadoes and brief severe storms often appear in springtime.

for. . . . The strongest Education bill in 20 years on minimum foundation, a system to finance public schools by providing them with state monies so that each school district will have the same minimum amount to operate on. Chairman of Education Committee Dan Kubiak is carrying the bill and the chances are good that it will pass.

The drive to close the smaller schools with less than 12 grades is still meeting strong opposition and for a good reason. Educators have yet to prove that excellence in education is tied to bigness, any more than happiness in living is increasingly available in larger cities.

It's been a subject of controversy for eight years and the gas unitization bill was debated and finally voted on April 12. I have had more mail on this one bill than any other this session. My judgment dictated I vote against the bill as it was presented.

There are those who would gain a spot in the public eye and use this right of free speech in America to tear at the soul and spirit of our

nation. During the past weeks when our POWs were returning and the nation was saying "Welcome home and well done," there was an ear-catching minority who screamed, "Their tales of torture are fiction, as prompted and orchestrated by a frustrated government." I have introduced a resolution in reply to these people, asking that they send a letter of apology to all returning POWs including those from Texas.

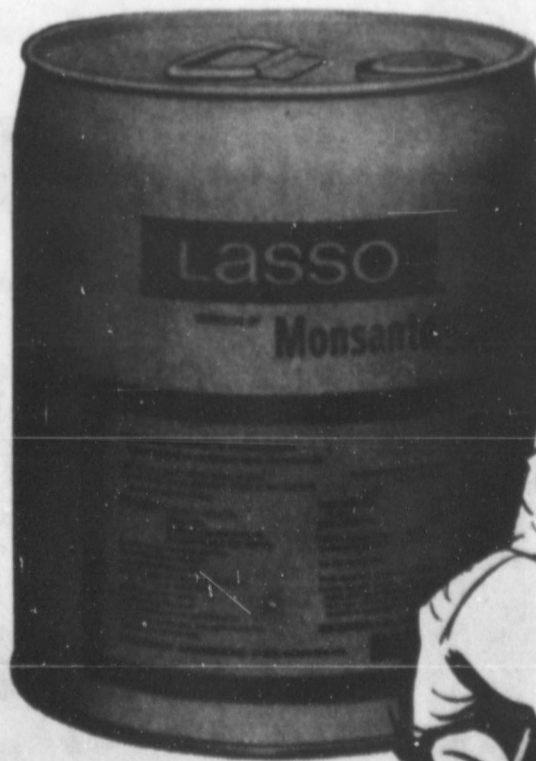

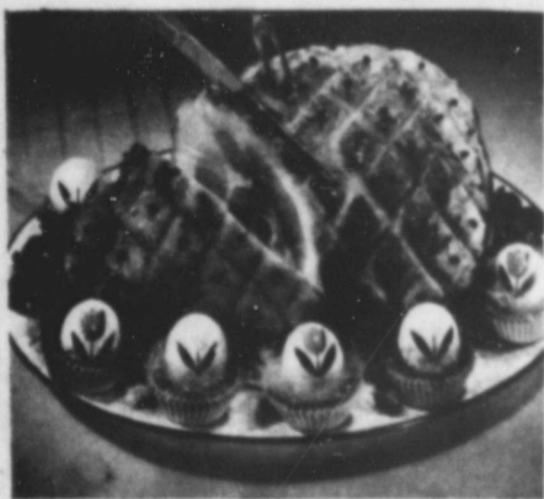

EASTER ROAST HAM

Place 5-lb. shank or butt half of smoked ham with fat side up on rack. Roast uncovered at 300 degrees F. Allow 22 to 25 min. per pound of ham.

Blend together 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar, 2 tablespoons vinegar, 2 teaspoons flour and 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard. Bring mixture to boiling and cook until mixture is thick, stirring constantly. Keep warm.

Remove ham from oven about 45 minutes before it is done. Remove rind if any, being careful not to remove fat. Cut fat surface into diamond pattern or use scalloped cookie cutter to make flower pattern.

Spread ham with glaze. Press into glaze maraschino cherries, pineapple chunks and whole cloves to form design. Return to oven and cook about 45 minutes or until done. Serve garnished with colored, decorated, hardcooked eggs in cup nests, and parsley.

AMBROSIA

With a sharp knife, cut away peel and white membrane from (3) medium size oranges.

Separate sections by cutting on either side of dividing membrane, working over a bowl to save the juice; or cut into thin crosswise slices, removing seeds, if any, and cut slices into halves.

Coarsely chop about 2/3 cup, (about 3 ozs.) moist shredded coconut.

Arrange orange sections in two or three layers in a crystal serving dish, sprinkling each layer with coconut and with sugar. (I use powdered sugar.)

Chill in refrigerator at least 1 hour.
