

## For State Senator On Republican Ticket

A Plainview school teacher who has been active in area and state Republican party circles for many years has announced her candidacy for nomination as the Republican candidate for state senator from the 30th senatorial district in the May Primary.

Mrs. Mary Virginia Kirchoff, who presently teaches at the 30th District state committee woman for the GOP, made the announcement in her home in Plainview.

Having lived in Texas for many years, she is a native Missourian and a graduate of Texas Christian University, attended Wayland Baptist College and Texas Tech University.

Mrs. Kirchoff is an instructor in speech and English in Coronado Jr. High school in Plainview. She will take a leave of absence to campaign for state post.

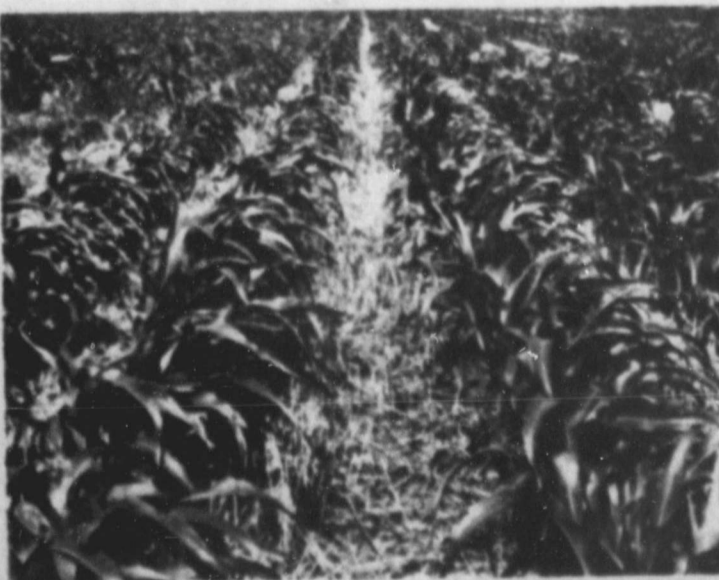

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## Girl Baseball

In a recent New Jersey civil rights hearing it was ruled that a boys' baseball team (Little League) must admit girls; otherwise, the ruling alleged, girls are discriminated against.

One can understand a desire among some girls, perhaps some parents, to play on Little League teams. In a sense, it seems that any girl good enough should be able to make the team. That's a democratic principle.

But what the nation must accept, in courts and lower bodies ruling on discrimination, is that boys and girls are different. All the courts and commissions in the world can't change that. And one wouldn't want it changed. Common sense tells us that youngsters should be allowed to compete in certain forms of athletic competition among members of their own sex. The vast majority of both children and parents want it that way.

Well-meaning individuals sometimes forget this simple, common sense logic and, in a crusading, or idealistic spirit, seek to force girls into athletic competition with boys. One can understand such efforts, but the interests and welfare of the majority must take precedent over an individual or exceptional case—at least at the school-age level involving the under-aged.

If women or girls want to compete on the pro level, they should have every legal right to do so, even in the grim world of pro football and Major League baseball. They would, of course, already have done so in these sports if that made any sense but it doesn't; they cannot compete equally in either, or in tennis, golf, basketball, etc., and that's why they have their own play on the professional level.

## Dangerous Precedent

The indicting of eight National Guardsmen in Ohio, for their part in the shooting of students during the rioting and confrontation at Kent State University in 1970, is unfair to the Guardsmen.

Consider their plight. They are called out, obey orders, and make a mistake in judgment. Who can expect ordinary law-enforcement citizens not to sometimes make mistakes when under provocation, when convinced they themselves are threatened?

Some provoke unrest, riots, turmoil and even act physically and illegally to seize buildings and threaten the public safety; then, when reacting law enforcement officials trying to maintain peace make a mistake, they become the villains and the demonstrators heroes.

Law enforcement is hard, dangerous work, at modest pay. Those engaged in it cannot be expected to behave perfectly at all times, and they cannot be hauled into court and tried if, under provocation, they unintentionally make mistakes. That has always happened and will always happen—until we find some way to give law enforcement jobs only to perfect human beings, with unlimited patience, no fear, no nerves, no emotions and with no instinct for self-preservation.

Moreover, if law enforcement individuals become convinced they can be, years later, dragged into court and tried for their errors trying to enforce the law, found guilty for mistakes made under pressure or provocation or while in danger, that will put an end to law enforcement.

That would be a far greater national tragedy than the loss of innocent lives, which unquestionably is a tragedy and which sometimes happens in riots. The answer is not to incite riots.

## Her Brother's Keeper?

When Kate's brother became a widower, she moved in with him and took over the care of his household. Three years later, he too passed away. At the probate of his estate, Kate put in a claim for "services rendered."

"Although my brother and I never discussed money," she told the court, "I just took it for granted that eventually I would be paid for my work. After all, I didn't have to do it. I was not my brother's keeper."



But the court disagreed and rejected her claim. The court said the natural presumption was that Kate had helped her brother for reasons of affection, not money. If she expected payment, added the court, she should have made that clear from the start.

Questions of this kind arise often in probate proceedings, when claims for services rendered to the deceased must be dealt with. As a rule, the closer the relationship between the claimant and the deceased, the more likely the court is to say that the services were given free.

But the individual circumstances can make a big difference. In another case, a man sought payment for carpentry, painting, and cement work he had done on the house of his late brother.

This time, the brothers had been living separately, with their own separate families. In this situation, the court decided that the claimant could reasonably have expected to be paid, even without any agreement to that effect.

The extent of the services, too, may be a factor. A sister who took over the management of her brother's home also took over the burdensome task of nursing him. He was seriously ill, and needed almost constant attention.

After his death, a judge ruled that the sister was indeed entitled to wages for her efforts. The judge said that even for a loving sister, this was an extraordinary amount of service.

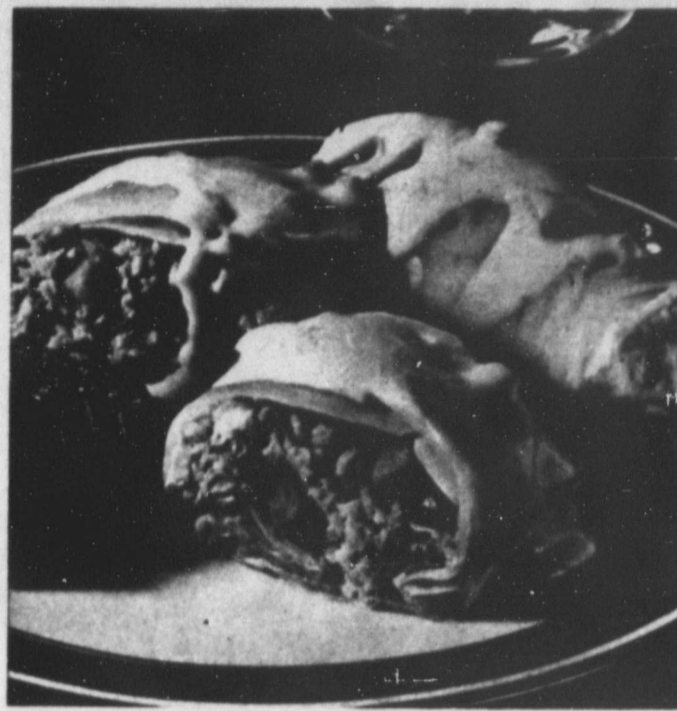

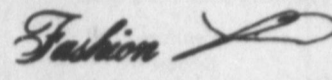
Ham-stuffed Cabbage Rolls

1 cup narrow noodles  
 1/2 of a 10-ounce package (1 cup) frozen peas and carrots  
 10 large cabbage leaves  
 1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup  
 1/2 cup milk  
 1 pound cooked ham, ground (about 3 1/2 cups)  
 1/4 cup chopped onion  
 1 beaten egg  
 Cook noodles and peas and carrots according to individual package directions; combine and set aside. Cook cabbage

leaves in boiling water for 5 minutes. Combine soup and milk; heat and stir till blended. Combine 1 1/3 cups of the soup mixture, the ham, noodle mixture, onion and egg. Spoon 1/3 cup ham mixture onto each cabbage leaf; fold in sides and roll ends over meat. Place rolls in 11 3/4 x 7 1/2 x 1 3/4-inch baking dish; pour remaining soup mixture a top. Cover; bake in 325 degrees oven for 1 hour. Makes 5 servings.

Ham Salad

1 1/2 cups diced cooked or canned ham  
 6 hard-cooked eggs, coarsely diced  
 1/2 cup diced celery  
 1/2 cup sliced sweet pickles  
 1/3 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing  
 2 tablespoons prepared mustard  
 1 tablespoon lemon juice  
 salt and pepper

ABOUT YOUR HOME

By April Rhodes

April is lawn fertilizing month. Don't overfertilize. It's better to add two applications about four weeks apart.

If you notice leaf yellowing on your pyracantha, roses, or gardenia, apply a little iron sulfate.

To clean a favorite iron skillet that has a thick coating of grease on the outside, put it on the hot coals when you finish grilling outside.

When cutting marshmallows or chopping dates, dip your scissors into water to prevent them from sticking.

If you peel too many potatoes, cover the raw potatoes with water and a few drops of vinegar and place them in refrigerator. They will keep three or four days.

To prevent gummy noodles, macaroni and spaghetti, add two teaspoons of cooking oil to the water before cooking.
