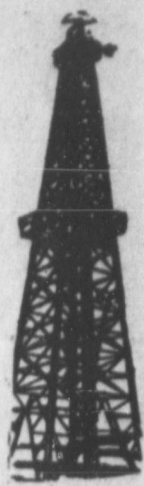

Jaybirds Win 17-8 Victory Over Undefeated Bronte Longhorns



This Week

The football game between the Bronte Longhorns and the Jayton Jaybirds in Jayton last Friday night was a fine football game, with all the ingredients to make a game interesting, and to increase the blood circulation.

Both teams had a lot of difficulty with the officials. In the second period Bronte had a fine 36 yard run and back on account of a rules violation. The next Bronte shook loose one of their speedy backs for a yard run into the end zone, and it too was brought and nullified by an infraction of the rules.

Then in the third period, Bronte was trying desperately to get back into the game after a 17-0 half time disadvantage. First they were shut out, after recovering a Jaybird fumble giving them good position. And then coming back, a long pass fell complete, but interference was ruled against the birds, giving Bronte the ball inside the 10 yard line, they pushed it in for the score.

Bronte came to town proudly displaying an undefeated record. But their fine offense was nullified quickly by the Jaybird defense, and this was quite a setback to their community pride.

Also the Jaybirds, in the first half cut the Bronte defense into shreds, as Fincher, Kelley, and ripped huge holes in their previously highly successful defense. But in the second half, Bronte out of the dressing room with every intention of stopping the Jaybirds. The Birds moved the ball fairly in mid field, but the Bronte defense was tough in the 20s. David Fincher did make yards at times, they were ganging him and hitting him extremely

The Jaybirds have now whipped all the powers in the district. Their only problem now is to underestimate the opposition, or to be looking only toward the playoffs. Goodluck Jaybirds.

Jayton Coed Is Honored at Angelo State

JUNIOR HIGH LADY JAYS UNDEFEATED

The Junior High Lady Jays pushed their record to last Tuesday with a 17-9 victory over Roby. Angie scored 9 points and Tammy Panter, 8. Penny Gregory had an outstanding defensive performance along with Gayla Prince.

It isn't every night you can get 114 yards in penalties and still scuttle the opposition, but Jayton did it last Friday night and came away with a 17-8 win over the Bronte Longhorns.

The victory gives the Jayton Jaybirds sole possession of the 3B lead with a 7-1 season and 5-0 district record. Bronte dropped to 7-1 and 4-1 for the year.

Mark Fincher led the Birds with a 220 yards on 36 carries; his sixth 200 yards game, as they collected 322 yards on the ground and 78 through the air.

The Jaybird defense completely stifled the Bronte offense, allowing only 37 yards rushing and 21 in the air.

Bronte's only score came in the opening minutes of the third quarter on a 71 yard, 15 plays drive. They were assisted in their score by a couple major penalties.

Kerwin Denton carried the final 16 yards for the touchdown. The two point conversion was successful.

The Jaybirds scores started with the opening kickoff as the Birds moved 80 yards in 7 plays. The big play was a 60 yard run by Fincher. His PAT was wide, but Jayton lead 6-0.

Deral Cox recovered a Longhorn fumble in the ensuing drive and Jayton drove to the Longhorn 6 yard line. Fincher tried a 23 yard field goal, but it was wide to the left.

Joe Martinez recovered a fumble on the 18 yard line, and Jayton was on the move again. Fincher again tried a field goal of 27 yards and was successful.

Just as the half ended, quarterback Bobby Kelley scored from 1 yard out. At the half, Jayton lead 17-0.

An almost score came in the final seconds as Kelley moved in for the score, but fumbled in the end zone and Bronte recovered.

The next game is against Forsan, there, this Friday at 7:30. See you there.

The Jaybirds led in the statistics: First downs 21-8, rushing 322 yards to 37; Passing 78 to 21; total offense 400 to 58.

Each team lost two fumbles. Jayton was penalized 13 times for 114 yards, Bronte 5 for 40 yards. Jayton punted one time for 19 yards, and Bronte 3 times for 33 average.

Jayton completed 6 of 9 passes and had one intercepted. Bronte completed two of 11 and had one picked off.

Lady Jays Take Tuesday Game From Roby Femmes

Tuesday night the Lady jays B team scored a victory over Roby 45-27.

Scoring were Lisa York 19, Sallie Garcia 9, Shelly Williams 7, Lean Kuenstler 4, Erin Hahn 4, and Larhonda Carriker 2.

The team shot 15 of 27 free throws for 55 percent, and 16 of 44 from the field for 36 percent. The team had 21 steals and 29 rebounds.

Outstanding defensive work was done by Lesa Pickens, 5 steals and 3 rebounds; Melodie So Relle 2 steals and 5 rebounds; Teressa Wright 1 steal and 4 rebounds, Lean Kuenstler 1 steal and 4 rebounds, and Sallie Garcia 4 steals and 2 rebounds. This team now has a season record of 1 win and 1 loss.

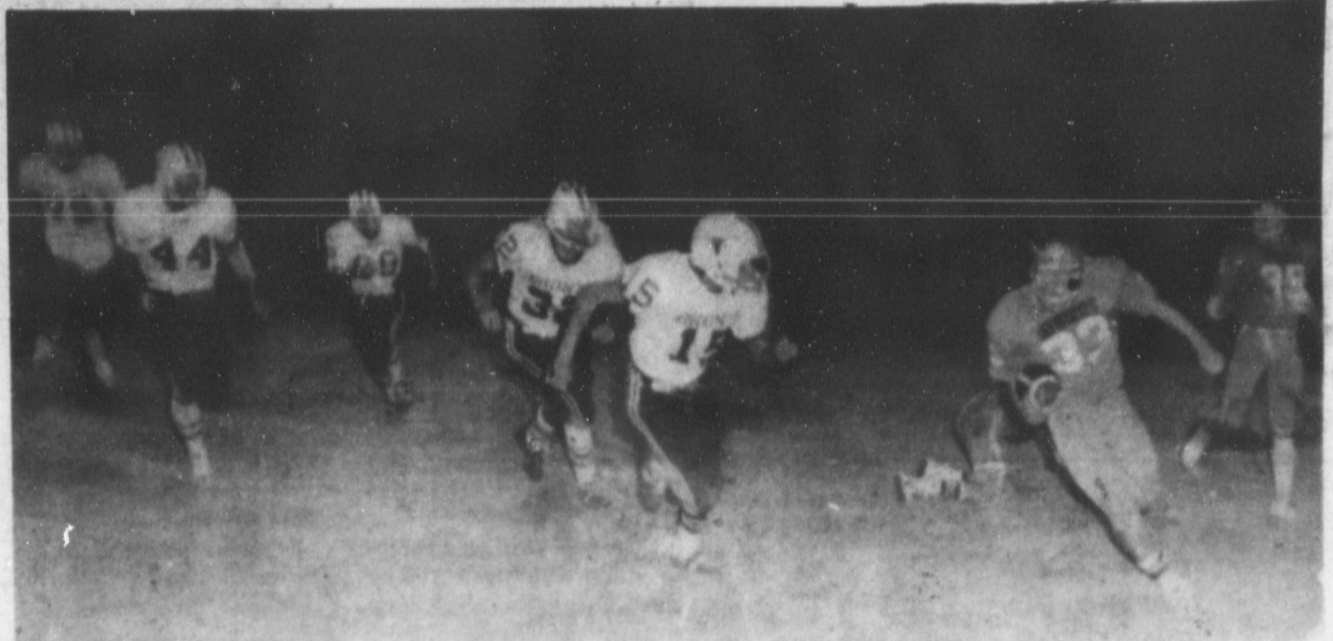
Jayton JVs Beat Roby

A Need For Replacing Soil Organic Matter

Even though soils in Kent County are naturally fertile, there is a need for replacing the depleted soil organic contents which have been brought about by a continuous cropping system of clean tilled row crops, according to Joe McAdams, of the Soil Conservation Service.

One of the easiest ways to replace this organic matter is by using a cover crop of small grain between cash crops such as cotton. Cover crops also protect the land during periods of the year when it would be exposed to wind erosion, McAdams said.

Soil nutrients, especially nitrogen, are subject to leaching during the winter months. Cover crops are very effective on sandy soils in reducing this loss by keeping fertility in the root zone area.

In Kent County the most commonly used cover crops are wheat, rye and oats. A firm seedbed should be prepared and fertilizer applied if needed.

The Lady Jay junior high girls lost a heartbreaker 23-20 in overtime in Roby Tuesday night.

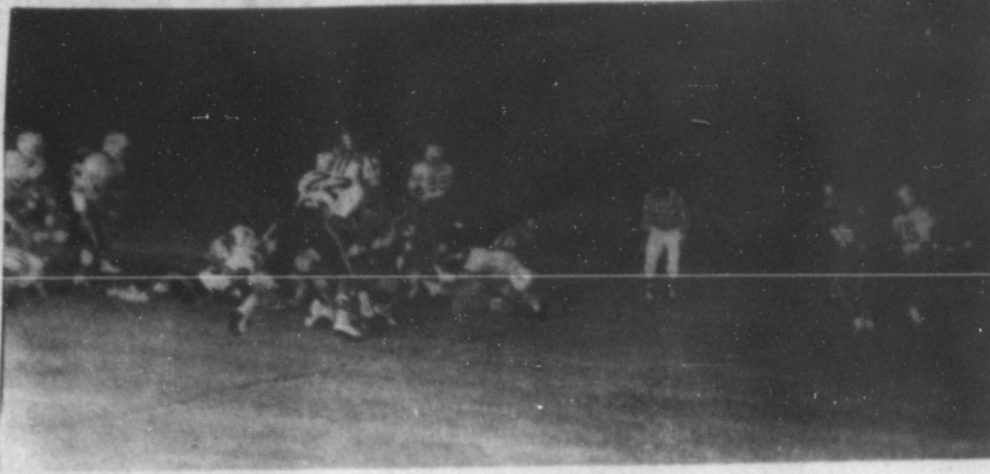

Apple-Cornmeal Muffins

1 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
 1/2 cup sugar
 3 tsp. baking powder
 1/4 tsp. salt
 1 cup yellow cornmeal
 1 cup milk
 1 beaten egg
 2 small tart green summer apples, cored, pared, and finely chopped (1 cup)

Sift together flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt; stir in cornmeal. Combine milk and egg. Add to flour mixture along with the chopped apple. Stir in quickly just till dry ingredients are moistened. Fill greased muffin cups 2/3 full. Bake in 400 degree oven for 20-25 minutes. Makes 12 to 15 muffins.

Patricia's Apple-Nut Cake

3 cups flour
 1 tsp. soda
 1 tsp. salt
 1 1/4 cups corn oil
 2 cups sugar
 3 eggs, well beaten
 3 cups apples, chopped fine
 1 cup nuts, chopped fine
 2 tsp. vanilla

Sift flour and measure; add soda and salt. Sift three more times. In another bowl, mix corn oil and sugar "well". Add beaten eggs to corn oil and sugar. Sift flour in slowly. Add nuts, apples and

vanilla. Pour into 9" cake pans.
 Put in COLD oven. Bake 45 mins. on 325 degrees; NO LONGER.

ICING
 1 1/2 sticks oleo or butter
 3/8 cup condensed milk
 1 1/2 cups light brown Sugar
 1 tsp. vanilla

Melt butter and sugar over low heat. Add cream and vanilla and let come to a rolling boil, about 1 minute. Set aside and cool. Spread on cake.

Farmers And Ranchers Have Source of Revenue In Wildlife Program



Many farmers and ranchers are making extra money through wildlife management. Sportsmen are happy to pay a fee for the privilege of hunting in a productive area.

According to Joe McAdams, Range Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service, the simplest means of making land produce more wild game is by improving habitat. Restocking is usually not necessary.

Three things are needed by all wild birds and animals, food, water and shelter. An increase in these will bring about an increase in the numbers of birds and animals to the maximum an area will support.

The easiest of these is to supply shelter. Fence rows that are overgrown with weeds are used by game birds for travel lanes, nesting and for protection from predators. Old areas such as gullies, and old gravel pits may be planted to forbs that will furnish both food and shelter.

Quail and doves will feed on fields planted to maize, Johnsongrass, and sorgum alnum. Deer prefer alfalfa, sudan, corn, oats, wheat, and vetch. These crops should be planted in small blocks of one fourth to four acres in size with a final ratio of ten acres of food to each one hundred acres of brush or other cover.

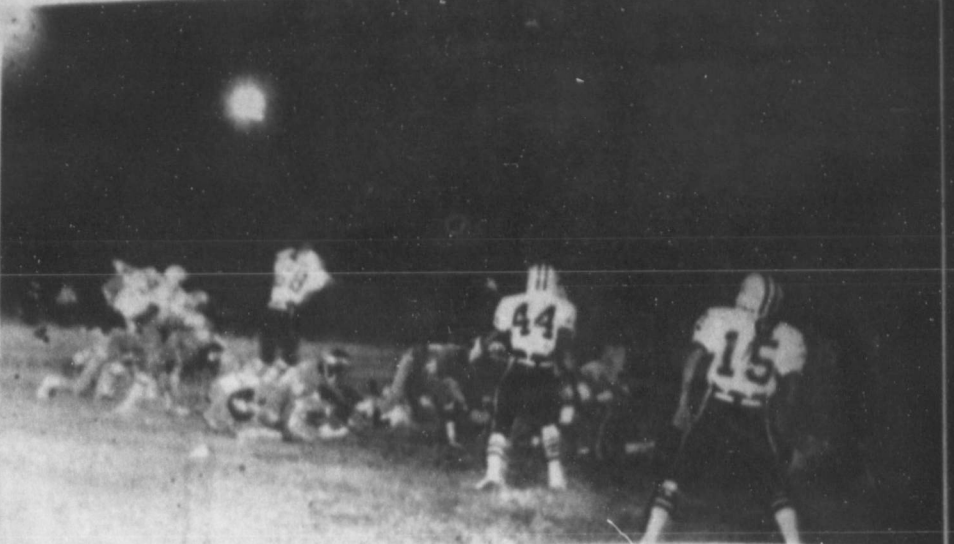

Production Of Honey Slightly Off

AUSTIN--Early indications are that Texas commercial beekeepers will produce 5,978,000 pounds of honey in 1975, according to recently released statistics.

This compares with 6,100,000 pounds produced last year.

Commercial apiaries had 98,000 colonies this year, 2,000 less than in 1974. Average yield remained at 61 pounds per colony, the same as for the past two years, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said.

"Conditions varied considerably during the peak honey producing period. Plentiful moisture benefited nectar plants but at the same time, reduced bee activity," Commissioner White explained.

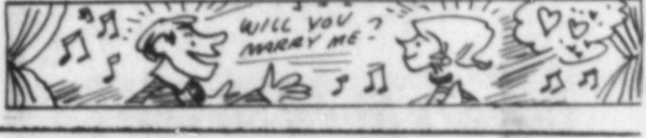
The Corps was decommissioned after independence, but Congress reestablished it in 1798.

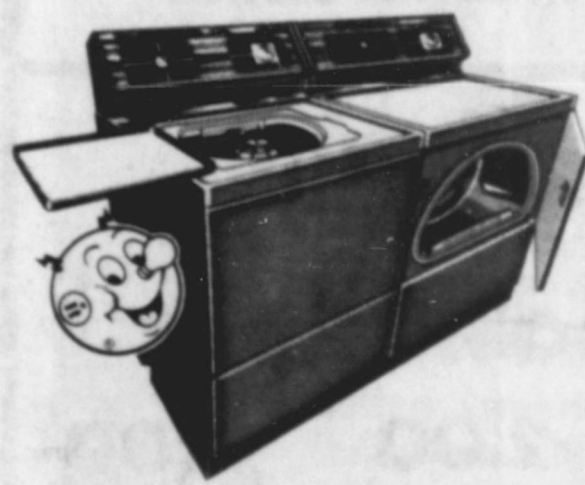
