Don Wayne Jones Attends TCU Ranch Management Plan

FORT WORTH--Don Wayne Jones of Jayton is among 35 ranchers from the United States, Venezuela, Mexico, Brazil, El Salvador, Australia and Japan enrolled in Texas Christian University's 1976-77 Ranch Management Program.

For the last 20 years, this TCU program has been giving young ranchers the expert backgrounds they need to become the combination accountant-veterinarian-farmer-broker-salesman-executive-laborer that is today's rancher. Director John Merrill calls it "a firm foundation in the basic principles of soil, water and grass, livestock selection, nutrition, health and marketing with a strong dose of records, finances and business management."

As far as Merrill knows, the nine-month program--which combines intensive academic study with week-long visits to see the textbooks in operation--is the only one of its kind anywhere. While many schools offer two to four years of specialized training, including degrees, in ranch-related subjects, none offer the 10,000 miles of field work to 60 ranches, farms, feedlots, marketing and packing facilities and research centers in Kansas, Oklahoma, and Texas, plus contact with 130 professionals in class and on the road.

The Jayton Jaybirds Are Walloped By The Forsans Buffalos

Somebody turned loose a herd of Buffaloes at Jaybird field Friday night, and they really trampled under foot the district title hopes of the Jaybirds.

The herd from Forsans clobbered the Jaybirds...47-0.

This was the worst defeat the Jaybirds have suffered in a great many years.

The fans from Forsans really enjoyed the victory. They always play the Jaybirds very competitively, and this is the only big win for them in the long series of exchange of games.

Forsans rolled up a total of 25 first downs, compared to 10 for the Birds. Forsans made 400 yards rushing, for 60 for the Jaybirds. The Jaybirds did lead in passing yardage 74 to 64.

Jayton lost 3 of 7 miscues, and the visitors lost 5 of 7 fumbles.

Leading tacklers for Jayton were Boyce Dees, Joe Martinez, Gary Sumner with 12 each. Leading rusher was Randy Prince with 34 yards or an average of 4.3 per try.

Leading receiver was Kenny Kidd who caught two passes for 35 yards.

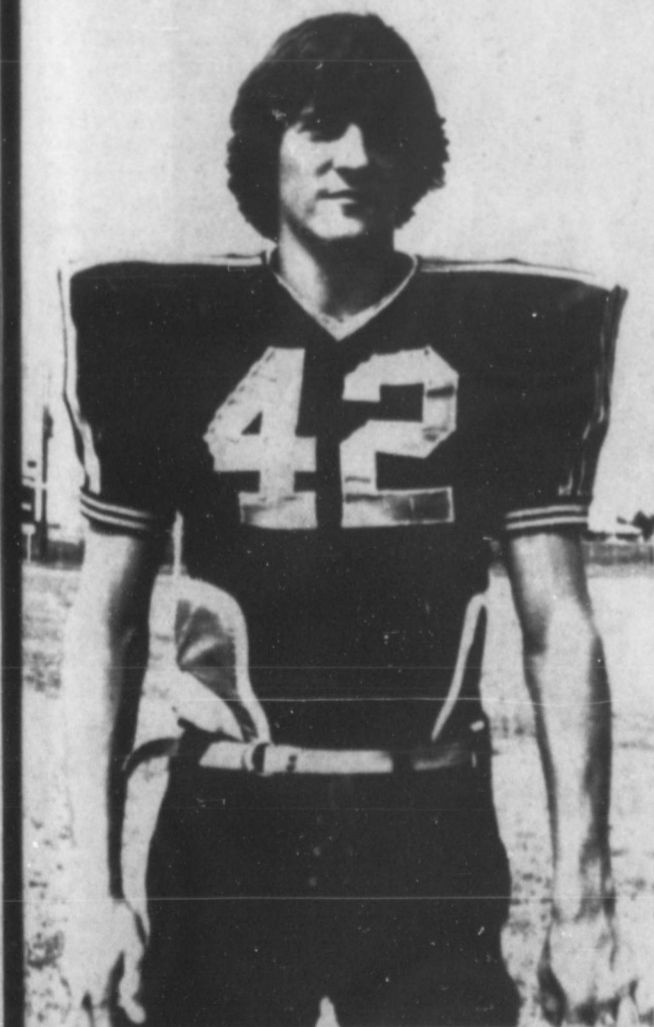

Information About Veterans Pensions

Children and widows of some veterans may be eligible for a pension from the Veterans Administration despite the fact that the death of the veteran was not directly related to military service, according to Allen Lowrey, Service Office for Kent County.

Children's eligibility is sometimes overlooked by the family when the mother is not eligible because of income, remarriage or divorce prior to the veteran's death.

Pension is available for widows, widowers and children of wartime veterans who died of nonservice-connected causes. The monthly amount of pension payable varies and is predicted on annual income. No pension is payable to a surviving spouse whose annual income is in excess of an amount set by law.

His coach states that Kenny is one of our best when it comes to catching a football. Kenny has scored two touchdowns this year by the pass route. Kenny should be a good one.



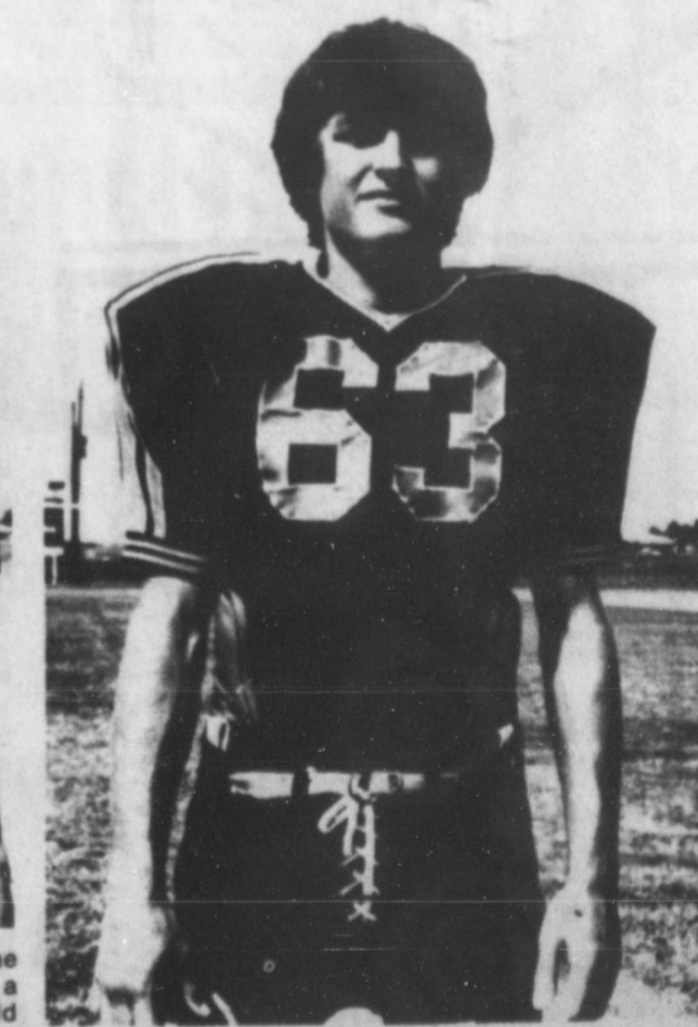

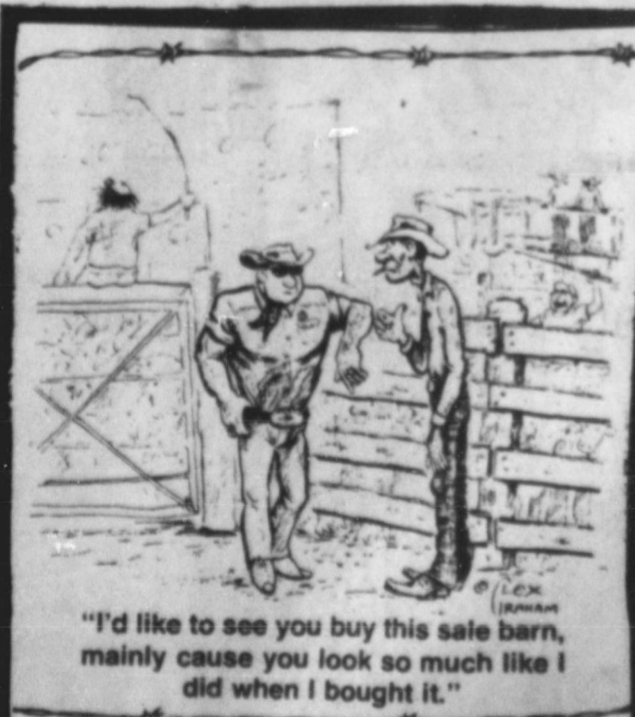
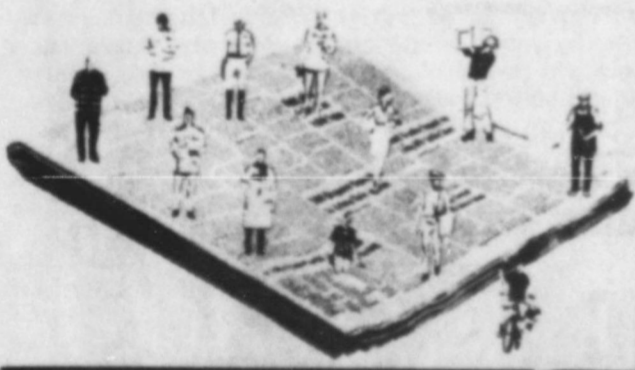

FEEDLOT MANAGER SHOULD PREPARE FOR WINTER

Feedlot managers should begin getting feedyards in shape for long winter months of poor drying potential, advises an agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. With certain maintenance practices, feedyards can be made more "liveable" for cattle during the winter months, odor production can be reduced, and manure can be harvested earlier in the spring. The main idea is to keep a minimum quantity of manure and wastewater on hand.

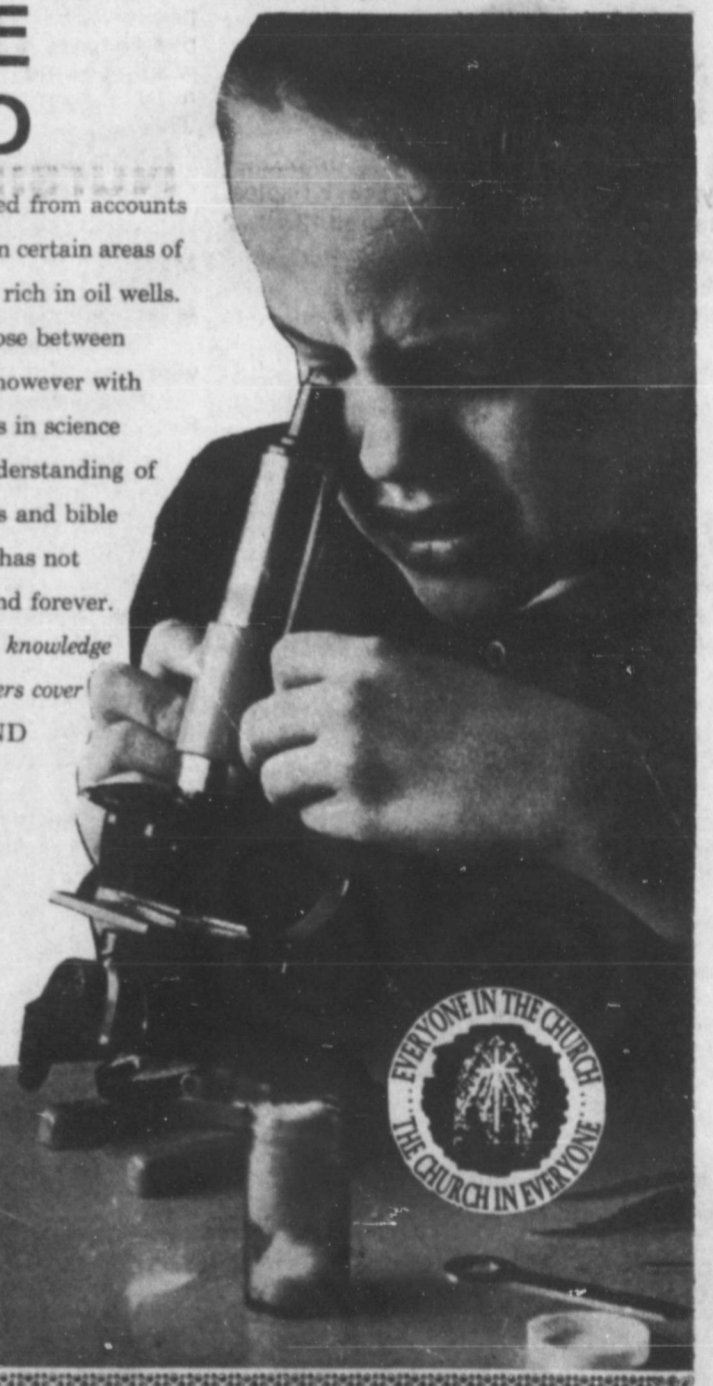
SCIENCE and GOD

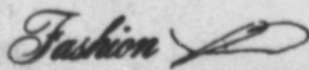

How is a stationary front formed? What causes most of them in fall and winter? A stationary front usually results from the movement of a cold air mass into a mass of warmer air. Instead of forcing a passage and breaking through, sometimes the cold front's winds will blow parallel to the juncture of the two air masses. The cold air mass thus stands still--as far as forward movement is concerned. The warm air mass sends its winds parallel to the juncture line (the stationary front), but in exactly the opposite direction of those of the cold air mass.

Darrell Royal, the big football chief down at the State Capitol, is having nightmares. He thinks that the Oklahoma Sooners had spies in his camp before the big Red River Shootout. And he has been throwing a fit about it. Well, don't they all spy on each other?

I lost some respect for Royal Saturday afternoon, as twice in the waning seconds of the game, he refused to go for a win. With the score tied, twice he kicked the ball away with only seconds on the clock. This meant he rather settle for a tie than go all out to win, and take the risk of losing.

Winning is the name of the game, and most coaches will pull all the stops out trying to get the win. It seems to me Royal ought to go ahead and quit--well he did Saturday in Dallas.

It's a shame what happened to Earl Butz. With all the people who hated Butz for the way he was running the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and all the people who wanted him fired for the way he conducts the affairs of office--and then he gets fired for a stupid little joke he told privately to John Dean.

True, the joke was a bit off color, but it was told in private, but John Dean, the confessed and convicted liar, told it on him, and this got his job.

If he was going to get fired, it should have been for his official conduct, and not over a joke told in private.

Strange things happen in politics, and sometimes peculiar things happen.

This is very vividly illustrated by two very good friends of mine. One is a retired banker. A number of years ago, back in the Eisenhower, Stevenson years, he was quite a conservative, and very conscientious about it. I recall he would not vote in the Democratic Primary, because he felt very strongly that he might vote Republican in the general election, and he could not in good conscience take the oath to support the nominees of the democrat party, and then vote against the nominee in the election.

And he sort of fussed about this, because he knocked him out of having a hand in naming local office holders.

But recently he and I were discussing the current presidential primary, and he expressed the thought that the philosophies of the two political parties were more important, and really outweighed the importance of the candidates--and he felt the democratic party was the one whose philosophy more fit his own, and he was going to vote for the democratic party candidate.

And then I have another friend, a school administrator, who for many years has been an outspoken liberal, and a democratic party loyalist.

But recently I have talked with him, and this time he is a strong supporter of the Republican candidate, President Ford. His reason for this--he thinks the Democratic party, as well as the candidate, are entirely too liberal.

One of his pet peeves, is the Humphrey-Burton full employment bill. In his position as a school administrator, he finds fault with the actions of the Democrat controlled congress, and he thinks it will get even worse, with a Democratic president and also a democratic controlled congress.

So there you have two sides of the coin.

U. S. Representative William Natcher has been acclaimed as the perfect Congressman, and no wonder.

In 23 years in the House of Representatives he has never missed a day, and he has never missed a roll call vote. Also he has one of the smallest staffs in the capitol. Last year he turned back \$166,000.00 in funds he could have used for his staff.

There are three top government agencies that have completely defied an official order given by President Ford to cut down on government red tape in their offices.

Ford ordered them to cut down by at least ten percent the number of forms that Americans must fill out each year. And even the forms they have cut out, they still require the public to spend even more time in filling them out, according to a story by Edwin Martin in the National Observer.

"It's just plain disgusting" said U. S. Rep. Tom Steed of Oklahoma.

The agencies who are defying the order of the president are the Department of Justice, the State and Transportation Departments.

Steed states "This constitutes defiance of an executive order. The agency heads are disloyal to the President... the least punishment they'd get, if I were in Ford's place, would be dismissal."

Last October Ford called on all federal agencies in the executive branch to whittle their report volume by ten percent no later than June 30. Eight agencies made the cut, but barely made the deadline. These agencies mentioned above failed to eliminate a single form, Steed says.

Another outstanding expose of government greed and misspending is about a fleet of private jet luxury planes used by the bureaucrats.

Philip V. Brennan, Jr. charges in an article in a national magazine, that over \$60,000.00 of taxpayers' money has disappeared into the wild blue yonder -- as luxury loving bureaucrats fly all over the country in a private fleet of government jets.

The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Brennan charges, maintains these planes for its own bureaucrats, and also "rents" them to other government agencies. But either way, he charges, the taxpayers pick up the check.

He says there are now eight aircraft assigned to the FAA, which are kept in Washington National Airport.

Secretary of Transportation William Coleman always gets first crack at the FAA private fleet. He used the planes 10 times in the last six months of 1975, at a taxpayer cost of \$37,000.00. Where did he go? Primarily to give speeches before the business groups and organizations in New Orleans, Boston, New York and

other cities, Brennan charges.

Other shocking examples of jet-setting bureaucrats wasting your money:

The administrator of the Urban Mass Transportation Administration, Robert Patricelli, flew to Boston with three assistants to dedicate a new subway station. The cost of the trip was \$1,246.

How does the FAA justify this gallivanting around at tax payers expense?

If you can figure out this explanation, you deserve the prize. Here it is: "Our aircrafts are used for air traffic evaluation and pilot proficiency, as well as transportation. Whenever possible, transportation is accomplished concurrently with evaluation and pilot efficiency missions". How about that?

If you are a dog lover, but you admit there is sometimes an over population of dogs, here is good news.

A leading dog food manufacturer, has come out with the announcement that the company will soon market a brand of dog food, that has "the pill" built into it.--That is right, certain ingredients are built into the dog food, so that when a female dog eats a certain amount of the food, it will render her infertile, and she cannot become pregnant, and cannot give birth to pups.

I'll tell you what, modern day science is a great thing--isn't it?
