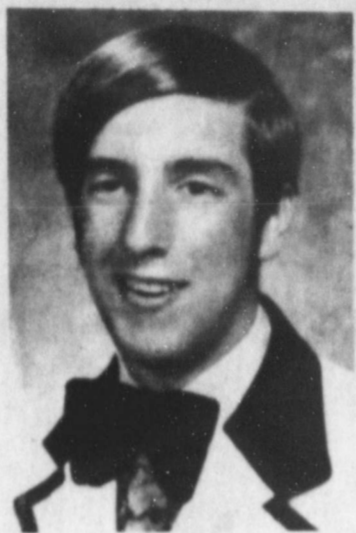

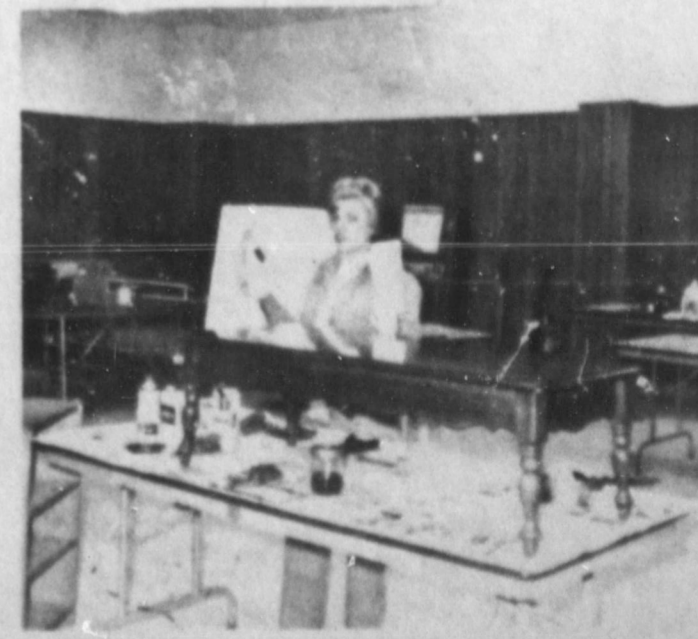

Grocer Hawkins put up no resistance as the youthful robber cleaned out his cash register. To Hawkins, the young man's pistol was all too real.

But in fact, the pistol was a toy. When the robber was later caught and brought to trial for "armed robbery," he insisted that the charge would not stand up.

"The simple truth is," he told the court, "that I was not armed at all. That gun I had couldn't hurt a flea."



Nevertheless, the court decided he was guilty as charged. The court said what mattered was not the actual character of the gun but the way it looked to the victim.

Most courts agree. That is, they view the holdup weapon "through the eyes of the beholder." They reason that the essence of the crime is putting the victim in fear, which can be done as effectively with a gun that only looks deadly

as with one that really is. There have even been cases of "armed robbery" in which the robber had no weapon at all. Thus, another holdup man terrified his victim merely by showing a menacing bulge in his coat pocket.

Yet, a court decided this was enough basis for a charge of armed robbery. The court said the fear that the robber had a gun, plus the fear that he might use it, was all that the law required by way of intimidation.

Still, the fear must be at least of physical harm—not of a lesser form of pressure. Suppose A says to B:

"Unless you hand over \$500, I'll get you in trouble with the Internal Revenue Service."

If B says off, A may be guilty of some offense—but not robbery. As one court put it:

"There can be no robbery without violence. The menace must be of a sort to excite reasonable apprehension of danger. Threat of prosecution for a crime is regarded as insufficient (because) a man in the hands of the law is not legally presumed to be in danger of bodily harm."

FDR

On April 12th, 1945, President Franklin Roosevelt, the only man ever elected President four times, died at the "little white house" in Georgia; thus ended the political career of a man both bitterly detested by some opponents and idolized by millions.

History has shown Roosevelt knowingly maneuvered the United States toward entrance in World War II, but with honorable intentions. He felt this the proper course for America. Nevertheless, it is true, as critics charge, that he ordered war action against Germany in the Atlantic which made war almost certain; by cutting off oil shipments to Japan he pushed the Japs into a corner from which they had to come out fighting or curtail their aggression. The Japs decided to fight, of course.

While these maneuvers forced the issue, it remains true that German and Japanese aggression and atrocities produced the war—not Roosevelt's clever maneuvering of these governments into striking the official blow.

As for domestic policies, a vast number of reforms and social services resulted from the Roosevelt years. It is to Roosevelt's everlasting credit that he brought new hope to a nation sunk deep in despair and depression when he took office in 1933. The little man who was fighting to keep his home, or to get food for his family in those days, always afterward felt Roosevelt his champion—which indeed he was to millions.

The Truth--30 Years Later

Thirty years after the greatest battle ever fought by Americans in Europe the full story of that epic struggle (in the Ardennes) is available for the first time to the average reader—in paperback.

Earlier books about the Battle of the Bulge have been written and films (notoriously inaccurate) have been made about that German offensive, which began December, 1944, but "Hitler's Last Offensive" is the first account to offer the complete story to the layman.

An Englishman, a tank commander in the battle, is the author of the Ballantine book—Peter Elstob. He has painstakingly recreated the crisis, the greatest battle in western Europe in World War II, fought almost totally between Germans and Americans.

For many years the sensational story of that last German offensive has captured the attention of writers and historians—the fact that the Germans broke through U.S. lines and advanced sixty miles. But that was inevitable, considering the much greater strength of German ground forces.

What "Hitler's Last Offensive" shows clearly for the first time is that the overwhelming majority of U.S. Army units surprised by the mighty German onslaught at Dawn December 16th fought bravely and ferociously. This heroic defense in the first day or two of the battle fatally delayed the German timetable. (The Germans hoped to race to the Meuse River, then turn right and encircle hundreds of thousands of American and British troops, closing the trap with the recapture of Antwerp.)

Since many of these desperately-fighting U.S. units were surrounded and cut off and, in the end, overwhelmed, their story has not been well known. Elstob tells it well, and completely, and it is a story, and history, Americans can be proud of.

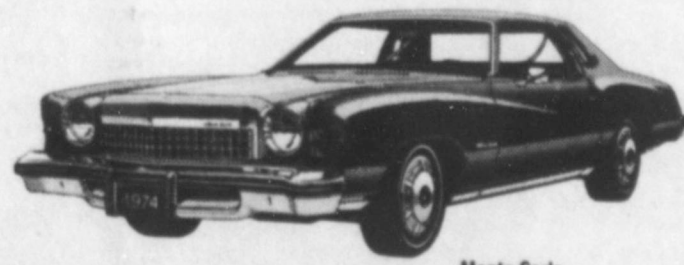

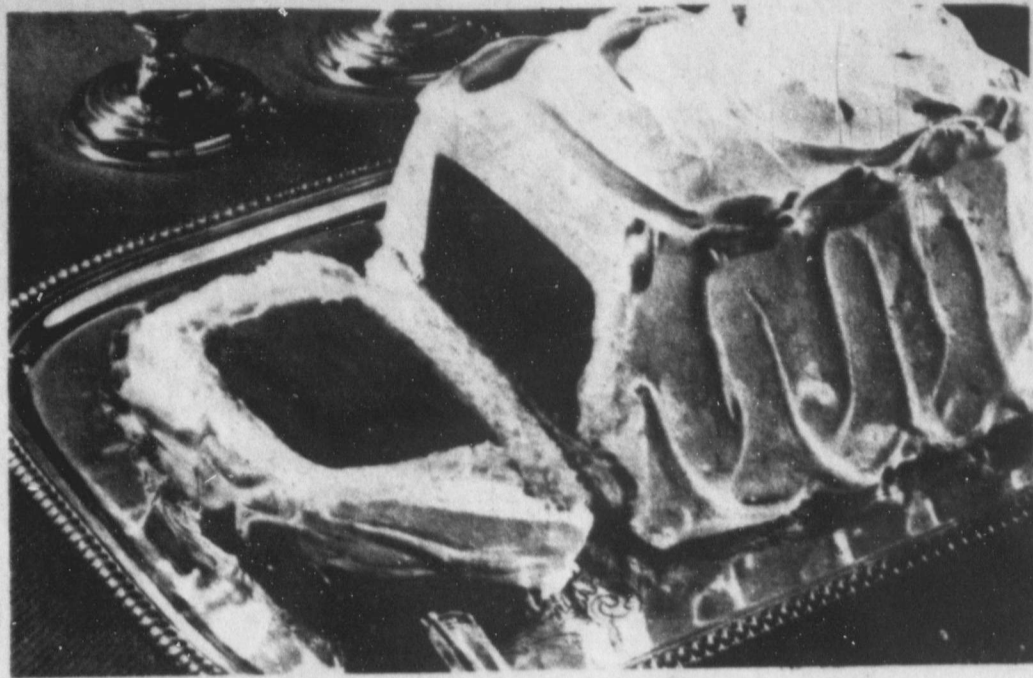

Quick Desserts For Your Easter Dinner



Baked Alaska

- 6 egg whites
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1 sponge layer cake
- 2 pints of Ice Cream square packages

Beat egg whites until foamy. Add salt, cream of tartar and vanilla. Beat until almost stiff enough to hold a peak. Gradually add sugar, beating until stiff enough to hold sharp peaks, but

not dry. Cover wooden board with brown paper. Place cake on center of paper on board. Cake should be at least 1-inch wider and longer than ice cream. Turn ice cream out of containers on-

to center of cake. Cover ice cream and cake completely with meringue. With a spoon, swirl surface to make peaks. Bake in an extremely hot oven (500 degrees F.) until light golden brown,

about 3 minutes. Remove from paper and board; place on a cold tray or cake plate; serve at once. Makes 6-8 servings.

NOTE: Baked Alaska may be prepared ahead of time and stored in freezer for several days. In which case, prepare Alaska but do not bake. The Alaska should be frozen solid quickly and then wrapped in freeze-wrap paper. Five minutes before serving, remove freezer wrapping and bake.

ORIGINAL NO-BAKE

Millionaire Pie

- 1 (9-inch) baked pie shell
- 3/4 stick butter or margarine
- 1/2 pound powdered sugar
- 1/3 cup egg yolks (about 3 yolks)
- 1/4 teaspoon vanilla

Have butter or margarine at room temperature. Add all other ingredients to butter and whip until light and fluffy. Pour into baked pie shell and spread with topping.

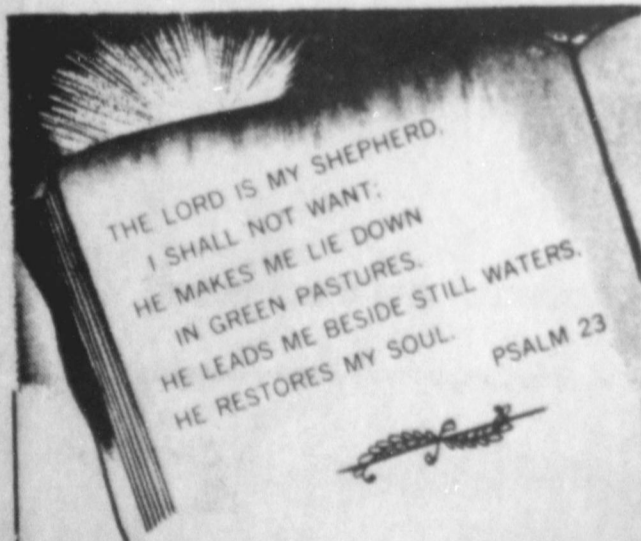
- Topping
- 2/3 cup whipped cream
- 3 tablespoons powdered sugar

- 2/3 cup crushed pineapple, well drained
 - 1/3 cup chopped pecans
- Whip cream, add sugar slowly and fold in pineapple and pecans. Pile topping on pie and refrigerate for several hours.

Easter, 1974

Easter, the principal ecclesiastical event of the year, gets its name from Eostre, a Teutonic goddess, whose festival was celebrated in the spring. Her name was given to the Christian festival, as it was she, according to legend, who opened the portals of Valhalla to receive the White God and Sun God, representing purity and light.

The Christian observance, this year on the 14th, is a symbol of the Resurrection, and intertwined with many religious customs and observances, some dating back hundreds of years before the time of Jesus Christ.

The Easter egg became associated with Easter because eggs were forbidden to be eaten during Lent and on Easter Sunday they were traditionally served. The Easter egg, though, dates back to the Egyptians and Persians, and also the Greeks and Romans, who ate eggs annually in spring festivals.

In any event, it's appropriate that Easter comes in the spring, when the renewal of life is so apparent. Sunrise services in our churches--an observance of recent origin in most churches--symbolize the Resurrection at sunrise. This practice is observed in practically all churches today as a symbol of hope, inspiration and faith.

Children's Television

Scandalous conditions which characterize children's television in this country are the subject of a damning study long locked in a Federal Communications Commission safe. This is, of course, only the latest indication, of many, that the FCC is more inclined to serve the interests of the major networks than to regulate commercial television in the public interest.

The report on children's television, which protests that misleading and downright untrue commercials flood every hour of children's television, also blasts the violence, noise and general content of the programs themselves.

In other words, what the great miracle of television is being used for in this country is not to creatively entertain, inform and improve our children's minds. Rather, it is harming children so that the network and corporations seeking to influence them can make more money.

All this is done in the name of free enterprise in this country. In most other countries, children's television programs are carefully regulated to insure they are appropriate, truthful and helpful to the child.
