### Pizza Supper Pie

- 1 stick packaged pastry mix
- 1/2 pound bulk pork sausage
- 3/4 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 teaspoon oregano
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 4 eggs
- 1/2 cup milk
- 4 ounces sharp American cheese, shredded (1 cup)
- 2/3 cup canned pizza sauce

Prepare one 9-inch shell from pastry mix according to package directions, baking in very hot oven (450 degrees) only 7 minutes or just till lightly browned. Remove from oven. Reduce temperature to 325 degrees. Slowly brown sausage and onion, breaking up sausage with fork; drain. Add seasonings. Beat together eggs and milk; stir in sausage and cheese. Pour into pastry shell. Bake in slow oven (325 degrees) 20 minutes or till knife inserted in center comes out clean. Spread top with pizza sauce. Serve immediately. Makes 6 servings.

### Beef and Cheese Wedges

- 1 slightly beaten egg yolk
- 1 cup packaged biscuit mix
- 2 tablespoons milk
- 1 1/2 pounds ground beef
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon Italian seasoning
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 slightly beaten egg
- 1 slightly beaten egg white
- 2 cups cream-style cottage cheese
- 1/2 cup (2 ounces) shredded process Swiss cheese

Form into ball; turn out onto floured surface. Roll pastry to 1/8 inch thickness; fit into 9-inch pie plate and flute edges. In skillet, combine ground beef, onion, salt, Italian seasoning, pepper and garlic. Cook till beef is browned. Drain off excess fat; spoon meat mixture into pastry shell. Combine egg, egg white and cottage cheese; spoon over meat mixture. Bake in 375 degrees oven for 15 minutes. Top with Swiss cheese; bake 10 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

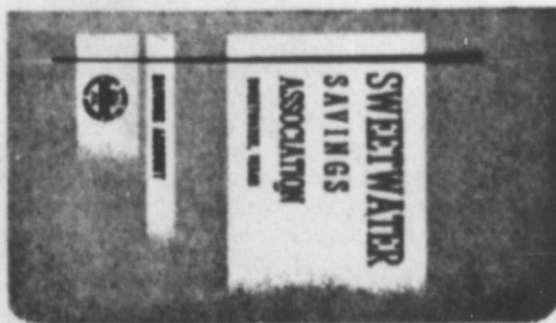

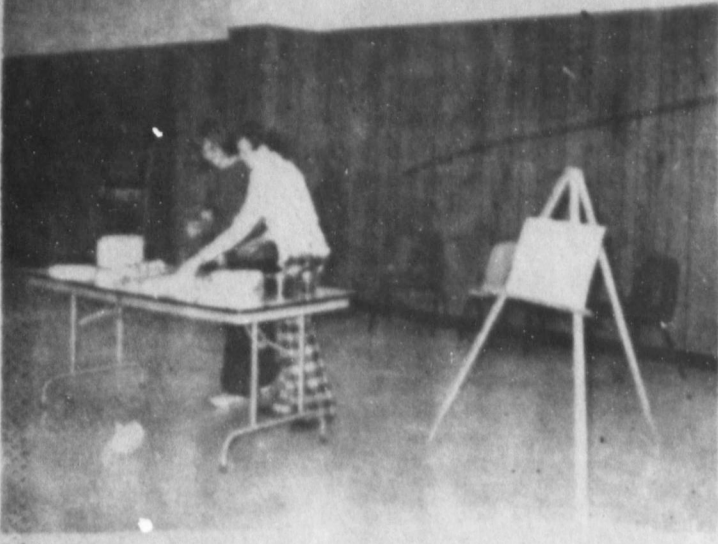

**Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election**

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Tabor, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots

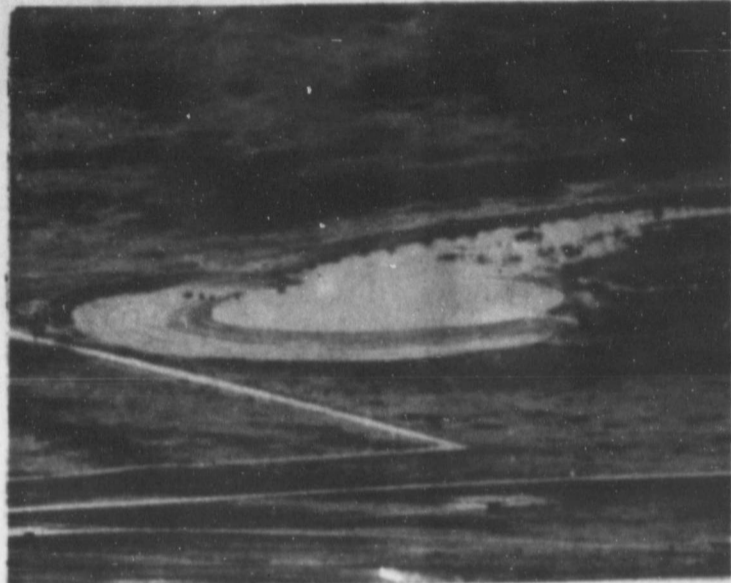

Stock ponds like the one pictured here, if properly stocked and managed, can provide fishing for farm and ranch families and their friends.

**Proper Maintenance Can Improve Your Fishing Waters**

Too often a land owner will stock a pond with fish and then never do anything else to it. Then unless the pond has enough natural breeding places the fish population will usually decline, and fishing will not be very productive. This can be prevented by providing artificial breeding places by placing large rocks piled in the pond to provide holes for the female to lay eggs in and raise her young. Short lengths of old pipe or empty oil drums can also be used to serve the same purpose.

Fertilizing a pond will also increase fish production and is simple to do using 8-8-2 fertilizer or the nearest equivalent. The cost is minimal when the results are considered. Fertilizer should be applied throughout the growing season at about 10 day intervals, generally from March through October. Fertilizer can either be applied by broadcasting or by submerging on a platform.

Control of unwanted aquatic vegetation can also help improve your fishing waters but if chemicals are used only those chemicals that have been cleared and approved for this use by the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency should be used. On new ponds the elimination of excessive shallow water (water less than 3 feet deep) during pond construction will aid in preventing this vegetation.

If you want to improve your fishing waters your local Soil Conservation Service personnel will be glad to furnish you more information and technical assistance.
