Local Man to Retire After 35 Years at Highway Dept.

AMARILLO--Wayland E. Brown of Stratford will retire January 31, 1982, from the Texas State Department of Highways and Public Transportation after 37 years service.

Brown, as maintenance superintendent since 1975, was assigned liaison duties between the Amarillo District Office and a section that includes Dallam, Hartley, Oldham, Deaf Smith, Randall, Potter, Moore and Sherman counties, and the Amarillo Expressway system.

He started to work for the state agency in 1942 in Borger, and worked as Sherman County maintenance foreman in Stratford for 21 years.

Brown served in the U.S. Army from 1944 to 1946 and spent most of his military duty at Ft. McClellan, Alabama. He returned to the Department in 1947 and worked in Amarillo and Canyon before moving to Stratford.

He has completed Department courses in general supervision, managing highway maintenance, as-

Stratford Man Dead-at-Scene of Pickup-Train Collision

A 77-year-old Stratford man was killed when the vehicle he was driving collided with a train on U.S. 287 in Stratford Saturday, January 30.

Melvin Arthur Phillips, a long-time resident of Sherman County, was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident at about 5 p.m., according to the Stratford Police report.

Phillips, who was driving a pickup truck in the northbound lane of the highway, apparently did not see the

westbound train as he attempted to cross the tracks. His vehicle was struck on the right front side by the train.

The deceased moved to Sherman County from Petersburg in 1928. He was a retired farmer-rancher and had been a member of the Masonic Lodge 874, Eastern Star 960 and the First Christian Church.

these is not correct. Check to see that you have the correct voting box number - the cards show this to be precinct number.

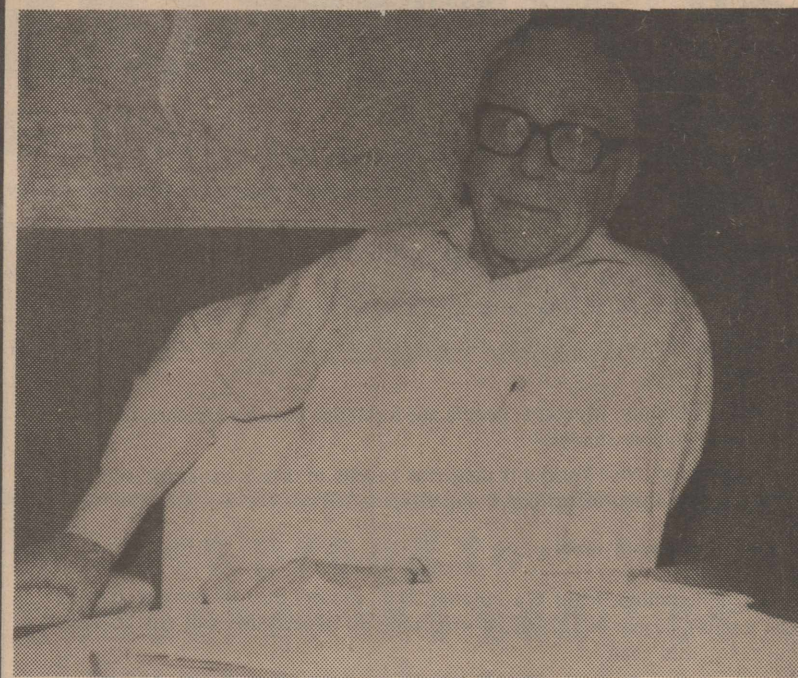
Have you moved, even just across the street? This can change your precinct.

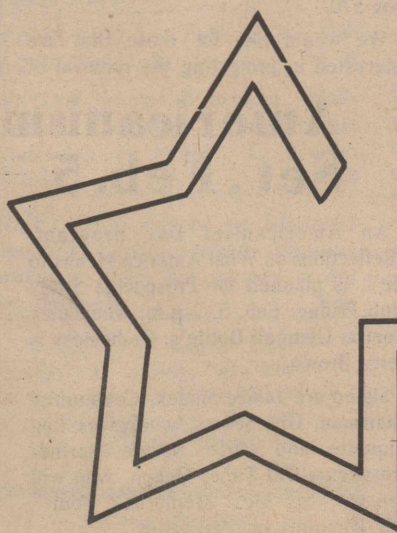

Annual FFA, 4-H Event

Livestock Show Set This Week

The annual Sherman County 4-H and Stratford FFA Livestock Show and Sale will be held this week at the Sherman County Barn with judging and the auction sale set for Feb. 5 and 6.

The 37th annual show and sale will get underway with the swine judging at 9 a.m., Friday, Feb. 5, and will be followed by the lamb judging at 2 p.m.

Commercial steer judging will begin at 9 a.m., Saturday, Feb. 6 and will be followed by the judging of steer classes at 10 a.m. Steer classes will be divided into three categories: light weight, middle weight, heavy weight.

The judging of heifer classes will be held at 11:30 a.m. on Feb. 6 and will be followed by the auction sale at 1 p.m.

The livestock sale held last year grossed almost \$89,000 bringing an average of \$427.04 for each of the 22

lams sold, \$1,499.07 for each of 22 steers, and \$2.83 per pound average for each of 74 pigs.

Grand champion honors during the 1981 show were won by: Nicol Harland, whose sheep was purchased by Don's Supermarket for \$1,200; Christy Comer, whose pig was purchased by Don's Supermarket for \$1,425; and Jimmy Gillenwaters, whose steer was not offered for sale.

General superintendent for the show this year will be Arthur Judd. Other superintendents and their assistants are as follows: Jack Harris and George Avent, steer; Keith Waters and Steve Beattie, swine; Mike O'Brien and Gary Lundberg, sheep. The superintendent of the commercial steer show will be Larry

Parsons.

Committee chairmen for the show this year are: Arthur Judd, show officials; Don Gurley and Rex Christian, weighing committee; Nancy Jones, secretary; John Wilson, treasurer; James Perkins and Bill Pendleton, auctioneers; Walter Lasley, trophy committee; E.R. Bell, finance committee.

Serving on the advisory committee are: Richard Carter and Dan Hembree, both vocational agriculture teachers, and Jim Allison, county agricultural agent.

The animals exhibited at the event will represent nearly a year of work on the part of each of the FFA and 4-H Club members.

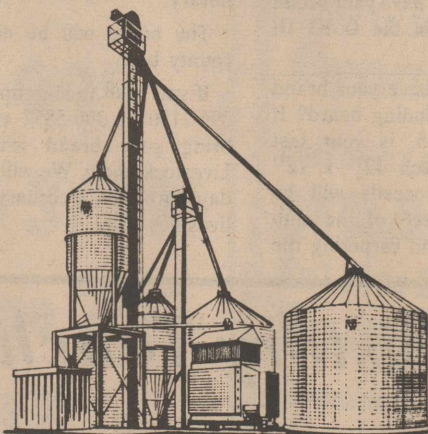

Mr. Watson was born in Coleman, Texas. He and his wife moved to Stratford in 1928. Their only child, Charlotte, preceded him in death last summer.

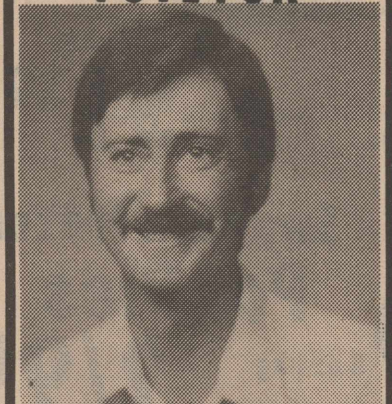
