



## Woodson Says Beef Price Controls Bad

Commenting on the administration's action in lifting the price freeze on beef Monday of this week, Texas Farm Bureau President, J. T. "Red" Woodson said in Waco that, "We have just had another very expensive lesson demonstrating again that price controls are not an effective tool for controlling inflation. The root cause of inflation is excessive government spending."

"It is high time for the administration to learn from this and other expensive lessons in price control that the only answer to the situation is to termination of all price controls will not be reimposed," Woodson said. "We may not see the increased production of agricultural commodities government is asking for because farmers and ranchers do not know from one day to the next when price controls may be reimposed at the insistence of consumers who do not seem to understand the basic economic law of supply and demand," he added. For example, producers are still fearful that the administration may impose various types of export controls such as embargoes on cotton and feed grains.

"The net result of price controls is decreased supplies, increased demand and higher prices. The immediate termination of all wage and price controls are in the best interest of the consumer, producer, and handlers. Texas Farm Bureau insists that Congress and the administration discharge their responsibility by following a sound monetary policy," Woodson concluded.

## Highway Patrol Checks Two County Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Kent County during the month of August according to Sergeant F. G. Highway Patrol supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in persons killed and persons injured.

ed and 328 persons injured as compared to August, 1972, with 593 accidents resulting in 28 persons killed and 359 persons injured. This was 7 less accidents, 4 less fatalities, and 31 less injured in 1973 at the same period of time.

The 24 traffic deaths for the month of August 1973 occurred in the following counties: Montague, four; Armstrong, Castro, Dallam, Swisher, Baylor, Clay, Wise counties, two each; and Deaf Smith, Donley, Farmer, Haskell, Lubbock, and Lynn counties one each.

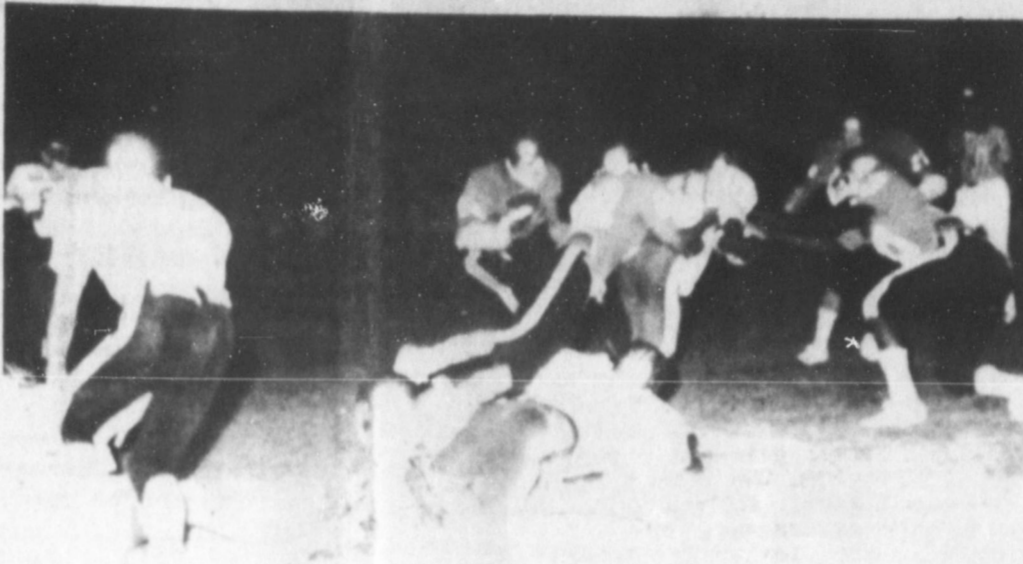

## Annual Ford PP&K Contest Thursday Night

Local youngsters will be "dusting off" their footballs and loosening up their throwing arms soon for the 1973 Punt, Pass & Kick competition sponsored by Goodall Ford Sales.

Any youngster eight through 13 years of age may register to compete in PP&K. Mr. McMeans, elementary principal will distribute the registration applications at school or you may pick one up at Goodall Ford Sales. The application must be filled in and signed by the parent. The application can be brought to the PP&K competition or turned in at the Dealership. There is no entrance fee and no body contact during competition.

No special equipment is needed and participation does not impair a youngster's amateur standing. Sneakers (tennis shoes) are recommended for all ages and are required for all except local competition. No football shoes or boots can be allowed and no barefoot kicking or punting is permitted.

Ford dealer, Raldo Goodall pointed out that trophies will be awarded for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place in the local competition in each of the six age groups. Increasing the youngster's chances of winning one of the 18 trophies is the fact that each contestant competes only against others of the same age. And since there is no body contact, an entrant's size is not as important as his ability

to punt, pass and place-kick for distance with accuracy.

Scoring is based on accuracy and range with one point added for every foot of punting, passing and kicking distance, and a point subtracted for every foot off a center line.

When contestants register, each entrant gets a free PP&K Tips Book, and complete PP&K rules and suggested conditioning exercises for contestants.

First place winners can continue on up through the Zone, District, Area and Division contests to the National Finals at the Super Bowl Game in Houston on January 13, 1974.

The time of the local PP&K will be Thursday night September 20 at 5:30 p. m. at the Jaybird Field. This will be just before the Jr. High game so come on out for both.

## Many Ways To Improve Your Pasture Land For Wildlife Hunting

If you are considering leasing your land for hunting or want to keep your land for personal hunting use, there are many things you can do to improve your land for wildlife.

Grassland needs to be in good condition to produce good cattle and the same is true to attract and keep wildlife. Depleted grassland that is infested with solid brush offers plenty of cover but little food during stress periods such as drought or severe winters. Brush control can be used to help improve grasslands and wildlife habitat, but it must be done in harmony with other conservation measures. Brush can be controlled leaving strips of brush for wildlife cover. Brush should be left along streams, draws and natural drainageways since these are preferred wildlife areas.

Wildlife will feed in the open yet they want wooded areas nearby for escape cover.

Cropland can be improved by planted grasses such as kleingrass or blue panic grass along turn rows and on small unproductive areas in your cropland. Leave a row or two of unharvested feed such as maize, hegari or other feed grains in your grain fields. These tall growing grasses provide both food and cover for birds and animals and the feed grain provides additional food for wildlife.

These are but a few of the ways you can improve your farm or ranch for wildlife and still not interfere with your livestock or farming operation. For further information on wildlife management contact your local Soil Conservation Service Field Office in Jayton.

The Jayton Jaybirds will be hosts to the Aspermont Hornets this Friday night, in the second home game of the season.

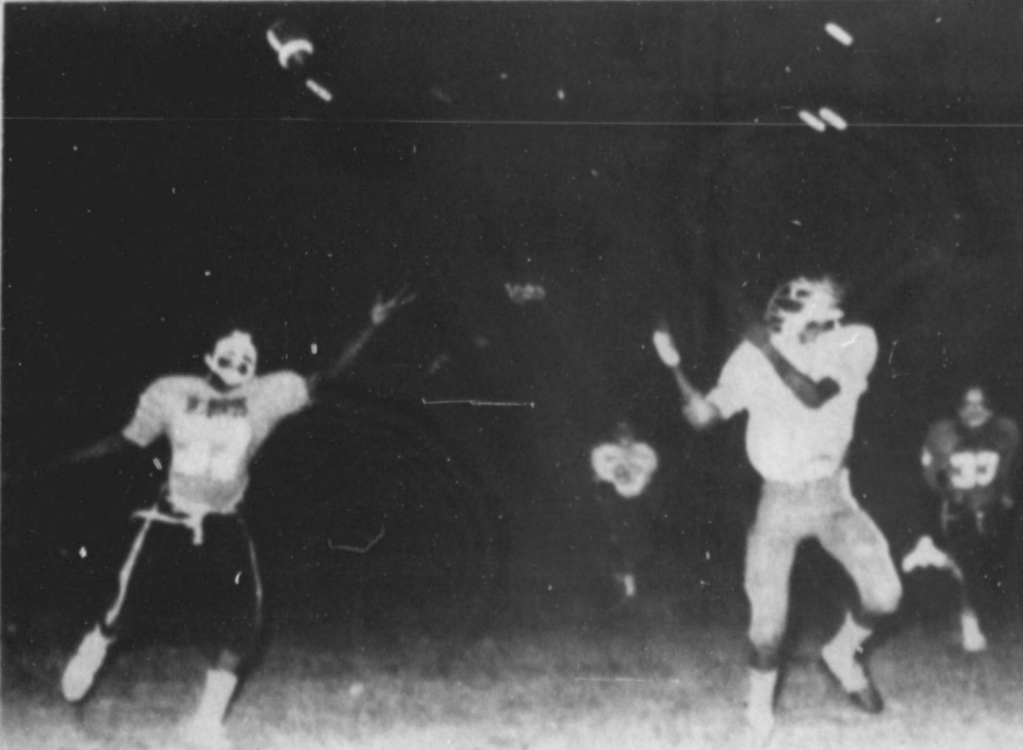
The Hornets lost their opener to Rule. This past week they were idle. So in Friday night's affair, each team will be trying to get on the victory trail with the first win of the season.

## County HD Council Meets

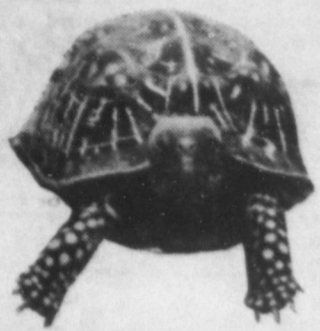

## Waco Site Of 1973 THDA Meet

Waco Convention Center will house the Texas Home Demonstration Association's 47th annual state meeting Sept. 18-20.

More than 700 members of Home Demonstration Clubs throughout Texas are expected to attend the 1973 meeting, according to Mrs. Toy Smith of College Station.

Open to the public, the meeting will feature three keynote speakers during general assemblies along with two days of workshops for THDA members. Workshops will concern citizenship, family life, 4-H, health, cultural arts, recreation, safety and publicity, Mrs. Smith said.

"Also, THDA county chairmen and THDA official delegates will attend workshops dealing with their primary areas of responsibility," the advisor added.

Addressing the public assemblies in keynote addresses will be U.S. Rep. Omar Bureson (D-Tex.) of Anson, the Rev. Peter McLeod of the First Baptist Church in Waco, and Mrs. Florence W. Low, assistant director for home economics with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

McLeod will discuss "Home--A Beacon Light" in a speech titled after the convention theme, and Mrs. Low will outline "Present Trends in Family Living."

Special guests at the meeting will be Claudia G. Williams of College Station, state home demonstration agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, along with Mrs. Low and Mrs. Smith.

Frederick McClure of San Augustine, Tex., immediate past president of the Texas Future Farmers of America, will be featured in a special program during the concluding banquet Sept. 20, according to Mrs. Bill Hardy of Rotan, Tex., THDA president.

Home demonstration clubs, numbering 1,397 in Texas with more than 20,000 members are sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System and the U.S. Department of Agriculture cooperating.

"Extension Service sponsors local clubs throughout Texas--which focus on the needs of homemakers in their counties--as part of a statewide educational effort to bring the latest information on homemaking to all families in Texas," Mrs. Smith noted.

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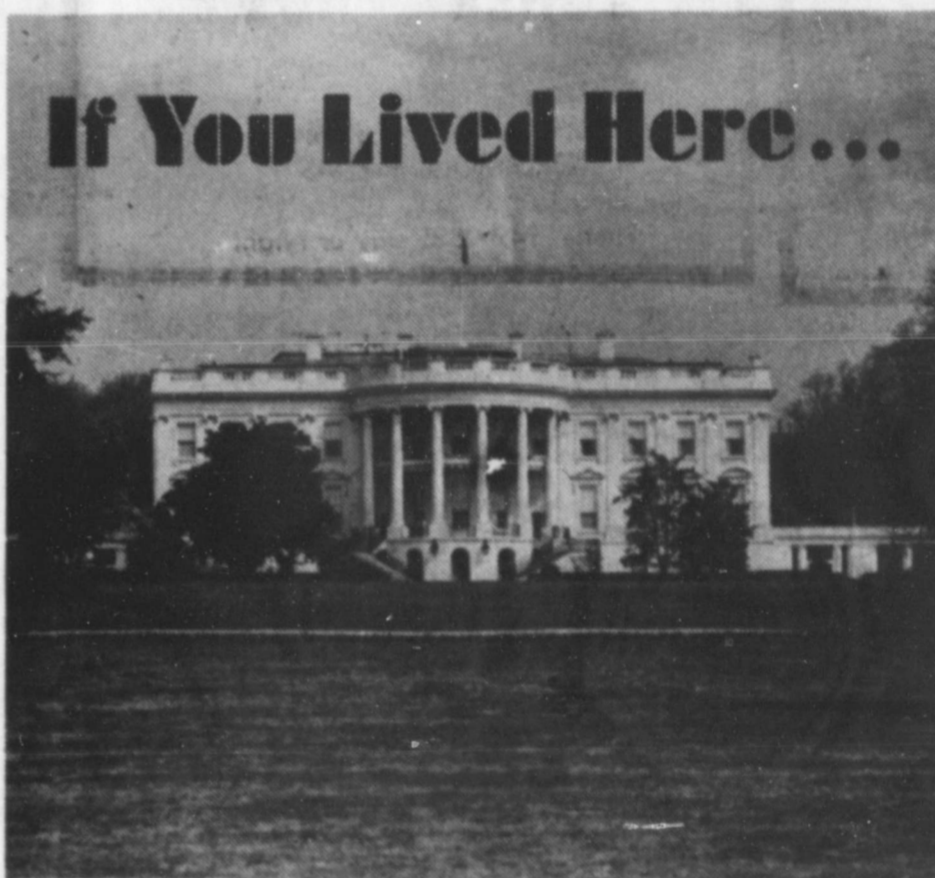

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## PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1973

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 8)

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days.

Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular session or special session.

Provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial estimates.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 7)

Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

Presently a single adult person is not entitled to claim a homestead exemption and a married man can abandon a family homestead without the consent of his wife.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 12)

Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers.

Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a two-thirds majority to a simple majority.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds

for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property tax-payers."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the residential homesteads of unmarried adults.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 1)

Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which:

Provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioners court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such districts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 26)

Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which:

Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distribution, or transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts having jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil appeals.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as between district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 6)

Article III, Section 49-b of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million.

Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those veterans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who serve after September 16, 1940 to buy land from the Veterans' Land Fund, provided they are otherwise qualified.

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 25)

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which:

Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative.

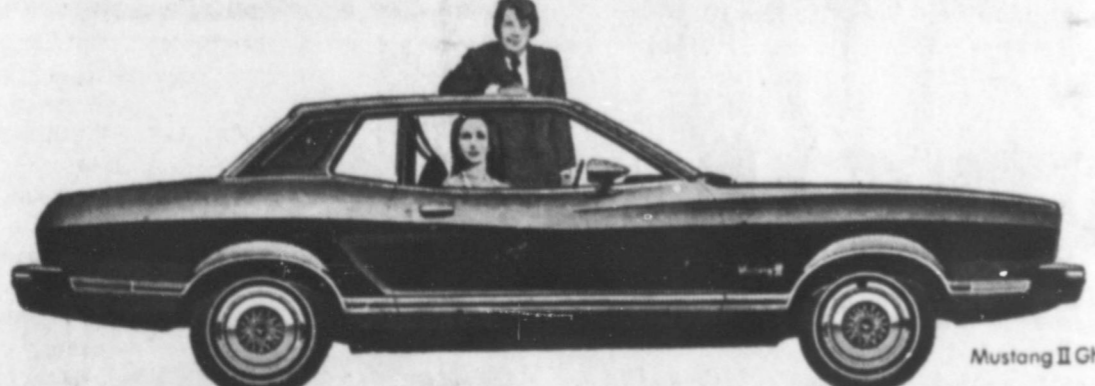
The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

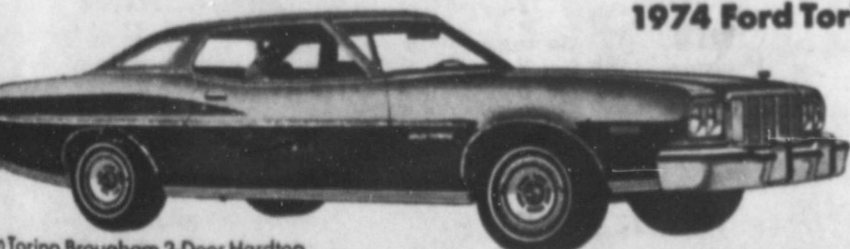

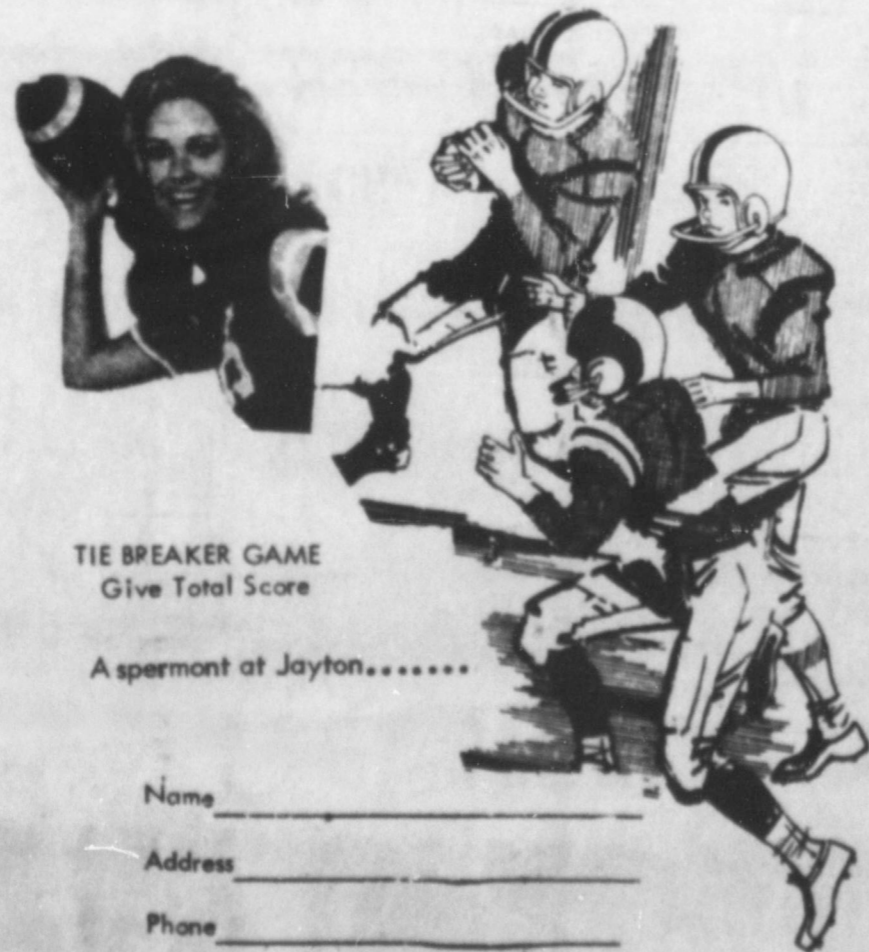

**Peanut Butter Adds Flavor And Goodness to Milk Shakes**

There's no question about it, chocolate is America's favorite milk shake flavor. It is anybody's guess what comes second. Vanilla, strawberry, coffee? Favorite or not, here's one that deserves more recognition. It's a peanut butter milk shake.

To make a peanut butter milk shake, put 1 1/4 cups milk and 1/2 cup creamy peanut butter into an electric blender container. Blend on high speed until smooth. Add 1 pint vanilla ice cream and blend to desired consistency. Makes 3 (8 oz.) servings.

Delicious yes, but nutritious, too. One serving supplies more than a quarter of the protein needed daily by a child and just about a quarter of that needed by an adult. The protein is from the peanut butter and the milk. In addition to the protein, the milk shake is an excellent source of calcium, phosphorus, riboflavin and niacin. The whole milk and ice cream also make it a good source of vitamin A. To reduce the saturated fat, cholesterol and calories, substitute skim milk for the whole milk and ice milk for the ice cream.

For the refuse-to-switch chocolate milk shake fans, substitute chocolate ice cream for the vanilla ice cream, or add 1/2 cup Bosco chocolate flavored syrup.

With either the vanilla peanut butter milk shake, or the chocolate, consider the addition of bananas. Add 1 sliced banana.

If you don't have a blender, make the milk shake with an electric mixer. In the case of the banana shake, mash the banana first. Or mix the milk and peanut butter in a shaker and pour over chunks of ice cream.

In other words -- enjoy a peanut butter milk shake, no matter how you make it or whether you drink it for breakfast, lunch or between meals.

**Peanut-butter Muffins**

- 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup chunk-style peanut butter
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 2 well-beaten eggs
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1/4 cup currant jelly, melted
- 1/2 cup finely chopped pecans, toasted

**Peanut-and-Apple Sandwiches**

- 1/2 cup peanut butter
- 2 tablespoons mayonnaise or salad dressing
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- 1/2 cup finely diced pared tart apple
- 6 slices bacon, crisp-cooked and crumbled
- Buttered bread slices

Blend peanut butter, mayonnaise, and lemon juice. Stir in apple and bacon. Use as a filling between buttered slices of bread. Add lettuce, if desired. Makes 1 cup filling--enough for 4 or 5 sandwiches.
