Newest Farmers Home Administration Program Is Moving Ahead

J. Lynn Futch, State Director, Farmer's Home Administration Temple, Tex. has announced the promotion of Ormel I. (Jack) Boyd to Chief, Business and Industrial Programs (B&I). Boyd has served as B&I Specialist for the past year, assisting with implementation of new guaranteed loan authorities assigned to FmHA by the Rural Development Act of 1972, Public Law 92-419.

Activity in the new program of providing loan guarantees to aid in business and industrial development in towns and cities of up to 50,000 has exceeded expectations according to Futch. He noted that eight conditional commitments to guarantee loans of \$29.2 million were authorized in the past fiscal year. Since July 1, 1974, ten commitments for \$1.6 million have been issued. Futch said fifty-eight requests for loan guarantees of \$16.6 million are presently being evaluated or applicants have been advised to complete formal applications for final feasibility determination. Boyd has been a member of the State Director's staff since 1968, serving as Community Programs Specialist until 1973. He completed twenty years federal service in 1974. All his service has been with FmHA except for military duty in World War II. Boyd was FmHA County Supervisor in Seguin, Guadalupe County from 1959 to mid 1968. He received special recognition in 1967 for his work with rural groups and communities on rural water systems. During 1957-58 he served as Assistant County Supervisor in Richmond, Fort Bend County. Prior to employment with FmHA, Boyd taught vocational agriculture for eight years. Boyd is a graduate of Texas A&M University and holds BS and MS degrees in Agriculture Education. The new Chief, B&I Programs, is a native of Chilton, Falls County. He and his wife, the former Marjorie Beasley of Trent, Taylor County, have two sons, Don, a senior Aggie Band member at Texas A&M, and Alan, a freshman at Tarleton State University, Stephenville.

Texas Highway Patrol Investigates Accident

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated one accident on rural highways in Kent County during the month of September, 1974, according to Sergeant Frank Jirick, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area. This crash resulted in no persons killed and two persons injured. The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1974 shows a total of three accidents resulting in no persons killed and five persons injured. The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for September, 1974, shows a total of 471 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 213 persons injured as compared to Sept., 1973 with 601 accidents resulting in 24 persons killed and 364 persons injured. This was 130 less accidents, seven less killed, and 151 less injured in 1974 at the same period of time. The 17 traffic deaths

for the month of Sept., 1974, occurred in the following counties: two each in Moore, Lipscomb, Parmer, Haskell, and Parker; and one each in Castro, Deaf Smith, Hartley, Oldham, Randall, Hale and Lamb.

Texas Soybean Association

DALLAS--A 20-foot mural of a soybean field will be part of the Texas Soybean Association display at the Texas Department of Agriculture Food and Fiber Pavilion at the State Fair Oct. 4-20, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Soybean recipes - including one for Soybean Chili - will be distributed to fairgoers and information will be given on export of the beans, their use in the United States and their nutritional value.

Products made from soybeans like cooking oil and milk for infants who cannot drink human or cow's milk will also be displayed.

Disease Hurts Women More Than The Men

Women are making tremendous inroads against discrimination in all areas today, but one remains a granite roadblock. For reasons medical science doesn't understand, rheumatoid arthritis -- the most common severe form of the disease -- strikes women three times as often as men.

According to The Arthritis Foundation, of the more than 50 million victims of all forms of arthritis in this country, nearly two-thirds are women, including many in their early 20s or younger.

In addition, most women over 45 have some degree of osteoarthritis, the milder of the two main types of arthritis. One of the rarer types of arthritis a potentially fatal disease, systemic lupus erythematosus, attacks women almost exclusively.

But rheumatoid arthritis, which usually strikes between the ages of 20 and 45, is of considerable concern not only because it afflicts some five million American but because of its potential for permanent crippling.

However, medical researchers believe that women can be invaluable in studies of the disease because of the potential vital link between their biology and the symptoms of the disease.

For example, it has been shown that arthritic symptoms often increase during menstruation. In contrast, the symptoms seem to decrease during pregnancy, only to flare up again after delivery. As a result, scientists suspect that the natural hormonal changes in the female body make women particularly

susceptible to arthritis. Because rheumatoid arthritis usually strikes in the prime of life, it can incapacitate a career woman or render a housewife incapable of being a homemaker. The disease costs American families about one billion dollars a year in lost homemaker services and another \$3.5 billion in lost wages.

Unfortunately, a woman can't be "liberated" from arthritis. There is no cure. But that doesn't mean she can't live a full life.

The key to success in overcoming prejudice of arthritis lies in a long-term treatment program under medical supervision. Physicians emphasize that pain can be alleviated and crippling prevented through modern medical techniques. This may include a regimen of medication, prescribed exercises, regular rest periods, and special devices as aids to daily living.

Despite labor saving devices around the home, today's women are often busier than ever. Many who work long hours at home or in business don't get enough rest or relaxation. While this can be a drain on the health of any woman, it is a special burden and potential danger to the woman with arthritis.

For such women, The Arthritis Foundation has a few words of advice. The agency suggests relaxing your housekeeping standards, taking a day's rest between major house cleaning. They are also advised to avoid overweight, fatigue and emotional stress -- all of which can have a negative impact on the course of the disease.

Cost-Price Squeeze Hurts State Dairymen

AUSTIN--Though feed prices have remained close to the record high \$133 a ton this year, the average price paid Texas dairymen for milk has declined to \$8.25 per hundredweight, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.

The average price paid last year was \$8.90 a hundredweight when feed costs ran an average of \$116 a ton.

"This cost-price squeeze is exerting terrific pressure on our livestock and dairy people," White said. "Our entire livestock industry is currently operating on the red side of the ledger."

Figures reveal that wholesale prices of most dairy products tumbled sharply in the second quarter of 1974. Farmers averaged \$7.88 per hundredweight for all milk in June, down \$1.06 from the March high.

Milk in August averaged only 75 percent of parity and milk for manufacturing use dropped below 75 percent of parity, more than five points below the minimum of 80 percent prescribed by law.

White said the high cost of feed has also influenced the amount of milk being produced. Domestic production in July 1973 and 1974 was the lowest for the month since 1936 when there was a major drought and depression.

Decline is based on reductions in the use of protein supplements in dairy food, White said. Cost on 16 percent protein mixed dairy feed has increased by 25 percent.

Meanwhile, during the first four months of the year, 1.7 billion pounds of dairy products were imported, more than doubling the .7 billion pounds of past years. Imports have slackened since May.

The Commissioner said a "flexible and orderly system of farm exports is necessary to our balance of payments abroad."

He added, however, "It is essential that our export program be rigidly monitored on a day-to-day basis. We need to take a hard-nosed look at

each exported commodity and determine its effect beforehand on our economy."

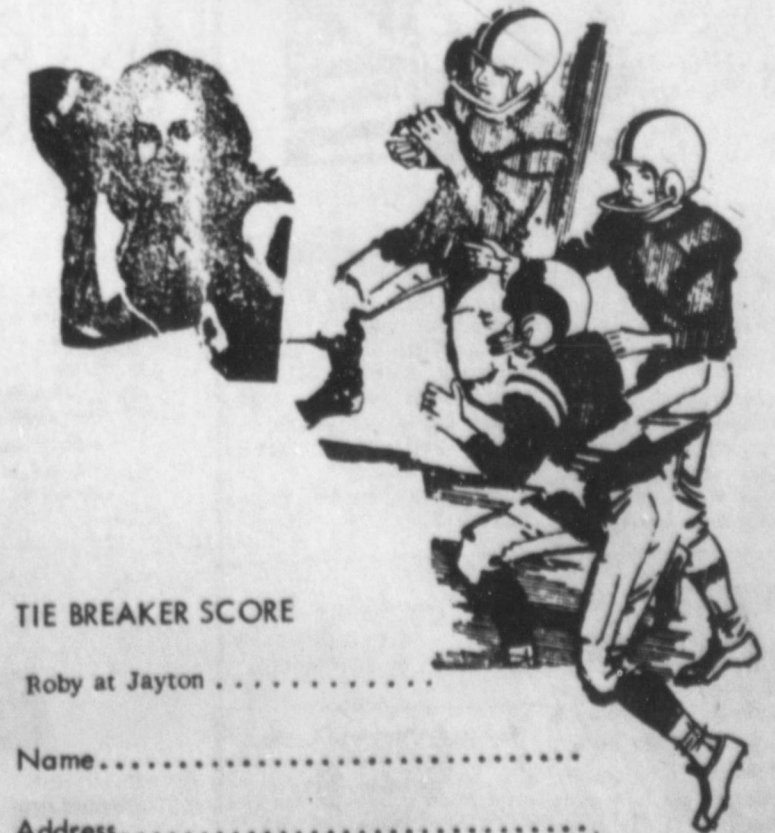

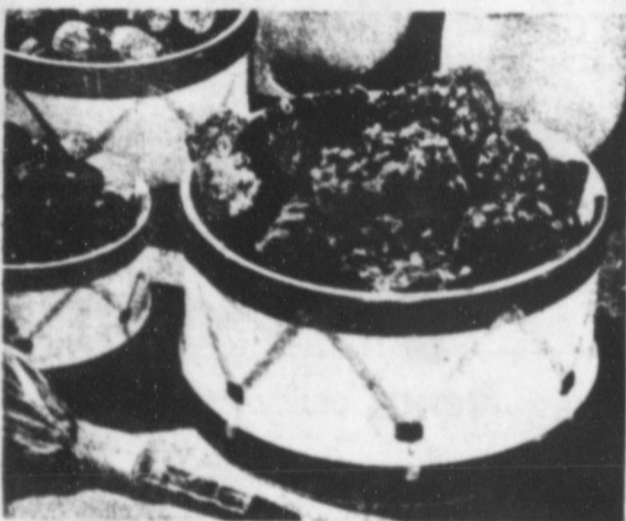
GET SET FOR Halloween



Witch's Brew

2 qts. apple cider
1/2 c. brown sugar, firmly packed
2-inch piece stick cinnamon
1 tsp. whole allspice
1 tsp. whole cloves
Mix cider and sugar in sauce pan; add spices. Heat mixture slowly to simmering; cover; simmer 20 minutes. Strain. Serve hot in warm mugs. Makes 2 quarts.

Chocolate-Peanut Bars

1/2 cup light corn syrup
1/4 cup brown sugar
Dash salt
1 cup peanut butter
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 cups crisp rice cereal
1 cup corn flakes, slightly crushed
1 6-ounce package (1 cup) semisweet chocolate pieces

Combine syrup, sugar, and salt in saucepan; bring to a full boil. Stir in peanut butter. Remove from heat. Stir in vanilla, cereals, and chocolate pieces. Press into buttered 9x9x2 1/2-inch pan. Chill about 1 hour. Cut in small bars or squares. (For easy serving, store in refrigerator.) Makes about 2 dozen.

Pop Corn Balls



10 cups popped corn
Sprinkle over popped corn and mix in 1 teaspoon salt
Set aside. Combine in a saucepan 1 1/4 cups white corn sirup
3/4 cup light molasses
1 tablespoon vinegar
Boil rapidly to 250 F (hard ball stage, remove from heat while testing). Remove from heat and stir in 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
Gradually pour hot sirup into center of the corn. With a long-handled fork, quickly stir and coat corn with sirup. With buttered hands, gather and press corn into firm balls.
10 large 20 small popcorn balls.

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THE FAMILY LAWYER

Wrong Victim

One winter's day, Art, a teenager, was amusing himself by hurling snowballs at passing cars. One snowball missed its target and struck a pedestrian across the street, injuring his eye. Could Art be held liable for assault and battery?

In a court hearing, his lawyer said no. "Art had no wrongful purpose toward this man," went the lawyer's argument. "Hitting him was purely accidental."



However, the court ordered Art to pay damages. The court invoked the doctrine of "transferred intent," by which an original wrongful intent—in this case, the desire to hit the passing car—was transferred to the accidental consequences.

This widely recognized doctrine is based on the law's reluctance to let a wrongdoer get off scot-free. It has even been applied in a case of mistaken identity. Thus:

A man snaked up behind another man, thinking he was an old antagonist, and bashed him on the head. Actually, the victim happened to be a total stranger.

But that didn't help the first man when he was haled into court afterward to face a damage claim. Applying the doctrine of transferred intent, the court had no trouble finding him liable.

On the other hand, the doctrine will not apply if there was no wrongful purpose in the first place.

Suppose, for instance, that a woman who is being chased by a mugger throws a rock in his direction. And suppose the rock misses the mugger and hits an innocent bystander.

Under these circumstances, the woman could not be held responsible for injury to the bystander, because she had acted in legitimate self defense. With no wrongful intent to begin with, there would be nothing that could be transferred into legal liability.

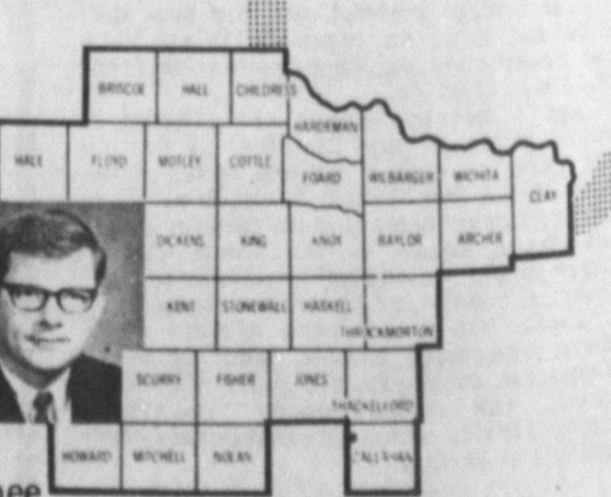
