Could You Stop In Plenty Time

If a small child suddenly dashed out into the street in front of your car, COULD YOU STOP IN TIME? Many people say, "I can stop on a dime."

Students of Jayton school will have an opportunity at 1:30 p.m. Nov. 21 to see for themselves the distance required to stop a car in an emergency, while participating in a Farm Bureau sponsored traffic safety program, according to Preston Cleveland, Principal.

The program, in two parts, will be given under the direction of Ben Bullard, Waco, Assistant Safety Director, Texas Farm Bureau.

During the first part of the program, Bullard will discuss Texas traffic safety, in addition to outlining procedures to be followed during the second part demonstration.

The group will then be directed to the street in front of the school to witness driving tests at 20, 30, and 40 m.p.h.

Bullard rides in his special equipped car with each of the drivers. The safety belts are used during the test. During each test, the equipment signals the driver to make a panic stop and marks that exact spot on the street. Two more spots are marked (1) where the brakes are first applied and (2) where the car comes to an exact and complete stop. Students and teachers will get a "panorama view" from their safety vantage point.

Student assistants, using a steel tape, measure the reaction and braking distances in exact feet and inches. Following each stop test and measurement, Bullard will announce the results over his auto public address system for each member of the audience to mark their personal card.

This public service traffic safety program, presented before high schools across the state since 1957, is being brought to Jayton under the sponsorship of the Kent County Farm Bureau.

High School Students Eligible For Texas Health Career Plan

The Texas Health Careers Program will present a Health Careers Assembly for Jayton High School Tuesday, Nov. 26, 1974, at 10:00 a.m. The unique presentation by Mr. Spencer Guimarin, Director of the Texas Health Careers Program, is designed to introduce exciting career opportunities in health care to all students.

The Texas Health Careers Program is a project of the Texas Hospital Education and Research Foundation and was begun in 1964 by the Texas Hospital Association because of a severe shortage in all health manpower categories. During the past seven years the Texas Health Careers Program has presented assemblies to more than a million Texas high school and junior high school students.

Seniors Vie For Betty Crocker College Scholarships

The 21st Annual Betty Crocker Search for Leadership in Family Living, a \$111,000 college scholarship program sponsored by General Mills, gets underway Tuesday, Dec. 3. High school seniors here and throughout the country will join in a written knowledge and attitude examination which will determine individual college scholarships awards of \$500 to \$5,000.

Participating seniors will compete in a 50-minute examination prepared and graded by Science Research Associates, Chicago, who are also responsible for all judging and selection of winners. The local winner will receive a specially designed award from General Mills and will, together with other school winners, remain in the running for state and national honors.

State winners -- one from every state and the District of Columbia -- will each be awarded a \$1,500 scholarship. Chosen in judging that centers on performance in the written examination, state Family Leaders of Tomorrow will also earn for their schools a 20-volume reference work, "The Annals of America," from Encyclopaedia Britannica Educational Corporation.

Second-ranking participants in each state will receive \$500 college grants. On April 20-25 of next year, the 51 state Family Leaders of Tomorrow will gather in Washington, D. C., for an expense-paid educational tour of the capital city and Williamsburg, VA. Personal observation and interviews of the state winners during the tour will be added factors in the selection of the 1975 Betty Crocker Family Leader of Tomorrow and three runners-up. Scholarships awarded to the four national winners will be \$5,000, \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000. A \$1,000 Nutrition Scholarship is also awarded to a student planning a college major in nutrition or a related field. More than nine million students have been enrolled in the Betty Crocker Search since its beginning in the 1954-55 school year. With this year's grants, total scholarships awarded will exceed \$2 million.

Confident Drinker

Fred was haled into court on a charge of drunk driving, after a blood test showed an alcoholic content of more than .15%. According to local law, this created a presumption that he was "under the influence."
 But in his defense, Fred argued that such a presumption was unconstitutional.
 "No two individuals are alike in their ability to tolerate alcohol," he said. "I happen to be able to hold my liquor better than most people."



However, the court upheld the presumption and found Fred guilty as charged.
 "Medical science," said the court, "has established a rational relationship between the percentage of alcohol in the blood and (the) condition of being under the influence of alcohol. Sobriety decreases as the percentage increases."

The idea of a presumption of intoxication, at a certain alcoholic level in the blood, has spread nationwide. Almost invariably, it has been held to be constitutional.
 Nor can a motorist avoid taking a sobriety test on grounds of self-incrimination. Traffic laws usually provide that a motorist consents in advance, when he takes out his driving license, to submit to testing or lose the license.

Of course, the test must still be administered properly to stand up in court. Suppose that the equipment was inadequate. Or that too much time elapsed between the arrest and the test. Either circumstance could invalidate the results.
 In one case, the officer who had administered a sobriety test acknowledged at the trial that he was not well trained in operating the device.

Result: the defendant motorist was set free. The court said the law would not automatically accept test results as valid merely because they happened to come out of a machine.

Food Labels To Tell More By Next Year

Nutrition labeling—already cropping up on some foods at the supermarket—is one way shoppers can be sure they're not spending their food dollars for "empty calories."

New federal regulations and laws—passed in response to consumer requests—require that by 1975 all fortified foods and all foods for which a nutrition claim is made must display certain information on labels.
 The required information will include the serving size, number of servings in the package, and the calories, protein, carbohydrates, and fats in a serving.

In addition, labels must tell the amount of Vitamins A and C, thiamine, riboflavin, niacin, calcium, and iron in the package contents. Cholesterol, fatty acids, and sodium content also may be included.

Basically, the information will provide a way for consumers to compare nutritive values of different foods.

Specialists say the best comparisons can be made between foods which can be easily substituted for each other. For example, calories can be compared in canned peaches, pears, and apricots. Vitamin contents can be weighed for salmon, tuna, and albacore.

Substitutions should be made only for foods that are alike. Milk, for example, shouldn't be substituted for asparagus. Specialists point out that both milk and green vegetables should be included in a nutritious diet since both contain different but required nutrients.

Rented Cow Causes Stir In Alaska

Quite a few city children have never seen a cow, and some don't even understand where milk comes from.

This lack of knowledge about cows, milk, and nutrition is even more acute in the remote areas of Alaska.

School and health officials in one such area recently put on a campaign to "rent a cow" from a farm near Anchorage to help children learn more about nutrition.

Students themselves raised enough money to fly the cow to town and feed it for a week. Cash receipts from all farm commodities in the nation totaled a record \$88.5 billion, up from the previous high of \$60.9 billion in 1972.

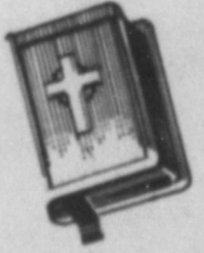

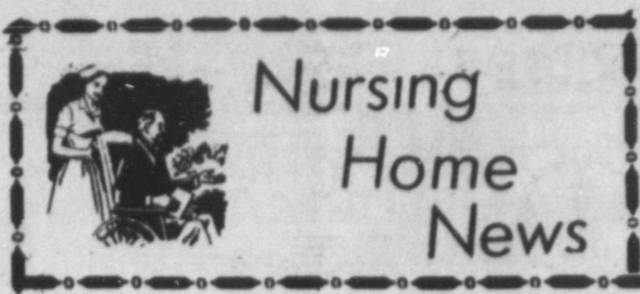

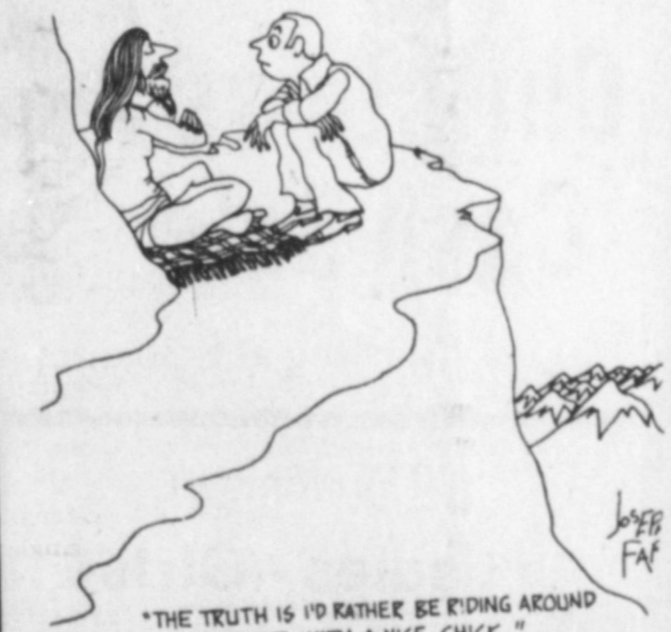
Parents Taking Own Advice?

Could be that parents who urge their children to eat more vegetables are now taking their own advice.

Over the past five years, the average American has increased his vegetable eating by a whopping 13 pounds. Last year's per capita consumption—including both fresh and processed varieties—was pegged at 223 pounds. Use of tomatoes and tomato products, which account for half of all canned vegetables, gained five pounds per person between 1967 and 1973. Canned peas also enjoyed a bigger demand last year, after some lagging previously. Frozen vegetable use—not including potatoes—perked up in 1973 after holding steady since 1970.

Most of the growth was due to the success of frozen corn on the cob, according to agricultural statisticians.

Kent County Farmers Are Now Available for Farm Loans

County Judge Norman Hahn has received word from J. Lynn Futch, State Director of Farmers Home Administration of Temple, that farmers and ranchers in Kent County who sustained production losses and physical losses as a result of drought from Aug. 1, 1973 through Sept. 15, 1974 and hailstorms June 3 and 11, 1974 may be eligible to receive an emergency loan from the Farmers Home Administration.

Those who have not received an emergency loan to assist them in recovering from their loss may apply for such a loan at the Farmers Home Administration county office at 3423 Avenue P, P. O. Box 1194, Snyder, Texas, before the close of business Aug. 15, 1975.

These loan applications will be taken under the terms of a new law (F. L. 93-237) enacted Jan. 2, 1974. Individual examination will be made each application to determine date of the disaster occurrence and emergency loan benefits for which the applicant is eligible.

Loans based on qualifying production losses may include funds to reimburse applicants for production expenses which went into damaged or destroyed crop and livestock enterprises, but not to produce new crops during 1975. Payment terms depend on the purposes for which the loan is used and the applicant's payment ability. No loan may exceed the actual loss sustained. The interest rate for these loans is 5 percent and there will be no principal cancellation. These loans must be secured by crops, livestock, farm machinery, or real estate.

Favorite Recipes



CHEESE-TOPPED PUMPKIN PIE

- Pumpkin pie and cheesecake all in one—
- 1 1/2 cups canned or mashed cooked pumpkin
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 2 slightly beaten eggs
- 1 1/4 cups milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 9-inch unbaked pastry shell with edges fluted high
- 8-ounce package cream cheese, softened
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Dash salt
- 2 eggs

Thoroughly combine pumpkin, the 1/4 cup sugar, the pumpkin pie spice, the 1/2 teaspoon salt, and the ginger. Blend in the first 2 eggs, the milk, and the first 1 teaspoon vanilla. Pour into unbaked pastry shell. In mixer bowl, combine cream cheese, the 1/4 cup sugar, the remaining vanilla, and salt. Beat in remaining eggs, one at a time, pour evenly over pumpkin mixture in pastry shell. Bake in 400° oven for 35 to 40 minutes or till knife inserted just off-center comes out clean. Chill. Garnish with pecan halves.

ITALIAN COCONUT CHEESE PIE

- 3 eggs
- 1 pound ricotta cheese
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/4 cup cookie coconut
- 1/4 cup mixed candied fruit, finely chopped
- 1 baked 9-inch Coconut Crumb Crust, cooled

Beat eggs; add cheese, sugar, salt, and vanilla. Blend until almost smooth. Stir in coconut and candied fruit. Spoon into crumb crust. Bake at 350 degrees for about 40 minutes, or until lightly browned. Cool before serving. If desired, garnish with candied fruits and toasted blanched almonds. (Before cutting, dip pie pan briefly in hot water to loosen crust from pan.) Makes 1 9-inch pie.

COCONUT CRUMB CRUST

- 1 1/2 cups (approximately) flaked coconut
 - 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted
 - 2 tablespoons sugar
 - 1/4 cup fine graham cracker or gingersnap, vanilla wafer, or chocolate water crumbs
- Combine coconut and butter. Add sugar and crumbs, mixing thoroughly. Press firmly on bottom and sides of a 9-inch pie pan. Bake at 375 degrees for 5 minutes. Cool thoroughly before filling.

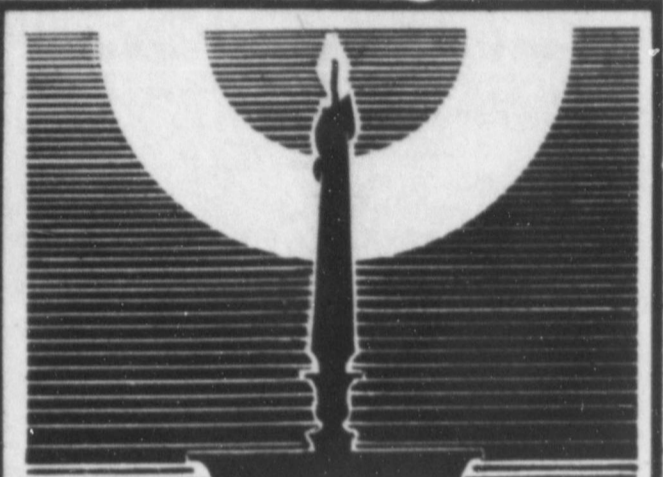
