Could You Stop In Plenty Time

If a small child suddenly dashed out into the street in front of your car, COULD YOU STOP IN TIME? Many people say, "I can stop on a dime."

Students of Jayton school will have an opportunity at 1:30 p.m. Nov., 21 to see for themselves the distance required to stop a car in an emergency, while participating in a Farm Bureau sponsored traffic safety program, according to Preston Cleveland, Principal.

The program, in two parts, will be given under the direction of Ben Bullard, Waco, Assistant Safety Director, Texas Farm

During the first part of the program, Bullard will discuss Texas traffic safety, in addition to outlining procedures to be followed during the second part demonstration.

The group will then be directed to the street in front of the Director of the Legislative school to witness driving tests at 20, 30, and 40 m.p.h.

Bullard rides in his special equipped car with each of the William H. Kelly of the drivers. The safety belts are used during the test. During each Federal Reserve Bank of test, the equipment signals the driver to make a panic stop and Dallas, speaking on the Texas marks that exact spot on the street. 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Newspaper people are well aware that postal rates are instantly going up, on a schedule prepared a good while ago. People working in the local postoffices are well aware of the drive for economy in the postal service. Local post masters

are constantly being lectured by higherups in the service to cut down on expenses, and from time to time they have their hours cut, and their help cut

This is what makes it very interesting, to get a piece of news this week from the Texas Press Association. According to the bulletin, the General Accounting office in

Washington has released some very interesting figures about the postal service. Washington headquarters. In regard to the new postal headquarters in Washington,

\$48,000 was spent to furnish the Postmaster General's office; and \$130,000 to furnish an adjoining reception area, press conference room, and a room for the Board of Governors.

Items included in the list of furnishings for the Postmaster General included: carpeting \$11,666.00, draperies, \$5,999.00, partry \$5,280.00, two sets of walnut doors, one with and one without the postal seal \$3,043.00, sofa \$821.00, marble topped

Now, this is not exactly what I would call an economy list. What do you think about it?

I have a little story to tell you. Actually, it has three verses

Verse one goes like this. On the night of Oct. 18, my wife and I had been to Levelland, and were returning to Ralls. At about 9:15 we were on Texas Highway 16, near Reese Air Force Base. There was a car in front of us. Suddenly, I noticed it was slowing down in speed, but the brake light was not coming on. and this made it very frustrating. And, again, very quickly, this car pulled partly off to the shoulder of the road, and stopped. I had to pull shortly and quickly to the left to keep from ramming this car in the back side. As I pulled past this car, I noticed the two radio antennas on the back side, and the insignia of the Texas Department of Public Safety on the side panel of the black and white sedan-a Texas Highway Patrol car.

crse two goes like this. Four times before, in the space of about a year. I have had the highway patrol to stop quickly in the line of traffic of a two lane road to get a speed reading on me. Once, when I met them, and other times when I was coming up behind them, and I noticed that the red light that usually comes on when the brake is applied, did not come on. This is a dangerous practice, and also the practice of quickly stopping in the lane of traffic in order to get a speed reading on an approaching car is dangerous.

Previously I had reported this to the DPS, and got a letter in reply, which really said nothing, except to acknowledge my

But not to be discouraged, I wrote Major Charles Bell, chief officer in the Lubbock DPS office about this last happening, and told him I wanted the name of this particular officer, so I could file a traffic violation complaint against him.

Major Bell sent a Captain out of his office out to see me. He said they had searched, and could not determine what car and officer, if any had been at the time and place of the incident I reported. He suggested it might have been another agency, maybe the license and weight patrol, or something like that.

I didn't tell him, but really I felt like I was getting the run around. I felt like they too could have told me who the officer was, that they do know where their officers are at any given

I have been told by people who know about the workings on the inside of their organization, that if you complain about the actions of one of their officers to a supervisory officer, he may give you the run around, and not tell you what the score is, but you may be sure the officer involved will be called in, and will be put on the mat, but they don't want the person who complains to know that this has happpened.

Now, here is verse three to the story.

About a month later, this past Friday night, Nov. 15, at parisons can be made between about 8:30, again I was traveling on this same stretch of road, foods which can be easily subexcept a few miles over in Hockley County. I noticed a car ahead of me, and he was slowing down, and pulling off to the side of the road. I was travelling within the legal speed limit. but when I saw this vehicle slowing down, and pulling out of the lane of traffic, I slowed down, and was driving no more than 30 MPH when I passed the car. And sure enough, it was a only for foods that are alike. patrol car, that was stopping. I am sure to get a speed reading

But, this time, not only was his brakelight working, not switched off, but also he pulled out wide on the shoulder, completely out of the lane of traffic

I pulled on by. The patrol car pulled up and followed me a ways, and then pulled off and stopped again, I suppose, to get a speed reading on another car approaching.

Then my wife and I started talking about our previous experience, and I told her that well, even though I apparently got the brush off when I reported the previous happenings, that it did do some good; that apparently the officers out on the road had been talked to about turning off their brake lights and

about stopping in the middle of the lane. Well, this is not a way to win a popularity contest, but if it helps to promote safety on the road, I will report such activities

You know, there is an old unwritten English law to the effect thatpeople who rule the public should do so with clean hands, and I feel very strongly about this. I think about the most despicable person around is one who is clothed with the authority of the law and enforcing it on the people, yet he nself in his own actions has no respect for the laws he is

And this applies in every area of activity.



Confident Drinker

Fred was haled into court on a charge of drunk driving, after a blood test showed an alcoholic content of more than .15%. According to local law, this created a presumption that he was "under

But in his defense, Fred argued that such a presumption was unconstitutional

"No two individuals are alike in their ability to tolerate alcohol," he said. "I happen to be able to hold my liquor better than most people.



However, the court upheld the presumption and found Fred guil-

"Medical science," said the court, "has established a rational relationship between the percentage of alcohol in the blood and (the) condition of being under the influence of alcohol. Sobriety decreases as the percentage increases.

The idea of a presumption of intoxication, at a certain alcoholic level in the blood, has spread nationwide. Almost invariably, it has been held to be constitutional.

Nor can a motorist avoid taking a sobriety test on grounds of selfincrimination. Traffic laws usually provide that a motorist consents in advance, when he takes out his driving license, to submit to testing or lose the license. Of course, the test must still be

administered properly to stand up in court. Suppose that the equipment was inadequate. Or that too much time elapsed between the arrest and the test. Either circumstance could invalidate the results.

In one case, the officer who had administered a sobriety test acknowledged at the trial that he was not well trained in operating the device. Result: the defendant motorist

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Food Labels To Tell More By Next Year

Nutrition labeling - already cropping up on some foods at the supermarket - is one way shoppers can be sure they're not spending their food dollars for "empty calories."

New federal regulations and laws -- passed in response to consumer requests - require that by 1975 all fortified foods and all foods for which a nutrition claim is made must display certain information on

The required information will include the serving size, number of servings in the package, and the calories, protein, carbohydrates, and fats in a

In addition, labels must tell the amount of Vitamins A and thiamine, riboflavin, niacin, calcium, and iron in the package contents. Cholesterol, fatty acids, and sodium content also may be included.

Basically, the information will provide a way for consumers to compare nutritive values of different foods

Specialists say the best comstituted for each other. For example, calories can be compared in canned peaches, pears, and apricots. Vitamin contents be weighed for salmon, ia, and albacore.

Substitutions should be made Milk, for example, shouldn't substituted for asparagus. cialists point out that both milk and green vegetables should be included in a nutritious diet since both contain different but required nutrients



Loans based on qualifying production losses may include ds to rein.burse applicants for production expenses which ent into damaged or destroyed crop and livestock enterprises, not to produce new crops during 1975. Payment terms pend on the purposes for which the loan is used and t he plicantg's paymnet ability. No loan may exceed the actual loss stained. The interest rate for these loans is 5 percent and there ill be no principal cancellation. These loans must be secured crops, livestock, farm machinery, or real estate.





CHEESE-TOPPED PUMPKIN PIE

Pumpkin pie and cheesecake all in one-

11/2 cups canned or mashed 1 9-inch unbaked pastry shell with edges fluted high cooked pumpkin ¾ cup sugar

1 teaspoon pumpkin ple spice 8-ounce package cream 1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon ground ginger 2 slightly beaten eggs

11/4 cups milk 1 teaspoon vanilla 1 teaspoon vanilla Dash salt

cheese, softened 1/4 cup sugar

2 eggs

Thoroughly combine pumpkin, the ¼ cup sugar, the pumpkin pie spice, the 1/2 teaspoon salt, and the ginger. Blend in the first 2 eggs, the milk, and the first 1 teaspoon vanilla. Pour into unbaked pastry shell. In mixer bowl, combine cream cheese, the ¼ cup sugar, the remaining vanilla, and salt. Beat in remaining eggs, one at a time. pour evenly over pumpkin mixture in pastry shell. Bake in 400° oven for 35 to 40 minutes or till knife inserted just off-center comes out clean. Chill. Garnish with pecan halves.

ITALIAN COCONUT CHEESE PIE 1/4 cup cookie coconut

3 eggs I pound ricotta cheese 1/4 cup sugar

1/4 cup mixed candied fruit. finely chopped

1/8 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

1 baked 9-inch Coconu Crumb Crust, cooled

Beat eggs; add cheese, sugar, salt, and vanilla. Blend until almost smooth. Stir in coconut and candied fruit. Spoon into crumb crust. Bake at 350 degrees for about 40 minutes, or until ightly browned. Cool before serving. If desired, garnish with candied fruits and toasted blanched almonds. (Before cutting, dip pie pan briefly in hot water to loosen crust from pan.) Makes 19-inch pic.

COCONUT CRUMB CRUST 1 % cups [approximately] 2 tablespoons sugar

flaked coconut

2 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted

1/4 cup fine graham cracker or gingersnap, vanilla wafer, or chocolate water crumbs

Combine coconut and butter. Add sugar and crumbs, mixing thoroughly. Press firmly on bottom and sides of a 9-inch pic pan. Bake at 375 degrees for 5 minutes. Cool thoroughly before filling.


