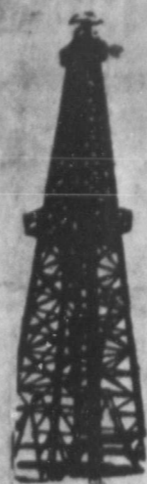

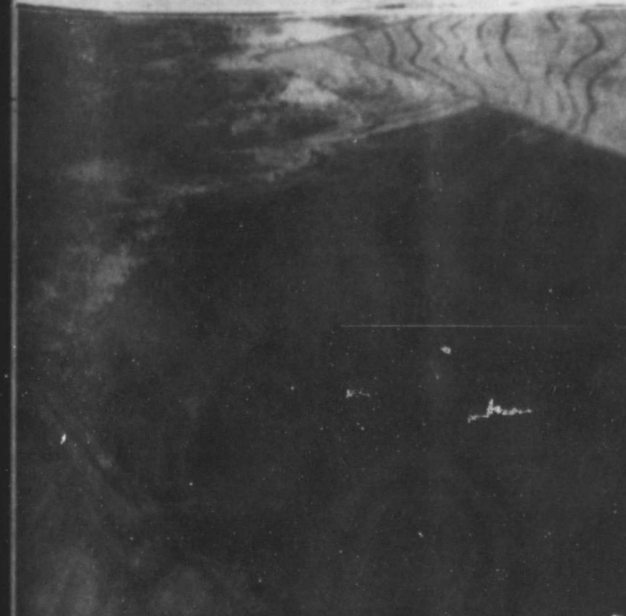
Stock Water Ponds Serve Good Need

The Jayt on Jaybirds Give Lesson On How To Pluck An Eagle

The Jayton Jaybirds and a large contingent of followers travelled to Sterling City last Friday and proved their claim as Number One by soundly defeating the Eagles 31-16.

The first quarter was rather shaky, as neither team could move the ball well. Sterling City scored first when a bad snap from center went over the punter's head (Mark Fincher) and out the end zone.

Jayton retaliated with an excellent scoring drive. The point after failed.

The second quarter had several drives halted, but both teams were able to score once. The point after failed for both teams.

The third quarter was all white and gold as the visiting Jaybirds burst forth for 19 points, and their only successful point after try.

The 'Birds never scored in the final period but the hosts managed eight points. The eagles threatened late in the fourth, but time ran out on them.

Mark Fincher had 203 yards rushing and scored four touchdowns and a PAT making his total for the night 25 points. Billy Wilson had probably his best night of the year as he rolled up 110 yards for the game.

This Friday night the Jaybirds take on the Hawley Bearkats. Kickoff time is 8 p. m. See you there.

In the statistics department, Jayton gained 20 yards passing and 334 yards rushing, while Sterling City passed for 125, and rushed for 41.

Jayton completed one of five yards. The home team completed three of seven. Jayton was penalized 8 times for 72 yards. Sterling City was hit twice for 20 yards.

Jayton lost both of their fumbles, while the Eagles lost 3 of 4.

Jayton punted three times for an average of 31.3 and the Eagles punted 10 times for an average of 36.5.

Veterans Should Know Their Rights

The 1975 Fall semester has begun on college campuses across the state and thousands of veterans have returned to the school room under the GI bill according to Allen Lowery, veterans service officer for Kent County, many of these veterans need to carefully review their remaining GI bill entitlement, to be certain that it is being used to their best advantage.

Eligible veterans are those with 181 days or more honorable service in the Armed forces of the United States since Jan. 31, 1955.

A veteran is entitled to one and a half months of training time for each month spent on active duty with a maximum of 36 months eligibility for those who served 18-months on active duty, he said.

Farmers Market

WASHINGTON—Small farmers and consumers can help each other beat the high cost of living.

I have proposed a bill which could boost the income of small farmers, and at the same time reduce the prices consumers have to pay for fresh fruits, vegetables, and other produce.

The goal of the Farmers Market Act is to reduce indirect costs. Marketing costs now total 60 cents of every dollar spent by the consumer does not go to the farmer.

The men and women in the wholesale and retail food industry are not to blame for that. They have strived mightily to keep down the costs of transporting, processing, and packaging food. Profit margins in the food industry are among the lowest for all industry. The indirect costs are justified. But they continue to mount. The Farmers Market Act would provide a means of reducing some of them.

The prime beneficiaries of the Farmers Market Act would be the 72 per cent of all farm families who earn less than \$15,000 a year.

But urban consumers who are willing to forego the conveniences of supermarket shopping in order to save on their food budget would also benefit. The price of produce sold at farmers' markets averages one-third below supermarket price, and sometimes as much as 40 to 50 per cent less.

The Farmers Market Act would authorize marketing experts from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to study means of operating markets ranging from roadside stands to large marketplaces in urban centers. The information would be provided to farmers on request.

The USDA experts also would be empowered to develop innovative farmer to consumer marketing arrangements in which groups of consumers could buy unprocessed food in bulk directly from farmers.

The Secretary of Agriculture would be given three years from the date of enactment of the Farmers Market Act to test at least five distinctly different innovative marketing schemes in various regions of the country. The cost of the innovative projects would be about \$5 million over the three-year period.

Kent County farmers Rance Gregory, Frank Garcia, and John Fowler listen as Research Entomologist James White explains work being done by the Lubbock Research and Extension Center on cotton plots east of Jayton. The ten acre research demonstration is on the J.T. Murdoch farm.

Entomologists are testing six varieties in the research plot: Experimental line 1209-L, Paymaster dwarf, Earlycot 31, Tamcot SP-37, Pilose, and Frego. These early maturing and insect resistant varieties are being grown in a habitat of high overwintering boll weevil population. Other research being done includes use of proven chemicals and new chemicals for boll weevil control.

Research personnel are cooperating with the Kent County Extension Agent in these plots.
