Kautz Attends State Meeting







Plow Horses

The same horses that pulled the ol' wagon out of the settled country back east were used to pull the ol' breaking plow through Texas sod. Pioneers plowed up the land. Some of them were used to the lonliness and long days. Their hands were calloused and hard; their muscles were knotted and strong; their skin was wrinkled and burnt by the sun. They plodded dutifully behind the old team and held

the plow in the row. Some folks didn't have what it took. The strength in a man's back had to match his love for the land. The land had to be plowed so the crop could grow. The permanent grass of the plains had to go.

Now we are involved in a program to plant the land back to grass. Most of the cropland in Sherman County will qualify for the Conservation Reserve Program. It is continued





This year, rents must be present before the immunizations may be administered. Signed permission is no longer

adequate for the shots. We urge anyone whose child's shot record is not current to please take advantage of this opportunity by coming to the school between the hours of 11:00 and 1:00 on Friday.

State and local regulations require the following immunizations:

DPT/DT A minimum of three doses of DPT and/or DT is required, with at least one dose having been received on or after the fourth birthday and with the last dose within the past ten

ORAL POLIO 3 required, with one on or after 4th birthday. Required to age 18 years.

MEASLES All students through the twelfth grade will be required to have received measles vaccine on or after the first birthday, and after January 1, 1968, or provide a physican-validated history of measles illnesses.

Rubella One dose required through 11 years of age. History of the disease is not acceptable in lieu of the

vaccine. RUBELLA One dose required through 11 years of age. History of the disease is not acceptable in lieu of the vaccine.







"The campaign title, Mommy...Don't, reflects the preventive messages--don't take unprescribed drugs,

don't drink, don't smoke--we want to get across to all women of childbearing age," Charles L. Massey, March of Dimes president,

"People are greatly concerned today with the damage drugs do to our communities in general," Massey noted. "But what many people don't realize is how serious the consequences can be for the baby in the womb of a mother who uses



Winterization

With winter approaching, the Public Utility Commission reminds consumers that now is the time to "winterize" homes for energy savings.

Furnaces should be checked at the beginning of the heating season by a qualified service person to ensure efficient operation. Consumers should stress procedures for improving efficiency of the unit when requesting the service. Make sure the safety features are operating correctly and do not operate the equipment until any problems have been corrected.

Check for air leaks in your home by holding a lighted candle near windows and doorways. If the candle flutters even slightly, you probably need weather stripping or caulking. For a small investment, you can improve the comfort level of your home, and reduce your heating bills at the same

Heat loss through windows during the winter can be costly and uncomfortable. Movable insulation, such as thermal curtains and shades, and interior and exterior shutters, can help reduce this heat loss. It allows full benefit of the window during the day, when free solar heating and lighting are available. And at night when the insulation is in place heat loss will be reduced, which lowers heating bills and increases the comfort of the

Helping People Help Themselves

Helping People Help Themselves is the motto for Panhandle Community Services, a human service delivery system headquarted in Amarillo and serving the people in the 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle with a multitude of services. The agency's slogan has taken on a vital new meaning with its special new program, Project Self-Sufficiency. This demonstration projects assists single men and women who are raising minor dependent children in our area. Project Self-Sufficiency aids them in living and a more meaningful and productive place in our community.
Sometimes, "Pulling yo-

urself up by your own bootstraps", requires a little help. Panhandle Community Services, (PCS), administers the locally designed demonstration project, directly providing section 8 rental assistance funded through the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development. A vital component of this project is the idenitifcation of and referral to other community resources for which the participant may also be eligible. These resources may include; grants, loans or scholarships, child care, transportation services, job search and placement opportunities. In addition, PCS strives to utilize as many of the other possible services available through the agency in order to assist the eligible applicants in successfully attaining their goal of Self-Sufficiency.

The project is scheduled to conclucde in April, 1988. All of the housing certificates awarded to PCS for this special demonstration project, which is the largest awarded nationally, must be issued by the end of January, 1987. It is the goal of PCS* Project Self-Sufficiency, staff and Task Force members to serve as many eligible participants as possible.

Throughout the entire Panhandle many men and women who are single parents with young dependent children are being aided in many ways to become Self-Sufficient. 77 of the current Project Self-Sufficiency participants are enrolled in local and regional universities, colleges, and vocational insitutions such as West Texas State University, Amarillo College, Frank Phillips College, Clarendon College, Wayland Baptist University, Texas State

Technical Institute and North American Education Center. These students are pursuing completion of their life-long goals in various occupations such as Licensed Vocational Nursing, medical occupations, business degress, computer science. mechanics, law enforcement and many more. Concurrently, many are working, soon-to-be working, and receiving assistance from various sources in housing, school opportunities and child care.

To become eligible for Project Self-Sufficiency and individuals must be a single head of household raising minor dependent children, qualify as having a very low income determined by guidelines established by the Department of Housing and Urban Development and must be currently paying rent with federal assistance.

Applicants are required to supply verification of marital status, custody of minor children, high school and/or college transcripts or certificates of completion, verification of income and letters of reference from personal acquaintances and employers. All applicants receive a battery of tests which are designed to provide indicators of motivational, achievement and aptitude levels to better determine their potential for success in the

Project.

All applicants are formally reviewed to determine if they can be recommended for enrollment and participation based largely upon the absence of substantial barriers to training and employment success. Participants are interviewed and selected by a Task Force of



Duke Leads Smokeout Effort

Dr. "Red" Duke, known best for syndicated television "Health Reports," will prescribe a smoke-free day for Texas smokers as the state's honorary Great American Smokeout chairman.

This year's Smokeout, which is sponsored annually by the American Cancer Society, is scheduled November 20. The Smokeout is a light-hearted campaign encouraging smokers to give up their tobacco for 24 hours.

Last year, a Gallup Survey indicated 23 million Americans quit smoking or cut down on the number of cigarettes smoked during the Smokeout.

Event planners expect a record number will make the attempt to abstain this year, as the Smokeout celebrates its 10th Anniversary.

"We're anticipating our greatest participation ever," said Oscar Newton of Houston, chairman of Texas' Smokeout efforts. "We feel Texans especially will respond to the supportive approach of the Smokeout and to Dr. Duke's plain-spoken advice," he said.

Duke, a nationally-respected trauma surgeon, has been a trusted source of health information for television viewers across the nations since 1982. His "Health Reports," produced by the University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston, are broadcast three times a week on 69 television stations in 30 states.

The "Health Reports" will feature segments on smoking and quitting smoking during Smokeout Week, Newton said.

"You can't say anything good about smoking," Duke said. "But the good thing about the Great American Smokeout is its supportive approach."
"Although the Smokeout

is known as a 'fun' event, it has a very serious purpose," he said, "Each year, 350,000 Americans die of diseases linked to cigarette smoking. We have to convince smokers that quitting is the best thing they can do for themselves and their loved ones," Duke said.

Communities around the state are planning local celebrations in observance of the 10th Anniversary Smokeout. Plans call for promotions at businesses, hospitals, schools and colleges, as well as city-wide events honoring former smokers and would-be guitters.


