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## Jaybirds Win Bi-District Game 34-14 Friday In Colorado City

To win a bi-district game is always great when you can do that, and at the same time beat a team that clobbered you the same time a year earlier, then that adds to the joy of the victory, and this is the way the Jaybirds did it in Colorado City on Turkey Day at Imperial Buena Vista.

A year ago probably very few people outside of Jayton knew there was a high school sophomore on the football team named Mark Fincher. But

now he is known far and wide. During the past season he shoved the football more than two thousand yards against the opposing teams. He was not tops in the district in points scored, but no one is listed with more yardage.

Everyone is happy with Mark's achievements, but there are ten more people on the field with him at all times who helped make this possible. One of the fallacies of the modern reporting system is that most of the praise

goes to the player who is touching the ball. But when you read about a big drive by the halfback, you know the boys on the front line, like Tom Hanke, Jack Ussery, Norman Hall, Joe Bob Baker, Terry Favor, and Mitchell Stanley and Allen Kelley have done their jobs well and opened the way.

When you read about Bobby Kelley getting a good pass off to his brother Allen or Billy Johnson, or some other player, you know the blockers in the backfield like David or Mark Fincher, Steve Kidd, or Mike Wilson gave him protection, as well as the front wall holding.

When you read where the Jaybirds pulled off a big victory, like beating the other team 34-14, you know the boys who play defense, like the ones mentioned above, and Don Wayne Jones, and others have done a good job getting the ball back for them.

And of course there are the boys on the bench. Perhaps the hardest thing for a boy to do is take all the hard knocks of the daily practices, and then sit on the bench during the games.

But these boys being there, and ready, many times have won games, when someone comes up hurt or sick. And also later they move on up. Boys like Chuck Kimmel, Timmy Parker and Billy Johnson. Or Alex Garcia, W. L. Mayer, Joe Seaton and Billy Wilson. Also Jimmie Arnold, Les Browning, Otis Chunn, Boyed Dees, Ramon Gomez, Joe Martinez, Johnny Panter, Gary Sumner or Oscar Trevino.

And then a great lot of credit is due the coaching staff. When a team gets better each week, you may be sure the coaches are doing a good job. Jayton's staff includes Jerry English, Bruce Land, Donald Heard, Arlon Alexander and Joe Don Gibson.

And of course that Goin' Band from Jaybird Land helps a bit too. They make a great sound

and put on a good show. The statistics of the bi-district football game, sound like a broken record. With Mark Fincher's name coming up so often. He did score on plays of 9 yards, 7 yards and one for 16 yards and 32 yards Thursday night. But also others were in on the show. Bobby Kelley made a TD from the 2, David Fincher a TD from the one, and another from the 1, also Fincher ran a 2 point play, Mike Wilson took a pass from Kelley for 2 points, Billy Johnson took a Kelley pass for two points and Steve Kidd kicked a point. So the scoring was pretty well passed around.

Jayton failed to get on the scoreboard in the first quarter, but made 24 points in the second, seven in the third, and 12 in the final period, to tack a total of 43 on the board, while holding the opponent to 14 points.

The Jaybirds led in first downs by only 15 to 13. Jayton rushed for 274 yards while Buena Vista was making 162. Jaybirds passes netted 51 yards while the opponent made 44. In the kicking department, the Birds had a big average of 44 yards while the opponent averaged 23.

The Birds had trouble getting along with the officials, getting 125 yards in penalties while Buena Vista were hit for 50. Each team lost the ball twice by fumbles and the Jaybirds had one pass intercepted.

## ASCS To Assist Farm Fuel Situation

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) and the Texas Railroad Commission have joined hands in an effort to increase efficiency in the handling of the mandatory allocation of middle distillate fuels. An agreement between the state and federal agencies should speed up the program.

Beginning immediately, ASCS County Office personnel will verify fuel needs for hardship cases on form OOG-PAP 20 for all applications prior to their submission to the State Allocation Officer (Texas Railroad Commission.)

## Schoolboy Playoff Schedule

00G-PAP-20 is to be issued by wholesale purchasers to request emergency allocations for immediate use. The form has been supplied to ASCS County Offices throughout the State and was made available to County Clerk's offices.

Also available is Form OOG-PAP-17 which is for the use of purchasers of middle distillate fuels in bulk supply to adjust their monthly allocation for the year or for obtaining a new allocation.

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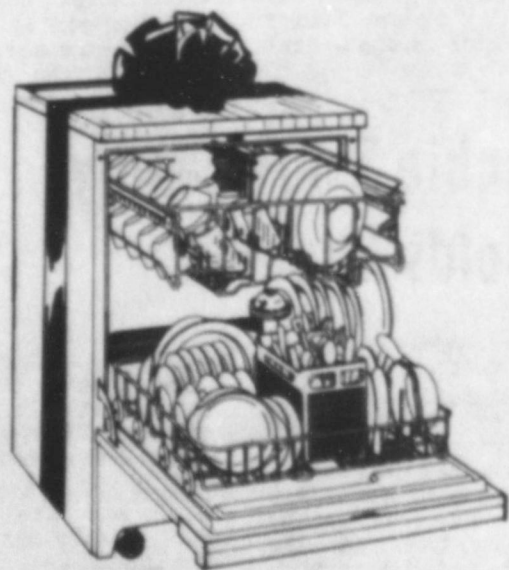
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## Make Plans Before Plowing Your Land

Temple, Texas. Plan before you plow.

That's the plea State Conservationist Edward E. Thomas made today to Texas farmers putting new land into cultivation in 1974.

"Most land in Texas should not be farmed in clean tilled crops without terraces, contour farming, minimum tillage, or other proven conservation measures," Thomas stressed. "Besides, these practices help increase production in the long run."

"But some land should not be farmed under any circumstances," Thomas said. "We are already getting reports of sandy, highly erosive soils in Texas being plowed up for crop production. Let a drought, coupled with high winds, hit this land and massive dust storms will be the result."

He said some steep soils will probably also be put into cultivation next year. Serious erosion and sedimentation damages can result unless sound conservation measures are installed.

Thomas, head of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service in Texas, said

his agency supports full agricultural production as a principal means of checking food price increases.

"But we also need full protection of the land, a long with full production," he emphasized.

He urged farmers to contact local SCS offices before putting land into cultivation.

"Our soil surveys show which soils can be farmed safely," Thomas pointed out. "They also can be used to determine which soils are most productive. Careful planning can hold erosion hazards to a minimum; but carelessness can quickly return us to the disastrous erosion conditions that existed in the 1930's and 1950's he warned."

Such conditions in the Great Plains, where wind erosion is a constant problem, led Congress in 1957 to establish a conservation program to return high risk cropland to grass.

"Under this program in Texas, we have helped farmers convert more than a million acres of cropland to grassland," Thomas said. This

land should remain in grass. For it or other land like it to be put back into cultivation will be a disastrous step backwards.

"As chief guardians of our state's soil resources, farmers and ranchers have a responsibility to themselves and to future generations to use their land wisely," Thomas continued. "They have made great strides in conservation work in the last 35 years. With proper planning, we can meet the demand for food without increasing dust storms, sediment pollution, and other problems caused by accelerated soil erosion."

Farmers are expected to bring thousands of former "set-aside" land back into full crop production in 1974 to meet the increased demand for farm commodities. Many farmers will also farm their land more intensively as they try to increase yields per acre.

SCS works through 193 local soil and water conservation districts in Texas helping farmers, ranchers, and other land users develop and carry out conservation plans.

## Life Not So Bleak For The Retarded

AUSTIN--Not too many years ago, mental illness and retardation were felt to be shameful, and those who were afflicted with these problems of ten were shut away in attic or medieval institutions where they were promptly forgotten.

Fortunately, the life of the mentally ill or retarded is not now so bleak. Many institutions both public and private, exist with the goals of treating their patients as human beings and offering them a future of security and development.

The Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation has made great strides toward providing modern care for the mentally ill and retarded. It administers eight state hospitals which admitted 20,826 individuals in 1972, and 11 state schools with a total resident population of 13,267.

In addition to the state hospitals and state schools, MH-MR administers other programs.

Outreach centers are being established in rural and small communities not served by community centers. Clients are referred to the centers directly, resulting in expanded local services and, in some instances, preventing the need for hospitalization. By the end of 1972, a total of 44 of these outreach centers were in operation.

The Community Mental Health, Mental Retardation Centers themselves are the most dramatic and successful new development in the MH-MR field. They meet the goal of providing services to the individual near his or her home.

In fiscal 1972, more than 61,000 persons were served by these centers. Undoubtedly, without this treatment, many of them would have required hospitalization.

The Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation has been the most visible target of much recent criticism. But I believe they are making a great deal of progress, especially in light of their tremendous need for additional funding.

Money for mental health and mental retardation has never been easy to come by. Now, when people demand decreased

government spending, it is even harder to get. A partial, but not final solution to MH-MR's pressing needs may lie in volunteer programs, which are best exemplified at the Abilene State School.

During the fiscal year ending August 31, 1971, more than 42,000 hours of service were contributed to the 1,900 patients

at the Abilene State School. At a minimum a \$1.50 an hour, this volunteer effort represented a saving to the state of \$63,000.

Volunteer programs are not the answer to all the needs of our mental health care system. However, until adequate funding is available I believe volunteer programs will be an integral of our MH-MR system.

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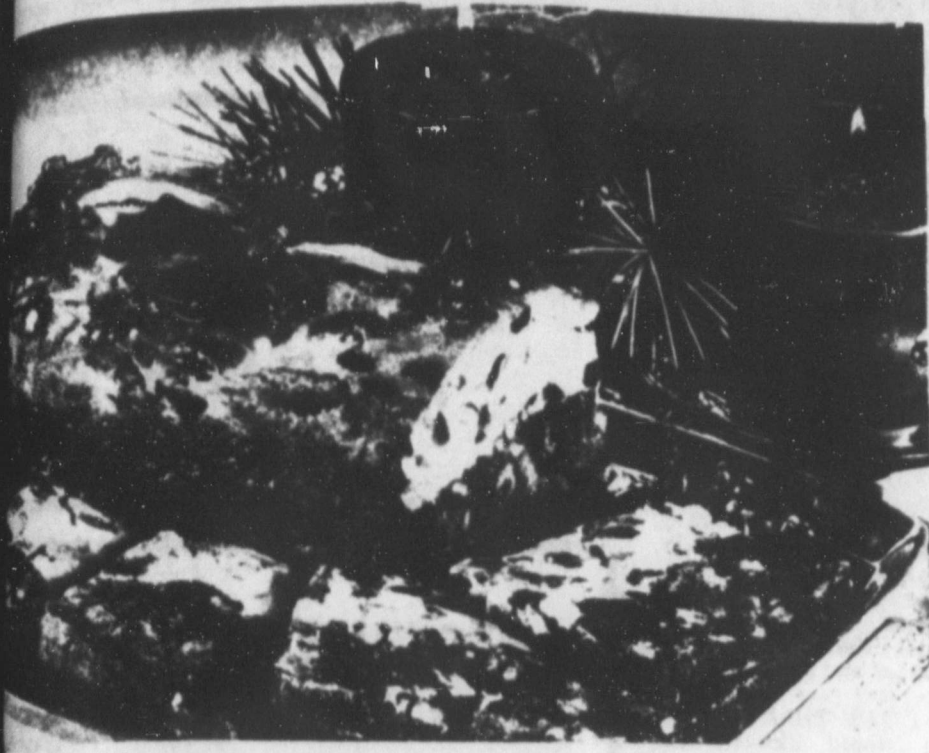

 1/2 cup honey 1/4 cup molasses 4 cups all-purpose flour  
 2 cups chopped walnuts 1 teaspoon cinnamon 2 teaspoons salt

Oil and line two 10 1/4 x 3 3/8 x 2 3/8-inch loaf pans with paper. Oil again. Combine first six ingredients. In another bowl, combine next nine ingredients. Cream together butter or margarine and sugar. Add eggs; beat well after each. Stir in flour and salt. Beat well. Pour half of batter in each bowl; mix well. Spoon half of dark batter into each pan. Repeat with light batter. Bake in 300° oven for 1 3/4 to 2 hours. Cool; remove from pan. Wrap in wine-

**Mother's Christmas Cake**

This Date-Nut Cake was a traditional Christmas cake at our house when I was growing up, as far back as I can remember. Mother used to make it about 3 weeks before Christmas and then set it aside, all wrapped up, so as to ripen, for Christmas.

2 pounds dates  
 4 cups pecan halves  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 1 cup flour  
 1 cup sugar  
 2 teaspoons baking powder  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 4 eggs

Sift dry ingredients together three times, sifting over fruit and nut mixture the last time. Add beaten egg yolks. Fold or work in stiffly beaten egg whites to which vanilla has been added. Let stand for 30 minutes and mix again. Line two 1-pound loaf bread pans with waxed paper. Cut to fit pan and extend 1 inch above top of pan. Grease paper. Pack batter tightly into pans, filling each about one-half full. Cover top of the pans with waxed paper and place pan of water in oven. Bake at 250° F. for 2 hours. Remove waxed paper from top of pans during last 15 minutes of baking.

**WHITE FRUIT CAKE**

1 cup butter or margarine  
 3 cups sugar  
 4 cups flour  
 1 cup milk  
 3 teaspoons baking powder  
 4 egg whites, well beaten  
 1 medium coconut, grated  
 1/2 pound candied pineapple  
 1 pound citron or drained watermelon rind preserves  
 1 pound candied cherries  
 4 cups pecans  
 1 cup almonds, blanched

Leave cherries and pecans whole. Chop almonds. Cut candied fruit into inch cubes. Grate fresh coconut. Combine fruits and nuts and sprinkle with flour. Cream butter or margarine; add sugar gradually and beat until well blended and light. Sift flour, measure and combine with baking powder. Add flour and milk alternately to the mixture, beginning and ending with flour. Add fruits and nuts. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites.

Grease two 1-pound bread pans. Line with brown paper cut to fit pans and extend 1 inch above pans. Grease paper. Pack batter firmly into pans with hands. Cover top with waxed paper and place pan of water in oven under cake. Bake at 250° F. for about 2 hours. Remove waxed paper from top of cake during last 15 minutes of baking.

**CARE AFTER BAKING AND WRAPPING FOR STORAGE**

After the cake is removed from the oven, cool thoroughly in the paper in which it was baked. Then wrap securely in a second layer of heavy waxed paper or moisture-vapor-proof packaging materials such as cellophane, aluminum foil, plicofilm or laminated wrapping paper, and store in a tightly covered container in a cool place. Fruit cakes generally are considered best after 1 to 3 months' storage.

**FRUIT CAKES IN THE FREEZER**

Well-wrapped fruit cakes can be kept in the freezer for 1 year. When ready to use, remove cake from the freezer and thaw. Do not unwrap while thawing.

**MAGIC FRUIT CAKE**

1 pound candied cherries  
 1 pound candied pineapple  
 1 pound pitted dates  
 1 pound shelled pecans (4 cups)  
 1 can sweetened condensed milk  
 1 4-ounce package dry coconut

Cut up the fruit, and chop pecans coarsely. Combine with milk and coconut, mixing with your hands. Pack into waxed paper-lined pans. Bake 1 hour for loaf size cake at 300° F. for 1 hour 15 minutes if baked in stem cake pan. Bake about 45 minutes in small molds.

Remove cake from the oven, turn out of pan. Peel off the paper and let cake cool on cake rack.

Wrap cakes in aluminum foil and store.

**GERMAN FRUITCAKE**

3/4 cup butter  
 2 cups sugar  
 4 eggs  
 3 cups flour  
 1 cup buttermilk  
 2-3 cup apricot preserves  
 2-3 cup pineapple preserves  
 1 cup chopped pecans  
 1 tsp. vanilla  
 1/2 tsp. allspice  
 1/2 tsp. cinnamon  
 1/2 tsp. nutmeg  
 1/2 tsp. baking soda  
 2-3 cup cherry preserves

Cream butter, sugar and eggs until light. Sift dry ingredients together. Add to creamed mixture alternating with buttermilk to which the baking soda has been added. Fold in remaining ingredients. Bake in two 9x5x3 greased and floured loaf pans or 1 large tube pan, greased and floured, at 325 degrees for 1 1/4 hours. Cool in pan 15 minutes before removing.

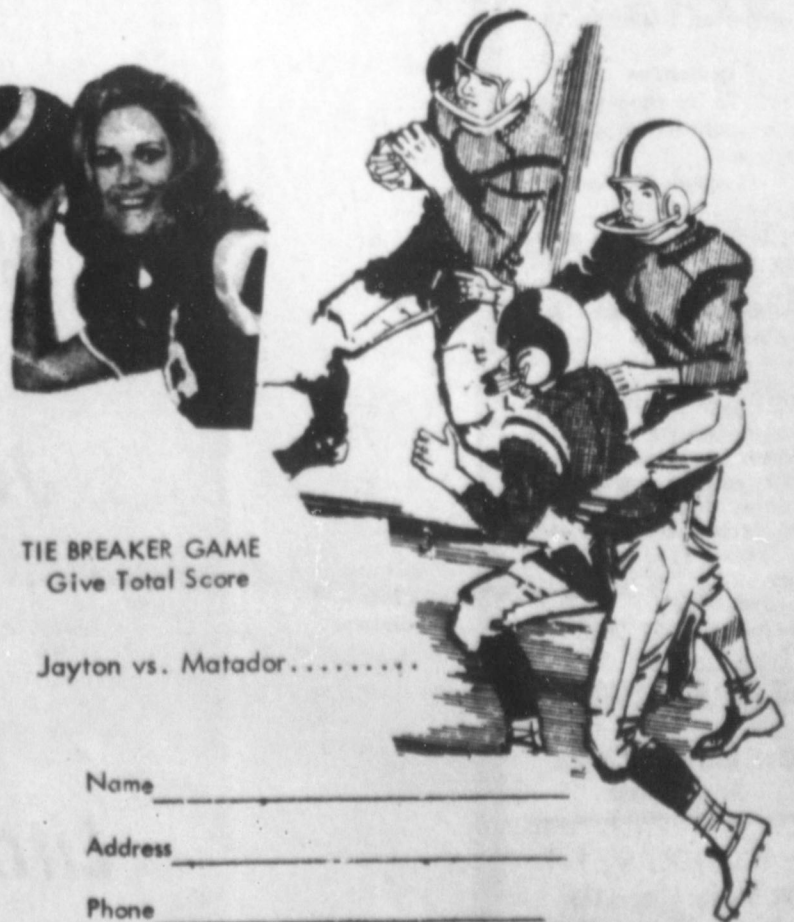
