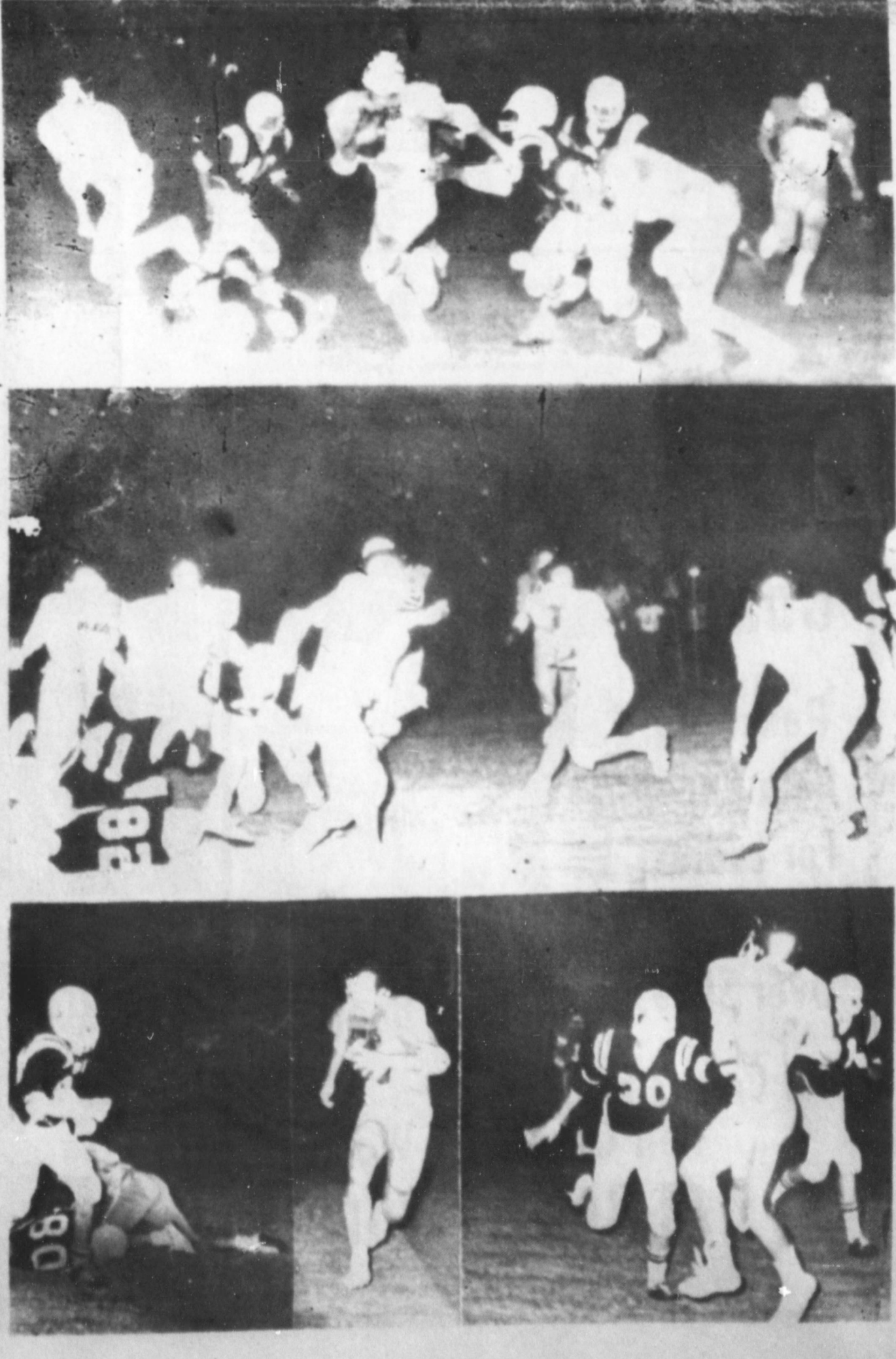
70 Lambs For County Show

Notes From The Kent County Agent

Peach-tree borers may be controlled in the fall when the soil is dry and temperature is 55 degrees F or above. Treat trees after the 20th of Oct. and before the 15th of Nov. with PDB crystals. This is a material also used in moth balls. Weeds should be re-

moved from around the tree and the soil loosened and leveled about 1 foot from the tree trunk. PDB crystals should be placed in a narrow circular band in a groove about 2 inches from the tree trunk. For 2 or 3 year old trees, use one-half ounce of crystals. For 4 or 5

year old trees, use three fourths ounce and one ounce for older mature trees. Place several shovels of clean soil over the crystals and mound the earth into a cone-shaped pile around the tree. Remove the earth mounds in the early spring.

Animals that graze on pasture or forage that has recently been hit by a frost are subject to prussic acid poisoning. Among grasses that are especially toxic to animals after a frost are Johnsongrass, Sudan, and other sorghum hybrids.

Prussic acid poisoning is a disease which prevents oxygen in the blood from reaching the tissues and thus causes death due to suffocation. Symptoms of the disease are suffocation and muscular twitching, and the animal may have his turned toward his flank. The blood of the animal has a bright red color. Animals usually become affected within 10 to 15 minutes after eating toxic material and rarely survive more than one or two hours.

Livestock should not be allowed access to wilted material after a frost until it has dried completely. Grazing should also be prevented after a rain when new sprouts begin to form on plants. Wilted material will usually dry out in a day or two of strong sunlight. New growth usually becomes non-toxic within a week to 10 days after a rain and can then be grazed safely by livestock.

If you're not sure about your pasture, have a veterinarian check it with a picrate test or have a sample checked in a lab. One way to check a pasture is to turn out a less valuable animal that has been without hay or grass for 24 hours. A hungry animal will fill up faster and show toxic symptoms if the plant material is dangerous. If you think your animal shows signs of prussic acid poisoning, don't hesitate to call a Vet. immediately.

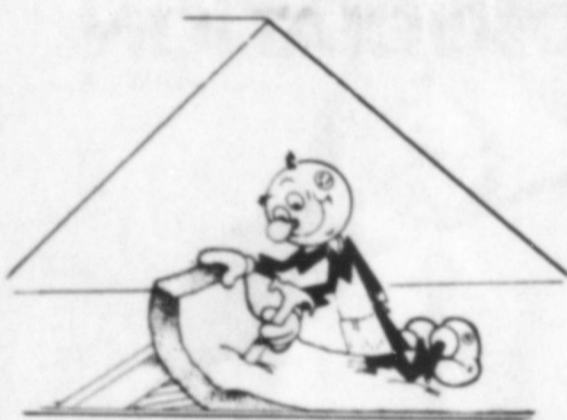

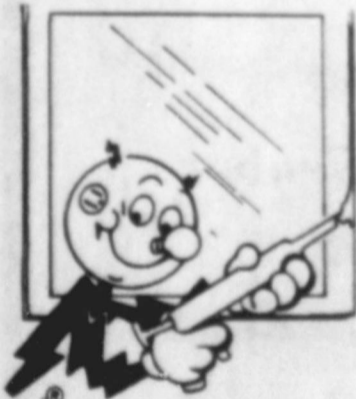

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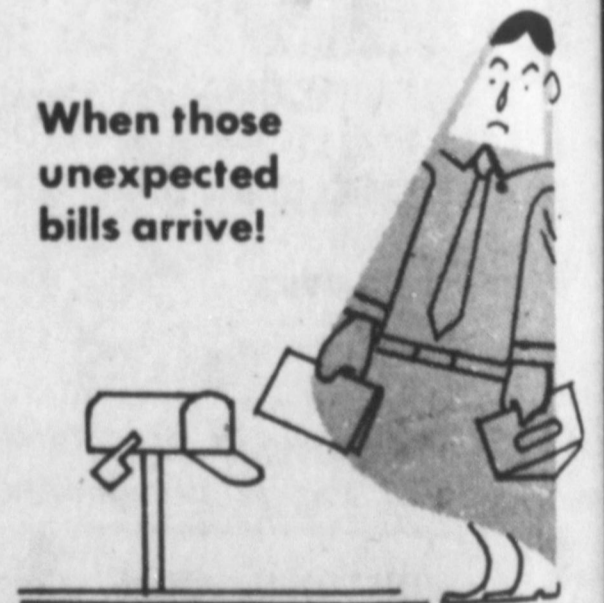

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Granting Credit Under the Quarter System

Under a semester system one unit courses will be offered for (160 clock hours) three quarters. One-half unit courses under a semester system will be offered for either one quarter or two quarters under the quarter system. Some (one-half unit) courses will be reduced from 80 to 60 clock hours of instruction while others will be increased from 80 to approximately 120 clock hours of instruction. Decisions concerning which courses are offered for one or two quarters will be made after each course is examined individually. Courses for high school will be granted as follows:

Semester Plan		Quarter Plan
1 unit	becomes	3 quarter units
1/2 unit	becomes	1 or 2 quarter units
Proposed Graduation Requirements (State Minimum)		

Under the quarter system, it is proposed that three quarter units will be granted for each 160 hours of instruction successfully completed. To receive a high school diploma, all pupils must complete 52 quarter units.

The required units include the following subjects:

Students may meet the graduation requirements with 1/2 semester unit or 2 quarter units in American Government. Students who accumulate units under both systems shall recompute their total number of semester units into quarter units by multiplying the cumulative units of credit by three. In the event that a student has a half unit of credit in his cumulative semester units, the half unit shall be rounded to the next quarter unit.

For example:

Freshman 4 semester units
 Sophomore 4 1/2 semester units
 8 1/2 semester units multiplied by 3 equals
 25 1/2 quarter units which would then be rounded off to 26 quarter units.

Under the quarter system, one-half credit courses such as electives are to become quarter courses. Schools may operate beginning and advanced courses if they elect to do so and grant quarter credits for each course.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Pet Coyote

In their back yard, the Martins kept a pet coyote on a chain. Although they considered him harmless, they warned youngsters in the neighborhood to keep their distance. But one day a boy ventured too close and got bitten. Sued afterward for damages, the Martins insisted in court that the coyote had never bitten anyone before. Nevertheless, the court held them liable. The court said the law is less interested in the characteristics of the individual animal than in the characteristics of the species.



Most courts agree that the keeper of a wild animal, even if it is seemingly tame, carries a heavy responsibility in case of an injury. (Of course, there may also be a local ordinance forbidding such pets altogether.)

Where is the dividing line between "wild" and "tame"? Generally considered wild are such animals as lions, tigers, bears, and wolves. Generally considered tame are such animals as cattle, sheep, horses, dogs, and cats.

Then there are assorted animals near the borderline, like deer, mules, and monkeys.

To some degree, the law's classification depends on the customs of the community. The elephant, held tame in Burma, was held wild in Ohio. The camel, held tame in Australia, was held wild in California.

Even if the animal is classified as wild, the keeper will usually not be blamed for an injury to someone who was guilty of deliberate provocation or recklessness. In one case a youth disregarded both a barrier and warning signs to approach a leopard in a cage.

Slashed by the leopard, he later demanded damages from the animal's owner. But the court threw out his claim. The court said, in effect, that the victim had gotten what he had asked for.

All businesses in the book have been inspected by a Texas Department of Agriculture inspector before a license was issued.

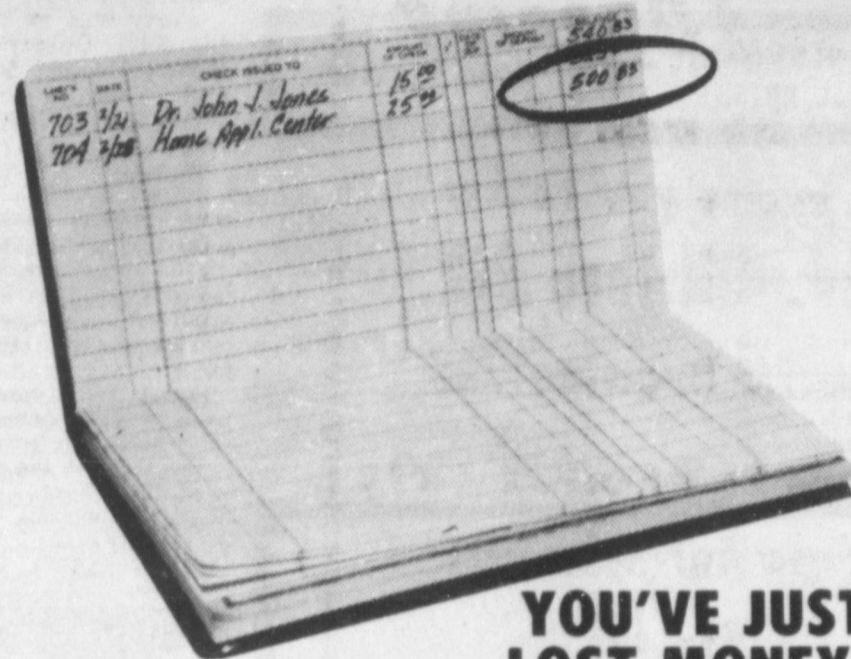

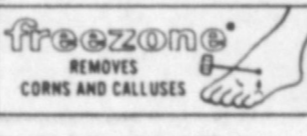
