Chief Appraiser Reports Changes in State Tax Laws for 1982

Marillyn Albert, Chief Appraiser for the Sherman County Appraisal District stated today that, "There have been many changes in the state tax laws which are effective for 1982. Annual application for homestead exemptions are no longer required. Persons who qualify for a \$5,000 exemption for school taxes, or an over age 65 exemption from all taxing units, need not re-apply if already signed up. Anyone who has previously failed to apply or who became 65 years of age during 1981 must apply at the Appraisal District office for the exemption. There will also be a representative from the District office at the January meeting of SCOT to assist anyone with their exemption."

Landowners who qualify for agriculture value on their land need not re-apply if they signed up in 1981. In 1982 for the first time, livestock are exempt. A certain amount of farm equipment will also be exempt. At the

present time there is an Attorney General's Opinion pending defining the amount of that exemption and also what the exemption specifically covers. The exemption is for individuals only, as partnerships and corporations do not qualify. In order for any exemption to be granted on "implements of farming and ranching", the taxpayer must apply annually and also render their equipment. Forms are now being mailed or this can be done at the Appraisal District office. Applications must be by May 1, 1982. NO EXCEPTIONS WILL BE GRANTED.

Persons with a disabled veterans exemption must also apply annually bringing their letter from the Veterans Administration giving their percent of disability.

Anyone having any questions is invited to stop by the district office at 402 N. Third in Stratford or to call 396-2315.

Sheriff Announced Crackdown on Shooting From Roadways

The Sheriff's Department has announced that hunting or discharging firearms from public roadways is a Class C misdemeanor and will be enforced by Sherman County law enforcement officials.

Sheriff Clois Vaughn said the action stems from the growing amount of night hunting that is being done along highways and county roads in Sherman

County. The Sheriff added that an 800-pound steer had recently been shot near the south boundary of the county line and his office feared other similar problems might occur if preventive actions are not taken.

Conviction for violating the law could lead to a \$200 fine.

Stratford Woman Killed After Being Hit by Truck

A Stratford woman was killed, Thursday, January 7, when she was struck by a semi-trailer tractor rig at an intersection in downtown Dumas.

Dead at the scene of the accident was Mrs. Viola Mae Thomason, 57, who owned and operated the Sunset Motel with her husband S.W. Thomason.

The accident occurred as Mrs. Thomason and her daughter were crossing Dumas Avenue from east to west at about 2 p.m., police said. Mrs. Thomason apparently walked into the path of the oncoming truck after being caught in the center of the street by a changing traffic light.

The driver of the rig, Sandy Scroggins, 25, of Nevada, Mo., was uninjured in the accident but was taken to Dumas Memorial Hospital for treatment of shock.

Officers said no charges will be filed

in connection with the accident. Mrs. Tomason had lived in Stratford for four years. She was born in Wheeler and had lived in Amarillo for 30 years prior to moving to Stratford.

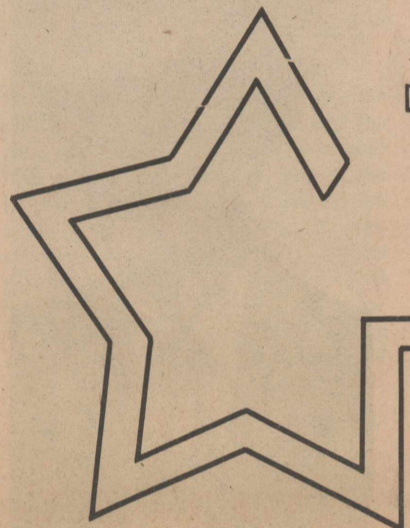
Meat Donated to Foster Home and Coldwater Manor

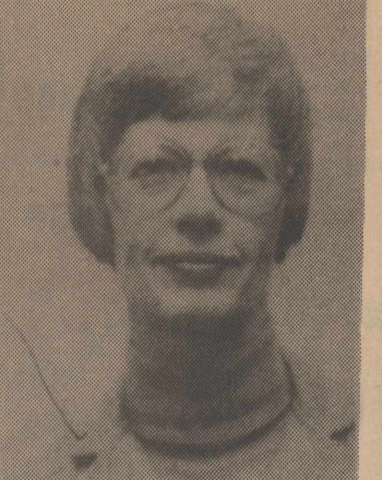
Woods holds active membership in the Texas Justices of the Peace Association and is presently serving as Judge Advocate of the West Texas Justices of the Peace Association.

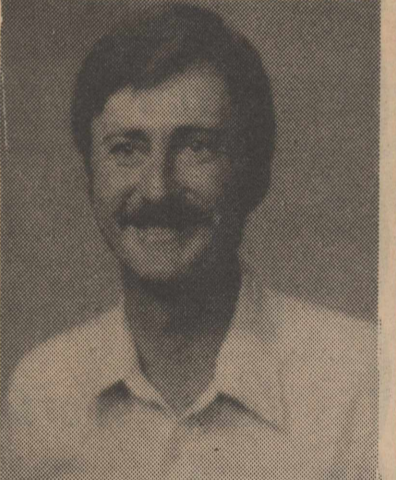
Ernestine Almquist of Stratford has announced that she is a democratic candidate for the office of District and County Clerk of Sherman County.

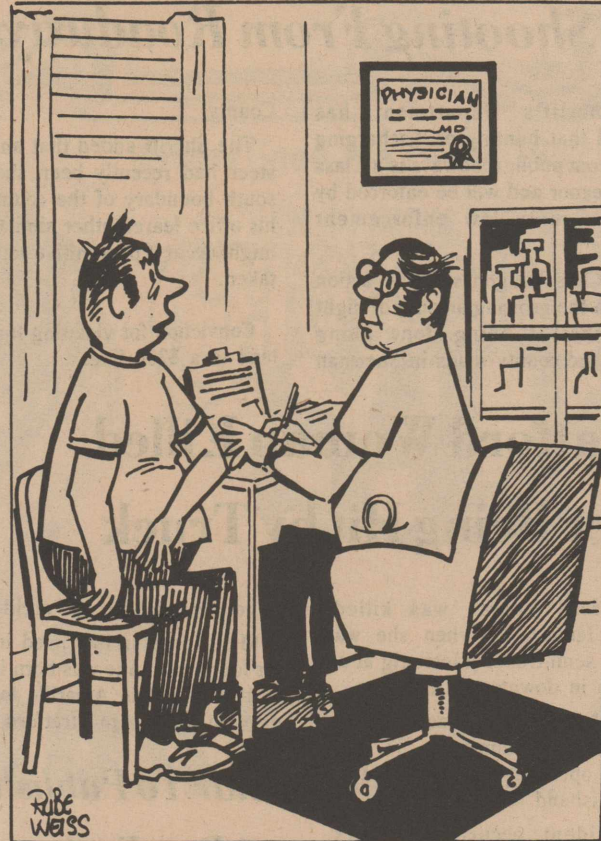

misdemeanor and felony offenses by informing them of their constitutional rights and setting their bail. As a magistrate, he conducts preliminary examining trials to determine if there is sufficient evidence to bind persons accused of felony offenses over for action by the Grand Jury; (4) Also as a magistrate, he holds hearing to determine if there is probably cause to issue a search warrant and warrants of arrest; (5) He is a judge authorized to hold certain administrative hearings for the Texas Department of Public Safety; (6) Acts as Coroner; (7) He holds courts of inquest over certain deaths; (8) He is county registrar for births and deaths; (9) He is an ex-officio Notary Public; and (10) He is also empowered to perform marriage ceremonies.

county purposes, and it approves official bonds and salaries of county officers and authorizes the appointment of assistants to the county offices. The Commissioners' Court has the responsibility to fill vacancies that occur in county offices. It appoints officers and personnel of the county that are not elected officials. The Commissioners' Court accepts and rejects contract bids for new building projects, roads, and for buying new machinery and equipment. There are responsibilities with Health and Welfare. The Commissioners' Court orders elections for the issuance of bonds, and appoints election judges. It provides county buildings, such as jails, and is responsible for keeping them up to standards as required by law.

Buchanan to Seek Re-Election as Representative to 88th District

State Representative J.W. "Buck" Buchanan of Dumas this week formally announced his candidacy for re-election, in the new Texas 88th Legislative District.

The new 88th now contains 13 counties: Dallam, Hartley, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hemphill, Roberts, Hutchinson, Moore, Oldham, Carson and Wheeler. The district was drawn to agree with 1980 populations.

Buchanan points out that the 88th "is established as of now, but there is a challenge in federal courts of all Texas House re-districting and something could change.

"But, as of now, I have 13 counties with similar economic interests and geography. I am pleased to represent them and am going ahead with my campaign on the premise that the district will remain as it is now drawn."

The Hansford county native has a long record of service in agricultural, civic and youth work, and has received a number of awards for this achievement, locally and regionally.

He has been president of Water, Inc., the Texas Water Conservation Association, the Dumas Chamber of Commerce, the Moore County Fair and Association.

"I believe that my experience in the Legislature, at different periods, gives me a perspective to effectively serve the area, particularly with changes we know are coming up," Buchanan declares, and adds:

"The federal government is eliminating its grants program in favor of giving this job to the states. This means that the Texas Legislature will figure in financing for local projects that previously have been designated out of Washington.

"I believe this is a better way to go, and I will work to assure that the people of the 88th district have their needs heard and met in Austin."

Rep. Buchanan devotes much of his time to his job as Representative, in the district and in Austin, and says of the office: "I have worked constructively in Austin for the Panhandle--and I have worked to defeat legislation that served special interests or that increased state spending needlessly and carelessly.

"I hold that a Representative has a responsibility to oppose bad legislation. I am proud to have a record of being conservative and responsible, as my district expects me to be."

"I am asking your support and vote in the 1982 elections on my record of serving the district," Buchanan adds. "I will be visiting over the district in the months ahead to keep abreast of people's needs and wishes--and to ask and thank you for your support."

SAFETY OF ZUCCHINI PINEAPPLE

A problem has arisen on the safety of the zucchini-pineapple recipe published by the Michigan Extension people on August 6, 1981. This recipe may be

similar to many recipes that have been traveling around for the past few summers. The Michigan recipe is as follows:

- ZUCCHINI PINEAPPLE
 - 1 gallon and 1 cup zucchini, peeled and ground or cubed
 - 1 gram oil of pineapple or pineapple extract
 - 1 46 oz. can unsweetened pineapple juice
 - 1/2 cup lemon juice
 - 3 cups sugar
- Mix and boil for 3 minutes. Pack into hot, sterilized pint jars. Cover the zucchini with the pineapple liquid. Process for 10 minutes in a boiling water bath.

This recipe has been experimented with to test its safety. Experiments have resulted in the following information:

After food processing, the pH of the product was in the range of 3.6-3.85, which is good for this type of product and process. The pH was continually monitored and in the third month of storage, the pH jumped to 4.5 or above which is the low acidity base favorable for the growth of bacteria.

Clostridium Botulinum is the harmful bacteria found in this product.

I strongly recommend to homemakers who have preserved zucchini in this fashion to destroy the jar contents of the product. I have preserved zucchini in this recipe and know that a lot of time, effort, and food dollars are intangible ingredients in the recipe and to destroy the contents is a disappointment.

Hopefully, in the near future, researchers will recommend a recipe that is safe for preserving zucchini.

The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN--One of the best ways to fight inflation in consumer purchases is the formation of member consumer cooperatives. These associations are basically non-profit and are engaged in acquiring and furnishing various types of commodities, goods, or services for the primary and mutual benefit of the members. Of course, these are also producer and manufacturing cooperatives.

Such cooperatives are formed under the Texas Cooperative Association Act and are subject to the provisions of the Texas Non-Profit Cooperation Act.

The essence of this type of association is that it is operated on a "cooperative basis." This means that the total income of the association, after payment of costs of operations and investment dividends, is distributed to the member consumers or is retained by the co-op in order to expand or to reduce prices of merchandise.

The cooperative association files articles of incorporation with the Texas Secretary of State and may adopt by-laws. In any meeting of the co-operative, each member has one vote.

Recently, the Consumer Protection Division became aware of a situation in which a retail drug store was using the term co-op as part of its business name. The Texas statutes prohibit the use of the term "cooperative" or any derivation such as "co-op" in a business

Therefore, consumers should be alert to the fact that this may occur and should investigate a cooperative thoroughly before they join or make purchases.

It is possible for consumers to gain substantial savings by participating in a cooperative; however, a consumer should be armed with all pertinent information prior to making this decision. For example, consumers might inquire of established cooperatives as to the cost of the shares and whether current or past members are satisfied with the quality and prices of merchandise. Further, it may be necessary for members to volunteer for some duties in the operation of the co-op such as building maintenance or purchasing inventory.

While this may result in keeping prices lower, the potential member should be prepared to schedule time for such activities.

Consumers who are considering forming a cooperative association should consult with a private attorney for guidance on the appropriate actions to take.

Consumers who have further questions may call the nearest office of the Consumer Protection Division of the Texas Attorney General.

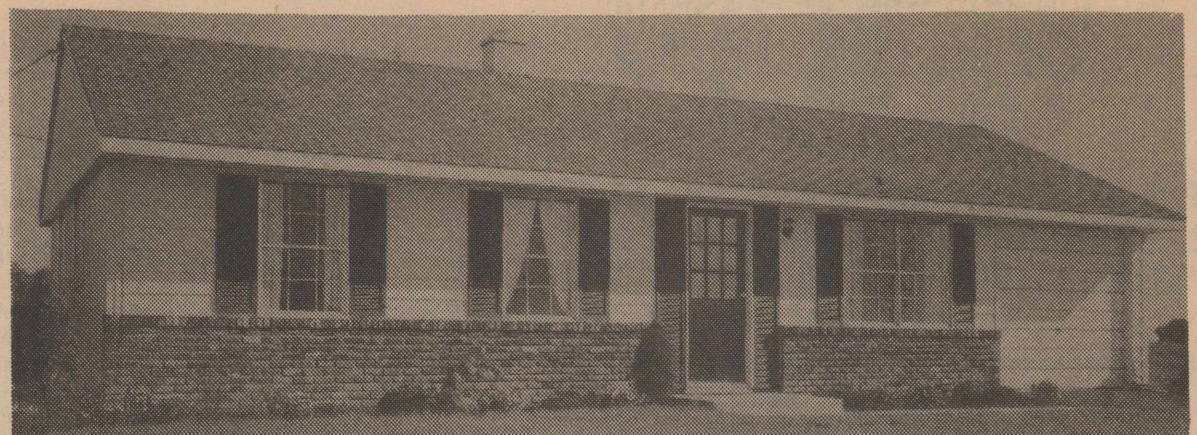
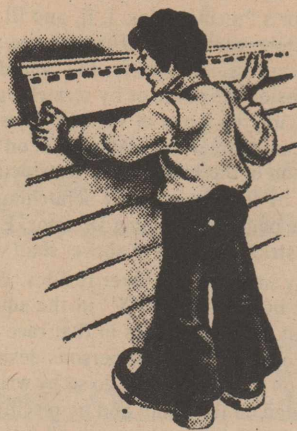

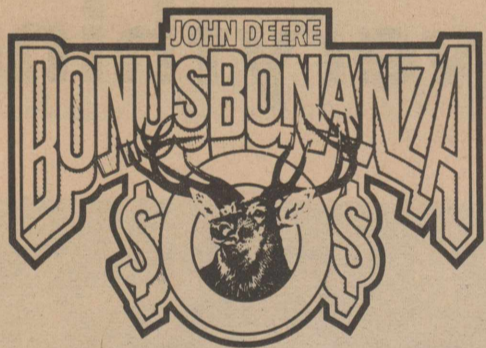
