## No Kent Accidents In Month Of April

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated no accidents on rural highways in Kent County during the month of April, 1974, according to Sergeant Frank Jircik, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1974 shows a total of two accidents, resulting in no persons killed and three persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for April, 1974, shows a total of 390 accidents resulting in 19

persons killed and 218 persons injured as compared to April, 1973, with 544 accidents resulting in 24 persons killed and 283 persons injured. This was 154 less accidents, five less killed, and 65 less injured in 974 at the same period of time.

The 19 traffic deaths for the month of April, 1974, occurred in the following counties: three in Palo Pinto, two each in Moore, Terry, Wilbarger, and Lynn; and one each in Gray, Hutchinson, Randall, Swisher, Jack, Lynn, Stonewall, and Wise counties.

## Dickens Rural Electric Gets New REA Loan

Congressman Omar Burleson announces approval of \$369,000 REA loan to the Dickens County Electric Cooperative Inc., with headquarters at Spur, serving Crosby, Garza, Kent, Stonewall, Dickens, King and Motley Counties.

The purpose of the loan is to finance service for

213 additional consumers, to finance 50 miles of distribution line and to finance system improvements, including substation facilities.

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This column predicted early in the Watergate hearings, that, in our opinion, if President Richard M. Nixon fails to serve out his elective term, it will be the members of his own party, and not the Democrats who force him out. This looks more like a true prediction each passing day.

True, the Demos are giving him a bad time, and on any given day, many of them are pointing out his shortcomings, but they really don't want him out of office.

Any Democrat campaigning for office, has a made-to-order issue against his GOP opponent. And the Republicans running for reelection are hard pressed on just how to handle the issue. They say Nixon's problems is not a party matter, but they really know they are wrong.

Electors already held, prove this. Out of five staunch GOP Congressmen who have met Democrats in elections so far, four of them have been defeated by just ordinary politicians of the opposition. This proves, and all Republicans know it, that Watergate is a serious issue for them all. And, this is the reason the Democrats are just stalling around in the matter of removing Nixon.

But now you can see the handwriting on the proverbial wall. Almost daily some important Congressman, Senator, Governor, or some newspaper that has always supported RMN right down the line, comes out and states it is time for Nixon to take out and resign.

Nixon is quoted this week as saying that he will not resign "Even if hell freezes over" but this sounds exactly the way Agnew sounded, just before he was forced by the Nixon people to resign.

It can already be seen, that Nixon's making public the edited transcripts of his tapes is backlashing on him. Friday morning's edition of the transcripts in the Lubbock-AJ sounded very much to me like he and Dean and Halderman were plotting together to establish the cover-up. After reading only the first two newspaper pages of the transcripts, if this was all of them there were, and I were on the jury, I would have to admit they sound like to me he was working with his aides to help sweep the matter under the rug, and not have the truth out in the public.

It has always been true, that when a person is in serious trouble, he panics, and every decision he makes from that time on, is a mistake, and gets him in even more trouble. Ever since Nixon went on television about this time last year, and said he was taking the blame for Watergate, because the mistakes were made by people working for him, but denied any guilty knowledge of the matter, he has been making major blunders that shove him deeper and deeper into trouble.

One thing he failed to rightly appraise in making the transcripts public, was public reaction to all the deletions and editing out from the tapes. I think this will hurt him worse, than the actual things that are made public.

Another thing, you read these transcripts, and see all the places edited out, and read what he actually discloses, and it will give you one idea very strongly--he certainly considered himself to be in trouble, and was grabbing at a straw--to hand this out to the public.

I think the big swing over by leading members of the Republican party is just now getting into high gear, and before the General elections this November it will get so hot that RMN will throw in the towel.

Right now he thinks his so called accomplishments in the field of foreign affairs will get him through the fire of opposition, but I doubt that--- What do you think?

## THE FAMILY LAWYER

### Heroic Doctor

Two workmen digging at a construction site were buried to the waist by a sudden cave-in. A doctor, passing nearby, rushed to the scene and gave lifesaving first aid until they could be rescued by other workmen.

But the doctor himself suffered painful injuries. Was he entitled to collect damages from the construction company, on the ground that its negligence had caused the cave-in?



In a court test, the company said it was not liable. "We admire his courage," said the company, "but anyone who ventures voluntarily into danger does so at his own risk."

However, the court said the doctor was indeed entitled to a damage award. The court said the company should have foreseen not only that workmen might be trapped but also that rescuers might rush in and get hurt too. As one judge put it:

"Danger invites rescue. The cry of distress is the summons to relief. The wrong that imperils life is a wrong to the imperilled victim; it is a wrong also to his rescuer."

Generally speaking, the law pays due respect to the heroic impulse. In fact, most courts will favor a rescuer even when the danger is merely to property not human life.

Thus, a man injured while trying to stop a rolling automobile was awarded damage later from the car owner, who had failed to set his brakes. The court said saving property, although less urgent than saving life, is nevertheless a laudable course of action.

Still, the law does not condone outright recklessness. Another case involved a woman who was killed by a freight train while trying to pull her dog off the tracks. She had leaned over even though the train was in plain sight, bearing down fast.

Under these circumstances, a court ruled, her family could not hold the railroad responsible for the tragedy.

"A person is not excused from the consequences of his own acts in exposing himself to danger," said the court. "where the peril is so obvious."

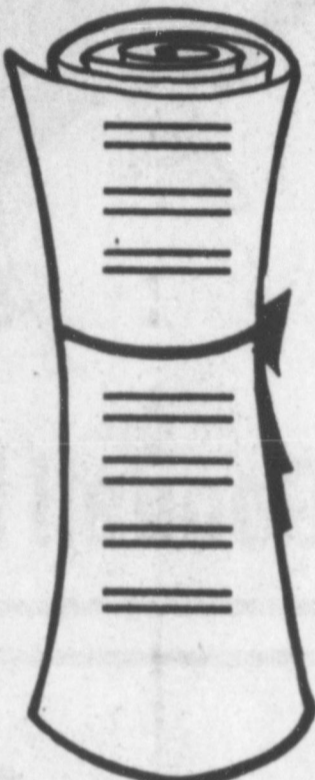

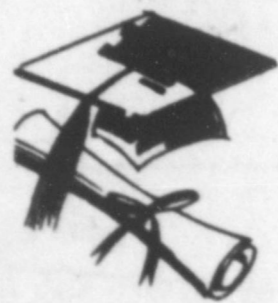

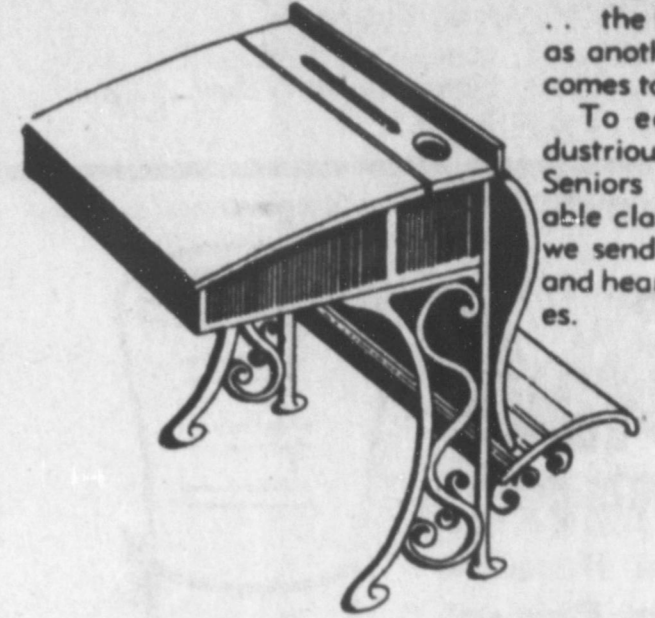
